From our Post Historian

In our nation's military history, the month of December has often presented, as Thomas Paine phrased it, "times that try men's souls." American prospects looked dim in December 1776, as General Washington's ragged Continental army was in retreat, having endured months of crushing defeats; the majority of army enlistments were due to expire at year's end. By order of General Washington, Paine's stirring words from *The Crisis* were read to the men:



These are the times that try men's souls. The summer soldier and the sunshine patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of his country; but he who stands it now, deserves the love and thanks of man and woman. Tyranny, like hell, is not easily conquered; yet...the harder the conflict, the more glorious the triumph.

In the late hours of Christmas day 1776, General Washington's 2400 American troops crossed the icy Delaware River to launch a successful surprise attack on Hessian forces at their winter quarters in Trenton, NJ. Though only a modest military victory, it nonetheless provided a critical morale boost to the American cause, and enabled Washington to persuade his men to extend their enlistments another month.

The 20th century also presented many soul-trying December episodes in American military history.

Perhaps the most notable was "a date which will live in infamy." On 7 December 1941, after months of secret preparation, Japanese carriers launched hundreds of dive bombers in a "dastardly attack" on the American naval and air base at Pearl Harbor, killing 2403 Americans, damaging or destroying 21 U.S. ships and over 300 aircraft. Within 24 hours, Japanese forces conducted an extensively coordinated attack on British and American bases throughout the Pacific Theater. Days later, Hitler also declared war on the



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United States, and America suddenly found itself in a global conflict with two of the most formidable military powers on Earth.



Three years later, on 16 December 1944, as Allied forces were confidently looking to advance into Germany, Hitler's Panzers launched a surprise counteroffensive in the densely forested Belgian Ardennes region, creating a "bulge" (salient) in Allied lines. The six-week "Battle of the Bulge" was one of the deadliest American battles of WWII, resulting in over 90,000 U.S. casualties.

By mid-October 1950, the Korean War seemed all but over, as United Nations (predominantly American) forces had nearly destroyed the communist Korean People's Army and advanced through the North. In early December 1950, however, American military gains in the Korean War were dramatically erased, ending hopes of an early victory and reunification of the peninsula. Vastly

outnumbered by an influx of six Chinese divisions at the "Frozen" Chosin Reservoir, the 1st Marine Division (U.S. X Corps) conducted a heroic fighting withdrawal in brutal sub-zero conditions. Seventeen Medals of Honor were awarded to members of the "Chosin Few."

In December 1969, President Nixon announced that because of his "Vietnamization" plan to decrease U.S. troop presence, the war in Vietnam was "reaching a conclusion." As the war continued three years later, Nixon ordered a massive B-52 bombing campaign (Linebacker II) over North Vietnam in December 1972. Derided by critics as "Christmas bombings," the campaign prompted a ceasefire and the negotiated U.S. troop withdrawal from Vietnam in 1973.

Enough of the "soul-trying" stuff – let's look at some encouraging December history now!

In December 1943, Past National Commander Harry Colmery was tasked with drafting the blueprint for comprehensive post-war veterans' assistance legislation. Colmery's hand-written draft on Mayflower Hotel stationary, displayed today at The American Legion headquarters in Indianapolis, formed the basis for what would become the 1944 Servicemen's Readjustment Act, popularly known as the "G.I. Bill of Rights."

The modern aviation age was born on 17 December 1903, when Orville and Wilber Wright successfully piloted the first heavierthan-air, controlled powered aircraft at Kitty Hawk, NC.

As the commander of NASA's final lunar mission, Apollo 17, Navy Captain Gene Cernan became the last human to set foot on the surface of the moon on 13 December 1972.

The Continental Air Defense Command Center (later NORAD) in Colorado Springs, employing its network of early warning radars, first started tracking Santa's

Christmas eve toy delivery missions on 24 December 1955.

The Post 209 Honor Guard had a couple of big events scheduled in November. The first event was the Colorado Springs Veterans Day Parade. Unfortunately, the major snow event the week leading up to the parade necessitated the Post withdrawing from the parade out of concerns for safety. The Post 209 Honor Guard also had the honor and privilege to provide the Final Honors for a dear friend of the Post, Robert "Bobby" Rydell. The service was held at Pikes Peak National Cemetery on Wednesday November 20, 2024. Eleven Honor Guard team members provided Full Final Honors, which included: seven rifles firing three rifle volleys, live TAPS, and the folding/presentation of the American Flag to Bobby's mother, Helen (also a Post 209 member). As part of our custom when performing Final Honors, the Honor Guard presented three expended rounds to Bobby's mother (and also to Bobby's siblings) that were engraved with DUTY, HONOR, COUNTRY to signify the three rifle volleys and the Veteran's dedication to Duty, Honor, Country. As an Army veteran, Bobby lived up to those three important words in ways that few people ever achieve. Bobby was an inspiration to many of the Post Family members, always there to help in any way he could, and will be always fondly remembered.

There is a lot happening on Saturday December 14, 2024: Wreaths Across America in the morning, the Army/Air Force game (Go Army!) starting at 13:00 (1:00pm for the Air Force (3)), and the Post Annual Holiday Potluck and Christmas Party starting at 15:00 (again, 3:00pm for the Air Force). As usual, the Honor Guard will be supporting the annual Wreaths Across America



ceremony at Pikes Peak National Cemetery by providing the Rifle Volleys and the playing of TAPS. The event starts promptly at 9:00am on Saturday December 14, 2024. With everything going on, people are obviously quite busy that day. Still, I hope everyone can make it out to PPNC for such an important and rewarding event.

The American Legion Neal Thomas, Jr. Centennial Post 209 is the largest post in the Department of Colorado, the most active post in the Pikes Peak Region (and probably Department), and (in my biased opinion) the best post in The American Legion. The are many very active posts across the nation, but how many posts right now can state, in addition to the so many programs being supported (too many for Post 209 to list), that they have as part of their active membership a: Past National Commander (Tom Bock); Past National Chaplain (Stan Hamamoto); and a Future National Commander (Jay Bowen; if he "doesn't screw up and stays out of trouble":). While the Post 209 membership also has a lot of Post, District, Department, and National level participation and is well known in the community, one thing is lacking from the Post's history – a Color Guard entry at the National Convention. We have tried in the past to put together a Color Guard to take to the National Convention, but have not received enough interest or support from the Post 209 membership. Out of a Post Family with somewhere around 1,200 members, we need a minimum of four members (preferably five) to submit a Color Guard for the competition. If the members are all Legion members, the Color Guard could compete to become the National Commander's Color Guard. This is something that multiple posts have done repeatedly over the years (e.g., Newport Harbor Post 291 for the past 4 years straight), yet we have not tried even once. There would be a lot of hard work involved, but after watching many of the videos of the past competitions, I know we have the capability to beat them. There are at least a dozen (most likely more than twice that) Post 209 members that I personally know of with the capability and drive to make it happen. While Tampa Bay (2025) would be a stretch, it still could be possible. Louisville (2026) and Kansas City (2027) are definitely within reach. Are there at least three or four Post 209 members willing to give it a try? Imagine how cool it would be for the Post 209 Color Guard to present newly elected Jay Bowen's colors in Louisville. Please reach out and let me know, nothing can ever happen without at least having some discussion.

As we close out the year, the Honor Guard wishes the members of the Post 209 Family a joyful holiday season and a very Happy New Year! We hope everyone enjoys time with their family and friends. We look forward to seeing everyone next year and continuing to provide our support as much as possible.

From our Junior Shooting Sports Program

The Young Guns Basic Course provides youth ages 10-18 years old (boys and girls) the opportunity to learn about firearms safety and basic shooting skills. During Young Guns, credentialed National Rifle Association (NRA) Basic Rifle Instructors teach the safe handling of firearms, shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing), how to zero a rifle, and how to score targets. At the end of the course, the youth have a competition shoot against the others in the course in order to show off the skills they have learned. The Marksmanship Course provides graduates of Young Guns the opportunity to further develop their shooting skills. Both courses have a credentialed NRA Range Safety Officer (RSO) overseeing the range and ensuring all activities are conducted safely and in accordance with the JSSP Range Standard Operating Procedures (SOP). There will be a JSSP Volunteer Meeting Wednesday December 4 at 6:00pm. Those interested in finding out more about the program are encouraged to attend.



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The next NRA Basic Rifle Course is tentatively going to be scheduled in early January 2025. The course is open to those at least 16 years old and legally able to own/possess a firearm. All materials, lunch, facility use, etc. are included in the course costs.

- \$50 for all "youth" 20 years and under;
- \$60 for Post 209 JSSP volunteers and Post 209 Legion Family members;
- \$90 for local junior shooting program volunteers and local Legion Family members; and
- \$120 for general public, if there are any openings remaining.

The planning for a future NRA Basic Pistol and NRA Basic Range Safety Officer Courses is also in the works for after the first of the year, more details to come when more is known.

I had asked my Dad to buy me one, but as usual his response was typically, "Boy, I'd rather live next door to someone with a motorcycle than to have one in my driveway." That was translated into "We can't afford to buy something frivolous" and/or "You'll kill yourself on those things." So, I had to be content to ride on the back of my buddy's S90 (yeah, I know there's a term for that, but it doesn't belong in this article).

One late afternoon/early evening several of us was at a Basketball game at our school. Tony was there also, as was his ride. We got bored and decided to take off and find some adventure somewhere else in the neighborhood. Tony wore a helmet, but there was not one for me. As we were leaving, a car ran a stop sign. The driver didn't see us, but we saw her...a little too late. Because we were just leaving the school, thank God we weren't going very fast. We hit her car on the passenger side near the front quarter panel. Tony flew over the car after glancing off her windshield. I was slammed into the front passenger side door area. Fortunately, neither of us was seriously hurt. Just as I was about to hit the car, I turned to my right bearing the brunt of the impact to my left shoulder and side. I don't think my head even hit the car...or at least I don't remember it happening. The Bike was totaled, but thankfully we both were able to walk away. Yeah, we were bruised, scratched, and hurt, but it could have been a lot worse.

I don't remember how I got home. I think I walked, which is how I got to the school in the first place. By the time I arrived, my left shoulder and side was hurting pretty bad. As I walked in the door, Mom immediately noticed something was wrong. I'm guessing she could tell from the painful look on my face, and maybe the tears in my shirt and black marks from the asphalt also gave her a clue. She asked what was wrong, and I explained what happened through tears of pain. She said Dad was on his way home from work so she had me lay on the couch. When Dad walked in the door, Mom told him I had some news. I don't know which hurt worse, the accident or telling Dad what happened. As my story ended, he just looked at me and said, "So, do you still want one of them iron horses?" I sheepishly replied, "Absolutely!" That was a lie and I think he knew it.

Mom took me to the Emergency Room and after X-Rays, they determined I just had some bruises. I had to wear my left arm in a sling for a couple of weeks, which was okay. It was like having battle scars.

That ended my great love affair for motorcycles. I still admire them, but from afar. I have ridden the occasional dirt bike on ranches and farms, but there's not much danger of a car pulling out in front of me in a pasture or a field. I also love to ride 4-wheelers, again off-road.

I pray all my buddies who ride will be VERY careful and always ride with a helmet for themselves and anyone who is riding with them. Hopefully, God will watch over all of them as He did with me and Tony.




Walk of Honor

- What are the costs for the individual bricks? Prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering desired but typically range from \$75 to \$200, depending on size.
- What are the costs for the corporate/veteran supporter bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$125 to \$500.
- What is the difference between individual and corporate bricks? Individual bricks are for veterans and family members



wishing to purchase a brick to honor their veterans. The corporate bricks are for our veteranfriendly supporters and businesses who want to show their continued support for our nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.

- Is the brick purchase restricted to members of the Post 209 families? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves for their veteran loved ones or to show their support for our veterans.
- Where do I go to buy a brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit <u>http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209</u> to buy your brick. The site is user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. In addition, you will see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How do I pay for the brick? We have the site set up to accept payment via PayPal or check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick, and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where will the brick be shipped? All bricks will be sent to the post. We will notify you when it arrives, and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What will become of my brick? It will be placed near the flagpole at the post in the area we call the Walk of Honor.
- How long will this fundraiser effort last? We plan to continue selling bricks until the Walk of Honor is covered with personalized bricks.
- Will I have an opportunity to buy a brick later? Quite possibly, depending on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.
