I came across this and looked into it and found out that these descriptions of each fold are read during the folding of a flag in a ceremony from the USAF Academy. I thought that it would be nice to share this so we all know the importance and reasons for properly folding and presenting The Colors. Here is the explanation of each of those folds:

The 1st fold of our Flag is a symbol of life.

The 2nd fold is a symbol of our belief in eternal life.

The 3rd fold is made in honor and remembrance of the veterans departing our ranks who gave a portion of their lives for the defense of our country to attain peace throughout the world.

The 4th fold represents our weaker nature; for as American citizens trusting, it is to Him we turn in times of peace as well as in time of war for His divine guidance.

The 5th fold is a tribute to our country, for in the words of Stephen Decatur, "Our Country, in dealing with other countries may she always be right; but it is still our country, right or wrong."

The 6th fold is for where our hearts lie. It is with our heart that we pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

The 7th fold is a tribute to our Armed Forces, for it is through the Armed Forces that we protect our country and our flag against all her enemies, whether they are found within or without the boundaries of our Republic.

The 8th fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day, and to honor mother, for whom it flies on Mother's Day.

The 9th fold is a tribute to womanhood; for it has been through their faith, their love, loyalty and devotion that the character of the men and women who have made this country great has been molded.

The 10th fold is a tribute to the father, for he, too, has given his sons and daughters for the defense of our country since they were first born.

The 11th fold, in the eyes of a Hebrew citizen represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon, and glorifies in their eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

The 12th fold, in the eyes of a Christian citizen, represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in their eyes, God the Father, the Son and Holy Spirit.

When the Flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost reminding us of our Nation's motto, "In God We Trust." After the Flag is completely folded and tucked in, it takes on the appearance of a cocked hat, ever reminding us of the soldiers who served under General George Washington, and the Sailors and Marines who served under Captain John Paul Jones, who were followed by their comrades and shipmates in the Armed Forces of the United States, preserving for us the rights, privileges, and freedoms we enjoy today.

The next time you see a Flag ceremony honoring someone that has served our country, either in the Armed Forces or in our civilian services such as the Police Force or Fire Department, keep in mind all the important reasons behind each and every movement. They have paid the ultimate sacrifice for all of us by honoring our Flag and our Country.

ARCHITECTURE & ENGINEERING CONTRACT

The Veterans Administration has finally announced the name of the A&E firm they selected to write the Master Plan and provide the Architectural drawings for all structures to be constructed at the National Cemetery for the veterans of southern Colorado. After purchasing the property, it took 13 months, and much prodding to make the selection. The AES Group Team of Parker, Colorado has been selected to produce the necessary plans. They were selected because they are considered a local firm, and because they have extensive experience planning National VA Cemeteries. The company is Veteran-owned, and the Team has performed planning work at over eighty Veterans Cemetery Projects.

The planning work is expected to take about a year, and will include a plan to mitigate issues with the 100-year flood plain which exists in the lower eastern and northeastern portion of the site. The Team will plan the entrance, internal roads, utilities corridors, structure sites, etc. of the entire 473-acre site, with particular attention to the First Phase of construction requirements. Phase I will include approximately 45-50 acres for administrative, support, and visitors' buildings, as well as ceremonial areas and burial and cremated remains facilities for approximately ten years of veteran/spouse deaths.

During the next few months, the AES Group Team and VA personnel are expected to host various meetings with local citizens and veterans groups to discuss various aspects of the work to be accomplished for the construction of the National Cemetery. Additionally, the VA will solicit recommendations for naming the National Cemetery. The Committee has made its' recommendation known to name it "The Pikes Peak National Cemetery", but other groups may have different ideas, and they will be heard.

Construction of the cemetery cannot be undertaken until the approved plans can be made available to the construction firms who would like to be included in the bidding process.

Funding is presently available to complete the planning process, but the Congress will have to provide future fiscal funding for the construction phase. The VA will select a Cemetery Director to operate the Cemetery. The selection date is not known at this time.

So, the long, arduous task of completing the establishment of our National Cemetery is expected to continue into at least 2018.

SAL Five Point Program of Service

This is a study program for older members. It consists of five separate points. The points are for Patriotism, Citizenship, Discipline, Leadership, and Legionism. After completing each step there is a medal to be awarded.

Point number 1 is for Patriotism, requires the member to have a knowledge and history of the flag as well as the proper way to display and respect it.

Point number 2 is for Citizenship, requires the member to show his usefulness in outside activities and display a working knowledge of the qualities of a good citizen.

Point number 3 is for Discipline, is for the member who shows respect for rules and obedience to them in all his activities.

Point number 4 is for Leadership which is for the member who shows qualities of leadership in different situations.

Point number 5 is for Legionism where the member shows that he understands the ritualistic work as well as the program of activities for the SAL

After all five stars are received by the member; he is eligible to receive the Five-Star Medal for perfection in SAL work.

All SAL members are eligible and are encouraged to earn these medals. I am working on getting the study program posted on our website. More information about the program is in the SAL handbook. Bringing a Little South to the West Immediate Past Post Commander Jay Bowen

Most of the South is waking up from Winter's cold and embracing the sun and warming weather of early Spring. Grass is turning green, flowers are blooming, and trees are acquiring a new coat of leaves. The vegetation is not the only thing waking up, so are the bugs and varmints.

I remember vividly this time of year in Tennessee and Arkansas. This was my absolute favorite time of year for weather. It was cool at night, and had warm, not so humid days. It was just before the mosquitos started getting active so you could sit outside in the evening and not get "slap happy" trying to keep from getting mosquito bit. You could wear shorts and not have your legs look like you were afflicted with boils. But this was fleeting, so you had to take advantage of it because soon the weather and bug-borne activity would pick up quickly.

The "no shoulders" as my Bubba refers to snakes begin to move about. Being cold-blooded they start out moving somewhat slow, but their speed and frequency pick up. They enjoy sunning themselves and will stretch out on roads because the asphalt is warm in the afternoon and feels pretty good. This time of year it's pretty easy to find them laying in the road and along the shoulder. Later in the year, they'll be hiding out in the sheds and grass, but now they like the feel of sun and the heat generated from the road. Fortunately, most of them are harmless, but as Jackie likes to remind me, "the only good snake is a dead snake." Occasionally, you'll find a Copperhead or Cotton Mouth (a.k.a. Water Moccasin to most southerners). They do have Rattlesnakes in the South, but they don't seem to be as plentiful there as they are here. But what they lack in Rattlers, they more than make up with other interesting and poisonous snakes. They even have Coral snakes in some of the high timber areas. These snakes are pretty, but the deadliest snake in N. America.

Enough about snakes. They're not nearly as bothersome as Wasps, Hornets, Yellow Jackets, Bumble Bees and mosquitos. This is the time of year when the flying stinger brigades begin building new nests and these miserable creatures swarm around making everyone look like they're breakdancing. You can't sit on a porch or patio without playing dodgeball with Wasps. And because the weather cools in the evening, they slow down and can't fly as well as they do in the middle of Summer. That makes it easier to kill them, and also makes it easier for them to light on you and not want to leave. Every time I see a Wasp nest, I think of my grandfather on my Mother's side who lived in Arkansas. He farmed his entire life and had hands that were nothing but one big callous. He was only about 5'5", and about as big around as he was tall. Many times I watched in fascination mixed with horror as he would reach up and grab a nest full of Wasps and crush them in his hands. The only time he would get stung (and it was seldom) would be if one of the Wasps got away and worked its way around to the back of his hand. And more than once, I saw Paw Paw pick up a snake by its tail as it was skittering across his yard. He would swing it over his head like a lariat, then snap the snake like a whip, killing it instantly ... most of the time. One time I watched him do that with a snake about 5' long. I don't remember what kind it was, but it must have been poisonous because Paw Paw wouldn't kill a non-poisonous snake. On this particular occasion, he swung that big ole snake and snap! Expecting the snake's head to come flying off, he threw the snake on the ground and it turned and tried to strike him. Whoops! That time it didn't work...but it did the second time. That man feared nothing.

One of the many things I like about living here is compared to down South, we have no mosquitos and very few Wasps. Which is fine with me. I like putting on a pair of shorts and sitting out on the patio in the evening. And I never could break-dance that well.
