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

From the desk of the Commander

According to our Post By-Laws Article IV, Section 1 and Article X, Section 4 the General Membership meeting in May is designated as our Annual Meeting and as Post Commander I am required to give a State of the Post. This report is traditionally given at the Installation Dinner. The following is a summary of the report that I gave for those of you that we not able to attend the Installation Dinner.

Overall, we are doing GREAT! We have actively supported numerous events this past year. We participated in the Colorado Springs Veteran's Day parade, and in the Memorial Day Event at Pikes Peak Veteran's Cemetery with our own Jay Bowen giving the key note address. We held a 9-11 Remembrance walk at Memorial Park starting at the Veteran's memorial walking around the park visiting the Firefighters and Police memorials. We helped the Auxiliary to prepare goodie bags to give to the Police departments and this year handed out some to the Fire departments. We helped the ALR put together Thanksgiving food baskets so that families in need had something to put on their table for Thanksgiving this past year. We held our annual Halloween party for the children of our Post and then had our second annual Trunk or Treat for the community. We continue to be very active with the Oratorical contest and Boys/Girls State. We sent two contestants to the Oratorical contest and sponsored 15 boys to Boys State and 20 girls to Girls State. This year, along with Mitchell High School and Doherty High School, we added UCCS to our ROTC awards. We presented 3 JROTC medals to Mitchell High School cadets and 1 JROTC medal to a Doherty High School cadet. We presented 2 ROTC medals this year to UCCS cadets. Our Post hosted the final leg of the Pony Express Legacy Scholarship drive again this past year for the ALR and our Post collected over \$7,000 to donate. We continue to help out veterans in need and our support for the El Paso County Homeless Stand Down along with sponsoring 4 dinners for the Temporary Housing Initiative.

In case you haven't already heard our Post won the National award for Posts over 750 members for our website and our newsletter. Thanks to Steve Hayes and Georgianna "George" Shea for the hard work they did on the website and newsletter respectively.

We were honored this year to host the Secretary of the VA for a Town Hall held at the Post concerning the PACT Act. We also were honored to host the Auxiliary President's homecoming at our Post this year. We are still the largest post in the Department with several Post members serving on the District 7 staff and at Department. The National Veterans Employment & Education Commission Chairman (Jay Bowen) is a member of our Post and we also have a Past National Commander and Former First Lady (Tom & Elaine Bock) as active members. Our SAL Squadron hosted the CWF Banquet and the Awards Banquet this year at our Post.

Our Auxiliary, SAL, and ALR are all doing GREAT as well and growing. Our Honor Guard continues to do what it does and is the "go to" Honor Guard in the area. The Junior Shooting



program continues to do well and we once again hosted the National Junior Shooting Sports dinner at the Post for contestants in town for the National Contest.

From our Chaplain

In the month of June, the most known national celebration is WWll D-Day. Do you actually know what D-Day stands for? Apparently, it's the most frequently asked question at the National World War II Museum, but the answer isn't overly simple. Many experts have varying opinions, including that the D simply stood for "day," a code used for any important military operation.

While the true meaning remains up for debate, we'll go with what U.S. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower said about it through his executive assistant, Brig. Gen. Robert Schultz: "Be advised that any amphibious operation has a 'departed date;' therefore the shortened term 'D-Day' is used." He said there were actually several other D-Days during the war — Normandy was just the biggest and most well-known.

We also celebrate Fathers Day. One of the ideas for Father's Day began when a woman heard a Mother's Day sermon and decided that she didn't want all that her dad had done for her to go unrecognized. When you think about Father's Day, what comes to your mind? Can you relate to this woman who was concerned about taking her father for granted?

God Almighty is your Heavenly Father, and He is the perfect example of what it means to be a dad. Looking at each of the letters that make up the word "father," consider some of the characteristics that set Him apart and provide a model for our human dads.

F Forgiveness is a huge part of your relationship with your Father. He is willing and able to forgive you of any sin you commit if you will only ask Him. It's comforting to know that nothing you do is ever so bad that God won't forgive you (Romans 8:38-39; 1 John 1:9). Now, that's unconditional acceptance.

A He is active in your life all the time. God is always at work around you. Ask God to show you what He is doing. You will be amazed at all that is going on. More important, the invitation is open for you to get involved with Him. You never have to wait for your turn to be active with God (John 5:17).



T Time for you. While humans get too busy to do this or that, God always has time for you. Whenever you feel lonely, struggle with a problem, want to share a thought, or need to deal with a concern, He is there for you. You can't find a time in your day when He is too busy to talk or listen to you (Jeremiah 33:3).

H The heart of the matter is that God knows your heart, and He loves you anyway. Proverbs tells us that the heart is deceitful above all things. Some people may not want to be in your life if you make mistakes. God wants to be with you anytime, and He alone is able to change your heart to be all you were created to be (1 John 4:9-10,19).

E Everywhere sums up God's place in your life. There is nowhere you can go where He isn't with you. It can be encouraging to realize that when you are in a tough place in your life, He is right there with you. Whether other people are there or not, God is by your side (Romans 8:35-39).

R Rest and Read. These are two areas where most people could use a little work. Rest is important to you because it's easy to become so busy that you don't take time with the Lord. He wants you to set aside daily time to rest in Him and to read His Word. The Bible is His letter to His children. The best way to get to know your Father is to spend quality time resting and reading all about Him in His Word (John 14:21; Psalm 46:10).

All these attributes of God's character make Him who He is. If you have been blessed with an earthly dad who has a lot in common with our Heavenly Father, be grateful. If you have missed out on a relationship with an earthly dad, be thankful that God is there for you and wants to meet the needs in your life. Let God know how much He means to you.

From our Post Historian



"Don't Give up the Ship!" were the dying words of James Lawrence, Captain of the U.S. frigate *Chesapeake*, during a 1 June 1813 battle with Royal Navy frigate *Shannon*. His devoted friend, Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry, had the sentiment sewn onto his personal battle flag and, in time, the declaration became the motto of the U.S. Navy.

The National Defense Act of 3 June 1916 authorized Congress to draft the National Guard into federal overseas service in the event of national emergency, which it invoked the next year during WW1.

The Battle of Midway (3-7 June 1942) was "the" turning point in the Pacific war with Japan. The American destruction of the Japanese carrier fleet began the costly three-year counteroffensive to push the Japanese back island by island.

6 June 1944 – "D-Day" – Operation Overlord commenced the long-anticipated WWII Allied invasion of Northwestern Europe— Allies landed nearly 150,000 troops on the Normandy coastline of France. Among those Americans in the first wave of landings on Utah and Omaha beaches was American Legion founding member, Brigadier General Theodore "Ted" Roosevelt Jr and his son, Captain Quentin Roosevelt. Awarded the Medal of Honor for his "gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty" that day, BG Ted Roosevelt's citation reads:

After two verbal requests to accompany the leading assault elements in the Normandy invasion had been denied, Brig. Gen. Roosevelt's written request for this mission was approved and he landed with the first wave of the forces assaulting the enemy-held beaches. He repeatedly led groups from the beach, over the seawall and established them inland. His valor, courage, and presence in the very front of the attack and his complete unconcern at being under heavy fire inspired the troops to heights of enthusiasm and self-sacrifice. Although the enemy had the beach under constant direct fire, Brig. Gen. Roosevelt moved from one locality to another, rallying men around him, directed and personally led them against the enemy. Under his seasoned, precise, calm, and unfaltering leadership, assault troops reduced beach strong points and rapidly moved inland with minimum casualties. He thus contributed substantially to the successful establishment of the beachhead in France.



In the distance of history, when America unashamedly asserted itself as defender of freedom and leader of the free world, President Ronald Reagan, the finest Commander-in-Chief under which your historian proudly served, stood at the Brandenburg Gate in West Berlin on 12 June 1987 and challenged the Soviet leader to "dramatically advance the cause of freedom and



peace...Mister Gorbachev, tear down this wall..." Within two years, the German people felt emboldened to confront the Communist oppressors and began dismantling the Berlin Wall and reuniting their nation.

On 14 June 1775, the Continental Congress first authorized ten companies of riflemen, drawn from different colonies, creating a "Continental Army," the forerunner of the U.S. Army.

The Continental Congress adopted a resolution on 14 June 1777 that determined "the flag of the United States be thirteen alternate stripes red and white...and the Union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new Constellation." A century later, the first "Flag Day" observance was held 14 June 1877 on the 100th anniversary of the "Stars and Stripes" adoption.



New England militiamen positioned on the high ground above Boston harbor on Bunker Hill (and Breed's Hill) faced a frontal assault of the British army on 17 June 1775. Reportedly ordered to hold their fire "until you see the whites of their eyes," the Patriot militiamen inflicted over 1000 casualties on the British army before retreating into the Boston countryside. Although considered a British victory, the Battle of Bunker Hill busted the British myth of an anticipated easy victory over "undisciplined"


American amateur soldiers.

A combined force of Sioux and Cheyenne warriors under the leadership of Sitting Bull and Crazy Horse devastated a considerable portion of George Custer's 7th Cavalry on 25 June 1876 in the worst American army defeat of the Plains Indian Wars. News of the demoralizing Battle of the

Little Bighorn reached a stunned American nation on the eve of national Centennial celebrations.

The Battle of Belleau Wood (1-26 June 1918) was the first large-scale battle fought by the American Expeditionary Force (AEF) during WW1, resulting in nearly 10,000 U.S. casualties. American Marines particularly distinguished themselves in the ferocious hand-to-hand fighting, reportedly described by their German adversaries as "Devil Dogs" (Teufel Hunden), which the USMC proudly utilized in their recruiting efforts.

30 June 1950 – President Truman ordered American forces to South Korea after the surprise Soviet-backed Communist North Korean invasion. This marked the first time the UN Security Council had approved the use of military force.




From our Sons of The American Legion Commander

From our JSSP Young Guns Captain

The Spring Junior Shooting Sports Program (JSSP) courses held their awards night on Wednesday April 19. The Young Guns course graduated eight (8) new shooters, with many of them expected to participate in the Fall 2023 Marksmanship course. The seven (7) new Marksmanship course students received their NRA Air Rifle Qualification patch. The thirteen (13) Marksmanship course students earned their rockers/tabs for a combined: seven (7) Pro-Marksman, eight (8) Marksman, and three (3) Sharpshooter. The Spring Marksmanship course ended with five (5) students actively shooting to earn their Expert qualification, a <u>VERY</u> difficult level to achieve, with one of the students being a new Marksmanship shooter for the Spring course. In a nutshell, this goes to show the level of talent these youth are exhibiting and their dedication to learning and improving shooting skills.

The Young Guns course provides youth ages 10-18 years old (boys and girls) the opportunity to learn about firearms safety and basic shooting skills. During the course, NRA Basic Rifle Instructors teach safe handling of firearms, shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing), how to zero a rifle, and how to score targets. At the end of the course, the youth have a competition shoot against the others in the course in order to show off the skills they have learned.

The JSSP needs your assistance to continue to provide the quality training opportunity to our local youth. Due to the loss of several instructors over the last couple of years, we need more instructors now more than ever. There are three courses required to become an instructor for the Post 209 Junior Shooting Sports Program: NRA Basic Rifle Course, NRA Basic Instructor Training (BIT) Course, and NRA Basic Rifle Instructor Course. In an effort to help reduce the costs associated with taking the courses, there is an NRA Basic Rifle Instructor Course scheduled for Sunday June 11 from 8:00am – 3:00pm (classroom) at Post 209 and 4:00pm-5:30pm (live fire) at Frontier Sportsman Club in Falcon. The course cost is \$50 per student to cover course costs (including training materials, lunch, and ammunition), a significant reduction as compared to other courses offered in the area. There is a minimum of four students needed to hold the course, so sign ups MUST be made not later than Wednesday May 31 to allow time for NRA materials to be ordered. An NRA BIT Course and NRA Basic Rifle Instructor Course are being worked out in coordination with a Post 209 member and local Scouting instructors, with the costs yet to be determined (though expected to be much lower than the standard costs in the area). Please feel free to contact me for more information on what an instructor's duties are for each course, costs of becoming an instructor, or any other questions you may have about the program.

The JSSP Marksmanship program is going to be adding NRA Air Pistol Qualification to the program in the Fall to students, by invitation only, already holding their Sharpshooter. This pilot program will help determine if the Air Pistol portion will continue, stay limited to selected students, or grow into its own scheduled discipline. The continuation of this trial beyond the fall will require additional NRA Pistol Instructors. Like the NRA Rifle Instructor training, the NRA Basic Pistol Course and NRA Basic Pistol Course Instructor Course are required (BIT is only required once every two (2) years). There will be more to follow on this subject in the future as the Air Pistol portion of the program is evaluated.



The Fall JSSP courses are taking applications, with a cost of \$30 per youth shooter for either course. If there is a youth interested in learning how to safely handle a firearm and basic shooting skills, they are invited to sign up for the Young Guns course. If there is a youth that has already completed the Young Guns, they are invited to sign up for the Marksmanship course. From our Honor Guard Captain

In addition to training for the support of the Honor Guard's primary mission, Final Honors, the Post 209 Honor Guard is also preparing for upcoming community events. There are already some pretty big events coming up this year that provide the Honor Guard to support our community. The Honor Guard will be supporting the Pikes Peak National Cemetery's (PPNC) Memorial Day event again this year on Monday May 29 at 10:00am. The rifle volleys will be followed by the cannons from the Colorado Military History Group, so come out to PPNC for a great event. If nothing else, you will get to see the cannons fired (which is pretty cool). The Honor Guard has also been asked to support The American Legion Post 9-11 carrying flags in the 4th of July Parade this year in Monument. A special honor for the team is being requested to do the Presentation of Colors at the annual Salute to Veterans Rally in Woodland Park on Saturday August 19. Since the number of personnel required for this event is larger than the number of team members available, we are looking into alternative solutions that will keep the Honor Guard from having to turn down this very special request.

Are you looking for a way to become involved with one (or more) of the activities at the Post? The Honor Guard team typically holds weekly meetings/practices at 6:00pm on the 1st Monday, 2nd Tuesday, 3rd Wednesday, and 4th Thursday of each month (please check the Newsletter calendar for any changes in dates). Come to the Post and check out one of the meetings, and see if the Honor Guard is something you would want to help support. Post 209 is also still trying to form a Competition Color Guard team to compete at The American Legion National Convention. This is another way to be involved and does not require prospective team members (tryouts required) to be members of the Honor Guard, though it is encouraged.

The Honor Guard continues to gain new team members; however, there is no such thing as having too many members. Understandably, not everyone has much time to participate in the Honor Guard. In reality, all someone needs is a few available hours: about an hour to participate a night (or even two) for a training meeting (a meeting is scheduled for every week, check the newsletter calendar) and up to a couple of hours for an event. So around three hours a month for a meeting and just ONE event is all you need to make a difference in helping support our veterans and our



community. Members of The American Legion, the Sons of The American Legion, and the American Legion Auxiliary are all eligible to be members of the Honor Guard with all uniform items provided except Legion family-specific cap and shoes. From our Service Officer

To my fellow veterans,

The VA is working on reducing the number of homeless veterans! Please contact me if you or someone you know is in need.

Even though the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) exceeded its goal for reducing the number of homeless veterans in 2022, it has set the bar even higher for this year.

VA permanently housed 40,401 homeless veterans last year, surpassing its goal of 38,000, according to Shawn Liu, director of communications for VA's Homeless Programs Office.

Liu said VA set several goals for lowering the number of homeless veterans in 2023. VA seeks to:

- House at least 38,000 more veterans. (As of March, 10,885 veterans have been rehoused.)
- Ensure that at least 95% of veterans housed during this period remain off the streets. (As of March, the percentage was 98.5%.)
- Make sure that at least 90% of veterans who return to homelessness are either rehoused or on a path to being housed again. (As of March, the percentage was 83.1%.)

Help is available for veterans, as well as their family members and other supporters, who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. The National Call Center for Homeless Veterans has trained counselors who are ready to talk confidentially 24 hours a day, seven days a week.



June's Buddy Time is **June 17th, 0900 – 1100**. We are looking forward to seeing you there.







What are the costs for the individual bricks? Prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering desired but typically range from \$90 to \$200, depending on size.



- What are the costs for the corporate/veteran supporter bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$250 to \$500.
- What is the difference between individual and corporate bricks? Individual bricks are for veterans and family members wishing to purchase a brick to honor their veterans. The corporate bricks are for our veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who want to show their continued support for our nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the brick purchase restricted to members of the Post 209 families? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves for their veteran loved ones or to show their support for our veterans.
- Where do I go to buy a brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion 209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209 to buy your brick. The site is user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. In addition, you will see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How do I pay for the brick? We have the site set up to accept payment via PayPal or check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick, and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where will the brick be shipped? All bricks will be sent to the post. We will notify you when it arrives, and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What will become of my brick? It will be placed near the flagpole at the post. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How long will this fundraiser effort last? We plan only to sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project.
- Will I have an opportunity to buy a brick later? Quite possibly, depending on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.

Bringing A Little South to the West

My brother Eddie (a.k.a. Bubba) recently texted a picture of an unannounced visitor to his screened-in back porch. It was a 5-foot King Snake. I asked him what he did with it and he said he just "scooted" it off his porch. The visitor made his way underneath the porch. Bubba said he hopes the King Snake likes his new home because he wants it to hang around. This statement brought back many memories of my time visiting grandparents in rural Arkansas on their farms.



Even though we lived in suburbia Memphis, most of our weekends and summer vacations were spent with grandparents about 50 miles west in Northeastern Arkansas. Both sets of grandparents lived near each other and both were farmers, mostly cotton and soy beans. Because they lived relatively close together, being able to visit and spend time with both was easy. I have more memories of leisure time spent in Arkansas than growing up in Memphis, which is probably why my mind flooded with some of the several encounters with what Bubba calls "no shoulders."

Running across snakes in rural Arkansas was as common as tornados in Kansas. It was something you learned to deal with if you chose to live there. Most of our interactions with snakes were with non-venomous types, but there were plenty of poisonous snakes around as well. Both grandfathers had a standing rule, they didn't care what you did when you ran across a snake with the exception of a King Snake. Those you leave alone. I don't know of any farmer who didn't try to keep a King Snake around. They were great for killing and eating rats and mice, and they also kept other snakes, especially poisonous snakes from coming around. Even though the King Snake was non-venomous, it was a strong constrictor. That's how they killed their prey.

So, we learned how to spot the various types of King Snakes. There were 3 or 4 varieties. One was the kind Bubba had show up at his place. There is another variety that looks similar to a Coral Snake with brightly colored bands. Coral Snakes are some of the most-deadly snakes in the US, but they are typically found in wooded or timber lands. There's an old saying that goes, "red touch black, venom lack; red touch yellow, kill a fellow." We never saw a Coral Snake, but we did come across several banded King Snakes, as well as the one in the picture above and the speckled King Snake, a variety very hard to confuse with any other breed.

While there were several occasions where we encountered snakes, there's only a few that I seem to often recall. One of those occurred relatively early morning while visiting Granny and Granddad (Dad's parents). Their farm butted up against a slough or channel of the L'Anguille (pronounced Lang-Ghee) river. Mom and Aunt Alta Mae decided to get in some fishing before breakfast so they walked the short distance to the slough. When they didn't come back after a couple of hours, Dad, Granddad, Uncle Troy, me and Bubba went looking for them. We discovered them standing very quiet and still on the bank of the slough. Dad called out, and even though we could see them, they stood very quiet and didn't answer. When we approached, we found out why. Between them was a coiled-up Cottonmouth, a venomous snake commonly referred to as a Water Moccasin. He laid there watching, apparently trying to determine if they intended him harm or maybe even wondering what they were.



When we realized what was going on, Granddad calmly picked up a pretty thick tree branch, walked up to the Cottonmouth, and slammed its head into the mud. I don't know if he actually killed it, but that gave all of us the time we needed to leave. My Mom and Aunt were obviously grateful for the intervention, but Mom said she was upset because she had gotten several bites on her fishing line while having to stand statue-still. To add to their adventure, Mom said that at one point, a Bobcat was in a tree near them just staring, apparently trying to figure out what his options may be. Bobcats are not normally aggressive, but it wasn't just the Cottonmouth or the Bobcat who was considering options. Fortunately for Mom and my Aunt, they didn't have to decide whether to fight or run because there was someone else apparently watching over them. God picked their course of action, which was to do nothing.

I guess no matter where you live, there is going to be something like snakes, bears, mountain lions, bobcats, or all of the above you have to learn to live with in harmony. The trick is to learn to live in harmony with those critters. That's really not unlike the two-legged critters we have to learn to live in harmony with if we want to have a peaceful life. Given the choice, I would choose the four-legged or no shoulders type. They only attack if provoked or startled. The two-legged types will attack for fun or to make themselves appear more powerful.







The Department of Colorado is Going On Trial!

On Saturday, 10 June, the elected and appointed officers for The American Legion, Department of Colorado will be going on trial at our Department Headquarters at 7465 E. 1st Ave., Denver to answer four or more charges ranging from misappropriation of funds to creating a hostile work environment. Our Department Executive Committee has until 31 May to respond to the charges and to identify the spokesperson for our Department.

If found guilty on any/all charges, the National Executive Committee (NEC) has the authority to cancel, suspend, or revoke our Department Charter. If this happens, all elected and appointed Department officers will be required to step down and the NEC will likely appoint someone to serve as an Administrator to help re-constitute our Department leadership.

The trial is open to all Legion family members (Legion, Auxiliary, SAL, ALR) and anyone interested in watching the proceedings. All are encouraged to attend. The Trial is expected to be conducted by the National Department Advisory Committee consisting of our National Judge Advocate, along with five Past National Commanders, and is expected to only last one day. The findings and recommendation will be presented to the NEC for resolution.
