BRINGING A LITTLE SOUTH TO THE WEST

I recently had a conversation with someone about jobs we've had over the years. I stated that I have never been fired from a job in my entire life. It dawned on me that statement may not be 100% true. I've been fired from one job (I think), and it wasn't even my fault.

I believe I was 16 and a sophomore in High School. Bubba (brother Eddie) was 17 and a Junior at the same school. We've both worked since even before we had a driver's license. It was either as paper boys, or mowing lawns, etc. After we got our license, we were able to open the horizon a little and get other, more meaningful (read that as higher paying) jobs.

I've been blessed that when I found work, I typically stayed with the company a while. This was not the norm for most of my friends and for Bubba. It seemed he was looking for a new job about every 30 days. I think it was because he had a short temper and even shorter attention span.

This was especially true on one occasion, where I helped him get a job working at the same place where I had worked for about 6 months; Giant Food Store. It was a grocery chain in Memphis and at that time, there were several around town. I started out as a sack boy, got promoted to stock boy, and after a while promoted to "Checker." I had a "knack" for being able to quickly determine the tax on a sub total for food and make change no matter what the amount. Today, being able to make change appears to be almost an art form. Our young people have been spoiled by electronic cash registers.

But I digress. Bubba needed a job and I had developed a good reputation, so I put it all on the line and got Bubba a job at the Giant Food Store where I worked. Everything started out just fine. Then the Mid-South Fair came to town.

The Mid-South Fair was the biggest annual event for all young and young at heart people from the Mid-South. It was a week-long event that drew people from 4 or 5 states. There were amusement rides, including the Pippin which was a huge roller coaster sitting on a 30 or 40-year-old rickety wooden frame that rattled and shook as the cars rolled over it, livestock shows, a rodeo, and entertainment from some of the biggest country stars of the day.

We always attended the Mid-South Fair, but now that we had a driver's license, we didn't need Mom or Dad to chaperone us. We could come and go when we wanted, for the most part. The weekend was the busiest and best time to attend. That's when all our buddies went, and the stars were on stage performing. It was at a Mid-South Fair that began my love for Country music. The last year I went to the Fair (my senior year in High School), I saw Johnny Cash, the Carter Family, and a relatively new group called The Statler Brothers.

Anyway, the Mid-South Fair was in town and Bubba and I were scheduled to work the Saturday evening of the Fair. We concocted a story about our Dad having car troubles just across the Bridge going into Arkansas, and that we had to go to help fix the car and transport Dad to the parts store. It was the perfect plan...at least in the mind of 16 and 17-year-old boys.

I don't know how our boss was able to see through the ruse. But when we reported to work on our next scheduled day, he called us up to his office. And he was fuming mad.

He ranted and screamed about us neglecting our responsibilities to attend a Fair. We tried to explain we were on a mission to help our poor Dad, but he wasn't buying it. Man, how did he ever see through the lie? I thought we were very convincing.

After a few minutes of ranting, I figured out that we were going to be put on notice that if we did it again, we'd be gone, but we were going to be let off with just this warning and counseling. But unfortunately, I didn't take into account the "Bubba Factor!"

Just about the time the boss was finishing a very well deserved "Come to Jesus" counseling session, Bubba's face turned beet red and his face got all screwy. I had seen this look before and it never resulted in anything positive for him or anyone near him. He untied his apron, lifted it over his head, wadded it up and threw it in the face of our sitting manager. As the apron flew through the air toward its target, he yelled, "We don't have to put up with this crap! We Quit!!!!"

I looked at him and said, "We? We Quit?" I looked at my manager with a plea in my face and started to let him know that Bubba wasn't speaking for the team. Too late! By that time, the boss was so mad he yelled at both of us to leave immediately. I tried to explain that the opinion of my idiot brother was not representative of us both, but my plea fell on deaf ears. He just screamed again, "Get Out!" That was the end of my days in the grocery business.

So, in reality I didn't really get fired, I quit. Or did I? I guess I could make an argument either way. But that was the LAST time I got Bubba a job working with me. Many, many years later he returned the favor and hired me to work with him and his wife Mary, as an engineer in their telecommunications business. I worked for him 6 years. I love my brother and wanted to continue to love my brother. So, I quit and moved to Colorado Springs.
