# From the desk and mind of the Commander

Hello and welcome to October. This year is flying by. I intended my article to be about fall and Halloween, but I have a different subject on my mind lately. As I write this article, I and other Legionnaires from the Post have just returned from National Convention in Milwaukee. We had a good time and learned much from our time in Milwaukee.

I am sure you have seen the <u>BE THE ONE</u> branding that national has come out with recently. It was on the cover of the most recent <u>The American Legion magazine</u>. It is also all over the national website. Indy car racers Tony Kanaan, Jimmy Johnson, and Alex Palou also got behind the theme. What does it mean? It is intended to remind us all that we can <u>BE THE ONES</u> to end veteran suicide.

We all have heard of the number that 22 veterans commit suicide every day. Most of us, if not all of us, know of someone they have had a brother or sister take their own life. I have a friend I did not realize was heading down that path, but he succeeded four years ago. I also have a fellow Legionnaire who has had at least three of his friends he served with take their own lives in the four years we have been friends. Veteran suicide is a big problem, and the Legion is prepared to battle to end this for good.

How can I help, you ask? It is simple; you don't have to have a Ph.D. or work in social service to help. All you need to do is ask, listen, and reach out.

Ask veterans how they are doing. One of the tools for this that The American Legion came up with is buddy checks. Buddy checks don't have to be done at a specific time of the year or as a post-sponsored event. Instead, call one of your buddies to see how they are doing and if they need anything. You don't even have to check on them as a buddy check. Just call them because you might be thinking of them.

When you are asking your buddy how they are doing, the next thing is to Listen to what they are saying. Remember, they don't need you to fix them. Instead, they need someone to listen.

If you know of a veteran struggling or going through a hard time, reach out and see if they need help or to talk with someone.

You don't have to have the answer or know how to fix a friend's problem. Sometimes the best thing is to show them you care and lend an ear. If the problem is beyond your help or they are still in a bad way, encourage them to reach out for professional help. Asking for help is not a sign of weakness.

Always remember that you can **<u>BE THE ONE</u>**. Thanks for all you do to help our post and veterans.

Jim currently lives in Maine to be close to a daughter and his grandchildren while still being within driving distance to the Department of New York.

National Commander Troiola must have been channeling my brainwaves as I came up with an article for this month's Newsletter on training. In his daily briefing on Wednesday, Sep 14<sup>th</sup>, he talked about the acronym on his membership shirt's sleeve, VETS.

"Through this concept, those who served (Veterans) will train (Education) Legionnaires about our advocacy, programs, and remarkable history. We will work together (Teamwork) to grow and accomplish great things, as we mentor (Sponsor) the next generation of Legionnaires."

So how does one train a group of veterans who work or don't and have different responsibilities and time commitments that make getting them in one place at one time impractical? A combination of online resources the Legionnaire can access on their own time. They scheduled online training accessible later for those who can't attend the live session. To acquire teamwork and mentorship, there are committees and projects that any Legionnaire can join in on when they have the time.

Let's start with training the Legionnaires about our advocacy, programs, and history. There is no better source than the online Basic Training course. It's free, takes only about 4 to 6 hours and once complete the Post will award you with the completion pin. Too much to list here, so check it out. Also, sign up for automatic emails on the weekly online update, commanders' messages, flag alerts, and more at <a href="https://www.legion.org/newsletters">https://www.legion.org/newsletters</a>. There is a lot of information out there, much more than when I joined.

Teamwork comes from training. Online conferences have opened up the previous mystery of how things got done. We have all realized that there are great options for people to get involved without traveling to Indy or being available on a specific day and time. We want the membership to learn what is going on and to be involved. At the local level, our committees are ready to train you and listen to your ideas to accomplish the mission.

Mentoring is readily available from our leadership team. There is a lot of experience in this Post. Talk to the Commander or me when you find something and see where your talent can be utilized. Come for dinner on a Friday or the meeting day breakfasts and talk to the members. We are here for you.

If you are interested in Media, you can join TALMA, The American Legion Media Alliance, a group of Legionnaires who provide monthly training on social, print, and TV media on how to utilize them to promote what we do to the public AND to the benefit of your Post. Membership is \$15 annually and includes press credentials. (As the current Facebook admin. We need a team to promote the Post and keep the membership informed.)

### From our Post Historian

First World War American service members earned a disproportionate number of Medals of Honor during October 1918, as US forces were the determining factor in the final offensives against Germany. I want to highlight one of these brave men, whose personal story also tragically demonstrates our ongoing need to "BE THE ONE" to help veterans at risk of suicide.

Major Charles Whittlesey commanded the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion (308<sup>th</sup> Infantry) during the October 1918 Meuse-Argonne offensive. Whittlesey and his men were cut off from divisional communications and supply lines. For nearly six days, with little food and water, they endured a constant barrage of German firepower and friendly fire from



Allied artillery. Following orders to "advance regardless of losses," Whittlesey ordered his men to hold their position. On the fourth day, Maj. Whittlesey received from the enemy a written proposition to surrender. Although he was at the time surrounded by the enemy, out of rations, and had suffered over fifty percent casualties, he treated the proposal with contempt, reportedly replying, "You can go to Hell!" When the "Lost Battalion" (as it came to be known) was finally rescued, two-thirds of Whittlesey's 554 men were either killed or wounded. Whittlesey was awarded the Medal of Honor for his heroic leadership under fire. After the war, he regularly visited wounded veterans, volunteered with the Red Cross, and attended countless veteran funerals. He wrote to a friend, "Not a day goes by, but I hear from some of my old outfit, usually about some sorrow or misfortune. I cannot bear it much more." He took his own life two weeks after serving as a pallbearer at the 11 November 1921 burial of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery. In his eulogy at Whittlesey's funeral, Colonel Averill, the 308th's commander, said Whittlesey's death "was, in reality, a battle casualty" and that he met his end "as much in the line of duty as if he had fallen by a German bullet."

#### Notable October events in American Military History

- The US Navy celebrates its birthday on 13 October. On this date in 1775, the Continental Congress authorized the fitting out of two armed vessels to intercept British munitions transports supplying their troops in the American colonies.
- Two of the most significant American victories in the American Revolution occurred in October. On 17 October 1777, British General Burgoyne surrendered his forces at the Battle of Saratoga, NY; the American victory convinced the French government to support the American cause. And on 19 October 1781, British General Cornwallis surrendered his forces at Yorktown, VA, to General Washington's Continental Army and their French allies. Yorktown was the last major land battle of the war and paved the way for British recognition of American independence.
- Cold War nuclear conflict was narrowly averted during the Cuban Missile Crisis of October 1962. President Kennedy's diplomacy depended on the effectiveness of the American naval



"quarantine" and the credibility of US military preparedness. America's first ready-to-launch intercontinental ballistic missile, Minuteman I, described by Kennedy as his strategic "ace in the hole," became operational during the crisis.

• With the launch of Operation Enduring Freedom on 7 October 2001, US airstrikes began targeting Taliban and al-Qaida forces in Afghanistan in response to the 11 September attacks.

# From the Chaplain: The Few, the Proud, the Marines

You've seen the slogan. Perhaps you even responded to it. As members of The American Legion Family, we are dedicated to serving God and our country. Okay. So – what kind of folks do the Lord and The Legion require? For those of Christian belief, we know the Good Lord, born in a stable to a simple teenage girl, doesn't require fine, upstanding, wealthy people of influence to serve Him. Jesus chose twelve ordinary men who would be used extraordinarily.

What kind of men were they? At least three were fishermen. Simon (Peter) was strong-willed and courageous. Phillip was slow to recognize Jesus once he found Him. Phillip was devoted. James of Galilee and John had strong personalities. Thomas was gloomy and easily discouraged. Matthew was a self-absorbed tax collector until he met Jesus. These sinful, imperfect men would become disciples ("learners") of Christ. Sound familiar? Yep – except for Judas ("the Betrayer"), they were pretty much like us.

Herman Wouk's thrilling World War II novel *The Caine Mutiny* illustrates what happens when someone becomes a follower of God. In the novel, a young man from an influential family has enlisted in the Navy. On the day of his induction, his mother drops him off in her fancy car and kisses him goodbye. He shakes hands with the guard as he enters the building, and the door closes behind him.

His mother, suddenly worried that he might not have enough money, rushes to the door. The guard politely stops her. When she demands entrance, he refuses. She can see her son standing inside the door, so she reaches for the doorknob. "He's, my son!' she cries. The guard gently removes her hand from the knob and says softly, "I know, Ma'am, but he belongs to Uncle Sam now. He's a sailor." Sound familiar? "...Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." (Mark 1: 17). Those who believe in Jesus Christ and become His followers are under the new authority. As a result, what was once vital to them loses its significance.

Sounds great – but serving <u>God</u> isn't easy. Disciples then and now experience ridicule, suffering, and hardship. Then and now, they are martyred in violent deaths. Many veterans will attest that serving one's country isn't easy in peacetime or war.

Friday, September 16<sup>th,</sup> was set aside as National POW/MIA Remembrance Day to honor the commitment and sacrifices made by this nation's prisoners of war, those still missing in action, and their families. We will never forget.

The goal of a soldier is to please his leader. So must be our goal in the warfare at hand. Rest assured – you're "good enough," just as you are. You are uniquely qualified to be in the army of the General whom Himself died to assure our ultimate victory.





#### Walk of Honor





- What are the costs for the corporate/veteran supporter bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$250 to \$500.
- What is the difference between individual and corporate bricks? Individual bricks are for veterans and family members wishing to purchase a brick to honor their veterans. The corporate bricks are for our veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who want to show their continued support for our nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the brick purchase restricted to members of the Post 209 families? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves for their veteran loved ones or to show their support for our veterans.
- Where do I go to buy a brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit <a href="http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209">http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209</a> to buy your brick. The site is user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. In addition, you will see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- **How do I pay for the brick?** We have the site set up to accept payment via PayPal or check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick, and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where will the brick be shipped? All bricks will be sent to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives, and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What will become of my brick? It will be placed near the flagpole at the Post. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How long will this fundraiser effort last? We plan only to sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project.
- Will I have an opportunity to buy a brick later? Quite possibly, depending on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.



Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know, and we will ensure they are all placed together.



### **Cyber 101 - Travel Tips**

A couple of digital entryways into your devices could give way to malicious people. The two main entrances are WIFI and Bluetooth. When traveling, most people don't think twice about whether they keep their WIFI or Bluetooth on, but this could put you at significant risk for a potential cyber-attack. This is especially prevalent when in public areas like shopping malls or airports. For example, most airports have some public free WIFI, which is great for convenience but not so great for security as they are most likely not encrypted. As a result, people can track and spy on your device activity while connected to said WIFI. This can allow them to take advantage of your secured data and anything else that may have been used in your session. While this may leave you never warning to connect to public WIFI again, there are a few ways to protect yourself.

#### • VPN (Virtual Private Network)

- A VPN creates a secure private connection for your computer. Instead of your information being able to be viewed freely, it forms a secure tunnel for all of your data to pass through
- Express VPN is a superb VPN that is super easy to set up. They have multiple plans and give step-by-step instructions on best utilizing the VPN. You can visit the website here - https://www.expressvpn.com/

#### • Disable auto-connect

- When you are connecting to a public WIFI, be sure to look at the name of the network you are connecting to (no spelling errors, password protected)
- If connected to public WIFI, do not access personal accounts, Ex. bank acc, email, Ect
  - If you must access these accounts while not using a VPN, be SURE to log off completely when finished with your session
- Only use public business centers for emergencies; again, log off completely when done.
- Disable Bluetooth unless actively using
- Back up electronic files
- Avoid links that pop up after joining WIFI
- Turn off location sharing
- Keep operating system/phone software updated
