From our Post Historian

We begin the new year's look at notable January milestones in American military history on a solemn note. On 4 January 2002, six weeks after U.S. ground forces arrived in Afghanistan, SFC Ross Chapman (USA) became the first of 2461 American heroes killed in Afghanistan, the longest war in U.S. history.



A government contract, dated 4 January 1847, was credited with saving Samuel Colt's struggling gun company, when the United States placed an order for one thousand .44 caliber revolvers. Colt has remained a key supplier to the U.S. military ever after.

In the last major engagement of the War of 1812, General Andrew Jackson's troops defeated a British force twice its size at the Battle of New Orleans. An embedded military correspondent captured the action: "We fired our guns and the British kept a comin', There wasn't as many as there was a while ago, We fired once more and they begin to runnin', on down the Mississippi to the Gulf of Mexico." At least that's how I heard it.

In the midst of WWII, America's growing military bureaucracy acquired some new office space with the 15 January 1943 dedication of The Pentagon in Washington, DC.

On 16 January 1991, a 32-nation coalition commanded by American General Norman Schwarzkopf commenced the devastating air campaign of Operation Desert Storm to eject Saddam Hussein's Iraqi forces from Kuwait.

Theodore Roosevelt is the only President to earn the Medal of Honor, when on 16 January 2001, he was posthumously awarded the honor (which coincidentally was presented in his old White House office). "Lieutenant Colonel Theodore Roosevelt distinguished himself by acts of bravery on 1 July, 1898, near Santiago de Cuba, Republic of Cuba, while leading a daring charge up San Juan Hill. Lieutenant Colonel Roosevelt, in total disregard for his personal safety, and accompanied by only four or five men, led a desperate and gallant charge up San Juan Hill, encouraging his troops to continue the assault through withering enemy fire over open countryside. Facing the enemy's heavy fire, he displayed extraordinary bravery throughout the charge, and was the first to reach the enemy trenches, where he quickly killed one of the enemy with his pistol, allowing his men to continue the assault. His leadership and valor turned the tide in the Battle for San Juan Hill."



The world's first nuclear submarine, USS Nautilus, began its first U.S. Navy mission on 17 January 1955.

In what became known as the "Pueblo Incident," on 23 January 1968, North Korean forces captured the U.S. Navy intelligence-gathering vessel, USS Pueblo, in international waters near Korea. One sailor was killed in its capture and the remaining crew of 82 were "detained" for the next eleven months. To this day, USS Pueblo remains in North Korean custody.

Only days after the "Pueblo Incident," Communist North Vietnamese forces launched the weeks-long deadly Tet Offensive throughout South Vietnam on 28 January 1968. The offensive led to a weakening of American public support for U.S. military efforts in Vietnam.



On 27 January 1973, Paris Peace Accords officially ended America's war in Vietnam, eleven years to the day after Defense Secretary McNamara had forwarded to President Kennedy the Joint Chiefs recommendation to deploy U.S. combat troops to Vietnam. President Nixon announced that America had achieved "peace with honor" in the war in which 58,220 American military heroes gave their lives and 1582 remain unaccounted for.

Although 4 August 1790 is celebrated as its "official" birthdate with the founding of the Revenue Cutter Service, the U.S. Coast Guard was formally created by law on 28 January 1915, combining the missions of multiple federal maritime agencies.

Before Captain Alan Shepard (USN) became the first American man in space, there was...Ham, the "Astrochimp." On 31 January 1961, Ham was successfully launched into space in a Mercury capsule atop a Redstone rocket; the results from his test flight led directly to the Mercury mission [Alan Shepard](#) made on 5 May 1961, aboard [Freedom 7](#).

From our Color/Honor Guard Captain

Happy New Year! The Honor Guard team is looking forward to another busy year supporting Our Veterans and Our Community.

The 2024 calendar year ended with the team supporting the Wreaths Across America ceremony at Pikes Peak National Cemetery December 14, 2024. At the time of this article submission, the Honor Guard supported 70 events for the year:

- 66 Final Honors
- 1 Presentation of Colors
- 3 Ceremonies

Unfortunately, the Honor Guard was unable to support every request received, 12 events total. This means that seven Veterans did not receive the Final Honors they earned/deserved and other community events were not able to be supported:

- Canceled Support: 1 Final Honors and 1 Parade
- Requests Denied: 6 Final Honors, 3 Presentation of Colors and 1 Ceremony

As included in last month's article, one thing is lacking from Post 209 history – a Color Guard entry at the National Convention. We have tried in the past to put together a Color Guard to take to the National Convention, but have not received enough interest or support from the Post 209 membership. Out of a Post Family with somewhere around 1,200 members, we need a minimum of four members (preferably five) to submit a Color Guard for the competition. If the members are all Legion members, the Color Guard could compete to become the National Commander's Color Guard. This is something that multiple posts have done repeatedly over the years (e.g., Newport Harbor Post 291 for the past 4 years straight), yet we have not tried even once. There would be a lot of hard work involved, but after watching many of the videos of the past competitions, I know we have the capability to beat them. There are at least a dozen (most likely more than twice that) Post 209 members that I personally know of with the capability and drive to make it happen. While Tampa Bay (2025) would be a stretch, it still could be possible. Louisville (2026), Jay's year (and the perfect time to show all the Posts in The American Legion what our Post is capable of), and Kansas City (2027) are definitely within reach. Are there at least three or four Post 209 members willing to give it a try? Please reach out and let me know, nothing can ever happen without at least having some discussion.

So, now it is time for the standard ending of my newsletter article –The Honor Guard needs to gain more new team members in order to ensure we are able to continue supporting our veterans and our community. Understandably, not everyone has much time to participate in the Honor Guard. In reality, all someone needs are a few available hours: about an hour to participate a night for a training meeting (check the newsletter calendar or the calendar on the Honor Guard website - <https://legion209.org/honorguard209/>) and up to a couple of hours for an event. So around three hours a month for a meeting and just **ONE** event is all you need to make a difference in helping support our veterans and our community. Members of The American Legion, the Sons of The American Legion, and The American Legion Auxiliary are all eligible to be members of the Honor Guard with all uniform items provided except Legion family-specific cap and shoes. From our Junior Shooting Sports Program

Happy New Year! The JSSP Instructors, Range Safety Officers, and Volunteers are looking forward to another great year for the program.

The Spring 2025 classes will start on Wednesday February 5, 2025 (at 4:45pm, 5:45pm, and 6:45pm) for the Marksmanship Course and Thursday February 6, 2025 (at 6:15pm) for the Young Guns Course. The courses will run every week for 10 weeks, ending with the Awards Night and Pizza Party on Thursday April 10, 2025 at 6:00pm. The updated course flyer has been uploaded to the Young Guns webpage.

The JSSP still needs Instructors, RSOs, and Volunteers to support the program to ensure the continuation of quality instruction and a safe range for the students taking part in the program(s). There will be a JSSP Volunteer Meeting coming up soon, more information to be included in the Weekly 411. Those interested in finding out more about the program are encouraged to attend.

The next NRA Basic Rifle Course is tentatively going to be scheduled in early January 2025. The course is open to those at least 16 years old and legally able to own/possess a firearm. All materials, lunch, facility use, etc. are included in the course costs.

- \$50 for all “youth” 20 years and under;
- \$60 for Post 209 JSSP volunteers and Post 209 Legion Family members;
- \$90 for local junior shooting program volunteers and local Legion Family members; and
- \$120 for general public, if there are any openings remaining.

The planning for a future NRA Basic Pistol and NRA Basic Range Safety Officer Courses is also in the works for after the first of the year, more details to come when more is known.

The Young Guns Basic Course provides youth ages 10-18 years old (boys and girls) the opportunity to learn about firearms safety and basic shooting skills. During Young Guns, credentialed National Rifle Association (NRA) Basic Rifle Instructors teach the safe handling of firearms, shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing), how to zero a rifle, and how to score targets. At the end of the course, the youth have a competition shoot against the others in the course in order to show off the skills they have learned. The Marksmanship Course provides graduates of Young Guns the opportunity to further develop their shooting skills. Both courses have a credentialed NRA Range Safety Officer (RSO) overseeing the range and ensuring all activities are conducted safely and in accordance with the JSSP Range Standard Operating Procedures (SOP). This month for Salty Dog I decided to give a little history. On January 4th 1988 the USS John F Kennedy (CV-67) encountered a pair of [MiG-23 Flogger fighter aircraft](#) from Libya. They approached the carrier task force, which was 81 miles (130 km) off the shore of Libya near the declared Libyan territorial waters of the Gulf of Sidra. John F. Kennedy launched two F-14 Tomcats from VF-32 "Fighting Swordsmen" to intercept the incoming MiGs. The U.S. planes were sent to escort the MiGs away from the task force. During the course of the intercept, the MiGs were determined to be hostile and were shot down.

I remember this day vividly for two reasons; 1) it was my brothers' birthday and 2) I was onboard the Kennedy at the time. We had a General Quarters drill scheduled for that day but it got cancelled in case Libya decided to retaliate. The picture below is taken out of our cruise book.

For us in the Memphis Oakhaven/Whitehaven area, that was Katz Drug Store.

This was an AMAZING store. There were two things that stood out for me at Katz; the soda shop inside the store, and an escalator. This was the very first escalator I had ever seen. I thought it was a state-of-the-art method for transporting someone between floors. It was a staircase that actually moved. All you had to do was stand on one step and it would transport you to another floor without you having to take another step.

The soda fountain featured a long counter with several stools where you could sit and enjoy a lunch sandwich or something from the soda machine. I don't think I ever went there for the lunch, but man the sodas were GREAT! Their root beer was my favorite soda, and they even had root beer floats. But even better than that was the Banana Splits. WOW! To this day, I don't recall having anything that came close to the Banana Splits at Katz. They were served in an oblong bowl, not very deep. There were scoops of chocolate, vanilla, and strawberry ice cream as the base. A full banana was split (hence the term) length-wise and provided a border on each side of the ice cream. On top of the ice cream scoops were nuts, whip cream, some chocolate and strawberry compote, and a cherry topped the middle scoop.

Probably just as popular, or maybe more the reason I liked the Banana Split was the balloon busts. Behind the counter against the wall were several balloons. You had the opportunity to throw a dart and pop the balloon before paying for the Banana Split. Inside each balloon was a piece of paper with a cost written on it. That's what you'd pay for the Banana Split. I think every balloon had some kind of discount, and occasionally you'd luck into getting the Banana Split free or maybe only have to pay a nickel. That made the treat even more popular.

But sadly, nothing lasts forever. Katz was eventually bought out by mega drug store Osco, which was later bought by CVS. This is the way of the world I guess. For the most part, it is good I think. But sometimes when these things happen, we lose a little bit of the Americana that made this great nation the best place in the world to live. I would personally like to see us move back just a little to a more-simple time when customer service was king and you could go into a store and not just buy clothes and drugs, but also enjoy a Banana Split at a Soda Fountain counter.

Thinking about this makes me crave a root beer float. I've given up on trying to recapture the same flavor of the Banana Split I enjoyed at Katz. Maybe that's a good thing. I am after all, trying to get ready for swim suit season. 😊

2) Have you actually had any thoughts about killing yourself?		
If YES to 2, ask questions 3, 4, 5 and 6. If NO to 2, skip to question 6.		
3) Have you been thinking about how you might do this?		
4) Have you had these thoughts and had some intention of acting on them?	High Risk	
5) Have you started to work out or worked out the details of how to kill yourself? Did you intend to carry out this plan?	High Risk	
Always Ask Question 6	Life-time	Past 3 Months
6) Have you done anything, started to do anything, or prepared to do anything to end your life? <i>Examples: Took pills, tried to shoot yourself, cut yourself, tried to hang yourself, took out pills but didn't swallow any, held a gun but changed your mind or it was grabbed from your hand, went to the roof but didn't jump, collected pills, obtained a gun, gave away valuables, wrote a will or suicide note, etc.</i> If yes, was this within the past 3 months?		High Risk

If YES to 2 or 3, seek behavioral healthcare for further evaluation. If the answer to 4, 5 or 6 is YES, get **immediate help**: Call or text 988, call 911 or go to the emergency room. **STAY WITH THEM** until they can be evaluated.

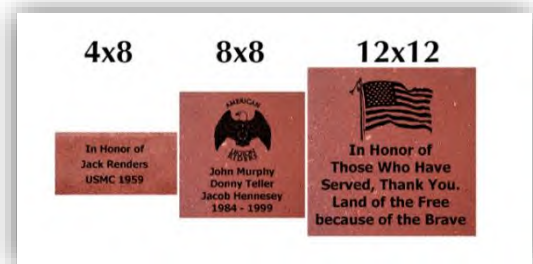

Walk of Honor

- **What are the costs for the individual bricks?** Prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering desired but typically range from \$75 to \$200, depending on size.
- **What are the costs for the corporate/veteran supporter bricks?** Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$125 to \$500.
- **What is the difference between individual and corporate bricks?** Individual bricks are for veterans and family members wishing to purchase a brick to honor their veterans. The corporate bricks are for our veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who want to show their continued support for our nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- **Is the brick purchase restricted to members of the Post 209 families?** No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves for their veteran loved ones or to show their support for our veterans.
- **Where do I go to buy a brick?** We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit <http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209> to buy your brick. The site is user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. In addition, you will see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- **How do I pay for the brick?** We have the site set up to accept payment via PayPal or check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick, and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- **Where will the brick be shipped?** All bricks will be sent to the post. We will notify you when it arrives, and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
