FROM THE DESK OF THE JR. VICE COMMANDER

Hello all! I'm happy to serve as your new Jr. Vice Commander for the 2021-2022 year. I'm looking forward to coordinating some great speakers and informative snippets at our monthly membership meetings. Coming up, we have Jim Griffith on 11 September, who will provide an overview of El Paso County Homeless Veteran Coalition (EPCHVC) programs and volunteer requirements for the 21 September Homeless Veteran's Stand-down. Later in the year, we are working to cover winter safety and have a speaker from Mount Carmel provide an overview of their services. We've already had a couple great presentations. At the August meeting, Dustin Venn provided an awesome overview of Pikes Peak National Cemetery, including services, pre-arrangement as well as the burial options and processes. At the July meeting, we discussed the concepts of group consensus using Tuckman's model for stages of team development (forming, storming, norming, performing and adjourning) and the relevance of those stages to Post operations as we swing into a post-COVID world. In many organizations, including The American Legion, increased levels of conflict have been observed as they resume operations following the lift of COVID restrictions. This may be due to expectations that everything will go right back to the pre-COVID 'normal' when people, circumstances and even aspects of the operations have changed. In many ways, despite having accomplished our mission for years, we are beginning a lot of things from a fresh start, essentially right at the forming stages of team development. The key point is that conflict is normal in team development as people work define their role within the organization and the team works to develop their processes for accomplishing the mission now and into the future. When we encounter these conflicts, it is important to remain patient, work to understand everyone's position and concerns, then develop consensus. Remembering that everyone is here to serve at the best of their ability and keeping our sights focused on caring for our Veterans, advocating for a strong national defense, promoting Americanism and nurturing our children and youth will help propel us through the stages of development and ensure we become, and remain, a strong, high performing team.

As we approach the 20th Anniversary of 9/11, take a moment to think about where you were, what you were doing, what you were thinking, how you reacted and/or were impacted. We all have a story for that day and how it impacted us. That day inspired such a great increase in patriotism, increasing to a high not seen since the attack on Pearl Harbor and leading to many of us to join the military to defend our country. For those of us already serving, it changed how we felt and what we did (my TDY to Bosnia at the end of the month turned into a much less desirable location for a longer period of time). Unfortunately, too many people seemed to forget that day (or were not even born yet), and in turn let the high level of patriotism wane. Now we need to remember those lost that day 20 years ago, remember those lost since then because of exposure to so many bad things while trying to help, and also remember our brothers and sisters in arms who have been lost defending our country in the War on Terrorism since then.

There is not a whole lot to say this month. The restructuring of the bank accounts is helping reduce the complexity of the finances and greatly reducing the number of account-to-account transfers. The annual audit will be conducted soon to wrap up the 2021 fiscal year. And for my normal closing statement, the Post needs your help in identifying new fundraising ideas. We are still working to get back to pre-COVID status in order to keep supporting OUR Veterans in the community. Any fundraising idea – big, small, unconventional (think about the impact of Kellie’s Stick Pony Race) – is worth consideration to help us get there.

SAL SQUADRON 209 PARTICIPATION INCENTIVE

To the end of encouraging increased membership participation, promoting Squadron visibility and developing Squadron esprit de corps (Group Spirit), Chaplain Brad Henderson & I presented at the last membership meeting, and passed by membership vote, an SAL Participation Reward whereby the Squadron will purchase an SAL Allegiance Polo (Color Navy Blue w/Red & White Left Sleeve & Blue Union w/ Embroidered stars on left shoulder, Fully embroidered SAL emblem on Chest) at a cost of \$45.00ea from Emblem Sales for any SAL Member who participates in 10 designated SAL & Post Family Activities within a 6-Month time period as verified & signed off by a Squadron Officer. The eligible activities are detailed on the Post SAL webpage in a downloadable participation checklist which may also be requested from any Squadron Officer.

THE 10 IDEALS

Also passed at July's Member Meeting were the guidelines I was asked to develop by Past Squadron Commander Eric Testorff, while I was serving as Junior Vice Commander, for achieving the completion of the SAL 10 Ideals Program whereby members may earn the 10 Ideals Medal. Like the Squadron 209 Five Star Program guidelines created years ago by Rick Kettering, this guideline & checklist is designed to assist any member in their pursuit of the ideals & skills, as recognized by the achievement of the 10 Ideals Medal, that help us better understand what true Americanism & "Legionism" is while guiding the understanding & development of leadership skills that help to forge a well-rounded person & citizen. The 10 Ideals Completion Checklist is downloadable from the Post SAL webpage and may also be requested from any Squadron Officer.

SUPPORTING OUR FAMILY

Our Squadron Members also volunteered to provide & staff a lunch to support our Post American Legion Riders Poker Run on 24 July and I'm pleased to report that while doing so our Squadron generated approximately \$270 toward the Squadron General Fund. Additionally, thanks to the generosity of an anonymous ALR Donor, our Post Legion Riders have offered a donation to our Squadron of \$500 for our assistance with their event. Thanks goes out to Chaplain Brad Henderson, District Commander Lino Calica and SAL Member Rob Barry for volunteering to assist me with the preparation, cooking and serving of the lunch to the Poker Run Participants.

I'm also very excited to announce that Current District Commander, Past Post Commander Lino Calica & his wife Susan have very generously offered to hold one of their famous Hawaiian Nights on 22 October 2021 as a fundraiser for the benefit of SAL Squadron 209. More details to come.

It is also my intent to continue our Squadron's commitment to the Child Welfare Fund (CWF) that for years we have given very generously to by consistently exceeding the 100% membership donation goal as both a Squadron and Post.

FROM OUR HONOR GUARD CAPTAIN

The Honor Guard has been busy as usual. As of this writing, there have been 81 events the Honor Guard has participated in so far this year with no sign of things slowing down. Of the 81 events, 71 were supporting the military services with a rifle team for Final Honors or performing the full Final Honors ourselves. Of the 81 events, 10 were supporting the Presentation of Colors and flag presentations for schools/youth. Of the 81 events, there have been 2 so far that we were requested to support from other areas; 1. Talk to youth about the flag at the Ted Nugent Kamp For Kids in Granite, CO, and 2. Support the Navy with a rifle team for a Veteran's Final Honors at Fort Lyon National Cemetery in Las Animas, CO. There are numerous Final Honors and Presentation of Colors on the calendar for the remainder of August (5), September (1), and October (3) with requests starting to come in for November – obviously those number will continue to grow.

Those are some interesting numbers that shows how big of an impact we have in support of OUR Veterans and OUR Community. There is a *more important* number to know about that impacts OUR Veterans, it is the number 9. The number 9 is the number of Veteran's who did not receive their full Final Honors in July and so far in August. There were 2 of those that the Honor Guard was committed to supporting and had to back out. There were also 2 of those that we received very late requests to support (less than 24 hours). The other 5 were requests that came in and there were not enough personnel available to support and we had to turn down the request. All 9 of these Final Honors only needed a 3-person rifle team in order to be able to support.

The Honor Guard currently has 10 primary and 4 backup/support members. The 10 members include 8 American Legion Post members, 1 Sons of the American Legion member, and 1 American Legion Auxiliary member. For the American Legion members, 8 is less than 1% of the Post's membership and the majority of the 8 are currently employed. In order to help augment those numbers, we are going to be reaching out to the other American Legion Posts in the area. A recruitment strategy is being developed to try to get more Honor Guard members from these Posts and possibly other VSOs (e.g., VFW, DAV) so that the number 9 does not keep growing and OUR Veterans receive the Final Honors they earned and deserve (just like the rest of us have).

As I said in last month's article, while not everyone has a lot of time to participate in the Honor Guard, all someone needs is the time to participate a night or two for training meetings and even just one event a month. A meeting or two and one event a month is only 3-5 hours. Those 3-5 hours makes a difference for a Veteran and their family. Those 3-5 hours a month can also make a difference for you! If 10 to 15 members of the Legion, Sons, or Auxiliary *gave back* with 3-5 hours a month, the Honor Guard could possibly double the number of Final Honors we participate in – and more importantly not have to turn down requests. Even if you do not have 3-5 hours a month, you can still help the Honor Guard by telling others in the Legion, Sons, or Auxiliary (Post 209 or other Posts in the area) about what the Honor Guard does and the importance of growing in order to meet the increase of requests to support OUR Veterans. Sons of the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary members are able to perform every activity that an American Legion Member does *except* the presentation of the flag or presentation of the expended rounds to the family. Veteran's Day is approaching soon and we are already receiving requests for the Honor Guard to support school programs during the week, in addition to planning for participation in the Veteran's Day Parade (COVID permitting). Traditionally, there is a place on the website that schools can sign up to have the Honor Guard support their programs/activities. The Honor Guard will soon be

making the decision whether or not to activate the link based on the expected support available. While we will do everything we can to support OUR Community, supporting OUR Veteran's Final Honors will always take priority.

FROM OUR POST CHAPLAIN

“Time and Talents”

“And He Himself gave some to be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, and some pastors and teachers...” (Ephesians 4:11)

One of the most interesting worship services I have attended happened on a Sunday before Labor Day. We normally dressed in “church attire”, but this day would be different. The pastor asked us to dress in our “work clothes.” The chapel filled with carpenters, soldiers, utility workers, nurses, businessmen, mechanics, farmers, bakers, homemakers, teachers and more – the people that were our community.

The Bible opens with God (Gen. 1-1) and the first thing we read about God is that He created the heavens and the earth. In other words, God first appears in Scripture as a worker. He placed the first humans in a garden “to tend and keep it.” (Gen 2:15)

God wants Christians to take responsibility to provide for their material needs and those of their families. God has created a world of resources for this purpose. He gives us authority, along with strength and skills, to use those resources to earn our living. Work is His gift to us, a means of supplying what we need. “...and also that every man should eat and drink and enjoy the good of all his labor – it is the gift of God” (Eccl 3:13). It doesn't matter what you do for a living. Your work has dignity and value. It matters to God.

So - what are you working for? Is it to draw a paycheck? Earning a living is important, but it is only part of God's intention for work. Ultimately, we are to be signposts pointing toward His kingdom. Through our job-related responsibilities, we have an opportunity to be like the citizens of Zion: “priests of the Lord” and “servants of our God.” Imagine if you were one of the workers hired to do temple repairs. Based on your past performance, would your work be so well done and your character so honest that no one needed to check up on whether you were doing the job with integrity? In Ephesians 6:5-9, Paul challenges us to work with “sincerity of heart” and to pay close attention to the work itself, which he calls “doing the will of God.” That's what impresses one's employer, and that's what pleases God.

Sometimes, our time and our talents (such as we can spare) are needed outside the workplace. There are needs and opportunities in our Post, and in our Sons of The American Legion Squadron. We are dedicated to the service of God and Country in a variety of programs, tasks, and projects; but we need more than the handful of members who attend our monthly meetings. “The harvest truly is plentiful, but the laborers are few, therefore pray the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest.” Think about it.

Buy A Brick Fundraiser!

We are re-introducing an exciting fundraiser for our Post. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our landscaping project we are working. The engraving uses the same technology as used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are some FAQs:



- **What Are We Having?** A Brick Fundraising Event
- **Why?** To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs
- **What Size Are the Bricks?** 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.
- **What are the Costs for the Individual Bricks?** Prices vary depending on size, style and lettering desired, but typically range from \$75 to \$200. For the 8x8 or 12x12 bricks, you can add a second emblem. Contact the Adjutant for ordering details. There is **NO** additional cost for the second emblem on the larger bricks.
- **What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks?** Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$125 to \$500.
- **What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks?** Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- **Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family?** No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- **Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One?** Absolutely!
- **Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick?** We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit <http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209> to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- **How Do I Pay For the Brick?** We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- **Where Will the Brick Be Shipped?** All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- **What Will Become of My Brick?** It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- **How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last?** We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- **Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later?** Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.

BRINGING A LITTLE SOUTH TO THE WEST



Seeing the ads on TV and in the newspaper (yes, I still get the newspaper every morning) with all the “Back to School” sales, I’m reminded of my days at Oakhaven in Memphis.

Things were pretty simple all the way up through the 6th grade. We didn’t have many textbooks, and really the only supplies we had to lug around was a ruled notebook, a couple of #2 lead pencils, a 12” ruler and a box of crayons. From about the 1st through the 6th grade, we used the notebook bound at the top perforated so we could tear the pages out and turn in our school assignments and homework. The notebook had two solid horizontal lines with a dotted line half-way between the solid lines. If we were writing something requiring using capitalization (upper case for you young’uns), we would start the letter at the top solid line and finish the letter at the bottom solid line. If we were writing uncapitalized (lower case) letters, that’s when we used the dotted lines for the top of the letter and the bottom solid line to finish. Of course, there were a few exceptions to that. For example, lower case letters like “b,” “d,” and “f” required us to use the two solid lines as our references.

What few textbooks we had were typically handed down from the previous year unless there was a major revision, which was seldom. We’d take the textbooks home and Mom would give us one of her many paper bags she saved from grocery shopping. Our job was to cut them up, fold, and tape them to the outside of the textbooks to use as book covers. This was a multi-purpose cover. It protected the textbook from scratches, water damage, and normal wear and tear. We wrote the title of the textbook on the front cover so we’d know which it was without having to open the book, and we also put our name on the cover to show ownership. Additionally, it gave us a canvas to display our artwork to our friends.

When we graduated to 7th grade, Jr. High (referred to as Middle School nowadays), things got a little more complicated. We didn’t spend all day in one room. While a few of our classes met in our homeroom, there were a few classes where we had to move to another room in the same wing.

We got away from the 3-line notebook and graduated to a 2-line notepaper that required us to have a 3-ring binder. The new paper with only two solid lines meant we had to develop a new way of writing. The two lines were much narrower than what we had grown accustomed to for the past six years. We had to gauge the distance between the two lines when writing lower case letters. And almost all our writing was done in cursive; a system taught to us as we progressed through grade school. We rarely printed anything.

Our supplies also increased quite a bit. Not only were we required to have a couple of #2 pencils, we also had to have an ink pen. We still needed our 12” ruler, but no crayons were required. Instead, we had to have a compass (not the kind that shows magnetic North), and a protractor. The last two items were required for Math. Back then, the only calculators we had were in our head. And I think the batteries in my head-culator never re-charged.

We also had several more textbooks. I remember going to the Bookstore to get my supplies and get issued my textbooks. We had a slip of paper showing our name, what grade we were in, and what teacher we had for a particular subject. The lady running the Bookstore used that to determine what and how many textbooks were needed. We didn’t have to pay for the textbooks, but we had to take care of them and turn them back in at the end of the school year. If we didn’t have the required notebook paper, writing utensils, or Math supplies, we could buy them at the Bookstore. We didn’t have Office Max or Staples. But we could count on Sears and the Ben Franklin five and dime for those basic school supplies.

None of my friends nor I wanted a new textbook. It was too hard to keep clean and undamaged. Also, often the textbooks had things either highlighted or underlined from a previous owner that normally indicated the answer to a test question, which made the textbook very valuable. Most of my friends (myself included), weren’t in school to learn, we were there to learn how to pass a test. The highlights and underlining made that a much easier task. Then at the end of the year, we’d take our slightly more used textbooks back to the Bookstore to turn them back in to the lady managing the store. She filed away those little slips of paper that had notes related to the condition of each textbook. Other than normal wear and tear, if the book had markings, torn pages or water damage, we would have to pay a fine. The amount of the fine was pretty arbitrary. It often was anywhere from a nickel to a half-dollar. If it was severely damaged, it could cost a couple of bucks. And until we “cleared” our turn in with the Bookstore, we didn’t get our final report card. We also had to clear out and clean out our locker prior to getting that final report card. Normally, I would not have cared about getting it, but we also didn’t know if we passed or failed the year until we saw it on the card. And there were a few years I had no idea which it would be until I saw it in writing. Well, with the exception of the 10th and 12th grade. I knew I flunked the 10th grade (Yuck! Summer School), and I knew I had passed the 12th grade because I finally woke up and actually made the Honor Roll for a few of the six-weeks reports. I still cringe just a little when I see those ads.
