While I was contemplating on running for office, I was afraid, due to my lack of knowledge and new to the American Legion. I was ensured by Jay Bowen, Greg Smith and other members who said, we will not let you fail and they will be there when I need them. I would like to thank them and everyone for their guidance. Here are the roles and responsibilities of Post Officers that was published in March 2016 Newsletter.

Commander: You are entrusted with the supervision of the duties of all other Officers of the Post. You are the presiding Officer at all meetings and you must familiarize yourself with the policies and traditions of your Post and The American Legion.

Adjutant: You are the Secretary of the Post. Post activities will revolve around you. The Adjutant is the Post personnel officer; maintains membership records, minutes of meetings, checks up and assists with the work of the other Officers and Committees. You publish official orders; announcements and instructions.

Senior Vice Commander: Your primary concern is membership. No Post can survive without good membership. You should also be familiar with ceremonial protocols for regular meetings. A Vice Commander must be ready to fill in for the Commander upon a moment's notice.

Junior Vice Commander: You must be ready to promote your Post. The Commander will depend on you to provide programs that spice up the meetings and attract attendance. You should contact other Veteran and civic organizations so that each patriotic holiday and observance receives the attention it deserves. You are

concerned with the pageantry of the Legion. You should also be concerned with the welfare of all fellow Veterans as well as with Veteran's affairs and rehabilitation committees.

Finance Officer: You will serve as chair of the Finance Committee and will be in charge of all receiving and disbursing of Post funds. You will work closely with the Post Adjutant in all matters relating to the finances of your Post.

Service Officer: You should be a dedicated person and should have a deep interest in fellow Veterans, the Post and the community. You are responsible for bringing to the attention of all Veterans and their dependents the rights and benefits granted to them by law. You must know how to utilize the expert services available through Legion channels as well as through local agencies. You should be ready to visit dependents upon a death of a service member. You may be called upon to serve as chair of Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Committee as well as working with children and youth committees or making hospital visitations. Appointed by the Commander-elect.

Chaplain: You must be a person capable of moral and intellectual leadership. You work closely with all other Officers of the Post. You should attend all meetings of the Post and Executive Committee. You should be ready to officiate when requested, at funerals of members. The Chaplain must also be ready to provide service to be be ready families of Post members.

Sergeant-at-Arms: You should know how to arrange the meeting hall, assist the Post Commander and Adjutant. You are the custodian of the Colors and in charge of Colors details during the presentation and retirement ceremonies. You should know how to display flags and their proper presentation. You are also responsible for maintaining order at all meetings.

Historian: You have the responsibility of preserving and compiling the records/photos (specifically through our Scrapbook and website) of our Post. You should try to attend Department Conventions and keep in touch with other Post Historians. [You are only encouraged to attend, not required.]

Post Executive Committeeman: You are a voting member of the Post Executive Committee, which is entrusted with the government and management of the Post. You shall be responsible to represent the interests of the general membership to the Executive Committee.

Judge Advocate: You will supply professional advice in the conducting of the Post business or to procure proper counsel. You are the interpreter of the Constitution and By-Laws of our Post. You may be asked to assist in auditing Post financial accounts. Appointed by the Commander-elect.

Millie Young, a True American Hero

On Tuesday, 15 January, 2019 at 2:00pm, we witnessed the end of an era for our Post. Millicent "Millie" Young was laid to rest at Evergreen Cemetery in Colorado Springs next to her husband, Bill, in a very touching and unique graveside service.



Millie was a WWII Women Airforce Services Pilot (also referred to as the Women's Army Service Pilots), or WASP. Just over 1,000 women successfully completed the WASP program, and fewer than 30 are still living today. Their mission was to provide training to other pilots, ferry aircraft from the factory to military bases, and test new aircraft.

This small group of heroic ladies, while not serving in a combat zone, provided critical mission support to the war effort. Interestingly, they did not receive Veteran status until 1977, and since most of us met Millie through the American Legion, thank God they did or we may never have gotten to know this wonderful lady.

One of Millie's favorite stories (and she had many) was about one of her roles as a WASP. She pulled a "tow" drone behind a long tether and our Artillery guys would

shoot at the drone. She would tell us she was being shot at by our own soldiers. Fortunately, they never hit her.

Millie was a member of The American Legion and Neal Thomas Jr.-Centennial Post 209 for 29 years. Most who knew her well used terms like, "she's a pistol," or "firecracker" when referring to this sweet lady. She kept people laughing with her quick wit and was always ready with a story about her life. She attended many dinner events and rarely missed a monthly meeting. Due to her advancing health issues, her attendance at both became increasingly less frequent. Although her health was deteriorating, her spirit and sense of humor remained strong.

Included among the many, and richly deserved awards and recognitions Millie received in her later years were the Congressional Gold Medal, awarded in 2010 by President Obama; being honored to serve as the Colorado Springs Veterans' Day Parade Grand Marshal; and being awarded a "Quilt of Honor."

Millie passed on January 12th, 2019, and was buried in a style known as a "natural burial." The funeral was indicative of her life; classy, and at the same time, simple. Millie's sons and daughters brought her to the gravesite in what appeared to be a wicker canoe. She was completely wrapped in a blanket and surrounded by flowers. Her children placed her next to Bill's grave, and the preacher began the service. After a while, Millie's sister and sons stepped forward and regaled the crowd with tales of life with this wonderful woman. It was a life well lived, with intrepid and patriotic service during the war, and afterwards, including raising 50 foster children over the years.

Toward the end of the service, the preacher called for Final Military Honors, and our Post 209 Honor Guard, along with three members of the US Air Force, rendered Honors befitting a pioneer and a Veteran who so faithfully served her country. The family then carefully laid Millie to rest next to Bill, took up shovels and lovingly closed the grave.

Millie Young now joins the ranks of the many unique and interesting Post 209 people who have gone on to the Post Everlasting. She remains in our thoughts and our memories as a Veteran who honorably served her country, a parent who cared for many children, and a comrade who enriched the lives of those around her. Millie, in the words of Fyodor Dostoyevsky, "May your sky always be clear, may your dear smile always be bright and happy (it indeed was), and may you be forever blessed for that moment of bliss and happiness which you gave to another lonely and grateful heart. Isn't such a moment sufficient for the whole of one's life?"

Colorado Post 209 Past Events

DEC 15: Wreaths Across America. Each year, the graves of departed Veterans are decorated with live wreaths. The event happens simultaneously across all time zones in the US, and this year "France" participated in laying Wreaths across <u>France</u>. Ceremonies began at 10:am. Thousands of wreaths were placed at Memorial Gardens Cemetery in Colorado Springs. Chaired by Eric Testorff and at the "Pikes Peak National Cemetery."

This tradition started in the 1990s when the Worcester Wreath Company quietly decorated graves at Arlington National. More than a decade later, a viral photo of the cemetery spurred interest in similar events nationwide.

In Colorado Springs, volunteers decorated the graves of Veterans buried at "Memorial Gardens Cemetery" and "Pikes Peak National Cemetery." The American Legion said it's important the name of the Veteran be read aloud and honored with a hand salute when the wreaths are placed.

"You die twice: Once when you breathe your last breath, and a Second time when they forget your name," said American Legion District Historian, Joseph Schmidt. "So, we always make sure to say the name of each Veteran out here at the cemetery so that they know that they're remembered."

Let me introduce the National SAL Ten Ideals Program.



<u>The Ten Ideals</u> is a national award of recognition that may be presented to those who have completed the Ten Ideals Program. The Ten Ideals are as follows:

PATRIOTISM

Turn out for Memorial Day, Independence Day, and Veterans Day parades and ceremonies. Learn the proper display of the flag. Learn the "Pledge of Allegiance."

HEALTH

Write an essay on how to maintain sanitary conditions to promote health in: (1) your home (2) in our Post home (give examples of sanitation and safety standards in our Post home), and (3) in camps and outdoors in general. Explain what you do daily to keep fit.

TRAINING

Become a squadron officer, or assist a squadron officer(s) during and between meetings and activities.

KNOWLEDGE

Maintain a passing mark in school. Know the ten ideals and five points of service. Explain what each part means. This may be written or oral. Know the SAL emblem. Explain what each part of the emblem stands for. If possible, use an emblem which comes apart so that the emblem can be put together as it is being explained.

HONOR

Honorable service in the squadron over a period of six months will qualify you for this award. Honesty of action and purpose, and truthfulness will help you achieve this.

FAITH

Good conduct and willingness to obey instructions over a period of six months will earn the squadron's recognition of your faith in its leadership and ideals.

HELPFULNESS

Develop reasonably consistent attendance at meetings and other functions. Volunteer for tasks for the good of the squadron and be reliable in carrying out your part. Help promote your squadron by signing up at least one new member, and help collect dues from existing members.

COURTESY

Apply yourself diligently to show you are polite and respectful to your comrades, officers, Legionnaires and others with whom you come in contact.

REVERENCE

Show where you are a member of a religious group. Aid in placing markers and flowers on Veterans' graves.

COMRADESHIP

Show the tie that binds you to the squadron and the Legion by helping in the annual Poppy Sale, thus aiding disabled Veterans. Help cheer some Veteran in a hospital or in his home.

Recently we've had two members of Squadron 209 to be the first ever to complete this SAL youth program at Legion Post 209.

They are your Sgt-at-Arms, Stanten Krasinski and your Chaplain, Shelten Krasinski.

They will be formally and publicly recognized at our 100th Anniversary Hawaiian Luau event on March 16th.

Origin of NAVY Terminology Rusty Bower



The NAVY Stockless Anchor and Anchor Chain:

The NAVY Stockless Anchor is a little more complicated than most land lubbers think. The anchor was patented in England in 1821. It has seven parts, the ring, shank, bill, fluke, shoulder, crown and balancing band. The crown, arms, and flukes of the anchor are cast in one piece and can pivot slightly from side to side on the shank. The flukes are long and heavy and have projecting shoulders at their base that catches on the sea bed. As more drag is exerted, the shoulders force the flukes downward into the bottom. The anchors onboard a NAVY Aircraft Carrier weigh 40,000 pounds each.

Anchor Chain. Anchor chain is put together in "links." Each link can weigh anywhere from 100 pounds to 500 pounds depending on the size of the ship and the ship's anchor. The links are connected to form "shots." A standard shot is 15 fathoms long (90 feet). Each shot is marked to determine the length of anchor chain. There are 13 lengths of anchor chain. When the 12th shot is reached it is painted yellow to warn you that you are coming to the end of the chain. (called the warning shot) The 13th shot is painted completely red. This is the DANGER chain shot letting you know you are at the end of the chain. It is stowed the Chain Locker.

Bringing a Little South to the West

This time of year typically invokes memories of my days attending Oakhaven Elementary School in Memphis. This was a pretty big school. We went from 1st grade through 6th grade in one building, then across the campus was our Jr. High and High School building. For those who have read my articles, you know I brag about attending the same school for 12, almost 13 years.

February was a special month even to us younger kids in Elementary school. I remember going to the five and dime, or the Ben Franklin five and dime (today, it would be called the dollar store) with Mom to buy Valentine's cards. We bought them by the box and we had to make certain we bought enough to give all the kids in class, boys and girls. The teachers never allowed us to only buy cards for a few in class; if you were going to hand out cards on Valentine's Day, you had to give one to everyone.

We would also buy the little candy hearts with Valentine's Day messages on the candy. Like the cards, we had to make certain we had enough to give all the kids a candy heart. Back then, it didn't seem strange to give a card and a heart to both boys and girls. We were just glad to get candy and have some fun rather than doing math on a blackboard or some other schoolwork.

Most of us would write something inside the card. For me, it was typically, "Happy Valentine's Day" (that was for the boys). For the girls I wanted to impress, I would write something like, "Be My Valentine!" Wow, even way back then it appears I had a real gift for words. ©

And I was very careful which candy heart I handed out and to whom. While most of the messages were pretty benign, there was always a few that had that special message meant for those pretty little girls I wanted to like me. For them, I would make certain they got the heart with the endearing message of something like, "You Are My Valentine," or "You are Very Special." Man, I was cool.

We took turns by rows walking around the room handing out our cards and candy hearts. I would pause just for an extra second when delivering cards with the "special prose" meant for the girls I was trying to impress. Our teacher watched us closely to ensure we gave out cards and candy to all the kids. No one was to be left out. She always kept cards and candy hearts in her desk just in case a kid came up short in the total count.

After all my cards and candy was handed out, I would rush back to my desk and wait my turn to receive cards and candy from my classmates. I paid particular attention to the girls that I liked and would set their card and candy off to the side to read later. I didn't want to chance missing a "come hither" smile from one of the girls by reading a card.

After everyone had completed the chore of handing out cards and candy, the teacher would give us time to read the cards and snack. I saved only the cards from the girls who were special to me. And I would hold on to the candy as long as possible, which meant I would eat those last. After all, it was candy and I was a third grade kid. Candy was more important than girls back then. Not by much, but it still ranked higher.

You know, it's funny. I never really had lewd or impure thoughts about those girls. Oh I guess I did wonder what it would be like to kiss one, but that was about all that ran through my 9 year old brain. Today, I would be expelled and probably sent to Juvenile Court for even thinking about that sort of thing.

Anyway, Happy Valentine's Day to all of you, boys and girls alike. And for that special girl in my life, thanks for being my Valentine for more than 47 years.
