Any fundraising idea – big, small, unconventional (think about the impact of Kellie's Stick Pony Race) – is worth consideration to help us get there.

FROM OUR POST HISTORIAN



FROM OUR HONOR GUARD CAPTAIN

The Honor Guard has been busy as usual continuing to support Final Honors for OUR Veterans and community events. We are getting known for being there when the military is not able to be there, to include surprise Flag and Bugle support. We are happy to have two new members join the team. Remember, that one time may make the difference between a Veteran receiving their Final Honors and having nobody there to fold and present their Flag to the family.

The Honor Guard had the opportunity to provide Posting/Retiring of Colors support to the United States Army Brotherhood Of Tankers (USABOT) annual banquet on Saturday October 16 and Presentation of Colors support for their wreath laying ceremony at the 11th Armored Calvary Regiment Tank Memorial at the Shrine of Remembrance on Sunday October 17. The banquet resulted in MANY thanks and comments praising the team and how well we did, which says a lot given how many retired Sergeant Majors were in attendance. The most humbling comment came from a Legionnaire (Iowa Post 49), who used to be a Color Guard member, when he said we did an "outstanding job" and we should be very proud of ourselves. Each member of the team received the outgoing USABOT Commander's "Manhole Cover" Coin – seriously, this is the largest Commander's Coin that I have ever seen. Some of the team members got to experience, in my opinion, a very tame (though very strong) Grog making it a good time for all.

The team is still preparing to represent American Legion Post 209 in the Veteran's Day Parade (COVID permitting) on Saturday November 6 by carrying the Legion Family Flags. We are working with the situation the best that we can given the multiple members who have physical limitations keeping them from being able to support. Training will continue after the parade to get all of the team fully trained for the multiple roles that they could be asked to perform (e.g., fold the Flag, Post/Retire the Colors). The next major Community event on the horizon is the Wreaths Across America on Saturday December 18. Typically, we support Memorial Gardens with this event every year. We are also expecting to be requested by Pikes Peak National Cemetery to support their event due to our good working relationship with their staff. We will be busy with either (or both?) doing the best that we can to provide the appropriate Honor Guard support.

While not everyone has a lot of time to participate in the Honor Guard, all you need is the time to participate a night or two for training meetings (2nd & 3rd Tuesday of every month) and even just one event a month. A meeting or two and one event a month is only 3-5 hours. Those 3-5 hours makes a difference for a Veteran and their family. Those 3-5 hours a month can also make a difference for you! If another 10 to 15 members of the Legion, Sons, or Auxiliary gave back with 3-5 hours a month, the Honor Guard could possibly double the number of Final Honors we participate in - and more importantly not have to turn down requests. If you do not remember/know how to march or fold the flag, we will teach you. We have a member each from both the Sons of the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary that have learned to march, use the rifle, fold the Flag, and carry/present the Colors. The only items a new member needs to get on their own is a Legion family cap and shoes. All other uniform items are provided. You do not have 3-5 hours a month? That is okay, you can still help the Honor Guard by telling others about what we do and the importance of growing to meet the requests to support. SAL and Auxiliary members are able to perform every activity except the presentation of the flag or presentation of the expended rounds to the family. FROM OUR POST CHAPLAIN

"FACES"

Can you believe it? Another holiday season is upon us. For some, that means heading off to see friends and family. For others, we getting the house prepared for the traditional hosting ahead.

The most familiar faces we encounter at this time of year are "family." Some members make the usual five or ten-minute trip to the house. Others may travel hundreds or even thousands of miles for the reunion. We cherish those moments when we could greet a uniformed family member with, "Welcome Home!"

There are so many "special days" in the months ahead. Among them is Veterans Day. Each year, I would escort "The World's Greatest Fifth Grade Class" to the observance at Fort Sam Houston National Ceremony; a celebration that included an official Naturalization Ceremony. The District Judge would convene the court, and the County Clerk would certify that the applicants had completed all the requirements for citizenship. Some in attendance were active duty military; including combat veterans. They had taken an oath to support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic, while still citizens of their native lands. I could see the pride and gratitude in their faces after taking the oath to become citizens of the United States of America. We in the audience would face a giant American flag and join them in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance as never before.

I always wore my uniform and when we returned to campus, we hosted family and friends who were veterans. Those who wished, could share their experiences over a sandwich lunch. It was always interesting to see the faces of our students after the Naturalization ceremony, and again as they heard the experiences shared by our honored guests.

I will enjoy participating in this year's Veterans Day Parade. It feels good to be in proud company of the warriors around me, and to see the faces of our citizens young and old, who turn out to celebrate our veterans and this great nation.

Thanksgiving is always a special time; a reminder of our many blessings, and an opportunity to say "Thank You" to loved ones, and to the Commander of us all. I have always marveled at how our country manages to provide a traditional American Thanksgiving meal "with all the trimmings" to our soldiers, sailors, airmen, Coast Guardsmen, Marines, and Space Force Guardians serving around the world.

I remember Thanksgiving 1969 in Vietnam. Saigon was the most densely populated refugee city on earth. Humanity existed however and wherever it could. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our landscaping project we are working. The engraving uses the same technology as used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are some FAQs:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs
- What Size Are the Bricks? 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.
- What are the Costs for the Individual Bricks? Prices vary depending on size, style and lettering desired, but typically range from \$90 to \$200. For the 8x8 or 12x12 bricks, you can add a second emblem. Contact the Adjutant for ordering details. There is **NO** additional cost for the second emblem on the larger bricks.
- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$250 to \$500.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209 to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.

For the few who are regular readers of my offerings, you know this is my absolute favorite time of year and holiday season. We just finished the good times brought on by Halloween (yes, I know it's not really a holiday), Thanksgiving is coming this month and Christmas next month. All of that added by the cool-down of the weather makes it an enjoyable time

and brings back many fond memories.

If you are a reader of my articles, you may recall I have often recounted memories of growing up with both sets of grandparents. They both lived outside a rural farming community about 60 miles west of Memphis, not quite an hour and a half drive from their farm to our suburban home in Memphis. That made it easy for them and us to visit frequently, and especially for holidays such as Thanksgiving.

We had the traditional Southern Thanksgiving feast every year. It was comprised of Turkey, Ham, all the fixins' such as Mashed Potatoes, Pinto or Baked Beans, Yams, Maw Maw's Yeast Buns, and Sweet Iced Tea. For dessert, we could always count on Karo Pecan Pie, Pumpkin and Chocolate Meringue Pies, and Granny's Chocolate Pudding Cake.

This holiday meal was big enough to feed an Army, and I guess you could say our Thanksgiving get togethers qualified. Typically, there was our family of six (2 boys, 2 girls, Mom, and Dad), both sets of grandparents, and our Aunt and Uncle with their daughter from just across the Mississippi River in West Memphis, AR. The kids would eat at the kitchen table, while the grownups squeezed in around our small dining room table. I enjoyed eating in the kitchen, it was closer to the food and especially the desserts!

The blessing was always provided by my Mom's father, Paw Paw. He and Maw Maw were devout Pentecost's. Mom and Dad weren't regular Church goers until later in life, but when they did attend, it was normally at a Baptist Church. Later in life, and right up until they both passed, Mom and Dad rarely missed a Church service. I am comforted they both left this life for a far better one knowing our Savior. Dad's parents only attended church for weddings and funerals. Dad's father, Granddad confessed on his death bed. I pray it was okay.

In the mid-60's, Dad's favorite team, the Dallas Cowboys started playing on Thanksgiving as well. This was a passion Dad and I shared. We would watch football together when I moved back to Memphis, but even before I moved home, we would talk with one another about the weekend football schedule. While I was NEVER a Dallas fan (I normally pulled for whoever played against them), it was always fun talking trash before the games and ribbing the loser afterward. I'm thankful Dad wasn't around to see the embarrassment of the NFL when they started taking a knee. The only thing Dad loved more than his family and football was America. Dad was very Patriotic. I'm certain this WWII Veteran would have joined me in my protest over their protest and stopped watching NFL.

This holiday always makes me think back about all the blessings I have been given (although not deserved). I thank God for giving me a GREAT family and life-style growing up, and an amazing family life with a loving wife, two happily married boys, four grandkids, good health, and an abundance of very good friends. For an old country boy from the South with little money, I am rich beyond imagination! So, what are you thankful for this Thanksgiving season?
