On a totally separate subject -**IMPORTANT ADJUTANT NOTICE-**

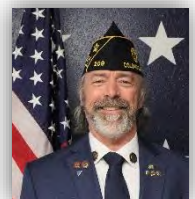

From our Post Historian

Bruce Charles Walker from Pueblo, Colorado, was commissioned as an Air Force officer in 1969. After completion of flight training, 1st Lt Walker was assigned to the 20th Tactical Air Support Squadron, Da Nang, South Vietnam, as an OV-10A Bronco forward air control pilot.

On 7 April 1972, Lt Walker and forward air observer, Marine Corps Lt Larry Potts, were flying their OV-10A, call-sign "Covey 282," in support of a massive search-and-rescue mission to recover Air Force Lt Col Gene Hambleton, call-sign "Bat-21 Bravo." Hambleton was the only surviving crewmember of an Air Force EB-66 Destroyer flying escort for B-52 bombers, shot down just south of the DMZ. Hambleton eluded capture from thousands of enemy forces for nearly 12 days while the United States conducted one of the costliest search-and-rescue missions in American history trying to rescue him. Although Hambleton was ultimately rescued, 11 servicemen were killed and two were captured during the nearly two-week effort. The two captured were Lieutenants Walker and Potts.



Another Forward Air Control pilot in the area observed the launch of a North Vietnamese surface-to-air missile (SAM), which struck Walker's aircraft. Both crewmen ejected, and search and rescue forces sighted two parachutes. Both made radio contact relaying their positions. It is believed that Potts was likely captured shortly after reaching the ground; later intelligence investigations indicated that he was taken into North Vietnamese custody, and that he was shot and killed during a subsequent escape attempt.



Lieutenant Walker evaded capture for 11 days, and remained in consistent contact with search and rescue personnel who managed to drop him extra survival gear while attempting to guide him toward a safe extraction location. On April 18, Walker's last radio transmission was to call off the rescue aircraft overhead, saying "they've got me and are shooting at me." Walker too, was captured alive, according to intelligence sources, and the North Vietnamese took him north across the DMZ to a prison facility in North Vietnam.

But when North Vietnam released American POWs one year later, none of the former prisoners knew anything about Walker's fate.

Both Walker and Potts were promoted to Captain while listed as "missing in action." In 1980, the Department of Defense transitioned their status to "killed in action, body not recovered." Potts and Walker became the 12th and 13th men who sacrificed their lives to save Hambleton. They are memorialized on the Courts of the Missing at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific. Bruce C. Walker's name is inscribed along with all his fallen comrades on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington, DC.

Thank you for your service, Bruce – You are not forgotten.

After graduating from Pueblo Centennial High School, Drew Dix enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1962 at the age of 17. He eventually earned entry into the Green Berets, and by 1968, Staff Sergeant Dix was deployed to Vietnam as a Special Forces adviser working on a CIA project in the provincial capital of Chau Phu near the Cambodian border. His mission was to coordinate intelligence-gathering with a company sized unit composed mainly of indigenous Vietnamese and Cambodians. Their task was to capture Viet Cong soldiers for interrogation.

On 31 January 1968, in the midst of the Tet Offensive, two heavily armed Viet Cong battalions attacked the Province capital city of Chau Phu resulting in the complete breakdown and fragmentation of the defenses of the city. Though outnumbered at least thirty to one, Dix led a small contingent of troops in a harrowing fifty-six hour

battle against two Viet Cong battalions. Determined to rescue the civilians and restore Chau Doc Province, Dix took matters into his own hands.

He saved an American nurse, eight USAID volunteers, two Filipino workers, a young Vietnamese girl and the wife and children of the Province Chief. The following day, Staff Sergeant Dix, still on his own volition, assembled a 20-man force and though under intense enemy fire, the team assaulted enemy strongholds, secured key buildings and captured over twenty prisoners including a Viet Cong General officer who turned out to be one of the highest-ranking officials ever seized during the Vietnam War.

For his gallantry, Staff Sergeant Dix was awarded the Medal of Honor by President Lyndon B. Johnson during a ceremony at the White House on 19 January, 1969. He was the first Special Forces enlisted man to receive the Medal of Honor. He received a direct commission to First Lieutenant and retired as a major after twenty years in the Army. Following his Army career, Dix operated an air service in Alaska, and after 9/11 served as Alaska's deputy commissioner for Homeland Security.



In 2010, he founded the Center for American Values in Pueblo, Colorado, to provide character and leadership development and promote the core values of honor, integrity, and patriotism. Drew Dix has served as president of the Congressional Medal of Honor Society and continues to speak on behalf of America's "warrior class" and advocate for veterans.

Jack of the Dust:

Jack of the Dust is an obsolete enlisted rating of the United States Navy and was used in the Navy Supply Corps. The term has its origin in the Royal Navy of the early 1800s when ship's stewards were known as "Jack-in-the-dust," referring to the dusty atmosphere created by issuing quantities of flour and dried biscuits. The US Naval rating was discontinued in the late 19th century, but the term survived as a formal title until World War II. "Jack of the Dust" is still used today on some ships as an informal title for a culinary specialist (cook) in charge of the canned goods storeroom. Every enlisted sailor is sent TAD to the mess decks after they report to help the cooks out; this is also referred to as “Mess Cranking”. Most only do 90 days but some ships do more time. My Mess Cranking time was spent with the Jack of the Dust and probably the easiest job to have while mess cranking.

And it didn't help when the ingredients called for a "tad" of this, or a "pinch" of that. After all, what is a tad? And when they would tell her to just take a small handful...okay, have you seen how small Jackie's hands are?

For those who have sampled Jackie's dishes, you know she is an AMAZING cook! But almost all her dishes are written down. Now, I'm not going to tell you she always follows the instructions every time, but she pretty well sticks closely to them. Some may be a tad off (look, I found a way to use that word!). I guess it's a southern thing to not write a recipe down. Maybe it's because many of the southern ladies are very particular about their "special dishes" and they don't want just anybody having access to the secret.

But in the south, it's not only the kitchen terms that are different. When I first retired from the US Army, Jackie and I moved to Blytheville, Arkansas, a predominantly farming town of about 20,000 on the northeast corner of the state. One fall afternoon, I commented to an older buddy who had lived in that county his entire life that I was hoping to find someone to buy some firewood. He asked, "How much do you need? A rank?" I said, "A what?" And he repeated himself. I told him I was at a loss for the amount of wood in a "Rank." He said, "Well, it's half a cord." I responded, "Oh, you mean a Rick." He looked at me like I had two heads. He said, "No, I mean a Rank. What's a Rick?" After that, we decided in the future to just refer to it as half a cord.

Oh well, I guess it's time to grab a handful of cereal, add a tad of milk, and maybe even a pinch of sugar for breakfast. Follow me for more recipes.

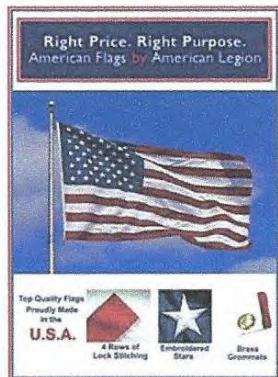
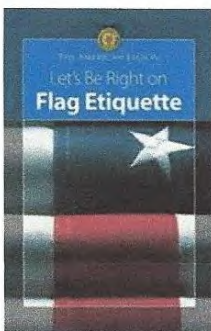

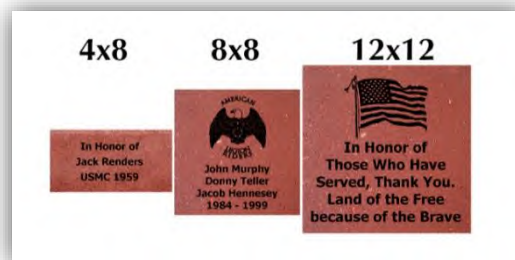

- **What are the costs for the individual bricks?** Prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering desired but typically range from \$90 to \$200, depending on size.
- **What are the costs for the corporate/veteran supporter bricks?** Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$250 to \$500.
- **What is the difference between individual and corporate bricks?** Individual bricks are for veterans and family members wishing to purchase a brick to honor their veterans. The corporate bricks are for our veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who want to show their continued support for our nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- **Is the brick purchase restricted to members of the Post 209 families?** No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves for their veteran loved ones or to show their support for our veterans.
- **Where do I go to buy a brick?** We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit <http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209> to buy your brick. The site is user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. In addition, you will see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- **How do I pay for the brick?** We have the site set up to accept payment via PayPal or check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick, and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- **Where will the brick be shipped?** All bricks will be sent to the post. We will notify you when it arrives, and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- **What will become of my brick?** It will be placed near the flagpole at the post. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- **How long will this fundraiser effort last?** We plan only to sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project.
- **Will I have an opportunity to buy a brick later?** Quite possibly, depending on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.
