Great news for Legionnaires in Colorado!!! On Saturday, 25 January, we approved a new Department of Colorado Constitution and By-Laws and elected a new slate of Department officers. These were two critical steps in getting the Department charter reinstated, and kicks off the process to obtain a National Executive Committee vote to reinstate the charter. That will probably occur this coming May. Our Post played important roles in getting this done, including having three members on the team to produce the initial draft of the C&B and one delegate of the 26 Legionnaires elected to produce the draft that went before membership at the Department special convention. The document passed the final vote with only one no vote out of all members present. It was awesome to see Legionnaires from many Districts and Posts across Colorado come together, working hard to knock this crucial task out of the ballpark.

I am looking forward to seeing everyone at the dinners, events and membership meeting for February. Don't forget to come on down to the Post on Sunday 9 February to enjoy the SUPERBOWL! The Post will open at 3pm ahead of the 4:30pm kickoff for the match between the Chiefs and the Eagles. This will be pot-luck format, so bring food to share. The lounge will be open, and the game will be pushed throughout the Post via our A/V system. If you want something to do while watching the game, it will be on in the game room and there will be a painting class in the AUX-SAL room for \$10. Veterans from the UCCS, CTU and Pikes Peak State College Student Veterans Organization chapters have been invited to join us, so this is a great opportunity to get to know some great new folks as well.

Facility-wise, in December we experienced some component failures with the rooftop heating unit that services our lounge, dining room and meeting room. Thanks to one of our members with HVAC expertise, we were able to identify the failing components, get them replaced, and then troubleshoot it until we got the unit back online before the most recent big freeze in January. On a final note, thanks to the very generous donation from one of our members, the Post received a new (to us) Honda Ridgeline. Through the additional efforts from members and some additional funds, together with a trade of our UTV, the Ridgeline is now fully road safe and equipped with a plow to provide a much more effective plowing capability for the parking lot area that will make it much easier, quicker, and most importantly SAFER to clear snow at the Post. We owe a huge THANK YOU to our members who have contributed and worked so hard to keep our post home in tip-top shape and mission ready!

The American Legion's federal charter requires the submission of an annual report to Congress on activities for the year. The Consolidated Post Report (CPR) was established for Posts to document external activities, such as volunteer and fundraising efforts, funeral honors, and youth programs. This information is used when National Commander makes their report to Congress.

The areas on the CPR where I need your help to complete are VA&R (Veteran Affairs & Rehabilitation), National Security, Americanism, Community Service Hours. Some examples are for Legion programs like donating blood, Boys State, Legion baseball, Honor Guard, etc. They can also be for things you do not just for the Legion; such as Toy Runs, volunteering at church, Veterans Stand Down, roadside cleanup, Vets4Vets runs, museum docent, etc.

To assist with this, I will send out a tracking sheet in the next 411. It is an easy way for you to track and report your activities, and for me to consolidate all the activities. Please watch for it and use it. If you do not know which block to check, I can do that for you if you give the activity a good description. The key is to just report it, no matter how small or if you think it matters. The reporting period is 1 June 2022 through 31 May, but I must submit it in the first week of June, so please get it to me as soon as you have completed your activities for the year so that I have time to compile all the data. The American Legion as a whole is really bad about reporting all the good we do.

Lastly; if you have not renewed your membership for 2025, it expired on December 31^{st} . I am in the office on most Mondays from 9:30 - 3:00. If you want to come by and talk with me or bring your renewal to the Post, you can do so at that time or see me at one of the Friday dinners.

Thanks for all you do to help Veterans and the Post.

As of 01/21/2025 Post 209, National has us as having 848 current members. That is 78% of our 1,088 membership goal for 2025. This puts us behind our quota for this period of time. Moses heeded his father-in-law's advice thereby increasing his efficiency and better serving his people.

We may want to believe that we are capable of handling the load all on our own. But if wisdom prevails we'll recognize the limits of our abilities. Sharing our efforts with others will ease our burdens and multiply the quantity the work we accomplish.

So, I leave you with this final thought. A poem by J. David Branon:

God's people have so much to do,

In serving Christ today,

If they don't share the heavy load,

They'll falter along the way.

From our Post Historian



In honor of Presidents' Day during the month of February, I want to recognize our ten Legionnaire U.S. Presidents. I hope you enjoy this look at our Commanders-in-Chief who in the last century, honorably answered the nation's call to service and <u>earned</u> the title of American military veteran.

As I write this article, U.S. flags are at half-mast to honor the passing of President James Earl Carter, Jr., who died 29 December 2024 at the age of 100. He will not be remembered as America's most effective President, but he did (in my humble opinion) lead the most admirable, honorable life of any ex-President in our nation's history. As one tribute noted, President Carter taught all of us what it means to live a life of grace, dignity, justice, and service. He was a midshipman at the U.S. Naval Academy during WWII and served in the active-duty Navy during the early years of the Cold War. He was a life-long member of the American Legion. It seems to me that his life's work exemplified so many of the tenets of the American Legion preamble. By his personal example, he modeled "individual obligation to the community, state, and nation" through his selfless service guided by his deep Christian faith. He worked to "safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom, and democracy" through his work to promote free and fair elections, advocating for political, civil, and human rights for oppressed peoples around the world. His ceaseless works to "promote peace and goodwill on Earth" were recognized by the award of the Nobel Peace Prize in 2002. The citation noted "his decades of untiring effort to find peaceful solutions to international conflicts, to advance democracy and human rights, and to promote economic and social development." We honor the passing of a true servant-leader, James Earl Carter, Jr. Thank you for your service.

James E. Carter, U.S. Navy Home Post: American Legion Post 2 Americus, GA.

James "Jimmy" Carter graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1946 and completed two years surface ship duty aboard USS *Wyoming*, before requesting assignment to submarine duty. LT Carter then served as executive officer, electronics repair officer, and engineering officer aboard USS *Pomfret* (SS-391) and



USS *Barracuda* (SSK-1). In 1952, he was hand-picked by Admiral Rickover to help implement the nuclear-powered submarine program. Carter was preparing to become engineering officer for one of the first atomic powered submarines, USS *Seawolf* (SSN-575), when notified of his father's death in July 1953. Carter made the difficult choice to resign his Naval commission and return to Plains, Georgia to manage the family peanut farming business. The *Seawolf*-class attack submarine *Jimmy Carter* (SSN-23) is named in his honor.

Harry S. Truman, U.S. Army Home Post: American Legion Post 21 Independence, MO.

At the age of 33, Harry Truman, as a member of the Missouri National Guard, volunteered for service with the American Expeditionary Force in the First World War, and served in France as a field artillery battery commander with the 35th Division. Upon returning to the States, he was a founding member of one of the first American Legion posts in Missouri. He remained active in the Army reserve and was eventually promoted to Colonel. Upon the untimely death of President F.D. Roosevelt in April 1945, Truman became our first Legionnaire U.S. President; company grade officer in one war, commander-in-chief in the next! The aircraft carrier USS *Harry S. Truman* (CVN-75) is named in his honor.

Dwight D. Eisenhower, U.S. Army Home Post: American Legion Post 39 Abeline, KS.

A 1915 West Point graduate, Dwight Eisenhower's First World War duties were limited to stateside training posts. During the next two decades of his army career, he served in a variety of staff positions. Despite his lack of direct combat experience, Eisenhower rose rapidly in the Second World War to Supreme Allied Commander in Europe and five-star General of the Army. He served finally as Supreme Commander of NATO forces until his retirement from the U.S. Army in 1952 and election to the presidency, making him the only career military officer to become president in the modern era. The aircraft carrier USS *Dwight D. Eisenhower* (CVN-69) is named in his honor.

John F. Kennedy, U.S. Navy Home Post: American Legion Post 281 Boston, MA.

Commissioned as an Ensign on the eve of America's entry into WWII, John Kennedy, despite medical disqualification for sea duty, was able to use family influence to gain assignment to PT (patrol torpedo) boat command in the South Pacific. LT Kennedy's PT-109 was destroyed during a 1943 engagement with a Japanese destroyer in the Solomons. His command and rescue of surviving crewmembers, despite severe wounds, received widespread recognition in popular culture, and paved the way for his political career following the war. As America's youngest

elected president, John F. Kennedy challenged citizens to national service, to "...ask what you can do for your country." The aircraft carrier USS *John F. Kennedy* (CV-67) is named in his honor.

Lyndon B. Johnson, U.S. Naval Reserve Home Post: American Legion Post 352 Blanco, TX.

As a U.S. House Representative from rural Texas, Lyndon Johnson was appointed as an officer in the U.S. Naval Reserve in 1940. Following the attack on Pearl Harbor, LCDR Johnson served briefly on active duty, performing naval inspection duties in the Pacific theater. When all members of Congress serving in the armed forces were ordered to resume their legislative responsibilities in 1942, Johnson was returned to the Naval Reserve, where he was eventually promoted to commander. He remained in the Naval Reserve until he became President of the United States upon the death of John F. Kennedy. The *Zumwalt*-class destroyer USS *Lyndon B. Johnson* (DDG-1002) is named in his honor.

Richard M. Nixon, U.S. Navy Home Post: American Legion Post 51 Whittier, CA.

As a government attorney, Richard Nixon was appointed as lieutenant junior grade in the U.S. Naval Reserve in early 1942. Nixon volunteered for active sea duty and was assigned in early 1943 to the South Pacific Combat Air Transport Command at Guadalcanal. As Officer in Charge, he supervised naval air logistics throughout the Allied campaign to consolidate the Solomon Islands. He finished his wartime duties as a government contract officer; after the end of WWII, he was transferred to the Naval Reserve, and eventually promoted to commander.

Gerald R. Ford, U.S. Navy Home Post: American Legion Post 258 Grand Rapids, MI.

Gerald Ford was commissioned into the Navy following Pearl Harbor and performed stateside instructor duties before being assigned to the new light aircraft carrier USS *Monterey* in 1943. He served aboard *Monterey* as navigation officer and anti-aircraft battery officer through December 1944, participating in dozens of carrier strike actions in the Pacific Theater. Ford finished his wartime service in the Naval Reserve Training Command with the rank of Lieutenant Commander. The aircraft carrier USS *Gerald R. Ford* (CVN 78) is named in his honor.

Ronald W. Reagan, U.S. Army Air Forces American Legion Post 283 Palisades, CA.

Home

Ronald Reagan first enlisted in the U.S. Army Reserve in 1937 as he was pursuing a Hollywood acting career before WWII. He was commissioned and transferred to the Army Air Forces as a public relations officer with the Los Angeles film production unit of the U.S. Army Air Forces during WWII. Throughout his wartime military service, he acted in and produced over 400 training films. He separated from active duty in December 1945 with the rank of Captain. The aircraft carrier USS Ronald Reagan (CVN-76) is named in his honor.

George H.W. Bush, U.S. Navy Home Post: American Legion Post 77 Houston, TX.

George H.W. Bush enlisted in the Navy on his 18th birthday and after completing flight training, was commissioned as an ensign, making him one of the youngest American naval aviators of WWII. LT Bush served aboard the aircraft carrier USS San Jacinto in the Pacific Theater as a Grumman Avenger torpedo bomber pilot. He flew 58 combat missions and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for a bombing mission in which his plane was heavily damaged by Japanese antiaircraft fire, forcing Bush and his crew to bail out in the open sea before crashing and eventual rescue. The aircraft carrier USS George H.W. Bush (CVN-77) is named in his honor.

George W. Bush, Texas Air National Guard Home Post: American Legion Post 77 Houston, TX.

George W. Bush was commissioned in the Texas Air National Guard in 1968 and after two years of flight training, was assigned as a Convair F-102 fighter-interceptor pilot. Bush performed part-time ANG duties for the next three years and was honorably discharged in 1973 as a captain.

We need candidates to fill Post officers' positions for the 2025 - 2026 year. All positions are open but there are a few running for re-election. These are the positions that are wide open: Adjutant, Sr. Vice Commander, Jr. Vice Commander, Historian, and Chaplain. If anyone is interested in filling one of these



positions, please contact Stanley Hamamoto at <u>pastorstan41228@gmail.com</u>, Marvin Weaver at <u>weavermr@q.com</u>, or Jeff Heischman at <u>jeffheman@netzero.net</u>. Tell them what position you are interested in, your full name, and telephone number. American Legion Post 209 has many members who have been in these position in the past and they are always there to help you when asked. Even the current members who now fill these positions will gladly help you when asked.

For your convenience, here's a short description of all officer positions:

Commander: You are entrusted with supervising the duties of all other officers of the Post. You are the presiding officer at all meetings, and you must familiarize yourself with the policies and traditions of your Post and The American Legion.

Adjutant: Also known as the "First Sergeant." You are the Secretary of the Post. Post activities will revolve around you. The Adjutant is the Post personnel officer; maintains membership records, and minutes of meetings, checks up, and assists with the work of the other officers and Committees. In addition, you publish official orders, announcements, and instructions.

Senior Vice Commander: Your primary role is membership. No Post can survive without a strong membership. You should be familiar with ceremonial protocols for regular meetings. A Vice Commander must be ready to fill in for the Commander upon a moment's notice.

Junior Vice Commander: You must be ready to promote your Post. The Commander will depend on you to provide programs that spice up the meetings and attract attendance. You should contact other veteran and civic organizations so that each patriotic holiday and observance receives the attention it deserves. You are concerned with the pageantry of The American Legion. You should also be concerned with the welfare of all fellow veterans and Veteran Affairs and Rehabilitation Committees.

Finance Officer: You will serve as chair of the Finance Committee and will be responsible for receiving and disbursing Post funds. You will work closely with the Post Adjutant in all matters related to the finances of your Post.

Service Officer: You should be a dedicated person with a deep interest in fellow veterans, the Post, and the community. You are responsible for bringing to the attention of all veterans and their dependents the rights and benefits granted by law. You must know how to utilize the expert services available through Legion channels and local agencies. You should be ready to visit dependents upon a service member's death. You may be called upon to serve as chair of the Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Committee, working with children and youth committees, or making hospital visitations and appointed by the Commander-elect.

Chaplain: You must be a person capable of moral and intellectual leadership. You work closely with all other Officers of the Post. You should attend all meetings of the Post and Executive Committee. When requested, you should be ready to officiate at the funerals of members. The Chaplain must also be prepared to serve the bereaved families of Post members.

Sergeant-at-Arms: You should know how to arrange the meeting hall and assist the Post Commander and Adjutant. You are the custodian of the Colors and in charge of Colors details during presentation and retirement ceremonies. You should know how to display flags and their proper presentation. You are also responsible for maintaining order at all meetings.



Historian: You are responsible for preserving and compiling our Post's records/photos (specifically through our Scrapbook and website). It would help if you tried to attend Department Conventions and keep in touch with other Post Historians. [You are only encouraged to attend, not required.]

Post Executive Committeeman: You are a voting member of the Post Executive Committee and are entrusted with the government and management of the Post. You shall be responsible for representing the interests of the general membership to the Executive Committee.

Judge Advocate: You provide professional advice in conducting Post business or assist in procuring proper counsel. You are the interpreter of the Constitution and By-Laws of our Post. You may be asked to assist in auditing Post financial accounts, appointed by the Commander-elect.

"The primary mission of The American Legion Neal Thomas Jr. Centennial Post 209 Honor Guard is to support Final Honors for Our Veterans, which is then followed by supporting Our Post and Our Community. The members of the Honor Guard showed very strong support in all mission areas by supporting 72 events during the 2024 calendar year. Of the 72 events supported, 68 of those events were Final Honors for Our Veterans, one (1) Presentation of Colors event for Our Community, two (2) ceremonies for Pikes Peak National Cemetery supporting Memorial Day and Wreaths Across America, and one (1) ceremony for our Post supporting the Post Everlasting Ceremony.

One member of the Honor Guard stands out in providing support to Our Veterans, Our Post, and Our Community – Jeff Heischman. Jeff joined the Honor Guard in November 2023 when answering a call for anyone willing to support even just one event a month, because that one event might be the one that the Honor Guard cannot support without another available member. This year Jeff has become much more than a "one event a month" Honor Guard member. Out of the 72 events the Honor Guard supported in 2024,



Jeff supported 63 of those events. Final Honors for Our Veterans accounted for 60 of the events, 88% of the total Final Honors performed by the Honor Guard. Jeff was that one "available member" for 31 of those Final Honors, ensuring those Veterans received the Honors they earned and deserved. Our Veterans, Our Post, and Our Community are very lucky to have Jeff as a member of The American Legion Neal Thomas Jr. Centennial Post 209 Honor Guard."

The Honor Guard continues to be the regular Honor Guard at Pikes Peak National Cemetery. Here is the article that was submitted to The American Legion National website to recognize the Honor Guard's continuing contributions:

"The American Legion Neal Thomas Jr. Centennial Post 209 Honor Guard was afforded the privilege to support a very unique event this month, a "Green Burial". Green Burials, or Natural Burials, are an increasing choice for many when planning for funeral services and interment. This includes a growing number of Veterans, enough that Congress passed a law allowing for the establishment of green burial sections in national cemeteries. From the National Cemetery Administration (NCA) website:

- "Generally, "green burial" refers to more environmentally friendly methods of burial that refrain from the use of chemicals, concrete vaults, and other non-biodegradable materials. These methods are also referred to as "natural burial." For more information about green burial, you may wish to visit the Green Burial Council's website (https://www.greenburialcouncil.org).
- "Congress gave VA the authority to establish green burial sections in its national cemeteries through Public Law (P.L.) 117-355, the National Cemeteries Preservation and Protection Act of 2022. VA sought this authority so it could provide a more environmentally sustainable burial option for Veterans and their eligible dependents in national cemeteries."
- "NCA will maintain green burial sections to have a natural appearance and will use native grasses and plants to differentiate them from other sections in the cemetery. NCA will mark the gravesites in green burial sections with a flat granite marker that is distinct from other markers in the national cemetery to complement the section's desired natural appearance and to be consistent with green burial practices."
- "In November 2024, VA's National Cemetery Administration (NCA) officially opened Green Burial sections at the Pikes Peak National Cemetery in Colorado Springs, Colorado; the National Memorial Cemetery of Arizona in Phoenix, Arizona, and Florida National Cemetery in Bushnell, Florida. The number of green burial sites at each cemetery are 152, 155 and 222, respectively." (https://news.va.gov/)

On Monday January 6, 2025, as one of the first three national cemeteries with a Green Burial section, the Pikes Peak National Cemetery held the first green burial in a national cemetery. The Post 209 Honor Guard was requested to provide the rifle volleys for Army veteran Gerald Riley's Final Honors. In addition to local organizations (e.g., The Honor Bell Foundation), there were individuals from Washington, D.C. in attendance, signifying the important step in the NCA's implementation of green burials and green burial sections."

The JSSP still needs Instructors, RSOs, and Volunteers to support the program to ensure the continuation of quality instruction and a safe range for the students taking part in the program(s).

The Young Guns Basic Course provides youth ages 10-18 years old (boys and girls) the opportunity to learn about firearms safety and basic shooting skills. During Young Guns, credentialed National Rifle Association (NRA) Basic Rifle Instructors teach the safe handling of firearms, shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing), how to zero a rifle, and how to score targets. At the end of the course, the youth have a competition shoot against the others in the course in order to show off the skills they have learned. The Marksmanship Course provides graduates of Young Guns the opportunity to further develop their shooting skills. Both courses have a credentialed NRA Range Safety Officer (RSO) overseeing the range and ensuring all activities are conducted safely and in accordance with the JSSP Range Standard Operating Procedures (SOP). All sailors are trained in firefighting. Not all though participate on a regular basis. Everyone on a ship has been through the training. The reason being that if a fire happens on a ship, it could be catastrophic if not put out quickly. Remember that ship is your ride home so you need to know what to do when the time comes. On bigger ships they have a division that is the fire party when out to sea. When in port the daily duty section has their own "in-port fire party". Just because you work in personnel does not mean you cannot be detailed to the in-port fire party. I served for two years as the access and overhaul member on my duty section in port fire party. We would have a fire drill every day that we had duty and my job was to access the space for the hose team to extinguish the fire. I would then come in and make sure it was completely out and no hot spots remained.

Growing up, my three siblings and I had a pretty strict weekday 9:00pm bedtime curfew. As we got older and into our teens where we could drive, the curfew was relaxed on Friday's and Saturday's to 10:00pm, and sometimes 10:30pm upon request for a special event such as going to a drive-in movie. But, if we weren't out running the streets at night, we made certain were home in time for our "7:30pm snack."

This was a BIG treat for us. The time was just a target, but it was kept pretty close to that. Regardless of the start time, it was called our "7:30 snack."

This was special for all of us, not just the kids. Mom and Dad also waited for the 7:30 snack before they would indulge. And the treat varied from something sweet to anything we could find in the Fridge or cupboard that could be eaten as a snack. It was one of the few times we didn't all have to eat the same thing. That in itself was a treat!

Even though our snack varied, often we would follow Dad's lead. One of his favorites (and mine) was a glass of milk with left-over corn bread crushed in the glass. The difference between his choice and mine was he more often than not poured Butter Milk in his glass. I have NEVER developed a taste for Butter Milk so I would opt for plain ole milk. Once that corn bread soaked up the milk, it was GREAT!

Another one of Dad's favorite (and ours) was to take a bag of fresh peanuts still in the shell, spread them out on a flat cooking pan and put them in the oven to roast. When he did this, Dad knew he would have to make certain there was enough for all of us. Rarely did Dad wait for the peanuts to cool down. He would take them out of the oven, select 3 or 4 and just bounce them from hand to hand almost like a juggler, until they cooled just enough to not burn his mouth. We did the same.

Nowadays, on the occasion I have a 7:30 snack, it typically consists of a shot of Crown, Jack, or Jamison. It's still good, but I don't put the shot in the oven to roast (Jackie gets mad when I do that) and I don't put corn bread in the glass. And I don't always wait until 7:30. But I'm still pretty good with the 9:00pm bedtime curfew.



If YES to 2 or 3, seek behavioral healthcare for further evaluation. If the answer to 4, 5 or 6 is YES, get <u>immediate help</u>: Call or text 988, call 911 or go to the emergency room. <u>STAY WITH THEM</u> until they can be evaluated.






Walk of Honor

- What are the costs for the individual bricks? Prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering desired but typically range from \$75 to \$200, depending on size.
- What are the costs for the corporate/veteran supporter bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$125 to \$500.
- What is the difference between individual and corporate bricks? Individual bricks are for veterans and family members wishing to purchase a brick to honor their veterans. The corporate bricks are for our veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who want to show their continued support for our nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.



- Where do I go to buy a brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit <u>http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209</u> to buy your brick. The site is user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. In addition, you will see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- **How do I pay for the brick?** We have the site set up to accept payment via PayPal or check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick, and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where will the brick be shipped? All bricks will be sent to the post. We will notify you when it arrives, and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What will become of my brick? It will be placed near the flagpole at the post in the area we call the Walk of Honor.
- How long will this fundraiser effort last? We plan to continue selling bricks until the Walk of Honor is covered with personalized bricks.
- Will I have an opportunity to buy a brick later? Quite possibly, depending on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.
