Vietnam War Veterans Recognition Act Announcement

Lee White is President of Chapter 1106 of the Vietnam Veterans of America. He has sent us this reminder:

On March 28, 2017, President Trump signed the "Vietnam War Veterans Recognition Act" that established the National Vietnam War Veterans Day to be celebrated each year on March 29th. Objectives of this act include:

1. Vietnam Commemoration – The Commemoration makes no distinction between veterans who served incountry, or were assigned elsewhere during those 20 years.

2. Highlight the service of the Armed forces during the war.

3. Pay tribute to wartime contributions at home by American citizens.

4. Highlight technology, science, and medical advances made during the war.

5. Recognize contributions by other friendly nations.

A few stats:

- 9,000,000 Americans served between November 1, 1955 and May 15, 1975
- 2,700,000 U. S. service members served in the Vietnam theatre of war
- 58,000 Killed in Action
- 304,000 Wounded in Action
- 1,253 Missing in Action
- 2,500 Prisoners of War

Buy A Brick Fundraiser!

If you've attended our meetings over the past year, you may have heard us discuss plans for a new fundraising effort. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our landscaping project we are working. The bricks are engraved using a hybrid method that combines both laser engraving and sandblasting. The engraving is then painted using the same paint used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are the details/answers to questions we anticipate:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs and Offset Increasing Costs
- What Size Are the Bricks? We are offering 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.
- What are the Costs for the Individual Bricks? Prices range from \$90 to \$200, depending on size, style and lettering desired. For the 8x8 or 12x12 bricks, you can add a second emblem. Contact the Adjutant for ordering details. There is <u>NO</u> additional cost for the second emblem on the larger bricks.
- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Prices range from \$250 to \$500, again depending on size, style and lettering.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? Visit <u>http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209</u> to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.

Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know and we will make certain they are all placed together.

Bringing a Little South to the West Past Post Commander Jay Bowen

Growing up I don't think I ever met any kid who didn't love Westerns. I mentioned them in my article last month, but I've been thinking quite a bit about those old shows and just wanted to share some thoughts about them this month. And it doesn't matter if I'm talking about Western movies or the great television shows of the 50's and 60's, this is relevant about both/either.

One of my first thoughts is how great a shot those guys were, especially the good guys. They could shoot a holster off the waist of the bad guys, shoot the gun from the hand of the outlaw they were facing, and unless they were in a heated battle that was supposed to last 3-4 minutes, they never missed their target. In reality, according to my research this was not likely the case back in those days.

Not to get too technical, but one of the great innovations of the day was to "rifle" the inside of a gun barrel. This rifling was done by cutting swirls inside the barrel, causing the round to spin as it left the barrel. This spinning motion improved accuracy dramatically. While the rifling technique was invented several hundred years ago, it didn't become popular in handguns until the mid to late 1800's. That was due mainly to the expense of having the bore of the barrel rifled correctly. So most of the pistols used by the good and bad guys in the early to late 1800's weren't capable of having the accuracy demonstrated in the old Westerns. But as a kid, we didn't know anything about that and didn't care. We just reveled in the displays of gunmanship and as we played "cowboys and Indians," we were also sharpshooters like our on-screen heroes. Matter of fact, I've read from multiple sources that until cowboys like Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid came around, most of the good/bad guys had to shoot many, many times to hit their intended target. Apparently, Sundance was almost as good as portrayed on screen.

Another scene we always looked forward to was the shootout in the streets. The Sheriff, or Marshall, or the good guy du jour would stand about 50 yards from his nemesis and they would stare down each other before one of them finally "reached for the draw." In almost every instance, the good guy would draw faster and his aim was always more true. Sometimes the good guy shot second, but it was their shot that proved to be the one that counted. I remember watching the beginning of each Gunsmoke episode. Matt Dillon drew his gun slower than the bad guy he was facing, but apparently the bad guy's aim was off and Matt never missed. I guess the bad guy in that Western didn't have rifling in his gun barrel, but Matt did.

In reality, according my research there were very, very few gun fights in the street as depicted in those old Westerns. Most of the shootouts occurred shooting from beside or behind buildings or using some other barrier for protection. While the face-to-face shootout was cooler and more-manly, it makes much more sense they would hide behind something for protection when in battle. And I guess a rifle (because of the rifling no doubt) or scattergun (double-barreled shotgun) if the distance wasn't too great, was the preferred weapon during a shootout.

I think my all-time favorite, and it has to be one of the most famous gunfights in the history of the West, was the shootout at the OK Corral in Tombstone, AZ, "The Town Too Tough to Die." This was the battle between the Earp brothers with their buddy, John "Doc" Holliday, against the Clanton and McLaury gang. I guess in reality you could argue who was the good guys and who were the bad guys in this battle, but history would suggest the Earp brothers and Doc Holliday were not as bad as the Clanton's and McLaury's.

There have been many, many movies about this famous battle, but the truth is the gunfight lasted about 30 seconds, and there were about 30 shots fired. None of the Earp brothers or Doc Holliday were killed during the gunfight, however interestingly enough all but Wyatt was wounded on their side. On the Clanton/McLaury side, both Tom and Frank McLaury were killed, as was Billy Clanton. Ike Clanton and Billy Claiborne ran off. The Earps and Holliday were charged with murder (probably because Virgil Earp is reported to have fired first), but they were acquitted and it was determined they acted within their jurisdiction as lawmen.

I guess one of the reasons those old shows were so popular was because the good guys always won the day, and with the exception of Matt Dillon, they also always won the girl. Sadly, we all know that is also not always the reality. Sometimes bad guys win, and the good guys don't always win the girl. But I do believe that in the end, the bad guys will eventually get what they deserve, if not in this life, certainly when they face the Master of All and they have to account for their actions. And I also believe if the good guy doesn't get the girl, it's because she was not the girl intended for him. At the end of the day and the good guy rides off into the sunset, the right girl and his just rewards are waiting in the next town and at his next adventure.


