I have included the Roles and Responsibilities of Post Officers published in March 2016.

Roles and responsibilities of Post Officers

Commander:

You are entrusted with the supervision of the duties of all other Officers of the Post. You are the presiding Officer at all meetings and you must familiarize yourself with the policies and traditions of your Post and The American Legion.

• Adjutant:

You are the Secretary. Post activities will revolve around you. The Adjutant is the Post personnel officer; maintains membership records, minutes of meetings, checks up and assists with the work of the other Officers and Committees. You publish official orders; announcements and instructions.

Senior Vice Commander:

Your primary concern is membership. No Post can survive without good membership. You should also be familiar with ceremonial protocols for regular meetings. A Vice Commander must be ready to fill in for the Commander upon a moment's notice.

• Junior Vice Commander:

You must be ready to promote your Post. The Commander will depend on you to provide programs that spice up the meetings and attract attendance. You should contact other Veteran and civic organizations so that each patriotic holiday and observance receives the attention it deserves. You are concerned with the pageantry of the Legion. You should also be concerned with the welfare of all fellow Veterans as well as with Veteran's affairs and rehabilitation committees.

• Finance Officer:

You will serve as chair of the Finance Committee and will be in charge of all receiving and disbursing of Post funds. You will work closely with the Post Adjutant in all matters relating to the finances of your Post.

Service Officer:

You should be a dedicated person and should have a deep interest in fellow Veterans, the Post and the community. You are responsible for bringing to the attention of all Veterans and their dependents the rights and benefits granted to them by law. You must know how to utilize the expert services available through Legion channels as well as through local agencies. You should be ready to visit dependents upon a death of a service member. You may be called upon to serve as chair of Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Committee as well as working with children and youth committees or making hospital visitations. Appointed by the Commander-elect.

• Chaplain:

You must be a person capable of moral and intellectual leadership. You work closely with all other Officers of the Post. You should attend all meetings of the Post and Executive Committee. You should be ready to officiate when requested, at funerals of members. The Chaplain must also be ready to provide service to bereaved families of Post members.

Sergeant-at-Arms:

You should know how to arrange the meeting hall, assist the Post Commander and Adjutant. You are the custodian of the Colors and in charge of Colors details during the presentation and retirement ceremonies. You should know how to display flags and their proper presentation. You are also responsible for maintaining order at meetings.

• Historian:

You have the responsibility of preserving and compiling the records/photos (specifically through our Scrapbook and website) of our Post. You should try to attend Department Conventions and keep in touch with other Post Historians. [You are only encouraged to attend, not required.]

• Post Executive Committeeman:

You are a voting member of the Post Executive Committee, which is entrusted with the government and management of the Post. You shall be responsible to represent the interests of the general membership to the Executive Committee.

Judge Advocate:

You will supply professional advice in the conducting of the Post business or to procure proper counsel. You are the interpreter of the Constitution and By-Laws of our Post. You may be asked to assist in auditing Post financial accounts. Appointed by the Commander-elect.

FROM THE DESK OF THE POST FINANCE OFFICER

The Post as a whole did pretty good last year. We end 2019 in the black for the month of December \$435. From July to December we were a total in the black for \$6192.46. The big thing that helped us this year was the Luau we had in March to celebrate the 100 year birthday of the American Legion. Until we got our finances in place, the Auxiliary was our keeper of the funds while we went through

the issue with the last finance officer, after he pilfered funds from us all the way back to 2016. Give yourself a pat on the back for helping us get over this issue and back on track. Now, with 2020 upon us, we need to begin looking at ways for us to continue to bring in funds, so we can continue to stay solvent and do what we do, helping our veterans in the community when the time comes when they need some assistance.

As for our utilities, I believe we have bottomed out on our savings when it comes to the electric side of the house. Our average for the last few months has bottomed out at around \$350. That's much better that where we were, burning anywhere from \$500 to \$700 dollars a month just on electric. I believe in May or June, Colorado Springs Utilities will look at our overall usage for the last year, and then adjust us, which should be in the positive for us, meaning our utility bill should go down. I will keep you all posted on the outcome of that when it becomes available.

Meanwhile, here in Colorado, the annual Child Welfare Foundation Banquet will be held on April 4th, and will be hosted by none other than our very own Sons of the American Legion Squadron 209!



As SAL 209 Commander, I am proud at the selection of our Squadron to host the CWF. There is a lot of work to be done to make this a success. One of the events of the evening will be a silent auction, and to that end, I am putting out the call to all Post 209 Family and friends: We are looking for silent auction items! Check your garage, your attic... your pocketbook.... We will gladly take donations of auction-able items to help Colorado Squadrons hit our goal of \$20,000 raised for the CWF. Or, if you prefer, we will be more than happy to receive **any** cash donation, regardless of size.

In case you are wondering about what the Child Welfare Foundation does for our nation's children, here is a small sampling of this year's grant recipients:

- Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh Foundation was awarded \$30,000 for their project, Online Resources for Child Liver Transplant Patients and their Families.
- CureSearch for Children's Cancer was awarded \$33,000 for their project, "Supporting American Families Facing a Pediatric Cancer Diagnosis."
- **Lifeline Pilots** was awarded \$25,000 for their project, "No Cost Air Transportation for Medically Fragile Kids."
- National Braille Press was awarded \$19,725 for their project, "ReadBooks!" This grant will fund resource books for parents with visually impaired children to introduce their children to Braille and help encourage parents to learn Braille to help their children.
- National Center for Missing and Exploited Children was awarded \$12,839 for their project, "Reconnecting with Your Child: Building Relationships after Suspected Sexual Exploitation."

And the list goes on.

Please keep Squadron 209 in mind as we work this winter toward helping the CWF meet its goal. The Sons of the American Legion is by far the biggest fundraiser for these grants, and we hope you will help us help our nation's children. BRINGING A LITTLE SOUTH TO THE WEST

I've recently been thinking about the technological advancements and changes that have occurred during my life. I know I've mentioned some of them in previous articles, but I think it's time to highlight in detail the changes I've been able to witness. Over the next few periodicals, I'll pick one to talk about.

I'll start off with the Television. Growing up we had a black and white model made by Muntz. I don't know why I remember that name, but I

do. They've probably been out of business 50+ years. The company was the first to market a TV for less than \$100. I think that's the only reason we had one. Mom and Dad kept that TV until I left to go into the Army. After I left they bought their first color TV. I guess they figured they could afford it because they didn't have to feed me any longer.

The TV had a remote control, but it quit working when we went to bed at 9:00. After that, Dad or Mom would have to get off the couch and change the channel themselves. We could only get the 3 major networks; ABC, NBC, and CBS, and if we had the antenna just right we could also occasionally get PBS. But we didn't care much for it because the only thing they aired was educational shows.

Speaking of our antenna, for many years we had one mounted on a steel pole that rose from the ground to about 6 feet over the top of the house. It was anchored with straps bolted to the side of the house. If the wind blew strong, or sometimes just to get a better signal, we'd form a line outside to "tweak" in a better signal. One of us kids would turn the antenna pole to re-orient the antenna, while another one would be inside the house and yell when the picture got clearer. The person watching the TV would guide the person on the pole and the message would be relayed across my siblings stationed between the antenna pole and the front door. I guess if you're "working the pole" these days, it means something entirely different.

I was ecstatic when we finally got "Rabbit Ears" for the TV. It made life so much better. I also learned that using aluminum foil seemed to make the images a little sharper, and occasionally having my little sister stand next to the rabbit ears with a hand on one of the antennae worked even better. She would get tired too quickly though to make that work for an extended period.

Speaking of the three networks, if there was more than one show on at the same time on different channels, you just had to pick one. There was no way to record a show being televised. If you missed it, you'd just have to wait for the re-runs during the summer. That took some planning.

We didn't have TV Guide to let us know what was being televised and when. The schedule was published in *The Commercial Appeal* and *The Press Scimitar* newspapers. The Commercial Appeal was the morning edition and The Press was our afternoon paper. Dad

got both for many years. The same schedule was posted in both so it didn't matter which you got. The schedule would go out a couple of days so you could plan your evenings better.

I can also recall seeing the commercial for the first time announcing a new technological advancement, "Pay TV." There wasn't much detail given, but it would show up as a commercial from time to time. I envisioned a box sitting on top of the TV with a coin slot at the top. I imagined having to put a quarter in the slot to get the signal passed down.

Dad chose what we watched each night. It was entirely up to him to pick the show. Fortunately, he liked Westerns during the week and Football on weekends. So did I. And if there was a Friday night fight (heavy weight boxing), he would watch that as well. Another favorite of his on Saturday was Wrestling. He knew even back then it was mostly fake, but he watched for the entertainment value. Jackie's Mom was also a big Wrestling fan. I remember one Saturday actually attending the match. Tojo Yamamoto was wrestling that day. He was a local favorite. He was Dad's favorite bad guy for years, then he switched over to being a good guy.

Thinking back, TV in the 50's and 60's was pretty barbaric compared to today. We didn't have 200 plus stations from which to choose. But to be perfectly honest, there was more good TV on before cable and satellite than there is now. There are many days I can't find anything on the 200 channels worth losing 1 hour of my life to watch. Unless I tune in to an old episode of Gunsmoke or Maverick. Ain't it funny how with 200 channels, many of us still look for the reruns? 🕄
