## From our Incoming Post Adjutant



## From our Honor Guard Captain

The schedule for April and May is changing quite often. The Honor Guard is being requested for more community events now because the word is getting out that we are here and support OUR community. We are keeping busy with Final Honors for OUR veterans. The Honor Guard continues to need help providing the Final Honors <u>earned</u> by veterans. We hope someone will be there to support the Final Honors we <u>earned</u> when OUR time comes. We have been fortunate to welcome four new team members in the last six weeks, and we are working on getting them trained up and ready to support. We can always use more team members; there is no such thing as "too many." More members mean a higher likelihood of not turning down *any* Final Honors.

The daughter of a deceased Marine from WWII who fought on Iwo Jima (and survived) contacted the Honor Guard. She requests we provide the Full Final Honors for her father due to some issues with the Marines (we are helping work through the issues; it is what we do as part of our support for all families). While he passed away some time ago, he will now be interred at Pikes Peak National Cemetery with his Full Final Honors. While the family does not want a "big deal" for the service (i.e., no media), anyone who wants to attend is welcome. There will only be four people in attendance (three families and another), so I encourage anyone available to help show our support for this veteran and his family. The service is Friday, 20 May, with the procession departing from the Pikes Peak National Cemetery Administration building at 11:00 sharp!

The Honor Guard will also participate in the Memorial Day Ceremony at Pikes Peak National Cemetery. We will be performing a rifle salute in coordination with the gun (cannon) salute and possibly a musket salute. The ceremony is on Monday, 30 May, starts at 10:00, and is OPEN to the public. Attending this very important ceremony is an excellent use of time after spending way too long being restricted by COVID.

Reminder, Honor Guard members, supporting Final Honors events, effective immediately, a fuel stipend is provided., You can earn \$5 for supporting every two (2) qualifying events to help defray the fuel costs from the events. The Fuel Stipend is capped at ten (10) qualifying events (\$25) per month and will be paid to the Honor Guard members at the end of each month. However, this does not cover the total costs incurred, though, with fuel prices where they are, it helps. The biggest incentive for being an Honor Guard member is the sense of pride you get by helping provide Final Honors for OUR veterans and supporting OUR community.

In the interest of saving a little space, I will shorten the normal ending part of the article. While not everyone has a lot of time to participate in the Honor Guard, all someone needs are the time to participate a night or two for training meetings (2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday & 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday of every month) and even just **ONE** event a month. Members of The American Legion, Sons of The American Legion, and American Legion Auxiliary are all eligible. If you or anyone you know might be interested in supporting the Honor Guard, please reach out to me.

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

### Walk of Honor





- What are the costs for the corporate/veteran supporter bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$250 to \$500.
- What is the difference between individual and corporate bricks? Individual bricks are identified for veterans and family members of veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their veterans. The corporate bricks are for our veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who want to show their continued support for our nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the brick purchase restricted to members of the post 209 families? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves for their veteran loved one or to show their support for our veterans.
- Where do I go to buy a brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit <a href="http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209">http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209</a> to buy your brick. The site is user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How do I pay for the brick? We have the site set up to accept payment via PayPal or check.
   PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick, and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where will the brick be shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the post. We will notify you when it arrives, and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What will become of my brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the post and part of the landscaping design we are working on. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- **How long will this fundraiser effort last?** We plan only to sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project.
- Will I have an opportunity to buy a brick later? Quite possibly, depending on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.


Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know, and we will make sure they are all placed together.

## **Legacy Scholarship Pony Express Run**

Support the Children of our Disabled and Fallen by contributing to The American Legion Legacy Scholarship. Eligible recipients include the children of U.S. military members who died while on active duty on or after 11 September 2001 and children of post -9/11 veterans having been assigned a combined disability rating of 50 percent or greater by the Department of Veterans Affairs qualify. The American Legion Legacy Scholarship helps ensure higher education is a possibility for children who lost a parent to death on active duty or suffered a service-connected disability rated 50 percent or greater by V.A. since the terrorist attacks of 11 September 2001.



Colorado The American Legion Post families across the state engage in fundraising efforts or contribute to the 2022 fundraising effort in conjunction with their program during the year. The donations received are consolidated at various relay stations across the state.

On 6 August 2022, Colorado The American Legion Riders will conduct the statewide Pony Express run, riding one of the designated routes to collect donations from the relay stations. All routes will reach a central collection point in the afternoon for a campaign celebration and some good old-fashioned fun.

## **Bringing A Little South to the West**

Growing up, just about every kid in America's favorite month of the year (other than December) was May. We knew school was about to let out, and time to start our summer vacation. Unless that is, you were dumb enough to have to go to summer school (10<sup>th</sup> grade). But that's for another article and another day.

May seemed to drag out and appeared to be the longest month. But as we got older and achieved the status of high schoolers, May was also a very event-filled month. So, we had Assemblies in preparation for the end of the year, final exams, and the Prom. Then, as we got nearer to graduation (10-12 grade), we also filled our school days getting our yearbook signed, and as a senior, our class rings.

I still have my Yearbooks from my Sophomore, Junior, and Senior years. It's fun to look through those old pictures and see how dorky we all looked. There were also several pictures of our teachers, the principal and staff, various clubs, sporting events, and cameos of students in a community setting. 
