Let me be the first to wish every Legionnaire a Happy Birthday! This is our 105th birthday. March 15th 1919, the first American legion Caucus was held in Paris. Members of the American Expeditionary Force in France met to form what is now the American Legion.

The American Legion was formed originally to look out for veterans and to make sure that our country did not forget about what they had done for them during WWI. Direct credit can be given to The American Legion for helping form what is now the Department of Veterans Affairs or as we all know it today the VA. The GI Bill was written by The American legion after WWII to help returning soldiers and sailors. The GI Bill has evolved over time and the new education benefit includes being able to transfer benefits to family members or even use the money to pay for a trade school. All this because the Legion continues to look out for fellow veterans.

The Americanism programs are something every Legionnaire should be proud of as well. Back when first charted, a relationship was formed with Scouting and continues to this day. Scouting is the longest running Americanism program and our Post charters 6 different units between all of the family members. It is hard not to run into someone who in their younger years did not participate in American Legion Baseball. Legion baseball has produced many major league "Hall of Famers." Boy's State is another big program boasting former Presidents and alumni of Boy's State and Boy's Nation.

Veterans Assistance and Rehabilitation and Americanism are just two of the four pillars that the American Legion stands on and will continue in the future.

At the General Membership meeting in March, we will be celebrating the Legion's birthday by again holding the American Legion Initiation Ceremony. This ceremony introduces you to The American Legion and some of our principles. description of each officer position. We will also ask for nominations from the floor in April when we have elections.

Commander: You are entrusted with supervising the duties of all other officers of the Post. You are the presiding officer at all meetings, and you must familiarize yourself with the policies and traditions of your Post and The American Legion.

Adjutant: Also known as the "First Sergeant." You are the Secretary of the Post. Post activities will revolve around you. The Adjutant is the Post personnel officer; maintains membership records, and minutes of meetings, checks up, and assists with the work of the other officers and Committees. In addition, you publish official orders, announcements, and instructions.

Senior Vice Commander: Your primary role is membership. No Post can survive without a strong membership. You should be familiar with ceremonial protocols for regular meetings. A Vice Commander must be ready to fill in for the Commander upon a moment's notice.

Junior Vice Commander: You must be ready to promote your Post. The Commander will depend on you to provide programs that spice up the meetings and attract attendance. You should contact other veteran and civic organizations so that each patriotic holiday and observance receives the attention it deserves. You are concerned with the pageantry of The American Legion. You should also be concerned with the welfare of all fellow veterans and Veteran Affairs and Rehabilitation Committees.

Finance Officer: You will serve as chair of the Finance Committee and will be responsible for receiving and disbursing Post funds. You will work closely with the Post Adjutant in all matters related to the finances of your Post.

Service Officer: You should be a dedicated person with a deep interest in fellow veterans, the Post, and the community. You are responsible for bringing to the attention of all veterans and their dependents the rights and benefits granted by law. You must know how to utilize the expert services available through Legion channels and local agencies. You should be ready to visit dependents upon a service member's death. You may be called upon to serve as chair of the Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Committee, working with children and youth committees, or making hospital visitations and appointed by the Commander-elect.

Chaplain: You must be a person capable of moral and intellectual leadership. You work closely with all other Officers of the Post. You should attend all meetings of the Post and Executive Committee. When requested, you should be ready to officiate at the funerals of members. The Chaplain must also be prepared to serve the bereaved families of Post members.

Sergeant-at-Arms: You should know how to arrange the meeting hall and assist the Post Commander and Adjutant. You are the custodian of the Colors and in charge of Colors details during presentation and retirement ceremonies. You should know how to display flags and their proper presentation. You are also responsible for maintaining order at all meetings.

Historian: You are responsible for preserving and compiling our Post's records/photos (specifically through our Scrapbook and website). It would help if you tried to attend Department Conventions and keep in touch with other Post Historians. [You are only encouraged to attend, not required.]



Post Executive Committeeman: You are a voting member of the Post Executive Committee and are entrusted with the government and management of the Post. You shall be responsible for representing the interests of the general membership to the Executive Committee.

Judge Advocate: You provide professional advice in conducting Post business or assist in procuring proper counsel. You are the interpreter of the Constitution and By-Laws of our Post. You may be asked to assist in auditing Post financial accounts, appointed by the Commander-elect.

POW/MIA Ceremony

As Adjutant, I am responsible for printing and distributing the meeting minutes. One of the things I try to do is to keep it consistent so a lot of times I just copy and paste text into an older minute format. While I was doing that for the January minutes, I noticed a similarity of distinguished guests in our November and January POW/MIA ceremonies. Coloradans' Seaman 2nd Class Leroy Arthur Amick and Electricians Mate 2nd Class Glenn W. Anderson shared the same submarine, the S-26.



S-26 (Lt. Cdr. E. C. Hawk) was lost at 2223 on 24 January 1942, in the Gulf of Panama about fourteen miles west of San Jose Light in three hundred feet of water. There were three survivors, two officers, one of whom was the Commanding Officer, and one enlisted man. These people were

on the bridge at the time of the collision; the fourth person on the bridge, an enlisted man, was lost.

S-26 was proceeding from Balboa, C. Z. to its patrol station in company with S-21, S-29 and S-44 and an escort vessel, PC-460, at the time of the disaster. At 2210 the escort vessel sent a visual message to the submarines that she was leaving the formation and that they could proceed on the duty assigned. S-21 was the only submarine to receive this message. Shortly thereafter PC-460 struck S-26 on the starboard side of the torpedo room and the submarine sank within a few seconds.

Salvage operations were started immediately under Captain T. J, Doyle, USN, Commander Submarine Squadron Three and Submarine Base, Coco Solo, Canal Zone, and attempts at rescue were made but without success. The submarine was not raised. She had previously made one war patrol but had inflicted no damage on the enemy.

S-26 lies upright on the seabed and is a protected war grave.

From our Post Historian



Joseph Louis Simpson, from Denver, Colorado, joined the U.S. Army after high school and served in Vietnam with the 23rd Infantry Division.

On May 12, 1968, Sergeant Simpson was manning an operational outpost of the Kham Duc Special Forces Base Camp at Quang Tin, South Vietnam, when the base came under heavy attack by a numerically superior enemy force. He was severely wounded in the attack in which his outpost was overrun, and the surviving personnel were ordered to escape and evade the enemy and make their way back to the Kham Duc airfield if possible. Kham Duc, the last Special

Forces camp on the northwestern

frontier of South Vietnam, was abandoned to advancing NVA infantry at 4:33 p.m. on May 12, 1968. Sergeant Simpson and two others arrived at the airfield just as the last C-130 departed. A fellow soldier, SP4 Long, carried SGT Simpson to a nearby hill, where Simpson reportedly died during the night. SP4 Long was captured by enemy forces and later released from North Vietnam in 1973. Attempts to recover SGT Simpson's remains after the attack were unsuccessful; his body was never recovered, and he is listed as Missing in Action. After the incident, the Army promoted Simpson to the rank of staff sergeant (SSG). Today, Staff Sergeant Simpson is memorialized at Fort Logan National Cemetery in Denver, on the Courts of the Missing at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, and his name is also inscribed along with all his fallen comrades on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington, DC.

25 March is designated as *National Medal of Honor Day* in recognition of the first Medals of Honor awarded on 25 March 1863 to six Union soldiers for their daring commando raid on Confederate forces.

Edgar Lee McWethy Jr. was born and raised in Leadville, Colorado. He joined the U.S. Army in 1964, completed combat medic training and served in Vietnam with Company B, 1st Battalion, 5th Cavalry, 1st Cavalry Division. On 21 June 1967, in Binh Dinh Province, South Vietnam, Specialist 5 McWethy repeatedly exposed himself to enemy fire to treat his wounded comrades despite being wounded three times himself. He continued to help his fellow soldiers until suffering a fourth and fatal wound.





His Medal of Honor citation reads:

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty. Serving as a medical aidman with Company B, Sp5c. McWethy accompanied his platoon to the site of a downed helicopter. Shortly after the platoon established a defensive perimeter around the aircraft, a large enemy force attacked the position from three sides with a heavy volume of automatic-weapons fire and grenades. The platoon leader and his radio operator were wounded almost immediately, and Sp5c. McWethy rushed across the fire-swept area to their assistance. Although he could not help the mortally wounded radio operator, Sp5c. McWethy's timely first aid enabled the platoon leader to retain command during this critical period. Hearing a call for aid, Sp5c. McWethy started across the open toward the injured

men, but was wounded in the head and was knocked to the ground. He regained his feet and continued on but was hit again, this time in the leg. Struggling onward despite his wounds, he gained the side of his comrades and treated their injuries. Observing another fallen rifleman lying in an exposed position raked by enemy fire, Sp5c. McWethy moved toward him without hesitation. Although the enemy fire wounded him a third time, Sp5c. McWethy reached his fallen companion. Though weakened and in extreme pain, Sp5c. McWethy gave the wounded man artificial respiration but suffered a fourth and fatal wound. Through his indomitable courage, complete disregard for his safety, and demonstrated concern for his fellow soldiers, Sp5c. McWethy inspired the members of his platoon and contributed in great measure to their successful defense of the position and the ultimate rout of the enemy force. Sp5c. McWethy's profound sense of duty, bravery, and his willingness to accept extraordinary risks in order to help the men of his unit are characteristic of the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the U.S. Army.

His family was presented his award posthumously by President Richard M. Nixon at the White House on October 16, 1969. The McWethy Troop Medical Clinic at Fort Sam Houston, Texas and Fort Jackson, South Carolina, are named in his honor.

Thank you for your service, Edgar – You are not forgotten.

To help with completing the very important mission, we have seen four (4) prospective new members come to the Honor Guard, including a member of the Auxiliary. The addition of more team members is a great thing to have happen over the last month and a half; however, the number of Honor Guard members is still at approximately 1% of the Post Family's membership. We expect a very busy year ahead of us, we need to have more new members in order to reverse last year's record 21 requests for Final Honors being denied due to a lack of available team members.

And now for the standard ending of my newsletter article – Want to be part of a great team? The Honor Guard needs to gain more new team members in order to ensure we are able to continue supporting our veterans and our community. Understandably, not everyone has much time to participate in the Honor Guard. In reality, all someone needs are a few available hours: about an hour to participate a night for a training meeting (check the newsletter calendar or the calendar on the Honor Guard website - https://legion209.org/honorguard209/) and up to a couple of hours for an event. So around three hours a month for a meeting and just ONE event is all you need to make a difference in helping support our veterans and our community. Members of The American Legion, the Sons of The American Legion, and The American Legion Auxiliary are all eligible to be members of the Honor Guard with all uniform items provided except Legion family-specific cap and shoes. The Young Guns Basic Course provides youth ages 10-18 years old (boys and girls) the opportunity to learn about firearms safety and basic shooting skills. During Young Guns, NRA Basic Rifle Instructors teach the safe handling of firearms, shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing), how to zero a rifle, and how to score targets. At the end of the course, the youth have a competition shoot against the others in the course in order to show off the skills they have learned. The Marksmanship Course provides graduates of Young Guns the opportunity to further develop their shooting skills. wear. This is a list of some of the jersey's you might see on the Flight Deck along with the job they perform:

 $Yellow\ Shirt-Launch\ Officer/\ Landing$

Signalman Enlisted

Red Shirt - Crash and Salvage

Blue Shirt – Aircraft Handler (chalks & chains)

Purple Shirt – Fueler

Green Shirt – Arresting Gear & Catapults

White Shirt – Medical or Safety Officer



You will find others but these are the main ones I worked with.







Bringing A Little South to the West

I have said for years that I think shoes are a curse of civilization. Growing up in the south, most of the kids in our neighborhood didn't wear shoes or socks until about November. Unless of course you were going to school. I attended a Memphis City School, and even though we weren't required to wear uniforms as mandated in the Catholic Schools, we had some pretty strict dress codes. Boys had to wear slacks and a collared shirt. We weren't able to wear tennis shoes or "sneakers" until they laxed the requirements in my senior year. Hair could not cover your ears, and if you had a mustache, it had to be of military standard; meaning it could not extend below your upper lip. And until my senior year, girls had to wear a skirt or a dress. Pant suits weren't allowed.

But when we got home from school, the slacks were replaced with jeans or jean shorts cut-off when the jeans got faded or ragged. We had holes in our jeans, which I guess is the style today, but we didn't buy them that way. They got holey through the normal wear and tear (pun intended) activities for boys of our age and environment. Collared shirts were replaced by tee-shirts or no shirt at all, and shoes and socks came off. If you wanted to wear shoes, it was almost always sneakers or flip flops with no socks.

Sure, there was the occasional bee sting on the bottom of our feet if we didn't watch where we were going. And maybe, just maybe a small cut from a shard of glass, but for the most part we didn't have anything harsh enough that would make us want to put on shoes.



We could walk on gravel just as easily as grass. Our feet were tough and calloused. And filthy from the dirt and gravel. I spent more time in the evening washing my feet than I did the rest of my body. But I didn't care. It was worth it.

During the middle of summer, the asphalt and sand on the beach would get hot, even for us who were accustomed to it. But all we had to do is find a shady spot on the sandy beach, or wade in the water using the shoreline for travel. Most of the time, we didn't have any place in particular to go, we just wanted to go. So having to walk down the shoreline was just as good as walking along the beach. And as far as the asphalt, we were never far away from a neighbor's yard. And as long as we were just passing through, none of our neighbors cared if we walked through their yard.

Even today, I can't stand to wear shoes. The first thing I do when I walk into my or anyone's home I may visit is take off my shoes. Most people think I'm just being polite not trapsing through their house with shoes, but the truth is I HATE SHOES! And when someone stops by our house, the first thing they see is a pair of shoes next to the front door. First time or infrequent visitors often take it as a sign that we would prefer shoes to be off inside the house. But I don't care if someone wants to leave their shoes on while visiting. I quickly explain my perspective that shoes are a curse of civilization and they are positioned by the door for me to put them on when I walk down to our community mailbox. I truly don't care if they want to leave their shoes on while visiting. But I've also discovered that when I give them the choice, more often than not, they too shed their shoes.

The callouses are gone now because I rarely walk around very long outside barefoot. But the upside is that it doesn't take nearly as long to clean my feet at night.








Walk of Honor
