From the Desk and Mind of the Commander

As I'm writing this July article fires are raging within our District. The two of most concern are the Black Forest and the Canon City fires. When I left the house this morning, the Canon City fire was 20% contained and the Black Forest fire was 30%. My prayer is that by the time you read this article, they will both be 100% out! As with the Waldo Canyon fire last year, I am in awe of our community, especially our American Legion family. I have been burning up the phone lines trying to get status and updates on our members affected by these devastating fires. In many cases, I learned that our Legionnaires stepped up to do what they do best; help others in need. I won't even try to identify all of you who have reached out to neighbors and friends and opened your home and wallet to assist. I know there were many because I have spoken with several. There are a few from our Legion family I believe is worth mentioning; Eddie Davis, and the Baxter family.

Like last year, as soon as the fire got out of control and families were evacuated, Eddie mobilized. He set up outside the Commissary at Peterson Air Force Base and other stores around town collecting food items. He made frequent trips to the Care and Share and our local Fire Departments delivering food and drinks. In one trip alone to Care and Share, Eddie delivered 6 boxes of food, 9 cases of Gatorade, and 7 cases of water. That same day he collected and delivered 39 cases of water, and 5 boxes of quick fix food items to a Fire Department; all in the name of The American Legion, Centennial Post 209.

Bill and Patti Baxter volunteer and work at the El Paso County Sheriff's Department. During emergencies such as with this fire, Patti trains and helps manage the Emergency Operations Center. Bill served as the Chief of Operations on the night shift for the duration. Both logged hundreds of tireless hours. Daughter Julie sin-



gle handily directed over 50 volunteers in the care and feeding of many large animals at the Norris-Penrose Animal Shelter. She arranged for the permanent placing of animals owned by people who lost their homes and reunited people who had to abandon their animals. Julie was also a 2012 Red Cross Hometown Hero for her support doing this same thing during the Waldo Canyon fire last year.

So far, there have been two deaths from the Black Forest fire. An evacuated couple felt they HAD to return to their home and retrieve more STUFF. Do you remember my article last year after the Waldo Canyon fire (August 2012)? Folks, it's just STUFF! Looking back, was it worth it? I just don't get it, and probably will never understand.

I am proud to be a member of the greatest Veterans organization in the world and an active member of this community. And I'm even more proud when I see how everyone comes together to help in times such as this. I don't know if it's because there are so many Veterans living here and that's what we've always done, or if it's because there are so many people from across the country who have migrated to this community, or maybe it's a combination of all of the above. Whatever the reason, it is great to watch and be a part of the coming together. I pray we never have another disaster. But if I am living in a city when/if another man-made or natural disaster of this magnitude hits, I want to be here in Colorado Springs and a part of Centennial Post 209. I know my chance of survival will be increased significantly.

I don't and can't say it enough; I am very proud of our Legion family and consider it an honor to have my name associated with this amazing team. Thank you for what you do, and may God continue to bless you, The American Legion, Colorado Springs, and our great Country.

Actually, bokoo is a legitimate French word, "beaucoup," meaning "very many." Americanization changed the spelling and pronunciation but the meaning remains unchanged. Like many foreign terms that have crept into our nautical lingo, "bokoo" is the inevitable product of generations of American seamen meeting peoples of other nations and adopting bokoo phrases from their languages for everyday shipboard use.
