Art promises you won't be disappointed. His guarantee comes with your money back if not satisfied with the meal. Come on out and let's give it a try!





The Centennial: A Great Resource for the History of Post 209

Many of you read the Post 209 "Centennial" newsletter each month, but did you know that you can read about what was happening with Post 209 all the way back to 40 years ago?

It's true. The Post 209 Web site, legion209.org, features a "Newsletter" link, which gives access to past editions of the Centennial—some dating back as far as the mid 1970's. Simply click the "Newsletter" link from any page and you are presented with a list of the Centennial editions currently available for your historical perusal. The list is broken up by decades, and each blue "link" is clickable, and will provide an electronic copy of that month's Centennial.



Here is an example of the decade of the 1980's:

You'll notice that some of the links are gray. That means we currently don't have a copy of that particular edition. That's where YOU come in! If you happen to have an old issue of the Post 209 Centennial that we don't currently have, you can loan it to us—long enough for us to scan it and put it online.

So dig into your file drawers, your attic, your basement.... Let's build a complete list and turn those gray areas blue! Bring your found copies to Post 209, and we will make sure it gets into the Historian's box. Your Post needs your help in completing our Centennial Newsletter history!



Buy A Brick Fundraiser!

If you have attended some of our meetings over the past several months, you may have heard us discuss plans for a new fundraising effort. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our land-scaping project we are working. The bricks are engraved using a hybrid method that combines both laser engraving and sandblasting. The engraving is then painted using the same paint used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are the details/answers to questions we anticipate:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs and Offset Increasing Costs
- What Size Are the Bricks? We are offering 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.
- What are the Costs for the Individual Bricks? Prices range from \$75 to \$200, depending on size, style and lettering desired. For the 8x8 or 12x12 bricks, you can add a second emblem. Contact the Adjutant for ordering details. There is **NO** additional cost for the second emblem on the larger bricks.
- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Prices range from \$125 to \$500, again depending on size, style and lettering.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? Visit http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209 to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/ approved for the next phase of our project.

Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know and we will make certain they are all placed together.

Isn't it interesting how we remember the past? On a recent trip back home to Tennessee, my brother, Eddie (affectionately known as Bubba) and I were regaling anyone who would listen about some of our adventures growing up. In his version, he was always the hero, gets the girl, and saves the world. Funny, I remember it slightly different.

In one such story was about a visit with our maternal grandparents; Maw-Maw and Paw-Paw. We both remember him as being a practical joker, man of God, and someone who never really got over being a kid. Anyway, we were leaving their Arkansas farmhouse to go into the nearby woods and kill some dinner. As we walked off the porch and down the 5 steps to a pretty steep sloping yard, Bubba looked over at Paw-Paw who had his 12 Gauge slung over his shoulder. This was an old Remington pump with a hammer. And the hammer was pulled back.

Maw-Maw was standing on the porch giving us our "marching orders" about when to return and to be careful. She had just walked back inside and closed the door when Bubba noticed the hammer back on the shot-gun. He made a comment to Paw-Paw, who exclaimed, "Why boy, it doesn't matter. It's not loaded." To prove his point, Paw-Paw pulled the trigger and blew a hole in the door Maw-Maw had just closed. He looked over at us and kind of shrugged, and said something like, "Oh well." That was it. Until Maw-Maw opened the door and shouted, "EARL!" They had been married almost 50 years by that time and he knew what that meant. So, this barely 5'4" man looked at us, cracked a little smile and turned to walk back toward his almost 6' bride. He looked like a little boy caught with his hand in the cookie jar. Needless to say we didn't go hunting that afternoon.

In Bubba's version, most of the above was similar, except he tried to talk Paw-Paw out of pulling the trigger, but to no avail. We do agree that we didn't get to go hunting that day and we're not certain what happened when Maw-Maw took Paw-Paw into the house. This was pretty normal. There were several occasions when Paw-Paw did something mischievous or child-like and wound up getting caught. Maw-Maw would always take him into the house and make us stay outside for several minutes while they discussed what happened. We were typical teenagers, but combined we didn't get in nearly as much trouble as he did. Seems he never learned...or just didn't care. He was a GREAT man and just about everyone who knew him loved him dearly. But that's a story for another day.

Bubba's imaginations and exaggerations also flow over into his more rowdy days after he got his driver's license. He would occasionally sneak out of the house after lights out to meet up with the girlfriend du jour. He likes to tell the story of one late night as he was crawling back into the bedroom we shared until I went into the Army, I started screaming because I awoke scared. My screams woke Dad who caught Bubba half-way in the bedroom and half-way hanging out the window. Back in those days, we slept with windows open to let the window fan draw air through the house. We didn't have air-conditioning so that was our only way to stay comfortable during the muggy summer months. Anyway, Bubba likes to tell people that because of my screaming, he got yet another spanking and was grounded until he was 21 (that was Dad's favorite threat, which if he held to it, I would probably just be coming up on parole about now).

The truth of the matter (my version) was that he made so much racket climbing back into the bedroom that he woke Mom and Dad up with the kicking and scrambling he was doing to get back into the house. Their bedroom was next to ours and they had a window open about 6' from the one Bubba tried to climb back into. I didn't scream; I didn't have to. He made more noise than I could have by yelling. And the funny part was we had another window opening into the backyard that he could have crawled into, but he didn't want to go over the 5' fence to do it.

Funny, how our mind and memory works. The story teller is always the hero and gets the girl, or in Bubba's case, gets the whipping!
