Someone is watching everything we say and do. They watch how we react to decisions, what decisions we make, and how we respond in a crisis situation. We are being judged on integrity, ethics, and morality. Pretty scary, huh?

We should all strive to be mentors, whether we are chosen or not. We can only do what we feel is the right thing to do, always. We cannot compromise our integrity or ethics, ever! Remember, someone is always watching, waiting, hoping to find a mentor.

It has often been said that a Post who can retain at least 85% of their membership every year has a program that is working.

The 3rd part to this membership program is working the American Legion membership opportunities called the Direct Mail Solicitation (DMS). This is where National solicits Veterans like you and me to become members of the American Legion and our responsibility is to get them to transfer you a local Post like ours. The other activity is called the Stay Alive Program. Whether you realize it or not, today's society is a very mobile entity and we are always moving for one end of town to another or from one state to another or from a city to another city within the State. Some of these members have 20 or 30 or more years in the American Legion and sometimes for whatever reason they have more and have not rejoined another Post in the local community. Again, our responsibility is to contact them when we get the information and let them know that we have a local Post and that we would like them to become a part of the Centennial 209 family.

If you have all 3 parts of this membership program working, there is nothing that can stop a Post like ours from growing and being a successful Post withi the Local community.
