## **Officers' Comments**

Below is a follow-on article to the visit we had at our May meeting from Kathy Scally, Director of Clinical Services, Preferred Hospice. It concerns hospice care, and I think it is of importance to all members. Please contact her at the address following the article, if you have questions.

### **Hidden Healthcare Benefits**

Everyone wants to capitalize on their healthcare benefits, but few realize there are services for end of life care that are covered by their insurance. Hospice services provide care for people when cure is no longer possible. These services can be provided at home, in independent or assisted living centers, at Alzheimer's units or in long-term care facilities.

Hospice services provide medications that are related to the hospice diagnosis as well as pain control. They also provide medical equipment such as hospital beds, wheelchair and specialized equipment. Hospice also provides nursing services, nursing assistants to help with activities of daily living, social work services, and Chaplain and bereavement services.

Hospice services are covered by Medicare, Medicaid and most commercial insurances. Tricare and Tricare for Life also cover hospice benefits. Anyone with a life expectancy of 6 months or

less qualifies for hospice. Anyone who can no longer be treated, or whose treatment fails can receive hospice benefits; hospice is not just for incurable cancer.

As with every component of healthcare you have a choice. There are many hospices to choose from. How do you know what to look for in a hospice? You must call and find out specifically what the hospice offers. Can the visits be tailored to your needs? Is there a nurse available 24 hours a day? What professional services are offered and will they meet not only your needs, but also your family needs? Will you see the same staff routinely? What specific medications and equipment can they provide? How many times a week can you expect to see each hospice team member? When can an admission take place?

The hospice benefit requires your physician to write the initial order. You, as the healthcare consumer, must be knowledgeable of all your benefits and discuss your options with your healthcare providers. Hospice can provide valuable support at a time when you need it the most. Call your local hospices and find out if they can provide the services you need.

**SURRENDER OF GERMANY**

In the spring of 1945, the USA was on the verge of leading the allied forces to victory. A year earlier, Allied Forces under General Eisenhower invaded Europe through the coast of Normandy. The US troops advanced gradually on France, Holland, Denmark and Germany. The USSR (Russia), armed and supplied by the USA, had taken the Eastern front and was closing on Berlin.

In March President Roosevelt returned from Yalta, Russia where he had met with Churchill and Stalin to discuss postwar issues and territorial problems because Germany and Japan were on the brink of defeat. Roosevelt's health became very precarious, and though he had just been re-elected, he suffered a massive stroke and died. On April 12, 1945, Vice President Truman was sworn in as the new President of the United States.

Shortly after, Hitler killed himself in a bunker in Berlin on May 7<sup>th</sup>, 1945, and the German High Command surrendered unconditionally to General Eisenhower. A proclamation to the American people announcing the surrender was broadcasted the next morning. President Truman stated:

“The Allied armies, through sacrifice and devotion and with God’s help have wrung from Germany a final and unconditional surrender. The western world has been freed of the evil forces which for five years and longer have imprisoned the bodies and broken the lives of millions upon millions of free-born men. They have violated their churches, destroyed their homes, corrupted their children and murdered their loved ones. Our Armies of Liberation have restored freedom to these suffering peoples whose spirit and will the oppressors could never enslave.”

After six catastrophic years, the war against Nazi Germany was over. The price was extremely high in lives, human suffering and destruction. The United States of America lost 407,000 troops and 6,000 civilians.

Thank you so very much, World War II veterans, for your tremendous sacrifices in defense of freedom. You sustained a lot through the dark days and adversity of the war.
