

Organization of The American Legion -

Often times an individual joins The American Legion without really knowing how it is organized. Here is a simplified version one may use as a primer. Certainly there are more detailed explanations which can be explored at another time, but for now this quick overview is offered for starters.

The American Legion is an international organization with Posts in Europe, The Philippines, and the US. The National Headquarters, located in Indianapolis, IN. has a full time staff with numerous volunteer committees. After National, there are 55 Departments (states & other affiliates). Within the Departments (states, etc), there are Districts, Posts, and members. One might say in reverse there is the individual member, who is a member of a Post, and the Post is part of a District, and the District is part of a Department (state), and then National, which is made up of a HQ and all Departments.

We members of Post 209 are also members of District 7, Department of Colorado, which is part of The American Legion National organization. And with few exceptions, all are volunteers joined together for the common purposes spelled out in the Preamble of the American Legion and are recited at the beginning of our Post 209 General Membership meetings. Want more information on the organization of The American Legion? Check with one of your Post 209 officers, ask to see the "2014 Officer's Guide and Manual of Ceremonies," which has 166 pages of information regarding organization and operation of The American Legion. Also, there is the website www.legion.org one might access for information.

Finally, to really get to know how The American Legion and our Post 209 are organized, become an active member by volunteering to serve on one or more of the many committees that keep Post 209 one of he most active and premier Posts in the Department of Colorado.

The burn pits were ready, the Honor Guard posted Colors, the Chaplain said a prayer of hope and remembrance, and each Scout carried a worn or faded flag with reverence. The Legion Riders placed the flags in the fire and rendered a hand salute.

These are not small things. They are part of a great calling that the American Legion carries on: To foster love of country, and respect for its flag, in the hearts and minds of its citizens.

What could be more fitting than to perform this ceremony on the we celebrate our Nation's birth?

Bringing a Little South to the West Jay Bowen

As far back as I can remember, Southerners have lived with the threat of Tornados. The season used to primarily be restricted to the Spring, but now it seems there are very real chances to get caught up in a twister any time during the year. The one thing that hasn't seemed to change about being exposed to the hazardous weather is how me and my redneck buddies reacted. You would think that as soon as the siren began to wail, everyone would head to the Storm Cellar (assuming you lived in the country and had one). As a kid I remembered visiting my aunt who lived on a farm just outside Matthews, MO. They had a typical Storm Cellar just outside the front door and off to the side of the house. Like most of them, it was not much more than a hole in the ground. There was no cement insert, just a "hollered" out hole with a heavy wooden door laying at about a 75 degree angle over the hole. It was latched but never locked. Inside the cellar was a candle and box of matches on a small wooden shelf or maybe even on a shelf carved out of the dirt wall. Sometimes there was a jar or two of fruit for those times when the Tornado warning lasted more than 30 minutes. There was also a transistor radio kept in the cellar to monitor the storm direction, location, and duration. You would think that with such a cozy and safe place, everyone would jump at the chance to climb down the 8 feet or so below ground to "weather the storm." I vividly remember my first experience at their farm during a Tornado warning. Out in the country, there were no sirens to warn of impending danger, but my aunt would tune into a local radio station anytime the weather turned bad. And if there was a hint of bad weather, here we'd go. I thought it was pretty cool as a kid and don't remember being scared, although in retrospect I also remember my aunt nearly having a stroke every time we had to go to the Cellar.

Now my cousins; that was a different story. They were teenagers when I was still able to show my age by holding up fingers. They would linger around waiting for all of us to get in the Cellar, then they would just stand around or sit on the side of the dirt hump looking at the darkening skies. They were more mesmerized than afraid. The first time I saw this I remember thinking how strange it was for them to be doing that when their mother was in a sheer panic state. They were laughing, smoking (BTW, they gave me my first cigarette), and just staring at the clouds blowing around. They would only get in the Cellar if they actually saw a Tornado touch down, which was rare.

As I grew older, I guess I too became a little too comfortable during a Tornado warning. Even when we moved to Memphis and away from anything resembling a Storm Cellar (the water table was so high you couldn't dig a hole deeper than a few inches without hitting water), we would react with something somewhere between amusement and apathy when the sirens went off. I was home on leave during one Christmas when the air filled with the sounds of a Tornado siren for about an hour. It was in the evening and we were about 2 hours into a family poker game. We never even missed a deal. My kids were freaking out (they were not accustomed to Tornados having lived outside the South at that time). They decided to hide in a coat closet and thought we were crazy for not joining them. At one point, my brother and I went outside and sat in a lawn chair with a beer and a cigarette (yep, just like the song). I still don't know what makes me and my redneck buddies do that. It may be a combination of wonderment, excitement, apathy, or just plain old curiosity.

Naw, it's just bein' a redneck. :)

THE MEANING OF THE PREAMBLE TO THE AMERICAN LEGION CONSTITUTION

I am going to spend a little time each month giving you the meaning of the Preamble, line by line. (This comes from the 2014 Officer's Guide and Manual of Ceremonies) I think it is necessary because our forefathers in 1918-1919 spent a lot of time coming up with these words. They understood them and we too should understand their meanings.

For God and Country, we associate ourselves together for the following purposes...

The American Legion recognizes the influence of Almighty God in all worthwhile endeavors and declares the allegiance of Legionnaires to both God and nation.

To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America...

The Constitution of the United States is the written bulwark of our free way of life and representative government. It is our guarantee of liberty, freedom, justice and democracy. Members of the American Legion bore arms and went to war to defend and uphold this document of freedom.

To maintain law and order...

Without law and order, liberty would become license. Law and order protect our pursuit of happiness, one of our God-given rights. Members of The American Legion served in wars to uphold law and order among nations. It is just as important to maintain the due processes of law in our domestic affairs. It binds Legionnaires to obey the laws of the land and to support the constituted authorities in enforcing those laws.

In the next three or four months we will review the entire Preamble. I hope you will bear with me.
