Origin of NAVY Terminology Rusty Bower



Gun Salutes: In the days of cannon, it took as long as twenty minutes to load and fire a gun. When a ship fired her guns in salute, she rendered herself powerless for the duration. By emptying their guns, the ship's crew showed shore batteries and forts that they were no threat. Over time, this gesture became a show of respect, with both shore and ship gun batteries firing volleys. While many people like to say the 21 gun salute was a tribute to the American Revolution, a number determined as a result of adding together the numbers 1+7+7+6, the truth is the 21 gun salute was an effort to cut costs. The habit of firing salutes became wasteful, with ships and shore batteries firing shots for hours on end. This was particularly expensive for ships, which had a limited space to store powder (which went bad quickly in the salt air). The British admiralty first dictated the policies now in place as a practical matter to save gunpowder. The rule was simple, for every volley fired by a ship in salute, a shore battery could return up to three shots. The regulations limited ships to a total of seven shots in salute, so the 21 gun-salute became the salute used to honor only the most important dignitaries. Today, the U.S. Navy Regulations prescribe that only those ships and stations designated by the Secretary of the Navy may fire gun salutes. **A national salute of 21 guns is fired on**:

- Washington's Birthday
- Memorial Day
- Independence Day
- To honor the President of the United States
- To honor heads of foreign states.

Additionally, ships may, with approval from the office of the Secretary of the Navy, provide gun salutes for naval officers on significant occasions, using the following protocol:

- Admiral-17 guns
- Vice Admiral-15 guns
- Rear Admiral (upper half)-13 guns
- Rear Admiral (lower half)-11 guns

All gun salutes are fired at five second intervals. Gun salutes will always total an odd number.

The Wreaths Across America event is held each year on the third Saturday in December at Arlington National Cemetery, and at over 1,400 locations in all 50 states, at sea, and abroad. This year it occurs on Saturday, December 15th. The event is timed to commence simultaneously, starting at 12:00 noon in the Eastern Time Zone, (10:am Mountain Time.)

Members and loved ones of American Legion Post 209 are invited to attend the Laying of the Wreaths ceremony at 10 o'clock in the Memorial Gardens Cemetery Chapel at Airport and Academy Blvd. After the ceremony, which honors the departed from each branch of the military services, we will proceed outside to the gravesites of roughly 1,800 Veterans interred there.



Worldwide, over one million wreaths will be laid this year at the graves of fallen and departed Veterans. In Colorado, there are over 160,000 Veteran graves, and last year, there were not enough wreaths to cover them all. Only one in five Veteran graves in our state received a wreath. This is why we are asking for your help.

You, your family, your friends or co-workers can purchase a wreath for a Veteran grave for only \$15. The



deadline to purchase is December 3rd, 2018. This ensures the wreaths arrive at our cemeteries before the ceremony on the 15th.

This year, we have a community partner, Colorado Honor, who will help us with a good distribution of wreaths to our Colorado Springs area cemeteries. You can buy wreaths at their Web site: coloradohonor.com. When filling out the order form, be sure to select "Colorado Springs, CO" where it says, "Requested City for Wreath". This will help us ensure that our local cemeteries receive the needed wreaths.

Thank you for your support of our Colorado Springs Veterans and their families, especially at this time of year. All Gave Some, Some Gave All, and all should be remembered.

Selected Colorado Post 209 Past Events October 16 thru November 14

The Vets were provided access to a large variety of products and services designed to help get them through the winter and back on their feet. This included help from the VA, dental care, mental health, housing and legal assistance, warm clothing, food, haircuts and more. Spearheaded by Andy Gilbert-Post 209.

Buy A Brick Fundraiser!

If you've attended our meetings over the past year, you may have heard us discuss plans for a new fundraising effort. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our landscaping project we are working. The bricks are engraved using a hybrid method that combines both laser engraving and sandblasting. The engraving is then painted using the same paint used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are the details/answers to questions we anticipate:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs and Offset Increasing Costs
- What Size Are the Bricks? We are offering 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.
- What are the Costs for the Individual Bricks? Prices range from \$90 to \$200, depending on size, style and lettering desired. For the 8x8 or 12x12 bricks, you can add a second emblem. Contact the Adjutant for ordering details. There is **NO** additional cost for the second emblem on the larger bricks.
- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Prices range from \$250 to \$500, again depending on size, style and lettering.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? Visit http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209 to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/ approved for the next phase of our project.

Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know and we will make certain they are all placed together.

There are a few exceptions to the above. And I will never forget meeting someone I always considered a hero as well as a great entertainer; Roy Rogers.

It wasn't long after I retired from the US Army that Jackie and I, her sister, and her sister's husband went on a vacation to Branson, MO. For several years Branson has been known as "little Nashville," a nickname given to them for the many music theaters owned and visited by country music stars.

The first morning we were there we asked the desk clerk to recommend a good breakfast place. The Quality Inn we stayed at didn't serve breakfast so we found ourselves having to venture onto the "strip" for something to eat. The clerk recommended a restaurant that resembled an old mansion. He told us the food was very good, and it was frequented by many of the country stars visiting the town. I don't remember the name of the restaurant, but chances are it has changed names since we were there anyway.

I do remember it was a place that served a good ole southern style breakfast. The decor fit the outside. It was set up with wooden tables and chairs, cloth table cloths and napkins, and there was a country feeling to the place. The walls were decorated with pictures of yesteryear, as well as some of the old west cowboys of the big screen and country stars who I'm guessing must have visited the restaurant and left behind an autographed photo.

After we were seated Jackie told me to look to my right. Sitting about three tables over was Roy, Dale Evans, Jeannie Pruitt and Carl Smith. For those reading this who don't know these folks, Jeannie and Carl were country singers, Roy and wife Dale were country music stars as well as actors. Roy was considered the "King of the Cowboys." He wore a white hat, rode Trigger, the "smartest horse alive," and was followed by his trusty German Shepherd, Bullet.

From all accounts, Roy lived the life he portrayed on the screen. There was never any scandals associated with him or Dale. Apparently, he was a good father and a great role model for kids of all ages. And he was sitting 3 tables over.

Jackie and her sister kept trying to get me to go over to their table and talk with Roy. After all, this was a one in a million opportunity for me to come face-to-face with one of my heroes. I told them I was not going to just walk over there for a couple of reasons. One, I didn't want to bother them while they were eating and enjoying each other's company. And two, I was sitting between them and the exit. I knew he would have to walk by me to leave. So I waited.

After just a short while, they all got up and headed to the door. As Roy approached, I stood up. He looked me square in the eyes and smiled. I said something to the effect that I just wanted to shake his hand because I had been such a fan my entire life. Roy took my hand and thanked me and we struck up a conversation. He acted like he was in no rush to leave and talked with me as if we had known each other forever. I don't even know where the others he was dining with went, I was wrapped up in this once in a lifetime visit with a great American.

There were no pictures taken although I'm certain he would not have minded. I didn't need a picture to capture that memory. This man of 5'6" or 5'7" provided me a larger than life encounter that will stay tucked away in my memory forever.

In my mind, there were quite a few like him from that era, those who real life actions mimicked their character on screen. Some of those for me was John Wayne, Jimmy Stewart, Red Skelton, and Lou Gehrig. How sad that entertainers and sports figures today have taken a different approach. They may be very good at what they do, but for them it's just a job. But that's okay, I have plenty of heroes to try and emulate. And interestingly enough, none of them perform. They guide, lead, and live a life of service to others.
