Constitution & By-Laws Update:

The Post Constitution and By-Laws were sent out last month and we were to vote on them in our August Membership Meeting. Following the July Membership Meeting, it came to my attention that there was some confusion due to them going out with the July newsletter. We will be sending out the draft Constitution & By-Laws again and pushing the vote to September to ensure all our members have a chance to review them.

As outlined in Article X, Section 2 of the Post Constitution, "This Constitution may be amended at any regular Post meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting in which there is a quorum, providing that the proposed amendment shall have been submitted in writing and read at the next preceding regular Post meeting, and providing further that written notice shall have been given to all Post members at least thirty (30) days in advance of the date when such amendment is to be voted upon, notifying such members that at such a meeting a proposal to amend the Constitution is to be voted upon." The Constitution & By-Laws Committee proposed several small changes to our Post Constitution & By-Laws. The proposed Constitution & By-Laws have been attached with the Newsletter email and will be voted on at the September Membership meeting.

Liquor License Update:

Many of you are aware the membership in general assembly voted earlier this year to approve the Post pursue a liquor license. I am happy to say it has been submitted and is under review by the City/State. The timeframe for approval is around 90 days. During this time the lounge will be closed for all events until our license comes in. I would like to make very clear that that this license will not change the way we operate the Post. We will not be turning into a "bar". The primary purpose of the license is to allow the Post to serve alcohol during hall rentals/special events, thus creating additional revenue for the many programs and activities our Post supports. If you have any questions about the liquor licensing process please reach out to me and I would be happy to answer any questions you may have.

Buy A Brick Fundraiser!

We are re-introducing an exciting fundraiser for our Post. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our landscaping project we are working. The engraving uses the same technology as used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are some FAQs:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs
- What Size Are the Bricks? 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.
- What are the Costs for the Individual Bricks? Prices vary depending on size, style and lettering desired, but typically range from \$75 to \$200. For the 8x8 or 12x12 bricks, you can add a second emblem. Contact the Adjutant for ordering details. There is <u>NO</u> additional cost for the second emblem on the larger bricks.
- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$125 to \$500.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209 to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.

Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know and we will make certain they are all placed together.

VA Eastern Colorado Health Care System's Social Work Service helps Veterans and those who care about them with comprehensive Veteran care and support services. Social Workers are available to help Veterans find resources to meet their needs within the VA system and in their communities, too include home and community supports, benefits, financial assistance, housing assistance, transportation, and community living resources and services. Social Workers offer case management and education conducted through one-on-one discussions, family conferences, and group classes. As a VA patient, you have a say in the health care you receive, but what would happen if you were too ill to understand your treatment choices or to tell your doctor what treatment you want?

- Who would you want to make health care decisions for you?
- What type of treatments or procedures would you want?

Questions like these may be hard to think about, but they are important. That's why VA wants you to know about a legal form you can complete. It's called an "advance directive."

What is an advance directive?

An advance directive is a legal form that helps your doctors and family members understand your wishes about medical and mental health care. It can help others decide about treatments if you are too ill to decide for yourself—for example, if you are unconscious or too weak to talk. Your advance directive is used only when you are not able to make decisions yourself.

There are two types of advance directives:

a durable power of attorney for health care and a living will.

What is a durable power of attorney for health care?

This form allows you to name the person you trust to make health care decisions for you if you can't make them yourself—your "health care agent." He or she will have the legal right to make health care decisions for you. You can choose any adult to be your agent. It's best to choose someone you trust, who knows you well and who knows your values. You should ensure the person is willing to serve as your agent. If you don't choose an agent, your doctor will choose someone to make decisions for you as required in VA policy, in the following order: legal guardian (if you have one), spouse, adult child, parent, sibling, grandparent, grandchild, or a close friend. Your health care team, or a court, will make decisions for you in accordance with VA policy if none of the above is available. Ask your care team for more details on this process.

What is a living will?

A living will, is a legal document that states what kinds of treatments you would or would not want if you become ill and can't decide for yourself. It can help your health care agent and your doctor make decisions the way you would want them to. Writing down what kind of treatment you would or would not want can help make it easier for those who are asked to make decisions for you. If you don't have a living will, decisions will be made for you based on what is known about you and your values. It is important to discuss your wishes with your loved ones, your doctors, and your health care team so they will not have to wonder what you want and if they are doing the right thing.

Must my health care agent always follow my living will?

Most of the time, yes. Your health care agent should try to respect your wishes, but it can be hard to imagine all future health scenarios and say just what treatment you would want at that time. Because of this, your agent may have to Interpret your wishes. In a VA Advance Directive, you can say if you want your agent to do exactly what your living will says or you can say it is alright for your agent to make the decision he or she thinks is best for you at that time, even if it isn't what you said you would want.

How do I complete an advance directive?

Fill out VA Form 10-01 37, "VA Advance Directive: Durable Power of Attorney and Living Will," or you can use any valid state advance directive form. Talk to a health care professional at your local VA health care facility. This could be a social worker or your primary care provider. You may also talk to your spiritual advisor or attorney. Your VA health care team can make your Advance Directive part of your medical record.

Do I need to fill out a durable power of attorney and a living will?

No. Even though the VA form contains both, you can choose whether to complete the durable power of attorney for health care section, the living will section, or both.

Can I change my advance directive?

Yes, you may change or cancel your advance directive at any time. In fact, you should review your advance directive regularly to make sure it's up to date, especially if there is a change in your health. If you change it, be sure to tell your health care team and have them put it in your health record. Share your new directive with your family members and other loved ones.

BRINGING A LITTLE SOUTH TO THE WEST



I was recently watching *American Graffiti* and it brought back fond memories of all the different activities available to teenagers in the 60's. The nightlife activities open to a restless teen was really limited by only three things; money, curfew, and wheels. And there was always a challenge with one or all of those obstacles with me and my running buddies.

We rarely had a plan for our Friday or Saturday nights. What we did was typically driven by the three things mentioned above. The curfew was pretty much the same for all of us; 10:00pm on a Friday and/or Saturday night. The only exception might be a concert or if a drive-in movie was one of those that ran longer than the normal hour and a half. But that was always approved in advance, and the curfew was never extended past 11:00pm for any of us.

Speaking of drive-in movies, that was the most popular thing to do if you had money and a car. Until I saved enough money to buy my '64 Buick Special, I was able to borrow my parent's Chevy Station Wagon. We'd pool our money to first make certain there was enough for gas because that was the one stipulation on borrowing the family wagon. I had to put gas back in the car. And at \$0.17/gallon for regular (we NEVER put Ethel in the tank, it was way too expensive), sometimes we would just have to opt for driving around and forgo the drive-in.

But if we were able to scrape the money together from mowing lawns, working part-time in a retail store or gas station or doing some other odd jobs, off to the movies we'd go. Now, I had heard there were some kids who would have two people in the front seat to pay for the theater, while 4 or 5 others were secreted away somewhere else in the car. They would lay down in the backseat floor with a blanket over them, or if they were in a Station Wagon, they would even put someone in the spare tire carrier that was in the back and covered with a side panel to hide the tire. If you took the tire out (and it was always a full-size tire), you could fit someone inside the carrier where the tire was stored. You should know I never did anything like that, but I was told there were others who did.

As you've seen in many movies, we also "cruised" the strip. For us in Memphis, there were several strips. It seems each suburb had their "strip" that became hangouts for teenagers. We didn't have a Sonics, but we had a Shoney's Big Boy that was similar. They had the drive-up kiosks where you could sit in your car and order a burger. That was a popular spot for guys with their "Muscle Car" to drive around with the intent to show off, intimidate those of us driving a Station Wagon, and impress the girls.

For me and Jackie, our favorite date consisted of going to the Zoo and/or the Pink Palace. Memphis has always prided themselves in their Zoo and for good reason. It is still a great place to visit and the habitat areas are very well done. The Pink Palace is a mansion that was initially built by the guy who started the Piggly Wiggly stores. He began construction on this huge palace of a home and went bankrupt before it could be completed. The city took over the building,

finished the construction based off the blueprints, and turned it into a museum. It was really an interesting place to visit, and yes the outside façade of the home was done in pink.

Even though both places made for a great daytime date on a Saturday, truth be told the main reason it appealed to me so much was because entrance into both places was free. And free was good. Still is. If I had money, our standard date was a drive-in. We didn't really go out to eat very often. Most of the time, we'd grab a "dog" or burger at the Concession stand at the drivein or Zoo. We didn't get to eat at the Pink Palace.

It's very rare to see teens today mowing lawns or doing other odd jobs. I've never had a teenager knock on my door and ask if they could mow my lawn. If they did, I'd gladly let them do it. And our newspaper carrier is a 30-something year old adult. Many of the teens today are content just getting the money from Mom and Dad to go out, and the parents give it to them! Except for prom night, they typically go to the Mall for a date, or maybe a walk-in theater. And I doubt most of them even know what a curfew is. Too bad. They really don't know what they're missing.
