The Young Guns Junior Shooting class started its nine week fall session on September 9th 2015 with twelve new shooters. All students received their packets which included a course outline, 15 point safety pledge, student book, safety glasses, writing pad, and pencil. Introductions of Instructors and Students were completed along with some housekeeping items.

The class then began with instruction on clothing and equipment needed for competitive shooting with .177 caliber air rifles. This was followed with a range safety briefing. It was stressed that we have never had an accident in Junior Shooting and that is because we always must be conscious of SAFETY, SAFETY, and MORE SAFETY. Parts of the rifle were covered as was mental training. No shooting was done on this first night, but next week will begin with more instruction and students will then begin shooting from the bench rest position.

The Young Guns will once again be sponsoring a Turkey Shoot on Steak night November 20^{th,} 2015. The entry fee will be \$5 for all contestants and the prize will be a frozen turkey in each of three age categories: 12 and under, 13 thru 18, and over 18. You will shoot 5 shots from 25 feet at the standing position and the highest score wins. Any tie will result in a shoot-off as determined by our Junior Shooting Instructors. Last 2 months I elaborated on the first 6 clauses of the American Legion Preamble.

For God and Country, we associate ourselves together for the following purposes:

To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America

To maintain law and order

To foster and perpetuate a 100-percent Americanism

To preserve the memories and incidents of our associations in the great wars

To inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation

This month I will elaborate on the next 3.

To combat the autocracy of both the classes and masses

To make right the master of might

To promote peace and good will on earth

TO COMBAT THE AUTOCRACY OF BOTH THE CLASSES AND MASSES...This clause places the Legionnaire on the side of right in opposing autocracy by either class or mass when this threatens. In a democracy such as ours, composed as it is of all nationalities, races, creeds and economic groups, there are bound to be both classes and masses. Indeed, the masses are composed of classes-but all groups within the mass must feel assured that in this nation, reason and fairness will prevail in all human activities and relations. There must be no hyphenated Americans-just Americans all.

TO MAKE RIGHT THE MASTER OF MIGHT...All wars from the Veterans of which The American Legion draws its membership were started by dictators who wanted their might to be the right. If human freedom is not to perish from the earth, right must always be master of might. The rights of small nations must be protected against the tyranny that powerful neighbors may seek to impose on them-just as the rights of minorities in our society must be protected and respected. Our belief in enthroning right over might is the main essence of our ideological conflict with Communism today. Legionnaires are pledged by this clause always to stand with the right, protect the weak and preserve the liberties of the individual. This concept is the basis of The American Legion's continued advocacy of a strong national preparedness so as to achieve the ideal situation that right will be backed by adequate might.

TO PROMOTE PEACE AND GOOD WILL ON EARTH...Until all the world becomes a good neighborhood, Legionnaires must continue the effort to promote peace and good will on earth. It is in pursuance of this founding ideal that The American Legion has supported from the beginning and seeks to strengthen the United Nations organization. Obliquely, The American Legion also contributes to this ideal by firmly supporting a strong national defense to discourage breaking of the peace by aggressor.

Again, I leave you with this:

Remember, we serve God, Family and The Legion, always keeping in mind our fellow Legionaries who are in need of some help along the way...

From the Historian

Bryce Bachman, from Discovery Canyon High School was one of about 45 boys our Post sponsored to Boys State this year. He attended the August, 2015 monthly meeting of Centennial Post 209 and thanked the membership for their support in sponsoring him for Boys State. Here is Bryce's thought paper about his experience:

Colorado Boys State Post-experience reflection paper:

A "Something Else" Experience



In the first week of June 2015, I was privileged to receive a sponsorship to the American Legion Boys State program. The weeklong program was held at Colorado State University, in Pueblo, Colorado. The following is a reflection of all I learned, experienced and how I grew personally.

My Boys State Experience: Educational, Leadership and Personal Growth Colorado American Legion Boys State was an experience I will never forget! The program is a tremendous educational, leadership, and personal growth opportunity of which I definitely recommend other high school juniors take advantage.

Education of our political system

To me, the best aspect of Boys' State was the hands-on experience that taught us about our country's political system. All 200 or so participants were divided into

separate fictitious political parties, counties, and cities to learn about the functions and process of the local and state government. We dove into the levels of government from local all the way to the state level. Each city held elections and we gained a full understanding of American governmental tradition and how special it is to be an American citizen because we truly have one of the best political systems in the world. The big irony is that I never dreamed of or desired to participate in politics or governmental life other than to vote once I turn 18. After my positive experiences at Boys State, I know now I will eventually seek out opportunities to serve my country and community by participating in some form of government service.

Becoming a proud leader

Throughout the week I spent a lot of time with my fellow Boys State delegates, participating in a number of activities that built close relationships. Each city held elections for various positions within the newly established government. Within my city I was elected city council president, and the chairman for a county meeting. Through the various program activities and events, we developed strong, and often very entertaining, rivalries within our "county" and event "state." I acted as the party chairman for that specific meeting in which our nationalist party elected to discharge a city from our county (just a joke to add additional fun to the experience.) The leadership positions I held at Colorado Boys State will help me to prepare for my years ahead, including college, job careers and my family. It was at Boys State I was able to take charge and to show who I am which is why I am looking forward to continuing my involvement with this program in the future. I feel very honored and privileged that I have been invited, and will proudly take this opportunity, to return as a teen counselor.

Lasting impacts of personal growth

Looking back the experience, I know it will have lasting impacts on me as I prepare for college and my future career. The program prepared me for not only understanding government but also for eventually leaving home to attend college. Up until this point in my life I had never been away from home on my own for any length of time. Boys State was one week long and was held on a college campus with the participants housed in dorm rooms. Each city had an American Legion sponsor assigned to make sure we followed procedure and to give us any guidance we might have needed. I loved this aspect of living in a residence hall on a floor with other young men I had never met, which, in a sense "forced" me and my fellow delegates to unite which helped us to be awarded the title of "Best City." Fortunately, my city, Hansen City, was able to do just that. We were selected as "City of the Day" three times. Unfortunately, we were only actually awarded the honor once due to a prank (innocent but fun, none-the-less) that we pulled on our counselor. At Boys State I was able to grow extremely close to the other boys, not only with those in my City but with those participating in the entire program as well. We got to know each other very well, but we also got to know the councilors and the American Legion sponsor assigned to each City. It was a great honor to be able to meet these American Legion members. My City of Hansen was lucky enough to have an American Legion sponsor who is a retired career Navy officer. The stories he shared with us over the week were truly inspiring and eye opening.

If truth be not known and received, error will be; if God and His Word are not known and received, the devil and his works will gain the ascendancy; if the evangelical volume (scripture) does not reach every hamlet, the pages of a corrupt and licentious literature will; if the power of the Gospel is not felt through the length and breadth of the land, anarchy and misrule, degradation and misery, corruption and darkness, will reign without mitigation or end.

The camaraderie and excitement at the closing ceremony was amazing. I felt such pride when our City was announced as the best! My City came together and became a family! BRINGING A LITTLE SOUTH TO THE WEST

Growing up as a kid in the '50s and '60s was interesting. The world as we knew it was changing daily although we were oblivious to most of the changes. Many of our adventures and outings resulted from stories told to us by our parents of their childhood. And others were from watching movies and programs on TV like *The Little Rascals* and *Leave it To Beaver*. I believe it was from one or several of those sources that influenced and fueled our Halloween episodes. Like all other kids in our neighborhood, we dressed up and painted up to disguise ourselves. Often, we didn't have masks because they were too expensive, so we just borrowed some of Mom's make-up and painted our faces to look scary. We'd grab a paper bag Mom always kept folded and put away to put her freshly picked peas or tomatoes in and we'd head out the door with the "almost" empty bag to visit the houses in our subdivision in search of candy and other goodies. Back then you didn't have to worry about some jerk putting razor blades in a candy bar. Our parents didn't have to go through our bag when we got home to make certain everything we got was safe. It just was, and we knew it. Many times we were treated to goodies that wasn't wrapped and hermetically sealed. Some of my favorites were caramel apples, or a popcorn ball. If you don't know what a popcorn ball is you are missing out. Ask me the next time we see each other at a dinner or meeting.

The reason I said almost empty bag was occasionally we would walk out the door with a bar of soap or a roll of Toilet Paper. Where I came from, getting your yard "TP'ed" was a sign that you were popular. The rule was you could not TP your own house, although it was more of a guideline than a rule. For those houses that didn't give us a "treat" or if they gave us something healthy like an apple that wasn't coated with something sweet, we would use the soap on the windows of their home or car. Some of the kids took it to another level and had eggs in their bag to throw at cars in the driveway or houses that didn't play the "Trick or Treat" game right. Most of the time they weren't rotten eggs because that would have meant there was some advanced planning into getting ready for 31 October. Most of the time we didn't think that far in advance. But sometimes one of our "gang" would surprise us with about a dozen rotten eggs, which always added a little more fun for us and a challenge for the person who woke up on 1 November to find his car or house had developed an odor that required a thorough and immediate wash.

We didn't beat up kids and steal their candy, but we knew some other kids that did. Everyone knew who they were, you could find them on the playground on any other day being bullies and trying to terrorize smaller kids. In every instance while growing up, the bullies were always pretty normal when they were alone. The only time they morphed into a Mr. Hyde was when they had their buddies with them.

Nowadays, parents have to walk with their kids while "Trick or Treating" and when they get home in the evening the first thing they do is pour the candy out onto the floor to inspect the contents of the bag or plastic pumpkin. If something is not completely wrapped, it gets tossed. If a treat is made from scratch like a candied apple it also gets thrown in the trash can unless the donor puts a piece of paper with their name and address on it in the plastic sealed bag with the treat. What a shame that with all the great advancements we've made to improve our lives, we take something as simple and sweet and turn it into a possible nightmarish evening. That's even scarier than the movies we always watched during the Halloween season.


