FROM THE DESK & MIND OF THE COMMANDER

I've decided to republish a newsletter I wrote last October with minor updates.

Why do all my friends kill themselves? A question I was asked a couple of weeks ago by a grieving Fort Carson Soldier, who was morning the loss of his friend who he had just lost to suicide. This question continues to haunt me, because like him I am all too familiar with the pain this sergeant is feeling. Over this last year alone I have experienced the loss of five people who I served with. I sat and listened to a groups of soldiers from his platoon talk and say things like, I just talked to him, he said he was good, he was always the one to help others. I couldn't help but think how many more times will I have to hear these words, how many more times will we wonder what else could we have done?

The American Legion like many organizations understand that military & veteran suicide is a pandemic within our community. Between 2005 and 2017, 78,875 veterans took their own lives, the reasons are not fully understood, but the numbers reflect a burden with heavy wartime demands after almost two decades of post-9/11 wars. In a 2018 white paper published by the American Legion two of the many root causes for Military & Veteran Suicide and contributed to losing a sense of purpose & losing a sense of belonging.

During the First World War, psychiatrists noted that "shell-shocked" soldiers treated closer to the frontlines with the support of their comrades showed a higher level of recovery and mental health improvements vs those who were evacuated from their units. The Veterans ranging from Vietnam to the current Global War on Terrorism, rejoined a civilian populous that was either, against the conflict (think Vietnam) or become disconnected from the war as a whole (think our current 19 year conflict). In a 2011 Pew Research Center study, 84 percent of Post-9/11 veterans said that the public does not understand the problems faced by those in the military or their families. Stereotypes portrayed in the media haven't helped much either, PTSD, unemployed, injured, or unstable are a few of those stereotypes.

There is some good news though, Veterans, although some maybe troubled by their past, still have a willingness to continue to serve even after leaving the military. The skills that were learned in the military make Veterans a top choice for leaders in private and non-profit positions. Groups like the American Legion, VFW, Team Rubicon, and many others continue to provide the outlet and support for active-duty service members and Veterans.

The American Legion is committed to ending Military & Veteran Suicide, by establishing a Suicide Prevention Program. This committee is currently reviewing methods, programs and strategies that can be used to reduce veteran suicide. Since 1981 the American Legion has passed national resolutions to combat suicide, 20 years before it was addressed by the VA as a public health crisis.

Here at the Neal Thomas Jr. Centennial Post 209 we can rally together to help all persons struggling with thoughts of suicide. We together can give them a place of belonging, a sense of purpose. Together we can all our comrades, be them Legionnaires or not just to see how they are doing. This isn't something that can be assigned to a committee or individual, to help end military & veteran suicide.

In closing I'd like to quote resolution No. 28 passed in 1981, "Many veterans return home and miss the sense of purpose and belonging that they felt from military service." As a Legion family we can return that sense of purpose, regardless of when they returned from theater, Korea to the Global War on Terror, we have an obligation to our sisters and brothers in arms to look out from them as they did us. A simple phone call can save a life. Let fight to end this so no one ever needs to ask "why" again.

As I mentioned in September's newsletter, I've chosen as one focus of my tenure as Squadron 209 Commander, in keeping with the traditional goals of the SAL, the renewal & restoration of The American's Creed in our collective consciousness. To that end I've compiled from various sources the following brief history of The American's Creed and its Author, William Tyler Page.

William Tyler Page & The American's Creed – Compiled by Brian L. A. Wess

Of the Creed, William Tyler Page once said: "The American's Creed is a summing up, in one hundred words, of the basic principles of American political faith. It is not an expression of individual opinion upon the obligations and duties of American citizenship or with respect to its rights and privileges. It is a summary of the fundamental principles of American political faith as set forth in its greatest documents, its worthiest traditions and by its greatest leaders."

In 1916, the world was embroiled in the Great War (WWI) and many Americans believed that we had become complacent, dwelling on our privileges, having forgotten to be mindful of the duties and obligations of being citizens of the United States of America.

With the entry of the United States into The Great War, Henry Sterling Chapin, New York State Commissioner of Education, conceived the idea to promote a county-wide contest for the writing

of a National Creed. The goal was to achieve a concise but complete as possible statement of American political faith, founded upon fundamentals most distinctive in American history and tradition. **SOMETHING TO REUNITE A TROUBLED COUNTRY**.

The City of Baltimore, birthplace of America's National Anthem, joined in to offer a \$1,000 award for the winning essay and three committees were formed: The Committee of Manuscripts to review all the entries and select the top 50; The Committee on Award to select the winning Creed and the Advisory Committee to endorse the result.



William Tyler Page was born in Frederick, Maryland, in 1868. He was the great-great-grandson of Carter Braxton, member of the House of Burgesses of the Province of Virginia and a signer of the Declaration of Independence. Mr. Page was also descended from the tenth President John Tyler (1841-1845). In 1881, at the age of 13, Page traveled to Washington, D.C. to serve as a page in the U.S. Capitol, beginning a 61-year-long career as a national public servant.

In 1917, at the age of 49, Mr. Page wrote the "American's Creed" as his submission to Henry Chapin's nationwide patriotic contest. Inspired by the Apostles Creed he recited at church, Page drew on a wide variety of historical documents and speeches, including the Declaration of Independence, the Preamble to the Constitution of the United States of America, The Gettysburg Address and various others. From these inspirations proceeded to craft a simple yet profoundly moving expression of American patriotism described as "brief and simple but remarkably comprehensive of the best in American ideals, history, and tradition, as expressed by the founders of the Republic and its greatest statesmen and writers."

Mr. Page's submission was chosen in March 1918 out of more than 3,000 entries submitted nationwide and on 3 April 1918 it was accepted by the Speaker of the U.S. House of Representative and the U.S. Commissioner of Education. Mr. Page was awarded the winning prize of \$1,000 by the Mayor of the City of Baltimore which he used to purchase Liberty Bonds for the war effort, and then donated them to his church.

In 1919, the year after WWI ended, Mr. Page was elected Clerk of the U.S. House of Representatives and in 1931 he was named "Emeritus Minority Clerk", a post created especially for him which he maintained for the remainder of his life. Throughout his entire service he was highly respected by members of both parties as a gentleman whose patriotism was inspirational and whose love of his country was unquestioned.

During the first year of WWII, on 18 October 1942 William Tyler Page gave an address to the women of the Daughters of the American Revolution on the occasion of the Golden (50th) Anniversary of the writing of the "Pledge of Allegiance" and recited the Creed, as he had annually for 24 years previous. It was to be his last public appearance. Mr. Page celebrated his 75th Birthday the following day with his family then passed away in quietly his sleep.

The Key Meaning behind each line of The American's Creed as explained by Mr. Page:

I believe in the United States of America: These are the closing words of the Preamble of the Constitution.

As a Government of the People, by the People, for the People: Abraham Lincoln stated this in the Gettysburg Address.

Whose Just Powers are Derived from the Consent of the Governed: Dating back to Jamestown in 1607 & stated by Thomas Jefferson in the Declaration of Independence.

A Democracy in a Republic: From James Madison in the Federalist #10.

A Sovereign Nation of Many Sovereign States: From Daniel Webster's speech in the US Senate, Jan. 26, 1830. The Union is 'one and inseparable' because the people have determined that it is best for all the States to remain united and 'governed by their own consent' through their duly-elected representatives.

A Perfect Union, One and Inseparable: From the Preamble to the Constitution encompassing a stronger union resulting from its adoption by all the States. The Supreme Court agreed that 'The Constitution, in all its provisions, looks to an indestructible Union, composed of indestructible States.' The powers of the State Governments are held to be sacred wherever they do not conflict with the good of all as represented in the Federal Government, whose power is granted in the Constitution from the people themselves.

Established upon those Principles of Freedom, Equality, Justice and Humanity for which American Patriots Sacrificed Their Lives and Fortunes: Adapted from the closing lines of the Declaration of Independence. "And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our Sacred Honor." American Patriots, from the beginning until now, have offered their lives and fortunes on behalf of the principles to which this Nation has been dedicated.

I Therefore Believe it is My Duty to My Country to Love it: Inspired by a speech from John Hancock "Patriotism is ever united with humanity and compassion. This noble affection which impels us to sacrifice everything dear, even life itself, to our country, involves in it a common sympathy and tenderness for every citizen, and must ever have a particular feeling for one who suffers in a public cause." Nathan Hale said, "I regret I have but one life to give to my country."

To Support its Constitution: From the United States Oath of Allegiance: "I do solemnly swear that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same...that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion..."

To Obey its Laws: From George Washington's Farewell Address: 'Respect for its authority, compliance with its Laws, acquiescence in its measures, are duties enjoined by the fundamental maxims of true Liberty. The basis of our political system is the right of the people to make and alter their Constitutions of Government. But the Constitution which at any time exists, 'til changed by an explicit and authentic actor of the whole People, is sacredly obligatory upon all. The very idea of the power and the right of the People to establish Government, presupposed the duty of every individual to obey the established Government.'

To Respect its Flag: The Army and Navy Regulations and Flag Etiquette published one year earlier in a War Department Circular, 14 April 1917.

and to Defend it Against All Enemies: Emphasized in the United States Oath of Allegiance. The American's Creed by William Tyler Page: I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people, by the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed, a democracy in a republic, a sovereign Nation of many sovereign States; a perfect union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice, and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes. I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it, to support its Constitution, to obey its laws, to respect its flag, and to defend it against all enemies.

ORDWAY, COLORADO VETERAN APPOINTED NATIONAL CAHPLAIN OF AMERICAN LEGION

On September 2, 2021 in Phoenix, Arizona, a Coast Guard Veteran from Ordway and a member of Post 209 was appointed National Chaplain of the American Legion during the organization's National Convention. He is the first Chaplain from the state of Colorado in the past 100 years to become a National Chaplain.

Born and raised in Honolulu, Hawaii Stanley K. (Pastor Stan) Hamamoto has served as the Chaplain for the American Legion Department of Colorado for the past 7 years. He served in the United Coast Guard from 1952 to 1960.

We are also seeing more requests for supporting events with the Presentation of Colors. The Presentation of Colors events are usually either during the evening or on the weekends, which makes them a perfect event for those who work during the week to be able to support.

The Honor Guard had the privilege of participating in the Post's 9/11 Remembrance Ceremony. Huge kudos to Jeraud, Marvin Sr, and Stacey (her 1st time doing this type of event) who practiced over and over (and over) to make it so the Presentation of Colors went perfectly. We had a minor hiccup with the rifles, but we worked through it and made things happen. The team is gearing up to represent American Legion Post 209 in the Veteran's Day Parade (COVID permitting). We can always use more assistance with this event since we have multiple members who have physical limitations keeping them from being able to support.

Unfortunately, at this time the Honor Guard is not planning to support school events during the Veteran's Day Week as we have in the past. Schools are setting up their events and schedules now for that week, and we do not have enough personnel with enough availability to commit to events this far out. We will, of course, support an event if a school contacts us closer to that week and we can get enough personnel able to support. While we will do everything we can to support OUR Community, supporting OUR Veteran's Final Honors will obviously always take priority.

As seen in previous articles (and can expect to see in each article in the future), while not everyone has a lot of time to participate in the Honor Guard, all someone needs is the time to participate a night or two for training meetings (2nd & 3rd Tuesday of every month) and even just one event a month. A meeting or two and one event a month is only 3-5 hours. Those 3-5 hours makes a difference for a Veteran and their family. Those 3-5 hours a month can also make a difference for you! If 10 to 15 members of the Legion, Sons, or Auxiliary gave back with 3-5 hours a month, the Honor Guard could possibly double the number of Final Honors we participate in – and more importantly not have to turn down requests. If you do not remember/know how to march or fold the flag, we will teach you. We have a member each from both the Sons of the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary that have learned to march, use the rifle (AR-15/M4 & M1 Garand), fold the American Flag, and carry/present the Colors. The only two items that a new Honor Guard member needs to get on their own is a Legion cap (or SAL/ALA as applicable) and shoes. All other uniforms items that you need are provided by the Honor Guard. You do not have 3-5 hours a month? That is okay, you can still help the Honor Guard by telling others in the Legion, Sons, or Auxiliary (Post 209 or other Posts in the area) about what the Honor Guard does and the importance of growing in order to meet the increase of requests to support OUR Veterans. Sons of the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary members are able to perform every activity that an American Legion Member does except during a Final Honors event the presentation of the flag or presentation of the expended rounds to the family. FROM OUR POST CHAPLAIN

"UNITY DAY"

"Unity: a quality or state of not being multiple. Oneness. A condition of harmony: Accord." (Merriam-Webster Dictionary)

October 3rd is "Unity Day." What – you've never heard of it? Our brothers and sisters in Germany know it well.

From the beginning, the city of Berlin was the center stage of the 'Cold War." The Allies had agreed to divide Germany into 4 zones of occupation even before the Nazi surrender. Berlin, 100 miles inside the Soviet zone, was also subject to the Four Powers occupation. In 1949, West Germany was founded. The Soviets created an "East Germany." By 1961, 3 million East Germans (1/6 of the population) had left through West Berlin. The massive "brain drain' was bleeding the country dry. At midnight on August 13, 1961, Berlin subway trains were halted at the border. Tanks, trucks, and troops rolled into the city. Barbed wire fencing was put up and crews constructed a 28-mile concrete wall dividing the city. On the East side, a 200-yard "No Man's Land" bordered the wall. Over the years, 5,000 people figured a way to escape. Eighty died trying. It was the *Schandmauer* – the "Wall of Shame." President Kennedy visited the wall in 1963 and proclaimed, "*Ich bin ein Berliner!*" ("I am a Berliner!").

Twenty years passed; and then something extraordinary happened. In 1985, Mikhail Gorbachev assumed the head of the Soviet Union. He introduced *Glasnost* – an openness to bring democratic reform, and *Perestroika*; a reorganization of basic economic and political institutions in Soviet society. The entire European system of communism began to crack. On June 12, 1987, President Reagan stood in front of the Brandenburg Gate and said, "*Mr. Gorbachev*, …*open this Gate! Tear down this wall!*"

Two years later in 1989, Stalinism collapsed. The people spoke, with massive demonstrations for freedom of assembly, freedom of the press, and free elections. They spoke in Hungary, Czechoslovakia and Poland. By July of that year, the communist party began to splinter. On November 9, at the end of a press briefing, the East German government announced it would open the border and allow citizens to travel freely including *through the Berlin Wall*. At the stroke of midnight, a panel of the wall was lifted away. Strangers embraced; tears flowed; champagne corks popped. The people began singing their national anthem – as one. On October 3, 1990, the Western Allies ceded their post-war occupation powers when formerly communist East Germany joined West Germany to become the Federal Republic of Germany.

Today, America faces threats from all sides, and discord from within. Our situation may <u>also</u> seem hopeless, but it is not. We have faced depressions, wars, and diseases before. We faced them *united*, calling on our faith. "...fulfill my joy by being like-minded, having the same love, being of one accord; of one mind." (Philippians 2:2, NKJV) As long as we remain "One nation under God…", we will be "INDIVISIBLE." That is the message of "Unity Day".

<u>Purpose:</u> To remember and honor those Veterans and family members who served and supported their loved one to make this country free!

If you haven't visited the Post in the last few weeks, I recommend you stop by and take a look. Thanks to Past Post Commander Lino Calica's leadership in spearheading the continuing landscaping project in front of our Post Home. Along with the assistance of some key volunteers like Steve and Kellie Hayes, Jerry Hopper, Hilary and Fred Nanpei, Jack Seitz, Mike Barger, Andy Gilbert, Eric Testorff, Joe Schmidt, and Kelvin Calica, our Walk of Honor is starting to take shape.

This two-year project has indeed been a work of passion for our members. It was started in October 2019 with the assistance of Jack Seitz, a former homeless Veteran. This 74 year-old Veteran and former Masonry expert was given a "hand up" by our Post, to include a part-time job from Andy Gilbert. He wanted to "pay it forward" and volunteered his time to build our stone wall where you now see our Post Home sign.

From that beginning we laid out the landscaping plans, which included how to display the bricks we started as a fundraiser. Fighting the ever-evolving changes to the landscaping plan and weather, our project saw delays until recently.

Now, all the bricks that have been purchased and received as of this writing have been laid in front of our rock wall sign, and six flag poles have been erected to support our Nation's Service Branches. But we're not done! We have two Eagle Scout projects, one completed and one in the works designed to beautify our Post Home. Jaden, a Scout in Troop 79 completed his Walk of Honor landscaping Eagle Scout project last year, and Isabel from Troop 77 will be working her project for our Walk of Honor this month. Her project involves creating wheelchair access to the Walk of Honor area and benches around the Memorial area. It is expected to finish this month.

We want to thank all our volunteers for their support and hard work so far. Other than those already mentioned, we want to thank Rich Jakarta for donating 1,200 bricks, Lowe's for donating four pallets of Windsor Blocks and landscaping material, and Andy Gilbert for donating eight tons of red breeze gravel.

Buy A Brick Fundraiser!

We are re-introducing an exciting fundraiser for our Post. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our landscaping project we are working. The engraving uses the same technology as used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are some FAQs:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs
- What Size Are the Bricks? 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.
- What are the Costs for the Individual Bricks? Prices vary depending on size, style and lettering desired, but typically range from \$90 to \$200. For the 8x8 or 12x12 bricks, you can add a second emblem. Contact the Adjutant for ordering details. There is **NO** additional cost for the second emblem on the larger bricks.
- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$250 to \$500.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209 to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.

Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know and we will make certain they are all placed together.



BRINGING A LITTLE SOUTH TO THE WEST

Do you remember the first concert you attended? No matter how many I go to, I am actually reminded of my first two concerts and for different reasons.

The first one was when I had just started my Freshmen year of High School. Like so many others my age and during this era, to be cool you had to love Rock 'N' Roll and not like Country. Both of those things was very easy for me...or so I thought. And I was cool.

Every year in late summer or early fall, the Mid-South Fair came to Memphis. It was a week-long event we looked forward to all year long. The Fair included rides and a Midway where you could impress your favorite girl and/or friends with your ball throwing abilities, your dart throwing accuracy, and your eagle eye marksmanship with the BB gun. It also included several concerts throughout the week.

My parents were really not big into concerts (an expense we couldn't afford), but there was one that year they felt they just had to attend, and along with them my brother Bubba, my little sister Debbie, and I were forced to go. My older sister, Dee had gotten married and moved off to Atlanta (man, some people will do some pretty desperate things to get out of going to a Country concert).

I tried to convince my parents I didn't need nor want to go. They weren't concerned about my desires or needs, so I finally gave up and very reluctantly found my seat in the Fairground Coliseum, made up my mind I would not enjoy the concert, and was determined to share my displeasure with everyone around me, especially Mom and Dad.

We were in the "nose-bleed" section of the Coliseum and my Mom brought a pair of binoculars so she and anyone else interested could get a good look at the entertainers. I thought it was a pretty silly idea, after all, who in the world cared about seeing Johnny Cash, June Carter Cash and the Carter Family, Carl Perkins, and the Statler Brothers? After all, they were Country, and Country wasn't cool (hey, that could be the subject of a great song!).

The show started off with Carl Perkins. He broke out with *Blue Suede Shoes*, a song I was very familiar with as sung by Elvis, but I didn't know it was written and first recorded by Carl. And apparently, Carl's version actually sold more records than the version sung by "The King" later.

After Carl sang a few of his hits (which I had to admit was pretty good), the Statler Brothers came on stage. I had no idea who they were, but when they started their show with *Countin' Flowers on the Wall*, I immediately recognized them. That was a huge cross-over song that was very popular on both the Rock and Country charts. That was the first time I asked Mom to let me borrow the binoculars. Their show was extremely funny and very entertaining.

Then Johnny took over the stage, along with June and the rest of the Carter family. He sang many of his hits including *Ring of Fire, Walk the Line*, and *Folsom Prison Blues*. I didn't connect him with those songs, many of which were also played frequently on the Rock station. Like the Statler's, his show also included some pretty funny moments, thanks to June. By the end of the concert, I think I used the binoculars as much or even more than Mom. That night, I became a life-long Country fan.

The first concert I attended without my parents was during my senior year. It was Three Dog Night. They put on an amazing show and sang all their hits, including *One* (*Is the Loneliness Number*) and *Joy to the World*. While I thoroughly enjoyed the concert, I have to admit it ran a pretty distant second to the Johnny Cash show from a few years earlier.

My love for the oldies has not changed, but now it is expanded to include a fondness for Country as well as the old Gospel songs. So now when *I Rock Around the Clock* with my *Friends in Low Places, There'll Be Peace in the Valley!*
