Wow! November already. Where has the year gone? Seems like just yesterday we were celebrating Memorial Day and July 4th. November is a busy month every year at the Post. Starts with the Veterans Day parade and ends with our annual Holiday Dinner.

Veterans Day has taken on a new meaning for me since I joined The American Legion. As a side note did you know that Veterans Day was originally called Armistice Day? This was the day the treaty was signed ending WWI. After WWII it was renamed to Veterans Day to honor all Veterans.

One of the things I enjoyed shortly after we stood up our Honor Guard was getting involved with Saluting America at District 11 schools. We made it to many schools with our Honor Guard. We had enough members to field two teams and we would visit 2-3 schools each day during Veterans Day week. It was great seeing the looks on the kids' faces as they were able to put a face to what a veteran is. Most schools would also have active-duty parents there for the assembly as well. I remember one year we went to Helen Keller Elementary to raise the flag in front of the school. We raised the flag twice that day because they brought the kids out in two groups. The cool thing about it was while we are standing there at attention as the kids came out we heard a girl say "hey I know them". We were at the school where our then current Commander Greg Smith's kids attended. We were able to talk with the kids before they went back inside.

We went to Wilson Elementary the next year to raise the flag in the morning before school started. We then went into one of the classrooms for about 15 minutes and spoke to the kids. We told them a little bit about what we did while we were active-duty and then took questions. Talk about intimidating, I learned that kids that age listen to what you are saying, although it may have been the weight of the M1 I was carrying that day.

One of the other things I like about November is the Veterans Day parade that the Post is in every year. The parade in Colorado Springs is one of the biggest in the country and the crowds always come out to thank us for our service. From our Post Adjutant

The Legion cap we wear today is not often thought of fondly (to say the least). Many of us wore that cap with our dress uniforms and had some indecent nicknames for that headpiece, but we knew little about it. Why did our uniformed services issue such a thing?

Before the flat, envelope looking cap there was the Campaign Hat, a wide brimmed hat with a Montana Peak. Great for protection from the weather and generally worn up until WWII and still worn by some Drill Sergeants today.

During WWI the Campaign Hat did not ship or store well when the troops went overseas. Instead of storing them when the troops switched to their helmets they were cut up and used for hospital slippers and such. Now what are the troops going to wear on their downtime and when going home? In 1918 the Army decided that Doughboys serving in France needed headgear that was comfortable to wear, yet could be stored in the pocket when the helmet was donned. The solution was an Americanized version of the fatigue cap issued to the French Poilus. Since the boys were overseas, it was given the name "Overseas Cap." In 1940 the cap was authorized for wear in the U.S. and was officially renamed the "Garrison Cap."

It is now ingrained in the public's eye through the parades of service members returning home from two world wars and the influx of veterans into society. The challenger? The venerable "Dixie Cup" of the US Navy and Coast Guard. I do not know why the garrison cap won out over the dixie cup, or if it was even considered. I would assume it was the numbers of soldiers and marines verses the sailors. Maybe it was the flat sides where pins and badges could be worn, and where the emblem and Post number could be proudly displayed? That seems reasonable to me.

Today, it is recognized that someone wearing that cap served is still serving. While not the most comfortable, certainly not the most protective, we wear it with pride knowing it is recognizable for what it is. Unlike a ball cap it is recognizable from all sides, maybe not as a Legionnaire, but as a member of a Veteran Service Organization that is still serving America with pride.

A couple overlooked policies regarding the wear of the uniform cap. When wearing the uniform cap in public you are representing The American Legion. The America Legion does not take sides in partisan politics and the cap should <u>not</u> be worn at campaign rallies for any person running for office. The left side (emblem side) of any American Legion cap cannot contain other than the official American Legion emblem and lettering set forth in resolution No. 58 adopted by the NEC Apr 30 – May 1, 1964 for Post, City, County, District, and Department. Additional lettering and all pins and badges are worn on the right side of the cap.

Wear it with pride, wear it correctly.



There has been an increase in scams by individuals claiming to be able to assist you in getting money for your encounters with these dangers. Do not give out your personal information to anyone claiming to do this. If it is by email, check that the email starts with "https://" The federal agencies will not contact you unless you have contacted them first. If you have been contacted by someone claiming to help you, get all the information from them you can and contact by phone the VA at 1-800-698-2411 or email to www.va.gov/PACT to report suspicious activity.

From our Post Historian



Roger Danny Helwig, born 17 May 1943 in Trinidad, CO, spent his teen years in Colorado Springs. He entered the U.S. Air Force from Colorado and served in the 390th Tactical Fighter Squadron during the Vietnam War. When North Vietnam began to increase their military strength in South Vietnam, NVA and Viet Cong troops again intruded on neutral Laos for sanctuary, as the Viet Minh had done during the war with the French some years before. The border road, termed the "Ho Chi Minh Trail" was used for transporting weapons, supplies and troops. Hundreds of American pilots were shot down trying to stop this communist traffic to South Vietnam.

On 11 September 1969, as aircraft commander of "Stormy 02", an F-4D Phantom II, Captain Helwig and Captain Roger Stearns departed Da Nang Air Base on a visual reconnaissance and forward air control (FAC) mission over Laos. After identifying a target, "Stormy 02" made a marking rocket pass to mark the target for other aircraft in the area. While pulling up from the pass, one of the other aircraft noticed fuel coming from both of "Stormy 02's" wings, which quickly caught fire and caused the aircraft to crash about ten miles west of the Vietnam border a few miles south of the Demilitarized Zone, exploding on impact. A badly damaged parachute was seen hanging in a tree near the crash site, but there were no other signs that the Phantom's crew survived the crash. No beepers were heard and neither crew member could be located following the crash.





On May 22, 1990, the Vietnamese government, having denied knowledge of Helwig and Stearns for many years, "discovered" and returned to U.S. control the remains of Captain Roger H. Stearns. The fate of Helwig remains unclear.

Captain Helwig is memorialized on the Courts of the Missing at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, and his name is inscribed along with all his fallen comrades on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington, D.C.

Thank you for your service, Roger. You are not forgotten.

Floyd K. Lindstrom was raised by his single mother at the Myron Straton Home for the working poor in Colorado Springs. Earning the rank of Eagle Scout and graduating from Cheyenne Mountain High School in 1931, Floyd worked as a long-haul truck driver through the 1930s until America's entry into World War II. He enlisted in the U.S. Army on his 30th birthday in June 1942, and after training, was assigned to the 3rd Infantry Division in North Africa. During the July 1943 Allied invasion of Sicily, Private Lindstrom saved the life of a fellow soldier under enemy fire, for which he was awarded the Silver Star.

On 11 November 1943, on the German-held slopes of Mount la Difensa south of Rome, Private First Class Lindstrom, seeing that his crew was outnumbered five to one, "...immediately deployed the few remaining men into position and opened fire with his single gun. The enemy

centered fire on him with machine gun, machine pistols, and grenades. Unable to knock out the enemy nest from his original position, PFC Lindstrom picked up his own heavy machine gun and staggered 15 yards up the barren, rocky hillside to a new position, completely ignoring enemy small-arms fire which was striking all around him...he charged uphill under a steady stream of fire, killed both gunners with his pistol, and dragged their gun down to his own men, directing them to employ it against the enemy. Disregarding heavy rifle fire, he returned to the enemy machine-gun nest for two boxes of ammunition, came back, and resumed withering fire from his own gun...which completely broke up the German counterattack. PFC Lindstrom demonstrated aggressive spirit and complete fearlessness in the face of almost certain death."



For this action he was nominated for the Medal of Honor. When offered a transfer away from the front lines while his nomination was under review, Lindstrom characteristically chose to stay with his men and advance on to Anzio, Italy. He was killed by enemy fire in the Battle of Anzio on 3 February 1944. He was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor on 20 April 1944.

Originally buried in Italy, Lindstrom was later disinterred and reburied at Evergreen Cemetery in Colorado Springs in 1948. Our WWII hometown hero's legacy is preserved throughout Colorado Springs. His medals are held by the Colorado Springs Pioneers Museum. He is honored at Cheyenne Mountain High School, the Myron Stratton Home, Fort Carson, and the Medal of Honor Memorial. In addition, the Community Based Operations Clinic in Colorado Springs was named in his honor. And in 2019, Colorado Springs American Legion Post 5 voted to rename the Post to American Legion PFC Floyd K. Lindstrom Post 5.

Understandably, not everyone has much time to participate in the Honor Guard. In reality, all someone needs are a few available hours: about an hour to participate a night for a training meeting (check the newsletter calendar or the calendar on the Honor Guard website - https://legion209.org/honorguard209/) and up to a couple of hours for an event. So around three hours a month for a meeting and just **ONE** event is all you need to make a difference in helping support our veterans and our community. Members of The American Legion, the Sons of The American Legion, and The American Legion Auxiliary are all eligible to be members of the Honor Guard with all uniform items provided except Legion family-specific cap and shoes. We are currently running Fall JSSP courses; the Marksmanship Course and the Young Guns Basic Course. They will conclude Thursday November 9. The customary Awards and Pizza Party to celebrate the accomplishments of our youth shooters will be at 6:00pm on November 9th. We will be handing out Air Pistol Qualification awards for two students, a first for the Post 209 JSSP.

The Spring 2024 JSSP courses are taking applications for the Marksmanship Course starting Wednesday, February 7th (4:45pm – 6:00pm, 5:45pm – 7:00pm, or 6:56pm – 8:00pm) and Young Guns Basic Course starting Thursday, February 8th (6:15pm – 8:00pm), with a cost of \$30 per youth shooter for either course. If there is a youth interested in learning how to safely handle a firearm and basic shooting skills, they are invited to sign up for the Young Guns Basic Course. If there is a youth that has already completed Young Guns, they are invited to sign up for the Marksmanship Course. Please go to https://legion209.org/young-guns/ to download an application, complete the application, and send it to Jesse Wade (jssp209@gmail.com) to sign up for either class. Please feel free to reach out to Jesse or myself (jwhaas.al209@gmail.com) with any questions you may have regarding the Junior Shooting Sports Program.

The Young Guns Basic Course provides youth ages 10-18 years old (boys and girls) the opportunity to learn about firearms safety and basic shooting skills. During Young Guns, NRA Basic Rifle Instructors teach the safe handling of firearms, shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing), how to zero a rifle, and how to score targets. At the end of the course, the youth have a competition shoot against the others in the course in order to show off the skills they have learned. The Marksmanship Course provides graduates of Young Guns the opportunity to further develop their shooting skills.

The JSSP needs your assistance to continue to provide the quality training opportunity to our local youth. Due to the loss of several instructors over the last couple of years, we need more instructors now more than ever. There are three courses required to become an instructor for the Post 209 Junior Shooting Sports Program: NRA Basic Rifle Course, NRA Basic Instructor Training (BIT) Course, and NRA Basic Rifle Instructor Course. In an effort to help reduce the costs associated with taking the courses, an NRA Basic Rifle Instructor Course has been offered a couple of times without the minimum of four students signing up. Another course will be scheduled in early January, with the date to be announced in late November/early December. An NRA BIT Course and NRA Basic Rifle Instructor Course are being worked out in coordination with a Post 209 member and local Scouting instructors, with the costs yet to be determined (though expected to be much lower than the standard costs in the area). Please feel free to contact me for more information on what an instructor's duties are for each course, the costs of becoming an instructor, or any other questions you may have about the program. If you think that you might be interested in becoming an NRA Basic Rifle Instructor, feel free to come and observe the Marksmanship and/or Young Guns Courses (see days/times below).





- What are the costs for the individual bricks? Prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering desired but typically range from \$90 to \$200, depending on size.

Bringing A Little South to the West

Country Cooking! I love Mexican and German food. Matter of fact, I also enjoy Cajun, Chinese, Japanese, and Italian food. But my favorite above all is what is now referred to as "Country Cooking." I've even seen it referred to a "Soul Food." Growing up, we just called it dinner or supper.

So, what do I mean by Country Cooking? Simple. At my grandparents' house, it is all home-made, not ready to eat out of a frozen package. For dinner (the noon meal), or supper (the evening meal), it normally consists of Yeast Rolls (my grandmother on Mom's side, or Maw Maw would prepare the Yeast rolls early in the morning let them sit on the counter for several hours to rise before baking), fried chicken (perfect every time), real mashed (not stirred with a mixer) potatoes (using a potato masher that looks something like an electrical sine wave on a metal frame with a wooden handle), pinto, navy, great northern, green, or baked beans, peas (either six-week or black-eyed), gravy, and sweet tea. For dessert, we'd have either cake or a pie (often with meringue). If the pie was apple, my favorite way to eat it was with a slice of American cheese (yes, cheese) melted on top and vanilla ice cream. My grandmother on my father's side (Granny) would also make chocolate pudding. Yum!

I know it sounds like a lot of food for one sitting...and it was. But when you consider these are meals prepared and served to farmers and people who had gotten up with the sun and went to bed when the sun went down, we didn't have to worry about food settling on your stomach.

At our house, these meals weren't typical because for most of my formulative years, Mom and Dad both worked so there wasn't much time to prepare meals like my grandparents had. Most of the time, we would have fried chicken, fried fish (see a trend here?) a stew or fried liver and onions (because it was cheap and the stew lasted all week). If Mom had mashed potatoes left over, the next night would include potato cakes. She would crack an egg, mix it in with the potatoes and fry them up. We rarely had hamburgers or hot dogs unless it was the 4th of July and we fired up the grill. There were no tacos or anything in a casserole dish.

Breakfast was obviously different than lunch or supper. It was always fried eggs (your choice of over easy, medium, or hard), bacon, sausage, or ham (not some of each), homemade biscuits, fresh butter, jelly, jam, or sorghum molasses, white or brown gravy (not SOS), fresh tomatoes, grits (there was only one way to eat grits in our family; lots of butter and salt), coffee and milk.

Regardless the meal or who prepared it, the rule was you ate what was on the table. We didn't have the luxury of asking for anything not on the table. We never even considered asking for it. And the rule was you were not excused from the table until your plate was cleaned. If something was served we didn't like, such as turnip greens or spinach, we still had to have some on the plate, even if it was just a bite or two. I discovered that with enough salt, pepper and ketchup, you could wash just about anything down.

I wasn't hungry until I started writing this article. Now, I'm thinking about some apple pie with cheese melted on top. Don't knock it 'til you've tried it. Yum!!!!
