It may not be a bad thing that they haven't been in touch, but everyone likes to get a call and realize someone is thinking of them. This is one of the reasons for the Legion's Buddy Check program; not just to prevent suicide but to let people know someone is thinking about them. If you encounter a buddy or a veteran that is in need of help you don't have to be the one to fix them but be available to talk with them when they are going through a rough patch. When doing this for your buddy don't forget about yourself. As always if needed call the Veterans Crisis Line (see number above).

Once again, I thank you for all you do to help veterans and our Post.

From our Chaplain

Colossians 3:14 (Amplified Bible):

Beyond all these things put on and wrap yourselves in [unselfish] love, which is the perfect bond of unity [for everything is bound together in agreement when each one seeks the best for others].

Who can forget where they were on September 11, 2001. It was a day that defined our generation. It is hard to believe it has been 22 years since the events that unfolded that day. Americans still remember 9/11 with tear-choked tributes and pleas to "never forget" after all these years. It was one of the deadliest terror attacks on U.S. soil.

"It took a tragedy to unite us. It should not take another tragedy to unite us again," said Andrew Colabella, whose cousin, John DiGiovanni, died in the 1993 bombing World Trade Center bombing that presaged 9/11."

I remember people gathering along roads waving American flags. Neighbors checked on each other to make sure they were OK and to lend a helping hand or a listening ear to each other. Patriotism was evident at sport gatherings, etc., while we as a nation joined together to mourn and honor those who were lost. From our Post Historian

The third Friday in September (15 Sep 2023) is designated as National POW/MIA Recognition Day to honor those American servicemembers who were captured as prisoners of war and returned, in addition to those who remain missing in action. The purpose of the day is to ensure that Americans remember to continue the effort to account for those who served and sacrificed, and never have returned from our nation's wars.





Private First Class Thomas Michael Hanratty, born 19 June 1946 in Beulah, CO, served with Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 265, Marine Air Group 16, 1st Marine Air Wing, during the Vietnam War.

On 11 June 1967, PFC Hanratty was a crewmember aboard the lead CH-46 Sea Knight helicopter in a flight of four (one other CH-46 and two UH-1 Iroquois) on an insertion mission to land a patrol of Marines in hostile territory

north of Cam Lo, Quang Tri Province, South Vietnam. The gunships made low strafing runs over the landing zone to clear booby traps and to locate any enemy troops in the area. The lead CH-46 then took intense enemy small arms fire while at low altitude. Portions of the rear blades were seen to separate from the aircraft and a radio transmission was received from the aircraft indicating that it had been hit. The helicopter became inverted and continued out of



ravine. Personnel in other helicopters in the flight believed that there could have been no survivors. Searchers repeatedly attempted to reach the crash site over the next two weeks, but enemy forces prevented them from doing so until 30 June, when they found no evidence of survivors and no remains.

Today, Private First Class Hanratty is memorialized on the Courts of the Missing at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, at Fort Logan National Cemetery, and the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C.

Thank you for your service, Thomas. You are not forgotten.

-- Medal of Honor recipient William Crawford

This month we look at the story of a local WW2 hero who earned the Medal of Honor in September 1943. Many veterans in Colorado Springs may be familiar with the name William "Bill" Crawford, namesake of the Crawford House, which operated from 2001-2022 as a homeless veterans' resource center. William J. Crawford, born 19 May 1918 in Pueblo, CO, enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1942 and served as a private with the 36th Infantry Division during the September 1943 Allied landings at Salerno, Italy.



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Private Crawford was serving as squad scout on 13 September 1943 when his platoon attacked an enemy-held position near Altavilla, Italy. After reaching the crest of a hill, the platoon was pinned down by intense enemy machine-gun and small-arms fire. Locating one of these guns, which was dug in on a terrace on his immediate front, Crawford, without orders and on his own initiative moved over the hill under enemy fire to a point within a few yards of the gun emplacement and singlehandedly destroyed the machine gun and killed three of the crew with a hand grenade, thus enabling his platoon to continue its advance.

When the platoon, after reaching the crest, was once more delayed by enemy fire, Pvt. Crawford

again, in the face of intense fire, advanced directly to the front midway between two hostile machine-gun nests located on a higher terrace and emplaced in a small ravine. Moving first to the left, with a grenade he destroyed one gun emplacement and killed the crew; he then worked his way, under continuous fire, to the other and with one grenade and the use of his rifle, killed one enemy and forced the remainder to flee. Seizing the enemy machine gun, he fired on the withdrawing Germans and facilitated his company's advance. Crawford and three others in the 36th Infantry were recommended for the Medal of Honor.



Following the battle, Crawford was reported missing in action and presumed killed; his father received his son's "posthumous" Medal of Honor in 1944.

Only with the Allied liberation of German POW camps in 1945 was it learned that Private William Crawford was indeed captured by Germans in September 1943 and held prisoner for the remainder of the war. Crawford remained in the U.S. Army and retired in 1964 as a master sergeant. He then quietly, humbly worked for many years as a janitor in the cadet dormitories at the U.S. Air Force Academy, until one day a cadet "discovered" that their unassuming custodian Mr. Crawford was, in fact, a WW2 war hero and Medal of Honor recipient.



When it was learned that William Crawford had never formally been presented his award, Academy leaders arranged for a formal ceremony as part of the 1984 USAFA graduation. The commencement speaker that year was President Ronald Reagan, who during the ceremony remarked, "...nearly forty years have gone by and it's time to do it right!" as he fastened the nation's highest military honor around Crawford's

neck.

When he died on 15 March 2000, MSGT William Crawford was buried at the U.S. Air Force Academy Cemetery, the only non-Air Force veteran to receive that distinction.

From our Junior Shooting Sports Team

The Young Guns Basic Course provides youth ages 10-18 years old (boys and girls) the opportunity to learn about firearms safety and basic shooting skills. During Young Guns, NRA Basic Rifle Instructors teach the safe handling of firearms, shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing), how to zero a rifle, and how to score targets. At the end of the course, the youth have a competition shoot against the others in the course in order to show off the skills they have learned. The Marksmanship Course provides graduates of Young Guns the opportunity to further develop their shooting skills.

On August 5, 2023 the first Young Guns Air Pistol Basic Course was held. Select students who have achieved Sharpshooter in the NRA Air Rifle Qualification program were invited to participate in the Air Pistol Basic Course. The course teaches the basics of air pistol shooting to include history, safe handling and use (including special instructions applicable to air pistols), shooting positions, targets and scoring, NRA Air Pistol Qualification program, and additional opportunities outside of the Post 209 JSSP. The three students who attended and completed the course have been invited to shoot for qualifications under the NRA Air Pistol Qualification program during a pilot offering for air pistols in the Fall 2023 Marksmanship Course. The JSSP instructors are looking forward to seeing Aloena, Ben, and Ellie shooting air pistols during the Marksmanship Course and helping shape the potential future of air pistol courses in the future.

The JSSP needs your assistance to continue to provide the quality training opportunity to our local youth. Due to the loss of several instructors over the last couple of years, we need more instructors now more than ever. There are three courses required to become an instructor for the Post 209 Junior Shooting Sports Program: NRA Basic Rifle Course, NRA Basic Instructor Training (BIT) Course, and NRA Basic Rifle Instructor Course. In an effort to help reduce the costs associated with taking the courses, an NRA Basic Rifle Instructor Course has been offered a couple of times without the minimum of four students signing up. Another course will be scheduled in early January, with the date to be announced in early November. An NRA BIT Course and NRA Basic Rifle Instructor Course are being worked out in coordination with a Post 209 member and local Scouting instructors, with the costs yet to be determined (though expected to be much lower than the standard costs in the area). Please feel free to contact me for more information on what an instructor's duties are for each course, the costs of becoming an instructor, or any other questions you may have about the program. If you think that you might be interested in becoming an NRA Basic Rifle Instructor, feel free to come and observe the Marksmanship and/or Young Guns Courses starting in September (see dates/times below).



The Fall JSSP courses are taking applications for the Marksmanship Course starting Wednesday September 6th (4:45pm – 6:00pm, 5:45pm – 7:00pm, or 6:56pm – 8:00pm) and Young Guns Basic Course starting Thursday September 7th (6:15pm – 8:00pm), with a cost of \$30 per youth shooter for either course. If there is a youth interested in learning how to safely handle a firearm and basic shooting skills, they are invited to sign up for the Young Guns Basic Course. If there is a youth that has already completed Young Guns, they are invited to sign up for the Marksmanship Course. 








UPCOMING EVENTS



- What are the costs for the corporate/veteran supporter bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$250 to \$500.
- What is the difference between individual and corporate bricks? Individual bricks are for veterans and family members wishing to purchase a brick to honor their veterans. Bringing A Little South to the West

If you've read many of my offerings, you may recall I often cite growing up in a suburb of Memphis, but I also frequently write about the time we spent helping our grandparents on their farms in Arkansas. This month I want to tell you a little about Cherry Valley, Arkansas.

Neither of my grandparents lived in town; both lived on and worked farms outside the little village of Cherry Valley. The exception was that Maw Maw (Mom's mother) moved into town after Paw Paw passed. She didn't want to live by herself on the farm, and I suspect there were just too many ghosts of my grandfather living in that house.

When our grandparents lived there, Cherry Valley was a town of about 350 residents on Arkansas Highway 1 about 15 minutes north of Wynne. I doubt it has grown much since that time. Most of the stores were lined up on Main Street, with just a few others as you entered the town limits. The stores consisted of the typical retail variety of the day; a feed or tack store, which served the farmers and ranchers with much needed stock and livestock and basic hardware supplies, a grocery store, a general mercantile store, and a gas station. There were a few others like clothes stores, but we never ventured into those. Our main interest was food, and of course, candy! For toys, we'd have to travel to Wynne and visit the Ben Franklin 5 and dime.

My favorite store was Holcomb's grocery. It was located about mid-way down Main Street. Mr. Holcomb was an extremely nice man and always had a smile for all his customers. He greeted everyone as if he'd known them his entire life. And he had a pretty good selection of candy, which made the experience even better.

The only other store I remember visiting in town was Misner's General Store. There wasn't much in there of interest to me, but it was great just getting to walk through and look at the variety of stuff he offered. I don't ever remember going to any other store in that town, with the possible exception of the gas station.

Both grandparents used essentially the same terms when referring to Cherry Valley and Wynne. For immediate or routine supplies, they'd just say, "I'm going to the store." That meant they were headed to Cherry Valley. "The Store" could mean any number of places, but most often it was Holcomb's grocery. If they said, "I'm going to town," that was code for Wynne. For us, that meant a stop at the Ben Franklin's 5 and dime, where we could spend our hard-earned dollars for junk toys that we normally broke before the day was out. I don't recall why they went, but I suspect it was mainly just a treat for us kids.

Cherry Valley was a typical town or village in the rural south. It was quaint, had all the necessities of life, and unlike today the prices rivaled what you found in larger cities. Many of them have died away or are dying because either they are no longer competitive or people have left. How sad.

UNREP/VERTREP:


When a ship is underway there is always a need for more supplies including fuel. Since you are out in the middle of the water you can't really pull up to the shore and refuel or restock. All this is done while underway and is a pretty major undertaking. The two ways the Navy uses to resupply or refuel are Underway Replenishment (UNREP) or Vertical Replenishment (VERTREP).

The supply ship pulls up alongside the ship it is going to resupply and then shot lines are sent over to each ship that are used to pull lines to refuel the ship and to send over supplies. The other way is supplies are sent over by helicopter and dropped on the flight deck; which on my ship we normally had both operations going on at the same time. Both procedures include lots of moving pieces and if you are not paying attention it can be very dangerous if not deadly.
