#### From the Jr. Vice Commander - To Serve

As I sit here drinking my mug of coffee anticipating July 4, flipping channels' I come upon the "Revolution" on the History channel. A documentary on the War of Independence that started our country. I sat and reflected on why I joined the Navy while seeing what our founding Veterans had to bear at Valley Forge during the winter of 1777. During the World Wars, some of our relatives felt it was such a responsibility to serve that they lied about their age to join. I heard we had this happen during Vietnam also.

We all had/have our reasons for joining the Military branch that we did. Some to follow in the foot steps of their parents. Some in the footsteps of their grandparents, uncles, brothers and so on. I joined to follow my brother into the Navy and to get out of the small town that to me showed no future. When I joined in the spring of 1975, the Vietnam War was officially declared over on April 30 so all we had at that time was the Cold War. People think that the Vietnam Veterans were all drafted but that is a false hood. During the Early 60's all of our men and women in uniform were volunteers. Following and fighting for the country that they were raised to believe was the defender of freedom. It was not until the late 60's that the draft was instituted.

I was naive enough to think that the service I would do would be quiet with no conflicts and the world was at a kind of peace; for the most part it was. I was to serve for 9 years, wanting to do my 20 but as they say, "well that didn't go as planned." I was discharged in 84. Seven years before the Gulf war and the beginning of a 25-year involvement in the conflicts in the Middle East. Then September 11 2001 occurred. I can tell you where I was and how I felt when I saw the second plane hit the tower of the World Trade center. Almost the same feelings when the Challenger exploded in 1986. From here no call for Soldiers, Marines, Sailors or Air Force was issued. The country was in a stupor but our young saw the attack and made the decision to join up to repel the war on terror.

Now 15 years have past and nearly 2 million new Veterans are among our ranks with proud service following in the footsteps of the Veterans of Valley Forge. People will say that the fight is only for oil that the Middle East has, but as a Veteran, we all know it is for something that you cannot touch but you can see and feel—peace-. That's what the fighting men & women put their life on the line for everyday. I sleep well because of our sentinels of peace that's willing to give their life and time to ensure the bad guy doesn't benefit from his evil ways. I thank all of our Veterans whether you did 2 or 22, whether you deployed or not; you gave your best years to defend and serve.

I salute you and thank you for serving.

#### From the Service Officer

I find it hard to get phone calls from Veterans asking for monetary assistance. This is a difficult assignment for me. I hate to say no! I want to ask them how much they need and write a check. However, that isn't always a possibility for our Post. We have limited funds and very little sources of income. Veterans groups; VFW, DAV and Legion donate monies to these causes and I am most grateful. But coordination takes time.

This past month I had a Veteran call to ask for help. He moved here from NC because he heard Colorado Springs was a good place to live and people took care of Veterans. All I could do was give him phone numbers of various organizations that assist single and married Veterans. The best our Legion could do for him was \$250 from the Colorado Veterans Kids Fund. An hour later I got a call from a Veteran with a wife and child who said he was about to be evicted. Although I wanted to ask him why he waited until now to call, I didn't. I just listened to him and went down the list of assisting organizations. I also told him that if he had the required documents we could apply for Temporary Financial Assistance thru National. I explained that process could take from 7-14 days. He said he'd let me know. Then I got a call from a Veteran whose utilities will be cut the next day if he didn't pay \$198. A few minutes later the fourth call; a Veteran with wife and two children in hotel room. He needed money to continue the hotel. As usual I told what documents we required and that we'd only be able to give him \$250 if the Kids Fund approved it. Wow! Don't know why I don't shut that phone off.

This isn't a normal day (thank the Lord)! In the event anyone interested in doing this kind of work please let the commander know. Until that time I will continue to serve - FOR GOD AND COUNTRY.

#### From the Historian



On 1 February, 1943 in North Africa, an enemy fighter attacking a 97th Bomb Group formation went out of control, probably with a wounded pilot, then continued its crashing descent into the rear of the fuselage of a Fortress named All American, piloted by Lt. Kendrick R. Bragg of the 414th Bomb Squadron.

When it struck, the fighter broke apart, but left some pieces in the B-17. The left horizontal stabilizer of the Fortress and left elevator were completely torn away. The two right engines were out and one on the left had a serious oil pump leak.

The vertical fin and the rudder had been damaged, the fuselage had been cut almost completely through, connected only at two small parts of the frame and the radios, electrical and oxygen systems were damaged.

There was also a hole in the top that was over 16 feet long and 4 feet wide at its widest, and the split in the fuselage went all the way to the top gunners turret. Although the tail actually bounced and swayed in the wind and twisted when the plane turned and all the control cables were severed, except one single elevator cable still worked, and the aircraft still flew - miraculously!





waist and tail gunners used parts of the German fighter and their own parachute harnesses in an attempt to keep the tail from ripping off and the two sides of the fuselage from splitting apart. While the crew was trying to keep the bomber from coming apart, the pilot continued on his bomb run and released his bombs over the target.

When the bomb bay doors were opened, the wind turbulence was so great that it blew one of the waist gunners into the broken tail section. It took several minutes and four crew members to pass him ropes from parachutes and haul him back into the forward part of the plane. When they tried to do the same for the tail gunner, the tail began flapping so hard that it began to break off.

The weight of the gunner was adding some stability to the tail section, so he went back to his position. The turn back toward base at Biskra, Algeria had to be very slow to keep the tail from twisting off. They actually covered almost 70 miles to make the turn to home base. The bomber was so badly damaged that it was losing altitude and speed and was soon alone in the sky. For a brief time, two more Me-109 German fighters attacked the All American. Despite the extensive damage, all of the machine gunners were able to respond to these attacks and soon drove off the fighters.

The two waist gunners stood up with their heads sticking out through the hole in the top of the fuselage to aim and fire their machine guns. The tail gunner had to shoot in short bursts because the recoil was actually causing the plane to turn. Allied P-51 fighters intercepted the All American as it crossed over it's home base and took one of the pictures shown. They also radioed to the base describing that the empennage was waving like a fish tail and that the plane would not make it and to send out boats to rescue the crew when they bailed out. The fighters stayed with the Fortress taking hand signals from Lt. Bragg and relaying them to the base. Lt. Bragg signaled that 5 parachutes and the spare had been "used" so five of the crew could not bail out. He made the decision that if they could not bail out safely, then he would stay with the plane and land it.2 1/2 hours after being hit, the aircraft made its final turn to line up with the runway while it was still over 40 miles away.

It descended into an emergency landing and a normal roll-out on its landing gear. When the ambulance pulled alongside, it was waved off because not a single member of the crew had been injured. No one could believe that the aircraft could still fly in such a condition. The Fortress sat placidly until the crew all exited through the door in the fuselage and the tail gunner had climbed down a ladder, at which time the entire rear section of the aircraft collapsed onto the ground. The rugged old bird had done its job.

### **Buy A Brick Fundraiser!**

If you have attended some of our meetings over the past several months, you may have heard us discuss plans for a new fundraising effort. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our land-scaping project we are working. The bricks are engraved using a hybrid method that combines both laser engraving and sandblasting. The engraving is then painted using the same paint used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are the details/answers to questions we anticipate:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs and Offset Increasing Costs
- What Size Are the Bricks? We are offering 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.
- What are the Costs for the Individual Bricks? Prices range from \$75 to \$200, depending on size, style and lettering desired. For the 8x8 or 12x12 bricks, you can add a second emblem. Contact the Adjutant for ordering details. There is **NO** additional cost for the second emblem on the larger bricks.
- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Prices range from \$125 to \$500, again depending on size, style and lettering.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? Visit <a href="http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209">http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209</a> to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/ approved for the next phase of our project.

Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know and we will make certain they are all placed together.

### **Bringing a Little South to the West - August**

People today think they are using cutting edge technology. I've got news for them; I enjoyed many of those same luxuries as a young married adult and even when I was a kid growing up. The application was a little different, but the end result was the same.

For example, my Dad had TV remote control, as did I after I got married and had kids. The only restriction was that Dad's remote control and mine a few years later went to bed at 9:00pm, so we had to get up and change the channel ourselves. But during the day, all we had to do was speak what channel we wanted to watch, and the TV channel was changed. By the way, that feature never worked well when trying to implement it with a short blonde. I guess she had trouble understanding the command.

My parents also had Caller ID. It was actually the same tools that provided the TV remote control functions. Often, when the phone rang one of us four kids answered it and depending on the caller, Mom and/or Dad was either busy, pre-occupied elsewhere, or not at home. That led to another advanced technological feature; voicemail. We would take down the message and deliver it to our parents. The message wasn't always 100% correct, but even today messages are sometimes garbled and hard to understand.

In my mind, I envisioned a small box with the outside antenna cable or "rabbit ears" connected to it, and a coin slot on top, sitting on the TV. I imagined we would have to put a quarter in the slot to get the picture to appear. I wasn't really clear on who owned the box, but I guess I thought it would be a department of our Government. Interesting that I wasn't too far off the mark.

I remember when calculators became the big thing for solving mathematical problems. We had that when I was in grade school. Back then it was call a #2 lead pencil. The pencil came with an erase function built in to it, which in my case was very handy. Many times the pencil was only half used before the eraser was worn down to the metal. Today, as I constantly tell Jackie I can use a pencil down to just a stub and still have an eraser never used. Matter of fact, I tell her the only reason we have erasers are for her use.:)

One of the coolest devices I remember was the Word Processor. Although when I was in high school it was called Typing class and we used electric typewriters. But these devices were like magic. We could back-space, erase a letter or word with the white tape that was either underneath the ribbon (depending on the model of the typewriter), or the small sheets of correction tape. Version 2.0 provided us with liquid correction that you applied with a very small brush applicator. Again, I told Jackie we only needed that when she needed to do word processing.

There were many other highly advanced technological machines and devices that kids today don't realize we had when we were their age. We had copiers (mimeographs) that were better then than today because ours also provided a very sweet odor that many of us would "sniff" when the copy first came off the copying machine. We had copy and paste functionality, only we called it carbon paper. There were several other examples, but I don't have time or space to list them all.

I guess technology, like beauty, is in the eye of the beholder. And sometimes in the implementation of child-like functionality.
