FROM THE DESK & MIND OF THE COMMANDER



Elections will be conducted at our general membership meeting on 9 April. All positions are up for nomination. If you are interested in running or nominating an individual for a position or multiple positions, please contact our election chairperson, Marvin Weaver 719-638-4763 or weavermr@q.com. See the previous page for our current officers. All positions (some are appointed) are open.

The following is a short description for Post Officer positions.

Commander: You are entrusted with the supervision of the duties of all other Officers of the Post. You are the presiding Officer at all meetings and you must familiarize yourself with the policies and traditions of your Post and The American Legion.

Adjutant: Also known as the "First Sergeant." You are the Secretary of the Post. Post activities will revolve around you. The Adjutant is the Post personnel officer; maintains membership records, minutes of meetings, checks up and assists with the work of the other Officers and Committees. You publish official orders; announcements and instructions.

Senior Vice Commander: Your primary role is membership. No Post can survive without a strong membership. You should be familiar with ceremonial protocols for regular meetings. A Vice Commander must be ready to fill in for the Commander upon a moment's notice.

Junior Vice Commander: You must be ready to promote your Post. The Commander will depend on you to provide programs that spice up the meetings and attract attendance. You should contact other Veteran and civic organizations so that each patriotic holiday and observance receives the attention it deserves. You are concerned with the pageantry of the Legion. You should also be concerned with the welfare of all fellow Veterans as well as with Veteran's affairs and rehabilitation committees.

Finance Officer: You will serve as chair of the Finance Committee and will be in charge of all receiving and disbursing Post funds. You will work closely with the Post Adjutant in all matters relating to the finances of your Post.

Service Officer: You should be a dedicated person and should have a deep interest in fellow Veterans, the Post and the community. You are responsible for bringing to the attention of all Veterans and their dependents the rights and benefits granted to them by law. You must know how to utilize the expert services available through Legion channels as well as through local agencies. You should be ready to visit dependents upon a death of a service member. You may be called upon to serve as chair of Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Committee as well as working with children and youth committees or making hospital visitations. Appointed by the Commander-elect.

Chaplain: You must be a person capable of moral and intellectual leadership. You work closely with all other Officers of the Post. You should attend all meetings of the Post and Executive Committee. You should be ready to officiate when requested, at funerals of members. The Chaplain must also be ready to provide service to bereaved families of Post members.

Sergeant-at-Arms: You should know how to arrange the meeting hall, and assist the Post Commander and Adjutant. You are the custodian of the Colors and in charge of Colors details during the presentation and retirement ceremonies. You should know how to display flags and their proper presentation. You are also responsible for maintaining order at all meetings.

Historian: You have the responsibility of preserving and compiling the records/photos (specifically through our Scrapbook and website) of our Post. You should <u>try</u> to attend Department Conventions and keep in touch with other Post Historians. [You are only encouraged to attend, not required.]

Post Executive Committeeman: You are a voting member of the Post Executive Committee, which is entrusted with the government and management of the Post. You shall be responsible to represent the interests of the general membership to the Executive Committee.

Judge Advocate: You will supply professional advice in the conduct of Post business or procure proper counsel. You are the interpreter of the Constitution and By-Laws of our Post. You may be asked to assist in auditing Post financial accounts. Appointed by the Commander-elect.



FROM OUR POST ELECTION NOMINATION CHAIRMAN

FROM THE DESK OF THE POST ADJUTANT

If you have not renewed your membership for 2022 yet the following excerpt is from our Post Constitution. Please take heed.

Section 4 - A member whose dues for the current year have not been paid by January 1st, shall be classed as delinquent. If their dues are paid on or before February 1st, they shall be automatically reinstated. If still delinquent after February 1st, they shall be suspended from all privileges of membership. If still under suspension on June 30th of each year, membership in The American Legion shall be forfeited.

Your payment is vital in assisting veterans. Besides financial assistance needed by many of our brothers and sisters and their families, our numbers are what stands behind our dealings with The U.S. Congress. When The American Legion goes to Congress to discuss the needs of the American Veteran your membership numbers speak volumes. You joined the American Legion for a reason. We are all FAMILY. Please do not allow me to enforce this section of The American Legion Neal Thomas Jr Centennial Post 209 Constitution. It is easy to renew. FROM OUR HONOR GUARD CAPTAIN

January has seen things starting to pick back up again (halfway through the month with three times as many requests as January 2021), so the team expects to be even busier this year. The Honor Guard members will be focusing on training for the different positions and activities the Honor Guard supports.

The Colorado Military Funeral Stipend Program has started with our Honor Guard participating in the pilot program (one of only two VSO Honor Guards chosen) to help the program manager identify issues to be resolved before the program opens to all VSO Honor Guards in Colorado. The Stipend Program pays VSO Honor Guards for providing Final Honors support for Veterans funerals, \$75 for the first funeral and possible expense reimbursement up to \$25 for each of the second through fourth funeral EACH day. These funds will provide the ability for the Honor Guard to do a lot more to grow and prepare for more events. In 2021, there were 77 Final Honors that would have counted if the program were in place. As stated above, we have been requested for three more Final Honors in January 2022 than last January (so far), showing that we should expect to have an even higher number of requests this year. With this increase, it is even more important for the Honor Guard to find additional members. So, keep an eye out in the next couple of newsletter articles for new incentives we are exploring to implement being an Honor Guard member and supporting Final Honors events.



While not everyone has a lot of time to participate in the Honor Guard, all someone needs is the time to participate a night or two for training meetings (2nd & 3rd Tuesday of every month) and even just one event a month. A meeting or two and one event a month is only 3-5 hours. **Those 3-5 hours makes a difference for a Veteran and their family. Those 3-5 hours a month can also make a difference for you! If another 10 to 15 members of the Legion, Sons, or Auxiliary gave back with 3-5 hours a month, the Honor Guard could possibly not have to keep turning down requests.** If you do not remember/know how to march or fold the flag, we will teach you. The only two items that a new Honor Guard member needs to get on their own is a Legion cap (or SAL/ALA as applicable) and shoes (multiple options available). All other uniforms items that you need are provided by the Honor Guard. You do not have 3-5 hours a month? That is okay, you can still help the Honor Guard by telling others in the Legion, Sons, or Auxiliary (Post 209 or other posts in the area) about what the Honor Guard does and the importance of growing in order to meet the increase of requests to support OUR Veterans. FROM OUR POST CHAPLAIN

What's a "Chaplain"?

The term chaplain originates from the fourth century legend of Martin of Tours. Martin was born to a pagan family about 316 A.D. in Pannonia, a Roman Province that included modern Hungary. When he grew up, he became a Roman soldier. At approximately age 21, on a very cold, winter day, Martin passed by the gates of Amiens in Gaul (what is today France). He saw a man who was freezing by the side of the road. Martin was moved with compassion after seeing and hearing the pleas of the beggar being ignored by several others who had ridden by on their horses. He decided to help, though he had little himself. He took the one valuable possession he owned – his cape – and cut it in half with his sword. He kept half for himself and gave the other half to the beggar. That night, as the story goes, Martin had a vision in which he came to understand that the beggar was Christ Himself. The vision shook Martin to his core. After that experience, he decided to follow the Christian faith and was baptized by Bishop St. Hillary. Ultimately, Martin left the army to devote himself to the church.

During the Middle Ages, St. Martin's cloak was carried into battle by the kings as a banner signifying the presence of God. Since it was a relic of the church, a priest went along as custodian. This guardian of the cape, or capellanus (which became chapelein in Old French), tended to the king's religious needs. This is where the word chaplain comes from.

I like to say, "I'm a shepherd. It's what I do." As an American Legion Chaplain, my mission is twofold: to help Legionnaires others grow in their relationships with God and one another, and to minister to people wherever there is a need. Because the Legion embraces all religious faiths and denominations, I am asked to care for those who have a spiritual affiliation, and those who do not. In some cases, I may be the only minister a veteran will ever know. American Legion Chaplains may or may not be clergy. Their main requirements are to have a servant heart, spiritual maturity, and a commitment to the office.

We are in good company. Patrick Brady, MG, USA (Ret.) writes, "Some of our greatest generals, including George Washington and George Patton, believed prayer was a combat multiplier. General Washington founded the Chaplain Corps immediately after he set up his army. More than 400 military chaplains have died in the line of duty. Nine have been awarded the Medal of Honor." (The American Legion Magazine, December 2021) Military chaplains today represent more than 200 separate denominations. The past chaplains of Post 209 probably have a variety of backgrounds as well.

"Four Chaplains Sunday" (the first Sunday in February) recognizes the noble sacrifice of four chaplains in World War II. More than 79 years later, the story of these heroic chaplains – Methodist, Jewish, Roman Catholic, and Dutch Reformed – is still being told. This service is a tribute to those chaplains and to all who have served, whose courage and faith have sustained this great nation.

Chaplains are volunteers. The story goes in Isaiah 6:8 that through a vision from the Lord, Isaiah learns that the Lord is seeking a messenger to Judah. Isaiah had felt unworthy in the presence of God, but God sent an angel to touch Isaiah's lips with burning coal, thus purifying him. When God asked, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?" Isaiah replied, "Here am I – send me."





Buy A Brick Fundraiser!

We are re-introducing an exciting fundraiser for our Post. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our landscaping project we are working. The engraving uses the same technology as used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are some FAQs:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs
- What Size Are the Bricks? 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.
- What are the Costs for the Individual Bricks? Prices vary depending on size, style and lettering desired, but typically range from \$90 to \$200. For the 8x8 or 12x12 bricks, you can add a second emblem. Contact the Adjutant for ordering details. There is **NO** additional cost for the second emblem on the larger bricks.
- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$250 to \$500.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209 to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.

Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know and we will make certain they are all placed together.



BRINGING A LITTLE SOUTH TO THE WEST



It's been said "Experience is the Best Teacher." I, for one believe that to be an absolute truth. Don't get me wrong, I believe formal education is important.
