We have a lot happening in the next couple of months, so be sure to read the calendars and call if you have any questions.


Butter Braids will be delivered Nov 22nd at noon. If you placed an order and want it for the holidays, be sure to mark your calendars for pick up.

THE AMERICAN LEGION HIGH SCHOOL ORATORICAL CONTEST



The American Legion High School Oratorical Contest is geared toward those students in grades 9 through 12. The subject of the contest is always the Constitution of The United States and as such, the students must prepare a 12 minute oration that relates to a specific subject of the Constitution.

In addition, they have to prepare 5 speeches on a list provided by National each year. At the contest, a topic is drawn and all contestants have to speak on that topic.

The contestants cannot use any notes, do not have a podium to lean on and do not have a microphone to amplify their voice. They are judged on how well they know the Constitution, the Amendments and how well they can relate the Constitution to today's world. They are also judged on their dress, their mannerisms, how well they project their voice and few other things.

This year the Department Contest will be held on 4 January 2014. The top prizes at National are scholarships to continue their education and range from \$12,000.00 to \$18,000.00 for the top 4 winners.

Eagle Scout Project Pays Respect to the American Flag By Jennifer Dunlop

Post 209 is receiving much needed help from Chance Hansen and his Eagle Scout Project. An ongoing project to build an American flag disposal unit will involve more than just muscle, giving Chance Hansen, 17, the chance to use organizational and leadership skills honed as a Boy Scout.

Chance Hansen of Boy Scout Troop 599 of Colorado Springs, is on his way to becoming an Eagle Scout. The Eagle Scout award is the highest rank amongst the Boy Scouts of America. According to the official Eagle Scout website, over 50,000 Boy Scouts become Eagle Scouts each year. However, only 7% of all Boys Scouts will earn the Eagle Scout badge. To earn this badge, a Boy Scout must fulfill requirements in the areas of leadership, service, and outdoor skills while fulfilling the "Aims of Scouting," which include character development, citizenship training, and personal fitness.

For his Eagle Scout project, Chance Hansen is dedicating his time and energies to building an American Flag receptacle and an American Flag disposal pit for Post 209. Chance has already installed the American Flag receptacle. He will start building the disposal fire pit area at the end of October. On the way to becoming an Eagle Scout, Chance will work with over eight different agencies and will personally solicit all donations and volunteer labor required to finish the project. He not only will be the project foreman, directing and managing the project, he will also be working alongside his volunteer labor force.

Chance said he was excited to help Post 209. He has deep respect for all Veterans and one day hopes to become an officer in the United States Army Rangers. By doing this project for the Post, he not only honors the American Flag, he also respects and wants to honor America's Veterans. He said this project will help ensure American Flags receive a respectful and dignified disposal.

Federal law as described in the American Flag etiquette section, often called the Flag Code, states, "When a flag is so worn it is no longer fit to serve as a symbol of our country, it should be destroyed by burning in a dignified manner." The American Legion is one of several agencies that offer a dignified flag disposal ceremony. Called the Ceremony for Disposal of Unserviceable Flags, it is an integral part of The American Legion ritual.

Our Post has collected and stored over 400 flags for proper retirement and disposal. However, due to fire restrictions in the past several years, we have been able to only perform a few ceremonies.

Now, because of Chance Hansen and his Eagle Scout project, our Post will have more flexibility when it comes to performing the Ceremony for Disposal of Unserviceable Flags. Jay Bowen, Commander of Post 209 stated, "The projects Chance is working for our Post will be of great benefit to us and the community. Currently, when someone has an unserviceable Flag they want to donate for proper disposal, they either leave it in a bag at the door or coordinate a date and time when someone can meet them. The Flag container Chance is getting will make it easier and much more convenient for our neighbors to get the Flags to us. Also, the permanent burn pit Chance is working on will make our Flag Disposal/Retirement ceremonies safer. We are very excited he has chosen us to do his Eagle Scout project."

Now thanks to Chance Hansen, Post 209 is capable of receiving unserviceable American Flags via the American Flag receptacle placed in front of the Post building. You can't miss it, it is painted Red, White, and Blue. Soon, we will have it marked as a Flag Receptacle to make it easier to distinguish. Please feel free to drop off any unserviceable American Flags at your convenience and know they will receive a properly respectful and dignified retirement and disposal.

Thank you in advance Chance, and thank you Boys Scouts of America for all you do to mentor and help grow our leaders of tomorrow.
