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
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From the Desk and Mind of the Commander

We had busted our respective rump to bring home a perfect score and for our efforts we received a "good job also!" I can still see the crusty old E-7 Team Leader when he pulled me off to the side and said, "Bowen, you did a great job during this evaluation. If you can't be satisfied knowing in your mind that you did good, you need to get out of this business. You will never get recognition for what you do as a maintenance man."

Wow! That hurt, but over the next few days I began to understand what he was telling me. While it is nice to have others recognize your achievements, what's really important is knowing in your mind that you did a good job and did it to the very best of your ability. That's was a very hard lesson to learn. Since childhood I sought approval and accolades. Now I'm supposed to let that go and get my acceptance from within? I finally accepted what he said, and since that time I have been very satisfied when I knew I had done a good job, regardless whether anyone else knew it

But also from this lesson I learned to make certain those with whom I work, associate and those who provide a service for me are recognized when they've gone above and beyond. I make a point to have the restaurant manager come to my table when the service has been exceptional (I also call the manager over when it's been substandard). I try to make a point to publically recognize those in the Post supporting our efforts and events and ensure they get a pat on the back for their unselfish and hard work.

For the times I've been remiss, I sincerely apologize. It is not because you are not appreciated. And just in case, "ATTA BOY!" and "YOU GO GIRL!"

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

I do not know about others, but some of the best meals that were ever provided by The American Legion were done at a potluck. I look forward to tasting all of the new food that will be prepared. Larry




We are celebrating Super Bowl Sunday with some activities for everyone. We are starting off the day with a Chili Cook-off, which will begin at 1:00pm.

Service Officer: Part B Surprise

Medicare officials announced the new Part B premium rates for 2012 and they were significantly lower across the board than most people had expected. Large members of seniors actually will see their premiums drop significantly.

Why the declines? Because the new eligible and upper-income beneficiaries were hit with extra premium hikes for the past two years. That happened because the law generally bars any drop in Social Security benefits when there's no COLA. That means most people had their Part B premiums frozen for the past two years. But new eligibles and upper income people were exempt from the freeze, so they absorbed not only their share of the 2010 and 2011 hikes but also had to cover the share of all of the "frozen" beneficiaries.

The bottom line: almost every Medicare eligible will be paying lower premiums in 2012 than had been expected, and a significant number will be paying much less.

One more piece of good news; Medicare also reported the annual Part B deductible will drop around \$22 from the 2011 deductible.



Things I Always Wanted to Know **About The American Legion** Neal Thomas, Jr.

There are several things I wondered about as a new Legionnaire. For example: How do they change eligibility dates for membership? How are priorities assigned to address Congress? How are portions of our Constitution changed?

Early in my affiliation with The American Legion, I asked these questions of my Post, District and Department officers. I received a variety of answers from a series of individuals along the way. I finally enrolled in The American Legion College correspondence course. This gave me considerable insight into the overall operation of The American Legion and much of its history.

As I progressed through the chairs I found answers to these and other questions. The major question that I had was; how are changes made that govern the organization? The answer was simple---Resolutions. Resolutions are the force that drives, directs and prioritizes programs of The American Legion. The national organization cannot act on a given problem in the absence of a controlling resolution. Furthermore, it must act on a matter when mandated to do so by a resolution that has been properly adopted by the National Convention or National Executive Committee.

I have had the honor of serving on the National Resolution Assignment Committee. This committee meets annually at the National Convention and reviews and assigns resolutions forwarded from all Departments. These resolutions are then forwarded to committees and commissions to be reviewed and approved or rejected. In many cases they are received and filed. Often there are duplicates from several departments that are merged into one resolution with recognition of all of the other resolutions with the same subject. This process often involves as many as 200-300 resolutions. If a Post seeks to be a leader in the policies and practices of The American Legion, it can do so only through the resolution process. A class on writing resolutions normally occurs during our mid-winter conferences. So why not plan to attend next year's Mid-Winter Conference and get involved in changing things through resolutions?

On 10 January, the City Council approved task force recommendations to lease Memorial Hospital to the University of Colorado Hospital. This means negotiations will begin to take over MH and voters will approve the final plan this year. Under the proposal, UCH along with Poudre Valley Health of Ft. Collins, will operate a new regional health system. Having this new system should open better access to health care to the community, this includes the military. These coming negotiations should include a detailed plan how Tri-Care will be administered in serving active members, retirees, families and survivors.
