FROM THE DESK & MIND OF THE COMMANDER


Aloha!



FROM THE DESK OF THE FINANCE OFFICER

Well, it's been a while since you've seen an article from the Finance Officer, so I figured I would inform you of some things going on with the financial side of the Post. As most of you know by now, Rusty has been removed from this position and I was asked by the Commander if I would step up and take this challenge on. The Commander's first request was if I could come up with a budget by the May executive board meeting, which was in 3 days. I ran through all the numbers.

worked with our bill collectors and have determined that in order to keep this Post running. We would have to budget \$24K a year. This includes a couple of thousand as overhead. In case things come up that were not budgeted for.

I have worked with Colorado Springs Utilities and was able to get us on budget billing. Meaning we pay the same amount over 12 months. If we overpay, our bill would be adjusted and lowered for the next year. If we underpaid, our bill for the next year would go up. With the installation of new windows in July, I am hoping this will help with the heating and cooling side of the house. Now we have a number to work with. As for the cable bill, I worked with Xfinity (Comcast) and got us into a new 3-year contract at a savings of around \$80 a month. We then looked at our trash bill and seeing that we paid \$239 a month for service. We went out shopping and was able to find a company that would do our trash for \$39 a month, for \$200 savings. We're in the process of cancelling our snow removal contract because we purchased a UTV with a blade so we can take care of the parking lot ourselves. That will be a huge savings also. A new shed will be in place in August (which was fully funded by the Legion Riders), so we can store the UTV in it. As for the building insurance. It has been paid in full already this year.

A part of the budget is to pay ourselves back and put \$384 back into our savings on a monthly basis so when it comes time to pay it next year, we will have the funds available to pay it and not have to ask Art for money from the club account. Art will still transfer money to us when needed. For the month of June, we were \$1793.81 in the black. But I guarantee you we will be in the red for July with the cost of the windows being purchased and installed. Another positive thing we're putting into place is we'll now be accepting credit cards for folks that want to pay for their Friday night dinners and/or beverage bill in the lounge, along with us using this feature for those that rent the Post. We'll begin taking credit cards in August, so if you're short on cash or don't have an ATM card, we'll still be able to assist you. It's my hope that with these little changes and a budget to work the numbers, we'll be able to keep this Post up and running for a long time. We still need to find ways of raising money to keep this Post solvent, but I firmly believe if we can somehow raise \$15K a year, we can keep our head above water. If anyone would like to see the monthly expense report, feel free to reach out to me and I'll gladly show it to you.

As the newly elected Commander of Sons of the American Legion Squadron 209, I get to choose my Commander's Project for the 2019-2020 year. I wanted something that really fit in with our pledge to serve the community, state and nation. What better endeavor than that which supports one of the Four Pillars of the American Legion: Children and Youth. Therefore, my project this year will be the Child Welfare Foundation. Here's a little background on the CWF:

"Established in 1954, The American Legion Child Welfare Foundation was developed as a repository of funds from individuals who wished to contribute to the betterment of children in this country...

"Not all American children grow up inside the comfortable definition of normal childhood development. For thousands, each day is a challenge marked by pain, prayer and perseverance. Many of these children require specialized care. To overcome their obstacles, they need help from you and The American Legion Child Welfare Foundation."

With grants usually in the range of \$10,000 to \$25,000, and some in the \$50-\$60k range, where does our money go? As an example, here is a very abbreviated list of the groups and projects supported by the CWF:

BRINGING A LITTLE SOUTH TO THE WEST

Growing up in suburbia, we had plenty of room to play outdoor games. Back in the day before cell phones, beepers and personal computers, kids actually played outside until well after dark. They normally went home just in time for their evening bath and then off to bed. Part of the reason we chose the outdoor playground was because most of the time we didn't care for what was being televised on one of the only four TV stations; CBS, ABC, NBC, or PBS.

We didn't have sidewalks in our neighborhood, and for several years we didn't even have streetlights. I was initially saddened when they were installed, but it turned out to be just another source of play and sometimes even mischievousness for us kids. But it really didn't matter whether it was day or night, we played outside from the time we finished our homework (during school year) until it was time to go home for the night.

I recently started thinking about some of the games we played and thought I'd share some of those memories. How many have you played?

Our favorite daytime games included things like Baseball, Football, Horseshoes, Steal the Bacon, Red Rover, and the deadly game of Dodge Ball. Steal the Bacon was one of my all-time favorite games. The more people you had to play, the more fun it became. We'd choose up sides with one person being the "caller" or judge. We'd line upside by side, number off and face the other team about 20 yards away. The caller would call out a number and those two people would run out to the center of the field where the "Bacon" laid. That's where the skill came into play. The two people would stop at the "Bacon" and dance around much like boxers watching each other and looking for that opportunity to "Steal the Bacon" and run back to their side without being touched. If they made it to home base, they got a point. If they were tagged, the other team got the point. We had a predetermined number of points needed to win the game. It was great fun.

Another fun game was "Red Rover." As with "Steal the Bacon," the more people you had to play, the better. We would once again choose up sides into two teams and face each other about 10-15 yards apart. We would stand side by side with our hands or arms interlocked. Each team would take turns yelling, "Red Rover, Red Rover, send (insert the name of an opposing player) right over!" The person whose name was called would take off and run toward the interlocked hands or arms of the opposing team in an attempt to "break the chain." If the player was successful breaking the chain, you could choose one of their players to return to your side with you. If you did not break the chain, you became a member of that team. I would always try to find the weakest link in the chain. The game ended when all players were on one side.

I think I've mentioned this in a previous article, but our favorite game to play at night was "Kick the Can." That was much like "Hide and Seek" with the can as a twist to the game. Someone would be chosen to be "it." We'd get an empty Pet Milk can or Pinto Bean can (16 ounce) and put it in the middle of the street. Our neighborhood side street didn't have much traffic, so it was the perfect place to play. Someone other than the person who was "it" was designated to make the initial kick. We'd kick the can as far and hard as possible then everyone would take off running to hide. The person who was "it" had to retrieve the can, return it to its original spot, place their foot on top of the can, hide their eyes and count to 50.

After the count, the person who was "it" started hunting for everyone hiding. There was no limit to where you could go, but you obviously didn't want to get too far away from the can. If the person who was "it" found you, he/she would run back to the can, put their foot on top of the can and yell "1, 2, 3 on (insert the person's name)!" If caught, that person would have to come in and stand near the can and wait. You could be saved by another player if they could run up and kick the can before the person who was "it" got to there first. If you could run up and kick it, everyone who had been found was free to hide again. The game ended when the person who was "it" found everyone.

We didn't need PCs, cell phones or pagers to have fun. And we didn't have time to get lazy. All the outdoor games we played kept us in pretty good physical shape. You had to be if you wanted to beat the "it" to the can and kick it before being called or beat the other person after "Stealing the Bacon." Man, I miss those games. I taught my boys and grandsons those games and would play it with them when there were small. If you have kids or grandkids around you, teach them how to play some of those games. They'll love it, and you might want to join them. If you need more players, give me a call. I'll even be "it!"
