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

At the Spring Meetings on Tuesday, 7 May, our own Past Post and Past Department Commander Jay Bowen was given the honor and privilege to open a Hospitality Room at the Fall Meetings 4-8 October. What this means is that when the gavel falls closing the National Convention in New Orleans on Thursday, 29 August, Jay will officially become the Following or Trailing Candidate for National Commander.

Jay will be only the second Legionnaire from Colorado to serve as the leader of the largest Veterans Service Organization in its 107-year history. Post 209 member Tom Bock is the only other Colorado Legionnaire elected to this high office. He served during the 2005-2006 year.

Jay is now building his team in preparation to begin his two-year campaign. If you are interested in supporting and possibly participating on the team, let Jay and/or Tom Bock (his campaign manager) know. He needs to quickly identify approximately 15-18 people interested in traveling with him and Jackie to Indianapolis in October in support of a three-day Hospitality event.

Even if you are not available to travel, there's still work to be done in support of the campaign. He will be conducting several fundraising events across the state and you can help with some of those. Speaking of fundraisers, if you have an idea for a fundraising event, let Jay know. If you would like to make a personal donation to the campaign, he's made that easy. You can donate with a check, cash, money order, or Venmo. If check or money order, please make it out to: "American Legion Post 209." In the memo, write "NEST EGG." You can mail the check to "American Legion Post 209, 3613 Jeannine Dr. Colorado Springs, CO, 80917." That will get the donation to an



account setup for the war chest. This money will be used to help defray the costs of getting our team to/from events and support his campaign travels.

Jay's goal is to raise a minimum of \$50,000 by October, toward an ultimate goal of \$200,000 for the two-year campaign he will be starting in September. He currently has a little over half of that October goal.

Jay will need about 25-30 people total for the campaign team. He is hoping to have a mix of Legion family (Legion, Auxiliary, Sons) from across the state.

From our Post Historian

"Don't Give up the Ship!" were the dying words of James Lawrence, Captain of the U.S. frigate *Chesapeake*, during a 1 June 1813 battle with Royal Navy frigate *Shannon*. His devoted friend, Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry, had the sentiment sewn onto his personal battle flag and, in time, the declaration became the motto of the U.S. Navy.

The National Defense Act of 3 June 1916 authorized Congress to draft the National Guard into federal overseas service in the event of national emergency, which it invoked the next year during WW1.





The Battle of Midway (3-7 June 1942) was "the" turning point in the Pacific war with Japan. The American destruction of the Japanese carrier fleet began the costly three-year counteroffensive to push the Japanese back island by island.

6 June 1944 – "D-Day" – Operation Overlord commenced the long-anticipated WWII Allied invasion of Northwestern Europe– Allies landed nearly 150,000 troops on the Normandy coastline of France. Among those Americans in the first wave of landings on Utah and Omaha beaches was American Legion founding member, Brigadier General Theodore "Ted" Roosevelt Jr and his son, Captain Quentin Roosevelt. Awarded the Medal of Honor for his "gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty" that day, BG Ted Roosevelt's citation reads:

After two verbal requests to accompany the leading assault elements in the Normandy invasion had been denied, Brig. Gen. Roosevelt's written request for this mission was approved and he landed with the first wave of the forces assaulting the enemyheld beaches. He repeatedly led groups from the beach, over the seawall and established them inland. His valor, courage, and presence in the very front of the attack and his complete unconcern at being under heavy fire inspired the troops to heights of enthusiasm and self-sacrifice. Although the enemy had the beach under constant direct fire, Brig. Gen. Roosevelt moved from one locality to another, rallying men around him, directed and personally led them against the enemy. Under his seasoned, precise, calm, and unfaltering leadership, assault troops reduced beach strong points and rapidly moved inland with minimum



casualties. He thus contributed substantially to the successful establishment of the beachhead in France.

In the distance of history, when America unashamedly asserted itself as defender of freedom and leader of the free world, President Ronald Reagan, the finest Commander-in-Chief under which your Historian proudly served, stood at the Brandenburg Gate in West Berlin on 12 June 1987 and challenged the Soviet leader to "dramatically advance the cause of freedom and peace...Mister Gorbachev, tear down this wall..." Within two years, the German people felt emboldened to confront the Communist oppressors and began dismantling the Wall and reuniting their nation.

On 14 June 1775, the Continental Congress first authorized ten companies of riflemen, drawn from different colonies, creating a "Continental Army," the forerunner of the U.S. Army.

The Continental Congress adopted a resolution on 14 June 1777 that determined "the flag of the United States be thirteen alternate stripes red and white...and the Union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new Constellation." A century later, the first "Flag Day" observance was held 14 June 1877 on the 100th anniversary of the "Stars and Stripes" adoption.





New England militiamen positioned on the high ground above Boston harbor on Bunker Hill (and Breed's Hill) faced a frontal assault of the British army on 17 June 1775. Reportedly ordered to hold their fire "until you see the whites of their eyes," the Patriot militiamen inflicted over 1000 casualties on the British army before retreating into the Boston countryside. Although considered a British victory, the Battle of Bunker Hill busted the British myth of an anticipated easy victory over "undisciplined" American amateur soldiers.

A combined force of Sioux and Cheyenne warriors under the leadership of Sitting Bull and Crazy Horse devastated a considerable portion of George Custer's 7th Cavalry on 25 June 1876 in the



worst American army defeat of the Plains Indian Wars. News of the demoralizing Battle of the Little Bighorn reached a stunned American nation on the eve of national Centennial celebrations.

The Battle of Belleau Wood (1-26 June 1918) was the first large-scale battle fought by the American Expeditionary Force (AEF) during WW1, resulting in nearly 10,000 U.S. casualties. American Marines particularly distinguished themselves in the ferocious hand-to-hand fighting, reportedly described by their German adversaries as "Devil Dogs" (Teufel Hunden), which the USMC proudly utilized in their recruiting efforts.

30 June 1950 – President Truman ordered American forces to South Korea after the surprise Soviet-backed Communist North Korean invasion. This marked the first time the UN Security Council had approved the use of military force.

So around three hours a month for a meeting and just **ONE** event is all you need to make a difference in helping support our veterans and our community. Members of The American Legion, the Sons of The American Legion, and The American Legion Auxiliary are all eligible to be members of the Honor Guard with all uniform items provided except Legion family-specific cap and shoes. From our Junior Shooting Sports Program

The Young Guns Basic Course provides youth ages 10-18 years old (boys and girls) the opportunity to learn about firearms safety and basic shooting skills. During Young Guns, credentialed National Rifle Association (NRA) Basic Rifle Instructors teach the safe handling of firearms, shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing), how to zero a rifle, and how to score targets. At the end of the course, the youth have a competition shoot against the others in the course in order to show off the skills they have learned. The Marksmanship Course provides graduates of Young Guns the opportunity to further develop their shooting skills. The Fall 2024 Junior Shooting Class flyer has been posted on the Young Guns website. The Young Guns brochure, Basic Course Application (new shooters), and Marksmanship Course Application are also available on the website. The cost for students is \$30. It is never too early to sign up, so send in your youth's application today! The Fall 2024 classes start with Marksmanship on Wednesday September 11 and Young Guns on Thursday September 12.

The JSSP needs Instructors and Range Safety Officers (RSOs) to support the program, ensuring quality instruction and a safe range for the students. A tentative schedule has been set for holding NRA Basic Pistol, NRA Basic Rifle, and NRA Basic RSO Courses this summer. The scheduled courses are based on interest and number of student signups, a minimum of four students are needed for each course at least two weeks prior to the course date (to allow for ordering materials from the NRA). The cost for each course is \$60 and covers: all materials, range time, firearm use, ammunition, and lunch. The courses scheduled are:

The United States Merchant Marine is an organization composed of United States civilian mariners and U.S. civilian and federally owned merchant vessels. Both the civilian mariners and the merchant vessels are managed by a combination of the government and private sectors, and engage in commerce or transportation of goods and services in and out of the navigable waters of the United States. The Merchant Marine primarily transports domestic and international cargo and passengers during peacetime, and operate and maintain deepsea merchant ships, tugboats, towboats, ferries, dredges, excursion vessels, charter boats and other waterborne craft on the oceans, the Great Lakes, rivers, canals, harbors, and other waterways. In times of war, the Merchant Marine can be an auxiliary to the United States Navy, and can be called upon to deliver military personnel and materiel for the military. The Military Sealift Command still operates supply ships for the US Navy with a USNS designation for the ship.

Bringing A Little South to the West

There was something about my 16th year of living on this earth. Blame it on hormones, or the anti-war movement, hippies, the age of the love child, or any number of things, but the bottom line I was not pleasant to be around for much of that year. Then I, along with brother Bubba joined a Golden Gloves program conducted by the Memphis Police Department. I think that helped change my attitude...for a short while.

I was never really good at boxing, although I had plenty of practice. Growing up, whenever Bubba and I had a dispute over something (which was often), Dad would make us put on a pair of boxing gloves and take it outside. He would serve as referee and we'd go at each other. Bubba was a little taller than me and pretty quick. Being a year older, I guess I was also a little intimidated by fighting an older person. Boxing, like in many other sports, you can lose the match if not mentally prepared. And most of the time I was not. That gave Bubba a clear advantage and left me getting knocked to the ground in most bouts. Normally, when one of us hit the dirt, the fight was over. Thinking back, it never really did solve whatever our dispute was to begin with, but it quite often made us forget what our original fight was about, so I guess that was Dad's plan all along.

But the one thing it did teach me was pugilistic basics. So, when Bubba and I joined the Golden Gloves team at the Police Department, I had an edge in a few different ways. I understood the basics for boxing, moving, jabbing, and I was also a southpaw. Most of the fighters in my Lightweight Class didn't know how to fight a southpaw, and I grew up fighting right-handed boxers. This actually made me pretty popular with my coaches. There was no one on our team who could best me at sparring. And finally, I felt pretty good about being able to actually win a bout.


Then the inevitable happened, I ran away from home. Growing up in my day, this was a very popular means of protest. Bubba had done it a year before me (when he was uh let me guess, 16). He stayed away for about a week and he and a buddy hitchhiked their way to Florida. I don't think Dad and Mom punished him for that excursion, but they handed down a sentence to me when I did it (and I never even left Memphis, I stayed with a friend who had his own apartment) that was about the worse punishment I could have gotten. I had to get a crew-cut. For a 16-year-old during that period, only nerds wore their hair short, and Mom and Dad knew it.

Well, when I returned home and made peace with the family, I tried to re-join the Golden Gloves team. For some reason, the Memphis City Police Department frowns on delinquents, so I was cut from the team. And to make matters worse, when the time came for the state-wide tournament, the guy who won in the Lightweight Class was on our team and a guy I had often beat sparring.

Between running away from home, getting thrown off the Golden Gloves team, and the coup de grace, I flunked the 10th grade and spent my summer in school, I was glad to survive my high school sophomore year and gain a year of experience and wisdom. I got much smarter when I turned 17. Notice I didn't say I got smart, I just got smarter. But the bar wasn't very high, so I guess that really doesn't say much.

I believe I learned some very valuable life lessons at 16. And it has served me well. I've never once ran away from home since being married to Jackie and never even thought about doing so. I don't think I could stand another crew-cut.






Walk of Honor

- What are the costs for the individual bricks? Prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering desired but typically range from \$75 to \$200, depending on size.
- What are the costs for the corporate/veteran supporter bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$125 to \$500.



- What is the difference between individual and corporate bricks? Individual bricks are for veterans and family members wishing to purchase a brick to honor their veterans. The corporate bricks are for our veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who want to show their continued support for our nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the brick purchase restricted to members of the Post 209 families? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves for their veteran loved ones or to show their support for our veterans.
- Where do I go to buy a brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit <u>http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209</u> to buy your brick. The site is user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. In addition, you will see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How do I pay for the brick? We have the site set up to accept payment via PayPal or check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick, and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where will the brick be shipped? All bricks will be sent to the post. We will notify you when it arrives, and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What will become of my brick? It will be placed near the flagpole at the post in the area we call the Walk of Honor.
- **How long will this fundraiser effort last?** We plan to continue selling bricks until the Walk of Honor is covered with personalized bricks.
- Will I have an opportunity to buy a brick later? Quite possibly, depending on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.
