2020 has presented a number of challenges to us all, but to Scout Troop 77 member, Sierra Dooley, learning to adapt and overcome was just an everyday part of Scouting. Sierra is a 17 year-old Senior at Manitou Springs High School who watched her younger brother from the sidelines as he was able to do all kinds of incredible things in Scouting. When she turned 14, she immediately joined a BSA Venturing Crew so that she could be a part of the fun, but the path to Eagle Scout was still not open to her. That all changed in February of 2019 when the BSA opened the doors to girls in Troops and the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 209 chartered Troop 77, an all-female Scout Troop. Sierra knew that for her to earn Eagle Scout before she turned 18 would mean that she needed to set a schedule and stick with it. Her perseverance and determination paid off on Sunday, October 18, 2020 when she attended her Eagle Scout Board of Review. Sierra completely blew the Board away with her attention to detail and knowledge. Board President, Shane Deichman commented that he had never seen a Scout put so much detail into an Eagle binder before. Her project was to complete a trail reclamation project in conjunction with Manitou Springs High School and the Manitou Springs School District. In addition to reclaiming the student-created trail, Sierra and her team erected a permanent wooden fence at the top and bottom of the section to prevent use.

Sierra set the bar for all male and female Eagle candidates that come after her. She is the first Eagle Scout in Troop 77 and the first female Eagle Scout in Pikes Peak Council from the first all-female Scout Troop in the Pikes Peak Region. Our Post 209 family prides itself in helping mold and mentor future leaders through the many youth programs we sponsor, and Sierra's achievement epitomizes the traits and passion we see in our future leaders.

In November we supported the Veteran's Day Poker Run and built Thanksgiving meals for 24 local families. We also had the honor of providing Final Honors Escort for a Fairplay Veteran to Pikes Peak National Cemetery on 19 November in conjunction with Riders from ALR172 Fairplay and ALR38 Fountain. We obtained approval to add 22 motorcycle parking spaces in the Post lot and will accomplish that as soon as weather and availability align. We also painted the maneuvering course markers in the lot as approved at the October Post Executive Committee meeting. There are markers for two turn circles with keyhole entry, one 28 foot outer/24 foot inner and one 24 foot outer/20 foot inner, together with a 12 foot interval weave course. 




Buy A Brick Fundraiser!

We are re-introducing an exciting fundraiser for our Post. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our landscaping project we are working. The engraving uses the same technology as used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are some FAQs:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs
- What Size Are the Bricks? 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.



- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$125 to \$500.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209 to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.

Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know and we will make certain they are all placed together.



FROM OUR POST SERVICE OFFICER

So far this year, we have reached out with assistance to 62 Veterans. You may not be aware, but we have a Post Veterans' Assistance Fund that was first established by our Post's namesake, Neal Thomas, Jr. As of 31 October, we have just over \$4,900 in this emergency fund. BRINGING A LITTLE SOUTH TO THE WEST



This month, I was planning to write more about TV shows from the 50's and 60's, but felt instead I would share/re-share some of my best Christmas memories. You may remember some of them from previous writings, but some will be memories I have not yet shared.

The Bowen family celebrated Christmas on Christmas Eve every year. I don't really know why we did that, but it was something we always did and still do today. Now it works out great because Jackie's family celebrates Christmas on the 25th, so this gives us a chance to spend quality time with families.

As I've mentioned in numerous articles, I was blessed to have grown up and know both sets of Grandparents. They were Arkansas farmers, not large farms, but a few hundred acres of cotton and soybeans each year. For most of my childhood, they lived about 5 miles from each other, which made visiting them very easy. Their respective farm was outside the little town of Cherry Valley, about an hour and a half from our house in Memphis.

For some reason, they always came to our house to celebrate Christmas. Maybe it was to prevent arguments on which of them would host, or maybe they wanted to get away and come to the big city, or more likely they just didn't want to have to deal with all the muss and fuss of hosting. Whatever the reason it worked out well for us kids.

Most of the time they would arrive on Christmas Eve mid to late morning. They rarely showed up the day before to spend the night. That was okay with us. We lived in a small 3-bedroom house with one bath. There was Mom, Dad, and 4 kids living in that house. Having overnight company was a challenge to say the least. Us kids would end up sleeping on a "pallet" of blankets in the living room floor so our out of town guests could have a bed. That could have been part of the reason my Grandparents didn't show up early, but I think it was mainly because our house bordered the Memphis Airport and our house was in the flight line. Planes taking off and landing late at night or very early morning never bothered us, but company not accustomed to the noise found sleeping at night very difficult.

Most of the time Dad's only sister and her family drove over from West Memphis, just across the Mississippi River, to join us for our Christmas celebration. It was my Aunt Alta Mae, Uncle Troy, and cousin Barbara. Barbara was about 6 years older than me, but about the same age as my older sister Dee and they were close friends growing up. So Dee seemed to enjoy their visit each year.

Barring an unexpected visit from a wayward Great Uncle, which thankfully happened infrequently, this was our Christmas gathering. If we did get that "pop in" visit, Mom would disappear to her bedroom and find a tie Dad had in the closet to wrap up for our surprise guest. Dad HATED ties, and only wore one when it was absolutely necessary, so losing one on occasion always gave Dad a smile and seemed to give him an extra Christmas present.

We didn't open gifts until the turkey dinner was done and dishes washed and put away. Well, most of the gifts were opened then. Dad would sometimes give over to our relentless begging to open one gift early. I think he did that just so he could also open one of his, but we didn't care why he did it.

I can still remember a few of the gifts I received over the years, like my "Fanner 50" gun and holster, and my Mouse Trap Game, but most of my lasting Christmas memories was about spending time with family. It is still that way today.
