From our Post Adjutant

The first round of renewal notices is out and I want to make a correction from something I put out last month. A Legionnaire came into the office in July and I helped him process his renewal online using a credit card. It did <u>not</u> give an option for a multi-year renewal except for the Paid Up For Life (PUFL) option. I had heard someone mention at convention that the system may not be ready to do that right away but I did not receive any notice of this. I will update you on changes.

The first thing the system did ask though is if we wanted to set up an automatic payment. We highly encourage everyone to take this option if they can. What happens is that every July the card you used to set it up will be charged the amount that the Post reports as its dues for the coming year. A renewal notice is never printed or mailed. You will receive your card after I download the first "paid online" report. It is basically the same as a PUFL option except that you do not need to come up with all the payments at once (upside) and as dues go up you will be charged the increase (downside). With PUFL, once you are paid up it will never change and you do not have to pony up the increase. And let's face it, with the increase in costs of goods and services over the last 10 years dues will be increased at some point; sooner rather than later.

Another reminder is that based on when you renew and when I get that renewal processed, and when National gets that information to the printer, and what the cutoff is at the printer to make changes to what is already scheduled, it is possible you may get a renewal notice from National after you have made your payment. This happens. You do not need to mail me the notice. However, if you have not received your membership card and a thank you letter from me within 3 weeks, please contact me! Maybe I did not get it, maybe we do not have a current address for you, or any number of things. Whatever it is, we will get it fixed.

If you want to pay in person or with cash, I am at most Friday dinners. Please feel free to bring it in and I can take care of it then. You can also give it to one of our officers if I am not there and they will get it to me. And of course, I am in the office on most Tuesdays from 0900 to 1400.

Interested in getting more involved with the Post? Come on in and talk to the Commander or me. We will try to fit your interest and skills with our programs and/or needs (which are many).

Finally, Thank You for your service, your membership, your belief in us and our mission. **Thank you!**

From our Chaplain

Excerpts from Ecclesiastes chapter 3 (vs 1) There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens...

(vs 9-13) What do workers gain from their toil? I have seen the burden God has laid on the human race. He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the human heart; yet no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end. I know that there is nothing better for people than to be happy and to do good while they live. That each of them may eat and drink and find satisfaction in all their toil—this is the gift of God.

From our Post Historian

"For God and Country, we associate ourselves together...to preserve the memories and incidents of our associations in all wars...." This is the historian's particular pledge cited in The American Legion Preamble. In my previous monthly *Centennial* newsletter columns (August 2022-July 2023), I sought to preserve some of the incidents of those wars by completing a one-year review of the major events that shaped American military history. I will now endeavor to preserve some of the memories of individual service in those wars. Each month for the next year, I will feature a Colorado native son veteran who remains Missing in Action. Additionally, I will share the story of a Medal of Honor recipient with a Colorado association. Lest we forget them and may you continue to be inspired by their stories of sacrifice and courage.



Private First Class Benjamin David De Herrera, born 19 April 1943 in Colorado Springs, was an infantryman of 3rd Platoon, C Company, 503rd Infantry Regiment, 173rd Airborne Brigade. On 19 November 1967, PFC DeHerrera was part of a Search and Destroy mission at Hill 875 in Dak To, South Vietnam. At 1435 hours, Companies A, C, and D of the 503rd Infantry, were in heavy contact with an unknown sized North Vietnamese force and were surrounded. Many of the wounded men, to include DeHerrera, were taken to the command post set up by Company C of the 503rd Infantry. As the fighting continued,

a close air support Marine pilot inadvertently dropped a 500-pound bomb on the command post, resulting

in additional casualties. A search of the command post's rubble the following day was unable to recover their remains. They were presumed to have died in the command post, either from their wounds or in the explosion when it was hit.

He was last seen wounded in the Company C command post area before the explosion and went missing following the blast. Search efforts never recovered his remains. Today, PFC De Herrera is memorialized on the Courts of the Missing at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, at Ft Logan National Cemetery, and the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C.

Jesse Nathaniel Funk's family moved to a ranch near Calhan, CO when he was a boy.



In 1918, he enlisted in the U.S. Army and joined Company L, 354th Infantry, 89th Division, American Expeditionary Force in Europe during the First World War. He was serving as a Private



First Class stretcher bearer during the Meuse-Argonne Offensive near Bois-de-Bantheville, France on 31 October 1918 when he and his partner learned of two severely wounded American officers stranded over a quarter mile into "No Man's Land" between Allied and enemy trenches. Without waiting for orders, the pair grabbed a stretcher and headed into harm's way. "Those darned machine-gun bullets were just singing songs around us and I figured every minute they were going to get us," Funk later said. They



finally crossed the 500 yards to reach the two lieutenants. The pair made it back to American lines with bullet holes in their clothes, but uninjured. They then returned for the other officer, loaded him on the stretcher and hustled back toward Allied lines. The stretcher was hit multiple times and bullets slashed through Funk's uniform and helmet, but he suffered only minor injuries. On their return trip, they spotted another wounded soldier in No Man's Land and daringly ventured a third time into danger to rescue the injured comrade.



None other than AEF Commander, General John Pershing awarded Corporal Funk the Medal of Honor in February 1919 (see accompanying photo). Although Jesse Funk went to war "virtually an unknown youth of the plains," the Denver Post observed in June 1919, he "so conducted himself on European soil that he became the greatest war hero of all time to residents of Colorado Springs, El Paso County, and the state of Colorado."

Funk returned to his modest life as a rancher in Calhan and

was

selected to represent Colorado at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier dedication ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery on 11 November 1921.

He died of complications following appendicitis surgery in Colorado Springs in 1933; he is buried at Calhan Memorial Cemetery.

August is Sturgis month. The Sturgis motorcycle rally is the oldest and most popular rally in the world. Clarence Hoel or "Pappy" is credited for founding the event when he bought a franchise of the Indian Motorcycle Company in Sturgis during 1936. After that, he organized the Jackpine Gypsies motorcycle club. The very first Sturgis motorcycle rally was held on August 14, 1938. The event was organized by the town's Jackpine Gypsies motorcycle club who bought and developed large motorcycle racetracks, hill climbs and field areas where the rally would be held. The only time the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally was not held was in 1942, at the height of World War II. This is the 83rd anniversary of the Sturgis rally that now draws about 700,000 motorcycle enthusiasts annually. ALR 209 has approximately 10 riders that will attend the event this year between 5-13 August.

Below you will find the second installment of the Rider of the Month. This month the spotlight is on Tom "Dundee" Foster. If there is a final-honors to be rendered, or a veteran event to be attended, Dundee will be there to represent Post 209 American Legion Riders. He always has time to help a veteran in need and is one of our most active members.


Nothing will change for you at the Squadron level. Business as usual. We will continue every activity, meeting and fundraisers. 100 members is possible and not far away. It will happen!

Through the year we will see change from above. It is only going to make us better and stronger. I am looking forward to being a part of this great year with each and every one of you.



August's Buddy Time is $August 19^{th}$, 0900 - 1100. We are looking forward to seeing you there.






FUNDRAISER INFORMATION

Walk of Honor

What are the costs for the individual bricks? Prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering desired but typically range from \$90 to \$200, depending on size.



- What are the costs for the corporate/veteran supporter bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$250 to \$500.
- What is the difference between individual and corporate bricks? Individual bricks are for veterans and family members wishing to purchase a brick to honor their veterans. The corporate bricks are for our veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who want to show their continued support for our nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the brick purchase restricted to members of the Post 209 families? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves for their veteran loved ones or to show their support for our veterans.
- Where do I go to buy a brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion 209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209 to buy your brick. The site is user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. In addition, you will see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- **How do I pay for the brick?** We have the site set up to accept payment via PayPal or check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick, and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where will the brick be shipped? All bricks will be sent to the post. We will notify you when it arrives, and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What will become of my brick? It will be placed near the flagpole at the post. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How long will this fundraiser effort last? We plan only to sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project.
- Will I have an opportunity to buy a brick later? Quite possibly, depending on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.

Bringing A Little South to the West

Food stamps have been around since long before I was born, but my family never took advantage of this program. I don't know if it was because we didn't qualify (highly unlikely), or maybe it was a pride thing, but growing up I don't recall Mom ever using food stamps to buy groceries. But she was a dedicated collector of S&H Green Stamps and Quality Stamps. Even some cigarette companies such as Old Gold and Raleigh offered Stamp coupons.

Mom was an avid S&H and Quality stamp collector. You would receive the stamps at the checkout counter from many grocery stores and some gas stations. They even had different denominations. They came in one, ten, and fifty point denominations. You would take the stamps, lick them as you would a stamp for mailing and put them into coupon books a little larger than a passport. When you filled the book, you could exchange it for items at the local S&H store or mail them in along with your selection from their S&H or Quality stamp catalog.

Most of the items in the catalog was household items, including many kitchen items. But, with enough points accumulated you could also get larger and more fun items, like camping gear or a crank handle ice cream maker. Mom was not only the collector of the stamps, she was also the decision-maker on what to buy with them.

It normally took some time to build up enough points to fill a book. Keep in mind, groceries were pretty cheap back in the day (so were salaries). I vividly recall Mom going to the local Kroger store with a coupon that allowed her to get a 5-pound bag of sugar for \$0.01 with a \$5.00 or more purchase. And a \$5.00 purchase of food normally filled three large paper bags.

Both Mom and Dad smoked when I was growing up. Dad liked to smoke Winston and would do so in the house or anywhere else the mood struck him. Mom didn't feel it was appropriate to smoke in front of the kids, so she would hide and smoke in the bathroom (one bath in a three-bedroom home) or in her bedroom, which was always off-limits to the kids. When Mom would smoke in the bathroom, she would always crank open the small window to allow the smoke to dissipate. It didn't work. If you went to the bathroom immediately after Mom, you couldn't hardly see the mirror from the smoke.

The problem however, was Winston didn't offer stamps. So, Mom convinced Dad to change. He was offered an opportunity to smoke Raleigh or Old Gold. Neither was



an attractive alternative. Old Gold was too weak, and Raleigh was too strong. But they both offered stamps, so Dad gave in and smoked Old Gold for the several years Old Gold was around and offered stamps. I do recall however, he would occasionally slip in a pack of Winston's when Mom wasn't paying attention.

The good ole days of collecting S&H and Quality stamps are long gone, along with stamps for smoking Old Gold, Raleigh or any other brand of cigarettes. There's actually no incentive to smoke any longer. Oh yeah, there's also that lung cancer thing.





Coffin Locker:

Everything on a ship has a place that it is stored so as to avoid gear adrift. In berthing compartments if you are lucky or high enough rank you get a coffin locker and a stand-up locker to store your gear. All sea bag items and any civilian clothes that you have onboard have to be stored in these lockers. The coffin locker was under your rack and would lift up for access. The small stand-up locker was normally used for your dress uniforms.
