Calling All Juniors...Auxiliary



2016 Membership Drive

Currently, Post 209 membership dues are \$35.00. We have not had an increase since 2007. Due to inflation and the higher cost for utilities there is a need to raise dues. At our November general membership meeting, Commander Smith presented an increase for dues. It was approved by an overwhelming majority of the membership present to increase the dues from \$35.00 to \$45.00, effective January 1, 2016. If you have not yet renewed your membership for 2016, please do so by December 31, 2015 before the increase is in effect. We have surpassed the Department's target goal of 65% in November. We are currently standing at 74 percent or 742 members who has renewed or signed up as new members. Our next goal is 75% on 13 December.

I ask for your support in recruiting, and reaching out to our Veterans and families in the community. Post 209 cannot achieve or succeed in reaching this goal without you. As you recruit, briefly address the different programs within the American Legion, the American Legion Auxiliary for spouses and daughters, the Sons of American Legion for Veteran's sons, grandsons and great grandsons, the American Legion Riders, if they have an interest in motorcycles, and the Young Guns, for students ages 10 to 18 who are interested in shooting guns and gun safety. The key to growth and success at Centennial Post 209 is to lead by example and to serve the needs of our Veterans and families. Remember the 3R's:

From the Historian; A Stand-Down Veteran's Story

The 2015 Veterans' Stand-Down has come and gone, and The American Legion was there, playing a big part in the annual outreach to homeless Veterans. This is a time and place where Veterans fighting a daily battle on the streets for warmth, shelter, security and sustenance, can come and "stand down" for a day. Veterans are offered showers, haircuts, warm clothes, and connections with those who can help with the V.A., legal issues, and other aid. Many of these Veterans are in a life-and-death struggle with substance abuse, depression and PTSD. Many who come to the Stand-Down are helped, but end up back on the streets; back in the same dire straits as before. However, a few-a precious few are able to envision a different path, and lift themselves out of the endless cycle of hunger, danger and addiction.

One such survivor is "John." A Navy veteran, John had been homeless since 2004. He is also a Veteran of multiple Stand-Downs. In most years, he went back to the streets, back to the old life and old dangers, because John was addicted to heroin. Working as a day laborer, making just enough to feed his addiction, he was sleeping in parking lots in his truck. He had burned his bridges with family and friends. He was estranged from the people who had mattered before in his life. As John put it, "Any virtue that was good, that was God-given, I destroyed."

Finally, in 2011, John came to the realization that his addiction "would ultimately result in either prison or death." With this hard reality at his feet, he made a decision that would start him back on the road of the living. He decided to bring about his own withdrawal from heroin, and to kick out the master that had ruled his life for so long.

John pitched his tent in the Pike National Forest on New Years Eve. He was determined that the New Year would mean a new life, or he would die trying. "The withdrawal was horrible. It was like somebody snapping your bones. For the longest time, I was in my tent with absolutely no strength to get up. At one point, a Park Ranger investigated and lifted the flap to my tent. I explained what I was trying to do. I feared I was busted, and would be dragged back to the old life, but he closed the flap and said 'I'll come back." The Ranger did eventually come back, but it was not to arrest John and take him away. He simply helped him find his keys-something John had been unable to do. "I was at my lowest point, and felt as though I had come from a place of ashes. It must have been divine intervention that helped me live through it, and place one foot in front of the other, step after step."

After coming down from the forest, John knew his life wouldn't truly change until he asked for help. He got on the waiting list for the VASH (Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing) program. He was driven to V.A. appointments. He ate food from the food bank. He worked on-again, off-again. He met all the qualifications to stay on a VASH voucher. But deep inside, John knew that he had once again created a lifestyle that set him up for dependency and failure. He knew things had to change. He realized that, "you've got to be willing to help yourself." John was ready for the next step.

And that next step came at the 2014 Stand Down. I watched as John shook hands with Andy Gilbert of American Legion Centennial Post 209, and Dean Casey, Service Officer for the American Legion Department of Colorado. Before them was a man ready to make a change, and these two Legionnaires stood ready to help.

Among the other things that John came away with from the Stand Down was an appointment with Dean to help with his paperwork in filing for V.A. disability compensation. On the way to his appointment at Colorado Legion Headquarters, the person driving him mentioned a job opportunity with a truck driving school. John realized, "Because of my relationship with the Legion, doors began to open, and kept opening." He became a Legion member. "In fact, my initial membership dues were sponsored by the Post 209 Legion Auxiliary," and John saw the doors open even more.

An important door that opened was his introduction to Andy Gilbert: President of Post 209's ALR, and a local business owner. "Andy offered friendship, a role model, a paycheck, accountability, and the kind of unconditional love that helped me to move on. We started fresh from Day One." As Andy puts it: "The Legion must be an organization that reaches out to help both the recipient, who wants to overcome what they must overcome, and also the business community willing to commit to Veterans despite the challenges from the street."

John adds, "At Post 209, I now have encouragement from you guys-a place to belong, and to witness the things that the Legion models: the giving of time, talent and treasure to something larger than myself. This Post has been consistent. I have had encouragement from every Post 209 member I have met."

Eventually, the opportunity with the truck driving school did materialize, and John seized the moment. "Rather than feeling like the constant recipient of the good graces of others, I feel like I have a chance. Now, I feel like I have the opportunity to pay it forward, and I am to the point where I am thinking... 'Who are we helping next?""

There was no one type of tree that sprouted a clump of mistletoe; we found them in oaks, maples, and most other trees. Parasites don't really care what kind of tree they attached to, as long as it can absorb nutrients it will thrive. So we would tromp through the woods looking for the mass growing out on a tree limb. If you're not paying attention, you can mistake a mistletoe clump for a squirrel's nest. Once you've found the mistletoe, all you have to do is fire a shot into the clump with something like #6 or even #4 shot. Because the mistletoe is attached to very small limbs it is easy to shoot through them and break off a large chunk. We would collect a box full and head home to share with family and friends and break out the "Scotch Tape" to hang the mistletoe around the house. You don't hang mistletoe to get a kiss from a parent, grandparent or aunt; it is for the friends of your sister who come over or as I mentioned, for the very special someone (for that particular day) you bring home to meet Mom and Dad. And it was to take to school to get a little kiss from that girl you were too scared to even say hello to any other time of the school year. We would take a handful to school to pass around, mostly to find out if we were also to be a recipient of a kiss from that special or secret someone. Nobody ever thought of selling mistletoe back home because it was so plentiful and everyone had shotguns so they could go get them whenever they wanted. When I left home and first saw it for sale, I just laughed and then got a little upset that I didn't think about doing it. Wow, city folks will buy anything. You can even buy fake mistletoe. Not certain why, but you can. I guess it's like fake flowers and plants. Some folks are just lazy, or maybe they don't own a shotgun.

There are many things I took for granted while growing up in the South. I guess I thought everyone had two sets of grandparents, aunts, uncles and cousins, and everyone came together to celebrate the birth of Jesus. But I learned after leaving home this is not always the case. I still love this time of year more than any other. And it's still a time for family to come together, celebrate Christ's birth, see family I haven't seen in a year (sometimes), and gain 5 pounds. Man, I'm hungry. Merry Christmas everyone!


