I will serve all of you to the best of my ability, and with the assistance of past Commanders, Officers and the support of fellow members. I will not fail. I want to extend my appreciation to the hard work and dedication of our former Legion Commander and his administration, Auxiliary President and officers, Sons of The American Legion and officers, and finally The American Legion Riders and officers. The motto of the Post was "THE LITTLE POST, GO-ING PLACES AND DOING BIG THINGS." I got orders to be reassigned to 76th HEM Company, Fort Knox, Kentucky from 1983-1985, and reassigned to HQ Detachment 4th Training Brigade to complete BNOC. After BNOC, I flew to Garmisch, Germany with my family and was assigned as NCOIC, Director of Engineer and Housing Motor Pool from 1985-1988. I received orders to CONUS and reassigned to HHC 34th Engineer Battalion, 1st Infantry Division, Fort Riley, Kansas 1988-1991, reassigned to Pusan Korea where I departed the military in 1992 as a Sergeant. After leaving the military, I went home to Hawaii for 6 months, then relocated to Colorado Springs, CO.

In 2012, I was introduced to the American Legion through my oldest granddaughter Khianna Calica, who lives in Marysville, WA. She asked me the following question, "Do you know about The American Legion or belong to The American Legion?" My response to the questions was, "no." She continued to tell me about how the Ladies Auxiliary sponsored her to Girls State which she competed, and was selected to attend Girls Nation in Washington DC to represent Washington State. She met President Obama, while in Washington DC. Khianna also contacted me and told me that there is an American Legion Post 209. She also included the day of their meeting, breakfast and telephone number. The first two breakfasts and meetings I went to I was not greeted by anyone, so I ate in the corner. From the Sr. Vice Commander

As Senior Vice Commander, part of my job is to promote respect for, and the display of, the U.S. flag. I'm actually writing this on Flag Day, June 14th, and I hope you have your flag flying proudly today. With that in mind, I thought I would post some of the American Legion's answers to many of the myths surrounding our flag, so here goes:

Myth: A flag that has been used to cover a casket cannot be used for any other proper display purpose.

Fact: A flag that has been used to cover a casket can be used for any proper display purpose to include displaying this flag from a staff or flagpole.

Myth: The Flag Code prohibits the display of a United States flag of less than 50 stars.

Fact: According to the US Army Institute of Heraldry the US flag never becomes obsolete. Any officially approved American flag, irrespective of the number or arrangement of the stars and/or stripes may continue to be used and displayed until no longer serviceable.

Myth: The Flag Code does provide for penalties for violations of any of its provisions.

Fact: The Flag Code is simply a guideline for proper flag etiquette. The law does not provide penalties for violation of any of its provisions.

Myth: You must destroy the flag when it touches the ground.

Fact: As long as the flag remains suitable for display, the flag may continue to be displayed as a symbol of our great country.

Myth: The Flag Code prohibits the washing or dry-cleaning of the flag.

Fact: There are no provisions of the Flag Code that prohibits the washing or dry-cleaning of the flag. The decision to wash or dry-clean would of course depend upon the type of material.

Myth: There has been a change to the Flag Code that no longer requires the flag to be properly illuminated during the hours of darkness.

Fact: There has been NO CHANGE to Flag Code section 6(a), which states: "It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flag staffs in the open. However, when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed twenty-four hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness."

Myth: The mayor, town official, or the Post Commander can order the flag to be displayed at half-staff. Fact: The gesture of placing the flag at half-staff means that the Nation or the state mourns the death of a highly regarded National or state figure, hence only the President of the United States or the Governor of the state may order the Flag to be half-staffed in accordance with Flag Code section 7(m). Those individuals and agencies that usurp authority and display the flag at half-staff on inappropriate occasions are quickly eroding the honor and reverence accorded this solemn act.

Myth: The Flag Code states that when the flag is no longer a fitting emblem for display it is to be disposed of by burning in private.

Fact: The Flag Code as revised and adopted by the Congress of the United States in 1942 has never included the word(s) "private" or "in privacy." Section 8(k) of the Flag Code states: "The flag, when it is in such a condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning." Since 1937, The American Legion has promoted the use of a public flag disposal ceremony. This ceremony is a fitting tribute and an overt expression of patriotism, which enhances the public's understanding of honor and respect due the American flag.

At Post 209, we will be holding our annual July 4th potluck at Noon, preceded at 11:am by our ceremony for the honorable, and very public, disposal of unserviceable US flags. I hope you will make it a point to come, and help us pay our final respects to these worn or faded versions of Old Glory.

Thank you, again, for this opportunity to serve.




Buy A Brick Fundraiser!

If you've attended our meetings over the past year, you may have heard us discuss plans for a new fundraising effort. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our landscaping project we are working. The bricks are engraved using a hybrid method that combines both laser engraving and sandblasting. The engraving is then painted using the same paint used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are the details/answers to questions we anticipate:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs and Offset Increasing Costs
- What Size Are the Bricks? We are offering 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.
- What are the Costs for the Individual Bricks? Prices range from \$90 to \$200, depending on size, style and lettering desired. For the 8x8 or 12x12 bricks, you can add a second emblem. Contact the Adjutant for ordering details. There is **NO** additional cost for the second emblem on the larger bricks.
- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Prices range from \$250 to \$500, again depending on size, style and lettering.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? Visit http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209 to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/ approved for the next phase of our project.

Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know and we will make certain they are all placed together.

July meant two things to me growing up; 4th of July celebration, and enjoying the summer vacation. Well, I enjoyed as many summer vacations as I could, except for the year I spent in Summer School (see last month's article), and when we weren't chopping cotton at my grandparents' farms in Arkansas.

Back in the day, there were two times a year Memphis had a big fireworks display; the start of the "Memphis in May" festival month, and on the 4th of July. Both occurred on the Mississippi river along the Memphis skyline. There's a street called Riverside Drive that runs about 2 miles along the river and bordering downtown. Cars would line the street, parked along the side of the road to catch the fireworks. We were no different. Dad and Mom would load up the Chevy Station Wagon (it seems Dad always had a Chevy Station Wagon when we were growing up), all four of us kids and we'd head to Riverside Drive.

You had to get there early if you wanted a good spot. Often, we'd even take a picnic and eat a sandwich while waiting for it to get dark enough to start the fireworks. After the engine cooled down, we'd sit or lay down on the hood of the car and even climb up on top. In those days you could do that and not worry about denting anything. My Dad's '58 Chevy was built like a tank and could easily support our slender bodies.

When the fireworks started, it was always as if seeing them for the first time. The sparkling reds, whites, blues, and greens against the night sky was like an artist's painting. And sprinkled among the fireworks were Lightening Bugs (or Fireflies if you're a Yankee) dancing in the air around us. We would occasionally catch them and either put them in a jar or wait until they lit up and we would twist off their lighted tail and stick them on our shirts. Today, that seems gross and we would probably be reported to the ASPCA, but back then it was like having rhinestones on your clothes, at least for a short while. I guess if you want to call it karma, sometimes we would mistake a Blister Bug for a Lightening Bug because they did look similar, but you learned the difference very quickly.

As mentioned, we also spent the July summers chopping cotton in Arkansas. We would earn \$5 per day chopping cotton from sunup to sundown, Monday through Friday (I wrote about my cotton chopping experiences in more detail in the October 2014 Newsletter. If you're interested in reading about the worst job I ever had just go to our Post website and you can read the article). Anyway, we would swap off spending a week with both sets of grandparents, even though they normally only lived about 10 miles apart. On Saturday, whichever grandparent we were staying with that week would take us to Wynne, the big town not far from the family farm. There, we would blow our hard earned \$25 on junk at the Ben Franklin 5 and Dime. On Sunday, if we were staying with my Mom's parents, we went to church at the Feltner Assembly of God, just outside Cherry Valley. If that happened, part of our money was saved for the offering plate.

At some point during our summer vacation (unless I was in Summer School), Dad would take his annual vacation and we'd load up the car and take off on a camping trip. More often than not, we would spend the week either at Bull Shoals, Greer's Ferry, or Norfork Lake in north central Arkansas. There were a few vacations we would go further west to Big Bend in southwest Texas or into the Black Hills of South Dakota. Whichever, it was always a camping trip. I don't recall ever going on a family vacation on which we stayed at a hotel. They were way too expensive for our family budget. But you know what, we never missed staying in a hotel because we never stayed in one. I guess the old adage is true, you can't miss what you never had.

It didn't matter whether we were in Texas, one of the Dakotas' or at a lake in Arkansas, we had a great time learning how to set up and strike a tent, cooking freshly caught Bass or Catfish over an open fire, and hiking through the woods. We learned how to recognize Poison Ivy, how to tell which way was north (without a compass), and which wild berries were good (read that to mean non-poisonous). Looking back, these vacations were very cheap if we're talking about dollars and cents, but priceless when considering the quality family time we spent together. There were no cell phones nor video games to distract us. We would sit around the campfire at night and talk while roasting marshmallows and hot dogs over the open fire.

After camping with a couple hundred of my closest friends during my 20 year Army career, I lost my great love affair for camping. But I really miss the family vacations when the biggest distraction was listening to the owls and bob whites.
