If you missed the Membership meeting last month you missed a good one. We held a Post Everlasting for 26 of our members that passed on to Post Everlasting over the last year. It was a very moving ceremony. After the Post Everlasting ceremony, we held a Member Initiation ceremony and initiated 6 Legionnaires into The American Legion. This month you will want to come because we will be holding elections of officers to run the Post for the next year. Your voice matters and helps us to get our direction for the following year.

I still need to get your input to complete the Consolidated Post Report (CPR). I have to complete this and turn it in by June 1<sup>st</sup>. The areas on the CPR where I need your help to complete are VA&R (Veteran Affairs & Rehabilitation), National Security, Americanism, Community Service Hours. Some examples are for Legion programs like donating blood, Boys State, Legion baseball, Honor Guard, etc. They can also be for things you do not just for the Legion; such as Toy Runs, volunteering at church, Veterans Stand Down, roadside cleanup, Vets4Vets runs, museum docent, etc. To assist you, I will send out a tracking sheet in the next 411. It is an easy way for you to track and report your activities, and for me to consolidate all the activities. Please watch for it and use it. If you do not know which block to check, I can do that for you if you give the activity a good description. They key is to just report it, no matter how small or if you think it matters. The reporting period is 1 June 2022 through 31 May. The American Legion as a whole is really bad about reporting all of the good we do.

Lastly; if you have not renewed your membership for 2025 yet, it expired on December  $31^{st}$ . I am in the office on most Mondays from 9:30-2:00. If you want to come by and talk with me or bring your renewal to the Post you can do so at that time or see me at one of the Friday dinners.

## From our Post Historian

April is the month in which America's deadliest conflict, The Civil War, began in 1861 and ended in 1865. Following the secession of 11 Southern states from the American Union, hostilities began when rebel forces attacked and captured Fort Sumter on 12 April, 1861. Four years and 620,000 battle fatalities later, Confederate General Robert E. Lee surrendered his Army to Union General Ulysses S. Grant at Appomattox Courthouse on 9 April, 1865.





On 1 April 1954, President Eisenhower signed a bill authorizing the U.S. Air Force Academy. The first class of cadets was sworn in at Lowry AFB in July, 1955 as construction began at the future permanent USAFA site in Colorado Springs.

The North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) was established on 4 April, 1949, linking the United States and Western Europe in a collective defense pact to defend against the authoritarian Communist military threat of the Soviet Union.

On 11 April, 1951, in perhaps the most notable dismissal in American military history, President Harry Truman relieved General of the Army Douglas MacArthur of command of U.S. forces in Korea. MacArthur had ignored Truman's plan for a negotiated truce in Korea, and advocated extending the war by invasion of the Chinese mainland and, Truman feared potential use of atomic weapons in the Asian theater. Truman believed MacArthur's failure to respect Presidential authority left him with no other choice. Hailed as a national hero upon his return to the United States and invited to speak before a joint session of



Congress, MacArthur observed that as "an old soldier that had tried to do his duty", he would now "just fade away." Consequently, so did Truman's public approval rating.



Over four months after the attack on Pearl Harbor, the 18 April, 1942 "Doolittle Raid" represented America's first retaliatory strike back at Japan. Led by Lt. Col. Jimmy Doolittle, 16 B-25 bombers launched from the deck of the USS *Hornet* on a one-way daylight bombing raid over Tokyo. The plan called for aircrews to crash land their aircraft over the Chinese mainland and hopefully receive assistance from the Chinese population. Remarkably, only seven U.S. crewmembers died in the unprecedented operation. Although limited in military value, the daring raid was a tremendous boost to American war morale.

American "patriots" demonstrated their rebellious nature on 19

April, 1775 in the "Battle" of Lexington and Concord, when Massachusetts militias and townsfolk fired on 700 British troops on a mission to seize the Concord arsenal held by rebels. Representing the first exchange of fire in an undeclared war between the British Empire and American colonials, the clash resulted in over 300 British casualties and became known as "the shot heard 'round the world."

"Remembering the Maine," the United States declared war on Spain on 25 April, 1898. An extensive naval investigation of the explosion of the USS *Maine*, which killed 266 American Sailors and Marines, determined that a suspected submerged mine was to

blame. American victory in the brief Spanish-American War ceded possession of Cuba, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Philippine Islands to the United States.

In the first recorded land battle fought overseas by U.S. forces, a detachment of Marines marched hundreds of miles through the North African desert "to the shores of Tripoli" to capture the Ottoman port city of Derna on 27 April, 1805 during the First Barbary War.

On 30 April, 1789, America inaugurated a military veteran as its first President. As the unanimous selection of electors, General George Washington was sworn in at Federal Hall on Wall Street in New York City. "First in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen," Washington led a life of honorable service. Since Washington, nearly two-thirds of U.S. Presidents have served in the military forces of this nation.







## From Our Post Service Officer

Lately, things have been somewhat "different" at the VA. I'm sure you have all heard about the staffing cuts, and the proposed additional 83,000 additional layoffs at the VA. Before you read too much into this, please watch the video the new VA Secretary, Doug Collins recently put out. You can go to Youtube and pull it up, but I can give you a summary of what he said. Essentially, there needs to be some changes at VA to make things more efficient and customer friendly. Also, the contracts that currently are in use at VA needs to be reviewed. After reviewing only 2% of these contacts, VA was able to eliminate over \$900 million in savings that will be able to be used to make veteran health care better! VA has never been perfect and it never will be, but changes need to be made to make it more efficient and that is what they are going to do. Change is hard, and it is unfortunate that anyone has to lose their job, but the bottom line is that we are here to serve the VETERAN, and anything we do should be with that in mind FIRST. Hopefully all these changes will improve access to care, quality of care, and overall outcomes of care! Let me know your thoughts!

Tell them what position you are interested in, your full name, and telephone number. American Legion Post 209 has many members who have been in these position in the past and they are always there to help you when asked. Even the current members who now fill these positions will gladly help you when asked.

For your convenience, here's a short description of all officer positions:

**Commander:** You are entrusted with supervising the duties of all other officers of the Post. You are the presiding officer at all meetings, and you must familiarize yourself with the policies and traditions of your Post and The American Legion.

**Adjutant:** Also known as the "First Sergeant." You are the Secretary of the Post. Post activities will revolve around you. The Adjutant is the Post personnel officer; maintains membership records, and minutes of meetings, checks up, and assists with the work of the other officers and Committees. In addition, you publish official orders, announcements, and instructions.

**Senior Vice Commander:** Your primary role is membership. No Post can survive without a strong membership. You should be familiar with ceremonial protocols for regular meetings. A Vice Commander must be ready to fill in for the Commander upon a moment's notice.

**Junior Vice Commander:** You must be ready to promote your Post. The Commander will depend on you to provide programs that spice up the meetings and attract attendance. You should contact other veteran and civic organizations so that each patriotic holiday and observance receives the attention it deserves. You are concerned with the pageantry of The American Legion. You should also be concerned with the welfare of all fellow veterans and Veteran Affairs and Rehabilitation Committees.

**Finance Officer:** You will serve as chair of the Finance Committee and will be responsible for receiving and disbursing Post funds. You will work closely with the Post Adjutant in all matters related to the finances of your Post.

**Service Officer:** You should be a dedicated person with a deep interest in fellow veterans, the Post, and the community. You are responsible for bringing to the attention of all veterans and their dependents the rights and benefits granted by law. You must know how to utilize the expert services available through Legion channels and local agencies. You should be ready to visit dependents upon a service member's death. You may be called upon to serve as chair of the Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Committee, working with children and youth committees, or making hospital visitations and appointed by the Commander-elect.

**Chaplain:** You must be a person capable of moral and intellectual leadership. You work closely with all other Officers of the Post. You should attend all meetings of the Post and Executive Committee. When requested, you should be ready to officiate at the funerals of members. The Chaplain must also be prepared to serve the bereaved families of Post members.

**Sergeant-at-Arms:** You should know how to arrange the meeting hall and assist the Post Commander and Adjutant. You are the custodian of the Colors and in charge of Colors details during presentation and retirement ceremonies. You should know how to display flags and their proper presentation. You are also responsible for maintaining order at all meetings.

**Historian:** You are responsible for preserving and compiling our Post's records/photos (specifically through our Scrapbook and website). It would help if you tried to attend Department Conventions and keep in touch with other Post Historians. [You are only encouraged to attend, not required.]

**Post Executive Committeeman:** You are a voting member of the Post Executive Committee and are entrusted with the government and management of the Post. You shall be responsible for representing the interests of the general membership to the Executive Committee.

**Judge Advocate:** You provide professional advice in conducting Post business or assist in procuring proper counsel. You are the interpreter of the Constitution and By-Laws of our Post. You may be asked to assist in auditing Post financial accounts, appointed by the Commander-elect.

## **Bringing A Little South to the West**

Growing up in the 60's, every kid in the neighborhood carried a pocket knife. We even took them to school. And you know what, nobody got stabbed...at least on purpose. A pocket knife had many uses; we could peel an apple, whittle a stick, play games like Mumblety Peg or Stretch, and sometimes use it to pick food out of our teeth.

I don't recall any kid we hung out with that didn't have a pocket knife. They came in a variety of sizes, lengths, and age. Some were very old, but they were the best. They were much better built than the newer ones and much more sturdy. Most were kept very sharp and we would occasionally test them by trying to shave the hair on our forearm. If we could do that with ease, the blade was considered to have a proper edge. If not, we'd normally harass the kid who didn't take proper care of their knife.

Whittling was a great pastime. Just pick up any size stick and start shaving away at one end. Often, we had no idea what we were making, we'd just whittle. As we went along, it would sometimes start to resemble something and then we would create a work of art that was cool and slick. Or we would just whittle until we put a point at the end of the stick.

Games with a pocket knife were something different. Mumblety Peg was a favorite. We would start on one side of our hand and arm, placing the point on a different appendage at a time, starting with our thumb and working across all fingers and we would "flip" the knife and make it stick in the ground. We'd work all five fingers first, then lay it in the palm and flip, then on the back of the hand and flip, and then the wrist, elbow, shoulder, forehead (you had to be very careful here), nose (again, very careful), chin, and down the other side. If you missed on the first try, you could pass the knife to the next person or take a chance with one more try. But if you missed the second time, you had to start all over when your time came back around. The last person to successfully complete the task lost the game and had to root a peg or matchstick out of the ground with their nose and pick it up with their teeth while mumbling (get the name now?).

Stretch was a little different and could only be played with two people standing face-to-face about three feet apart with legs standing at something resembling attention. Each would get one turn to flip their pocket knife some distance parallel to the other person's legs. If the knife stuck in the ground, that person had to "stretch" to where the knife landed. They would then get their turn to do the same. This would go on until someone stuck the knife in the ground too far for their opponent to reach. No peg had to be rooted. This was just bragging rights.










## Walk of Honor

- What are the costs for the individual bricks? Prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering desired but typically range from \$75 to \$200, depending on size.
- What are the costs for the corporate/veteran supporter bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$125 to \$500.

In addition, you will see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How do I pay for the brick? We have the site set up to accept payment via PayPal or check.
   PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick, and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where will the brick be shipped? All bricks will be sent to the post. We will notify you when it arrives, and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What will become of my brick? It will be placed near the flagpole at the post in the area we call the Walk of Honor.
- How long will this fundraiser effort last? We plan to continue selling bricks until the Walk of Honor is covered with personalized bricks.
- Will I have an opportunity to buy a brick later? Quite possibly, depending on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.
