### From the Sr. Vice Commander



Here's just a follow-up to Jay Bowen's "Roy Rogers" story in the December Centennial.

One of the favorite stars Jay mentioned was Red Skelton. Some may remember Red from movies as far back as the 1940's. He was a Veteran, and entertained thousands of troops during WWII. In fact, between that job and his duties as a soldier, he was briefly hospitalized with nervous exhaustion in 1945.

Red was patriotic, and a leader in the fight to add "under God" to the Pledge of Allegiance. Younger folks may have seen his almost viral video on YouTube wherein Red recites the Pledge, and explains every word and phrase. This happened during a broadcast of his television show, which aired throughout the 1950s & '60s. The show featured unforgettable characters such as Clem Kadiddlehopper and Freddie the Freeloader.

Red always believed in keeping comedy "clean," but as the 1960's came to a close, that was quickly falling out of fashion, giving way to a much edgier, profanity-laced style. Red's show was abruptly cancelled in 1971 in favor of shows like All in the Family.





As a screen career winds down, many stars leave New York or Hollywood for Las Vegas... then Reno... maybe Branson... and ultimately, the "Gold Room" at the Gold Buffet Restaurant in North Kansas City, Missouri. Red became a headliner there in the 1970's.

I grew up in North Kansas City, and was an employee at the Gold Buffet during that time. In addition to keeping the salad bar replenished, an occasional duty was to be a runner to the dressing rooms if the items were snacks or non-alcoholic drinks. We had performers like "Lonesome" George Gobel or Foster Brooks, but on this night with my tray in hand, I knocked on the door, it opened and there stood Red Skelton.

Red was just as gracious and kind to a 16-year-old kid in real life as was his persona on TV. I don't

even remember if I got a tip, not that it mattered. I guess that's what Jay means by "star struck." But Red was a sweet person, asked me about school, and made me feel at ease.

I carried my tray back to the kitchen, and resumed my tending of the salad bar. Later that evening, I snuck a peek into the Gold Room. The room had erupted with laugher, and the old pro was on stage just killin 'em. At a time when profane humor was in vogue, Red stayed true to "clean" comedy, and would sign off with, "Good night, and may God bless..." As far as I know, nobody took offense.

### **Buy A Brick Fundraiser!**

If you've attended our meetings over the past year, you may have heard us discuss plans for a new fundraising effort. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our landscaping project we are working. The bricks are engraved using a hybrid method that combines both laser engraving and sandblasting. The engraving is then painted using the same paint used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are the details/answers to questions we anticipate:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs and Offset Increasing Costs
- What Size Are the Bricks? We are offering 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.
- What are the Costs for the Individual Bricks? Prices range from \$90 to \$200, depending on size, style and lettering desired. For the 8x8 or 12x12 bricks, you can add a second emblem. Contact the Adjutant for ordering details. There is <u>NO</u> additional cost for the second emblem on the larger bricks.
- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Prices range from \$250 to \$500, again depending on size, style and lettering.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? Visit <u>http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209</u> to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.

Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know and we will make certain they are all placed together.

### Bringing a Little South to the West

The day I told Mom and Dad I was going to join the Army is deeply wedged into my memory as if it was yesterday. Dad was a WWII Veteran, as was his Dad. Mom's face was pretty stoic, but Dad just kind of chuckled. When I asked why the laugh, he said, "Your brother said the same thing last year, and Dee [older sister] told us that 5 years ago. Neither of them did it."

I was just barely 18 and still in high school. There was a Draft lottery going on and with the way my luck was running, I knew my lottery number would be very low (it wound up being #12 out of 366). I was in my 3rd year of JROTC and my senior military instructor was a crusty old retired Army First Sergeant. When I talked with him about joining, he suggested I call a Recruiter and have him visit the school and the three of us could sit in his office while the Recruiter talked. He told me the Recruiter wouldn't dare talk trash with him there. That made good sense to me.

Anyway, boy I showed my "old man." I joined the Delayed Entry program while still a senior with a start date of 1 July the year I graduated HS in June. I made the decision and signed the papers during a weekend when Mom and Dad were visiting their parents in Arkansas. When I gave them the news, Dad looked at me and said, "So, you decided to join the 'Hurry Up and Wait' group." I asked him what that meant, and he just grinned and said, "You'll find out."

I left downtown Memphis the morning of 1 July on a charter bus with about 40 other guys who were going to the same place; Ft. Campbell, KY, home of the 101st Airborne. This was in 1971 and the Vietnam War was still being waged so most of the active duty folks we encountered when we arrived, especially the Drill Sergeants, were combat Vets.

I didn't realize it at the time, but Ft. Campbell was full of comedian "wannabes." On the first day, we were ushered into one of the local Barber Shops on Post and one of the Barbers would ask each man as they sat down how they would like their hair cut. Then he'd laugh as he took the clippers from the middle of the forehead to the back of the man's neck. But he'd always ask.

I remember vividly my first morning as an Army soldier. We were housed in the Reception area in what appeared to be WWII barracks. I was on the top bunk in a bay with other recruits. Someone had sneaked in a transistor radio and tuned in a local country music station (imagine finding country music in Tennessee and Kentucky). The song I woke up to my first day as a soldier was Country Roads by John Denver. As he sang, "Take me home, Country Roads…" I remember thinking, "What in the world am I doing here?" Strange way to start a new career.

Another memory of my very short time in the Reception area was when one of the staff NCOs sneaked in a lady of the evening. She was a young African American lady in a jump suit that I can only assume was the only article of clothing she was wearing. The staff NCO acted as cashier for anyone interested in a 5-minute good time. I have no idea the cost but what an introduction into the US Army. By the way, the action was taking place there in the Bay, she never went into the semi-private NCO room at the end of the building.

I mentioned this place having a few comedians. Our Mess Sergeant was another one. Every morning as we walked through the chow line he would yell out, "How You Like Your Eggs?" And every morning, one of the recruits would respond with something like, "I'll take my Over Easy please." And the old Mess Sergeant would laugh as he slapped a spoonful of scrambled eggs on the tray.

I was a squad leader all during Basic Training. Matter of fact, I was the only squad leader that kept their stripes throughout the 8 weeks of Basic. I think part of the reason was because I had three years of JROTC, so even though I couldn't wear the rank until graduation I was already an E-3, unlike most who were E-1s. Anyway, being a squad leader meant I only had to pull KP once during my Basic Training cycle, where everyone else had to pull it several times. I remember the night before I was scheduled for KP I asked one of my squad members what was the best job to try and get. He immediately said Pots and Pans. The next morning as we gathered with the Mess Sergeant and he began handing out jobs, I jumped up and yelled, "I wanted Pots and Pans." He looked at me funny, smiled and said, "No problem." I couldn't wait for the end of my shift to get back and ream that guy's butt. He thought it was funny until he realized I was the guy handing out other jobs in the barracks each day. Not so funny then.

Our PT test included: Run, Dodge, and Jump; the inverted crawl; the horizontal (Monkey) bars; sit ups, and the 1 mile run. You could score 100 points in each. They had a club called the "450 Club" and I became a member of that elite group. I guess I've always been a stud. ©
