PROOF OF ELIGIBILITY UPDATE

The Post has always had the responsibility of ensuring that every member was eligible to belong to the American Legion. In August or September, I informed you that the IRS was sort of forcing the all Posts to maintain a database or a copy of your DD Form 214 to show eligibility. Last month, the IRS and The American Legion worked out new guidelines that we need to take to ensure eligibility of our members. The Post still has to maintain a database on all of our members and the Adjutant can certify that he/she has verified the information provided.

The IRS inspector can require us to produce the DD Form 214 provided they (the inspector) has something that contradicts was has been provided. An example – many of us could have two, three or more enlistments when we were on active duty. One or two of these could have been honorable and one could have been a dishonorable. The IRS may believe only the honorable one was presented in order to become a member of The American Legion.

When you became a member of The American Legion you provided 90% of the information that is needed and we have recorded this information as we have received it. But we do need to recognize that the person who recruited you or the Adjutant at that time didn't keep records required and therefore the information did not get annotated at is should have.

I am trying to put together a card that will have the required information for the database and will be sending it you in the near future.

When you get it, please fill out the card and return it to the Post. It my feeling that that if I have this information and get it recorded on our membership rosters, I won't need to have a copy of the DD form 214 unless you feel it would be easier just send me the form.

I hope to have this form created and out to you by the end of February.



Goat Locker:


Entertainment on liberty took many forms, mostly depending on the coast and opportunity. One incident which became tradition was at a Navy-Army football game. In early sailing years, livestock would travel on ships, providing the crew the fresh milk, meats, and eggs, as well as serving as ships mascots. One pet, a goat named El Cid (meaning The Chief) was the mascot aboard the USS New York. When its crew attended the fourth Navy-Army football game in 1893, they took El Cid to the game, which resulted in the West Pointers losing. El Cid was offered shore duty at Annapolis and became the Navy's mascot. This is believed to be the source of the old Navy term, Goat Locker.
