The first Sunday in the month of February is designated as "Four Chaplains Sunday".

If you have never heard this story, than I suggest you put it on your to do list! It is probably as close to Pearl Harbor, in remembrance of a tremendous loss and one of sacrifice!

The heroic sacrifice of the Four Chaplains has been immortalized through the work of the "Chapel of the Four Chaplains."

It is located in the heart of Temple University, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. It was dedicated on Feb. 3rd, 1951. The chapel has reached out to all corners of the world spreading the story of the Chaplains in an attempt to bring unity to humanity, without uniformity.

The Chapel is an Interfaith memorial and a sanctuary for Brotherhood. It is not a "Theology" nor a "Doctrine," but a symbol. Its purpose is not to promote uniformity but to strengthen unity in one's relationship with God and humanity.

The message of the Chapel was best stated by Dr. A.A. Poling, father of one of the Chaplains, when he said:

"The irreducible minimum for an adequate defense of America is American unity! Not uniformity! All races and faith, all colors and economic degrees, living together and working together as American's all." Amen and Amen.

One afternoon per week at sea, usually a Wednesday, was reserved for mending. Since it was an afternoon for rest from the usual chores, much like Sunday, it was dubbed "rope yarn Sunday."

The Navy adhered to the custom up to the years immediately after World War II; men used Wednesday afternoon for personal errands like picking up their laundry and getting haircuts. Of course they paid back the time by working a half-day on Saturdays.

Today, uniforms require less attention so rope yarn Sunday has been turned to other purposes; mainly early liberty or a time for catching up on sleep. Some, however, still adhere to tradition and break out the ditty bag for an afternoon of uniform PMS [Preventative Maintenance Schedule].

Fill Your GAS Tank!

Some days many people wake up and feel like they have no gas in the tank. Get the coffee down your throat and eat some fruit – you'll feel better. Taking care of the physical needs is easy – let's talk about the mental and get some GAS. Dictionary.com has nine noun and eight verb definitions for gas; I'm going to add an acronym – GAS (Give a \$&!#). Apologies on the use of the vulgarity, but Give A Darn (GAD) or Give a Care (GAC) just doesn't pop or have a nice ring to it. Besides, using GAS makes for a good analogy (or is it a metaphor?). With that in mind, there are several advantages to keeping your GAS tank full.

Having a full tank of GAS helps you go the distance, stay on target and puts mileage between start and finish without getting distracted to see the world's largest ball of twine (located in Cawker City, Kansas incidentally). If you're heading into new, different or unknown territory, you're less likely to become stranded or stuck with a full tank of GAS. If you do encounter a rough spot, a full tank of GAS will help keep you going until assistance arrives. Gotta have GAS!

A full tank of GAS will make your life easier. You will make fewer stops at the station. Getting just enough GAS to get you by will just get you by. \$10 of GAS twice a week or \$20 of GAS once a week; the cost is the same. The difference is fewer stops; more time for you and yours and less impulse buys of that 'brain freeze' cherry ICEE or that "I wonder how long has that been rolling there" hotdog. Gotta have GAS!

Keeping a full tank of GAS helps your whole system. Consistently maintaining plenty of GAS will reduce condensation in your tank. That moisture will cause your tank to rust from the inside out and leave a hole in your tank; GAS will just drip away without fulfilling its potential. When it gets real cold, moisture will freeze in the lines and keep you from using your GAS. All the GAS in the world doesn't mean beans if it doesn't get to the engine. Gotta have GAS!

I suspect we all know someone who doesn't regularly fill up with GAS. A bit of a shame really. There are so many opportunities in our lives to get GAS, we often drive by without paying attention or even really seeing them. If you do run out of GAS, you're left sitting at the side of the road, watching all the other cars pass you by (I bet a good share of them have full tanks of GAS). Fortunately, there always seems to be a kind and generous soul with an abundance of GAS and they even carry extra GAS with them. They'll take time out of their day and give you some GAS. GAS comes in different containers and sizes, but what's important is that GAS is for you. Use it – Appreciate it. If you're lucky, it's the high octane stuff. Gotta have GAS!

I won't pretend to know how to fill up your GAS tank – I suspect it's different for everyone. Like most gas stations, it's self-serve – something you have to do yourself. Some get it from private meditation or prayer; others appreciate the public acknowledgment of a job well done. Some keep a full tank from a childhood instilled work ethic; others seem to be naturally full of GAS the moment they wake up (I'll admit to needing a couple cups of coffee and maybe a breakfast burrito to get my GAS really going). Keep your GAS tank full. Gotta have GAS!
