From the desk and mind of the Commander

I want to start this month's article by thanking you for the trust you have given me to be the Commander of our post for the coming year. I do not take this responsibility lightly. I talked with the new Commander for the Sons of The American Legion and the presidents of the American Legion Auxiliary and American Legion Riders. We have developed some ideas and plans that you will see in the next few months.

For those of you that may not know, I served in the Navy from 1988 to 1997. On April 25, 1988, I enlisted and went to Recruit Training Command Orlando, Florida, for boot camp. This was definitely not the right time of the year to be in Orlando with the heat and humidity they get down there. I reported to the USS John F. Kennedy CV-67 in August of 1988, meeting them in the Mediterranean where they had just started their deployment. I spent almost two years on the Kennedy and then cross-decked over to the USS Inchon LPH-12, reporting on board in August of 1990. We deployed to the Med in September 1990 with a stop off the coast of Liberia for Operation Sharp Edge, where we evacuated the U.S. Embassy due to an ongoing civil war in the country. Orders then sent us into the Mediterranean for Operation Desert Shield and Operation Desert Storm buildup in early October. We were one of the first ships back to Norfolk after Operation Desert Storm, so we were sent back to the Mediterranean for a routine deployment six months later.

I departed the Inchon in December 1992 to report to Naval Support Force Antarctica in January 1993 as summer support. When I arrived in California for Naval Supply Systems Command Antarctica, I found out that the summer season of 1993 would be the last since the Navy was turning the Firehouse and Crash Firehouse over to civilians in October 1994. I volunteered to winter over in 1994 and was accepted, so I spent the whole year in Antarctica instead of just five months. This was one of my favorite duty assignments. I left Antarctica in October 1994 and reported to Naval Air Station Fallon, NV, in December 1994 and served there until I separated in December 1997. I did enjoy my time in the Navy, and as their slogan at the time went, it was not just a job but an adventure. I always tell people I would not have seen the countries I have without the Navy.

A little about my legion career: I have been our Post Adjutant, Post Executive Committeemen, and Post Sr. Vice Commander. I have also been District 7 Adjutant, District 7 Senior Vice Commander, and District 7 Commander for two years. I currently serve as the Department Finance Officer for the past 3.5 years.

I am excited for the year to come, and thank you for all you do to help veterans and Post 209.

TAKE A HIKE...or, a more polite way to say that is let's go for a walk. Michelle Bresee (Unit 209) and I would be delighted if you could join us for a walk once or twice a month. This would be an excellent way to knock out a few miles for the 100 Miles for Hope Challenge, but it would also be a lovely couple of hours for everyone else. Join us, challenge or not. And please bring family and friends.

The plan is to meet in the Post parking lot on the second Sunday and fourth Saturday at 1000 Hrs. There is access to Palmer Park trails right around the corner. We will start easy at 3 miles round trip, but if you plan and preposition an escape vehicle, there is an extraction point at the halfway point (Lazy Land picnic area off of Austin Bluffs and Brenner Pl.). But of course, you can turn around at any point.

We have walked the trail before and find it easy and mostly flat, packed earth with some spots with loose sand. There is a small hill just before Lazy Land that does have the 3 Rs. Roots, Ruts, Rocks. But it is a small area and a short hill. This is not the ranger selection course or a forced march; it's at our leisurely group pace. But if you want to ruck it, bring it along!

Eventually, we can make the northern loop taking the Grandview and Palmer Point trails. That is a little more challenging at around 5.5 miles and more 3R obstacles. After that, maybe we move on to other parks and open areas around C.S. if you wish. So I'll start scouting, and if you know of any for me to check out, let me know.

This is a group walk, not an event. YOU are responsible for your level of fitness. But this is a park in the city with pretty close road access, so we won't roll you under a bush if something does happen. Good walking shoes are required, as is anything else you feel you might need (water, power bar, etc.).

Our first walk will be the second Sunday in June, the 12th, at 1000 Hrs., followed by June 25th. When we have returned from the walk, we can replace those lost calories at a local eatery like Doug's if you wish. I will cause y'know, ...Doug's.

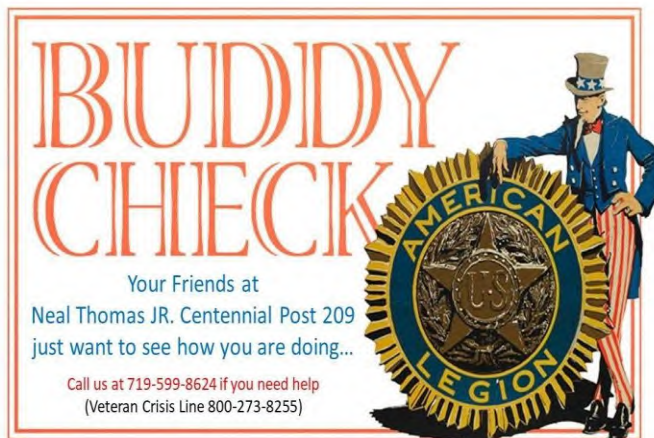
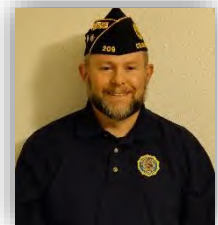
From the desk of our Finance Officer

From our Honor Guard Captain

By the time the newsletter is released, the Honor Guard will have participated in the Memorial Day ceremony at Pikes Peak National Cemetery (PPNC). We have the honor of performing a 3-volley rifle salute in coordination with the gun (cannon) salute. On Monday, May 30, the meaningful ceremony pays tribute to the fallen after spending way too long being restricted by COVID. We will submit an article about the event and our involvement to National for possible posting on the Honor and Remembrance Honor Guards page.

The schedule for June is starting to pick up, sometimes changing daily or multiple times in a day. We expect to have a busy summer, as this is traditionally when the most requests are received. Some requests come to the team from places outside the Colorado Springs area. We have developed a reputation as "the ones to call for support" for services at PPNC. We also see more requests directly from family members, resulting in the need to provide more support to help them understand what to expect and help navigate the process of getting the military service support requested. As a result, we will update the Honor Guard webpage to help provide additional information for those seeking our support.

The most significant incentive for being an Honor Guard member is the sense of pride you get by helping provide final honors for OUR veterans and supporting OUR community. However, just a reminder, other incentives are being put in place for being an Honor Guard member supporting final honors events. A fuel stipend is available for every two qualifying events an Honor Guard member supports. You can earn \$5 to help defray the fuel costs from supporting the events. The fuel stipend is capped at ten qualifying events (\$25) per month and paid to the Honor Guard members at the end of each month. This does not cover the total costs, though it helps. In addition, a dry cleaning stipend will be rolling out soon.

I'm proud to announce our membership exceeded the 100% goal with only two or three members or renewals to meet the aspirational goal of seventy-five members for 2022. This represents the first increase in our squadron since before 2019 and the pandemic.

Special recognition and congratulations to Ken Taylor; he will receive an honorary lifetime membership as our thanks to him for his long, dedicated, influential, and continued leadership and sacrifice to Squadron 209. Steve Hayes was the winner of the quarter one SAL meeting participation door prize, a \$50 Visa gift card. 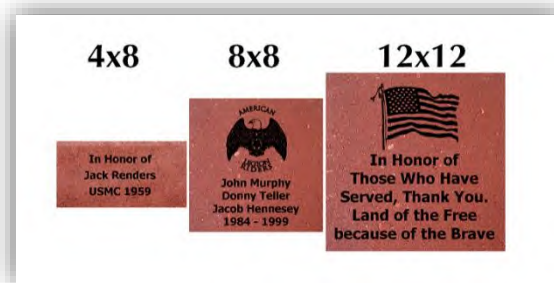

Walk of Honor



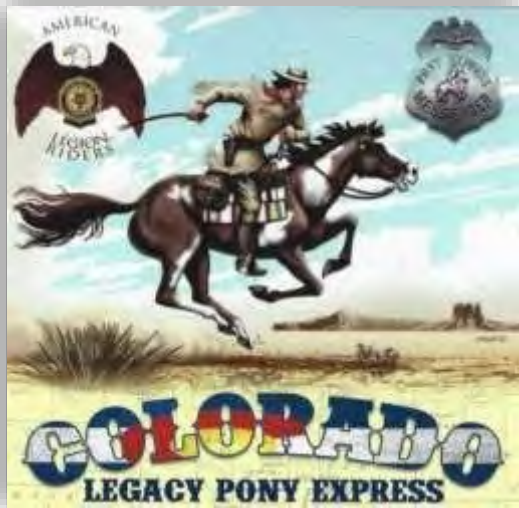
- **What are the costs for the individual bricks?** Prices vary depending on size, style and lettering desired but typically ranged from \$90 to \$200 depending on size.
- **What are the costs for the corporate/veteran supporter bricks?** Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$250 to \$500.
- **What is the difference between individual and corporate bricks?** Individual bricks are for veterans and family members of veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their veterans. The corporate bricks are for our veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who want to show their continued support for our nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- **Is the brick purchase restricted to members of the post 209 families?** No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves for their veteran loved ones or to show their support for our veterans.
- **Where do I go to buy a brick?** We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit <http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209> to buy your brick. The site is user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- **How do I pay for the brick?** We have the site set up to accept payment via PayPal or check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick, and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- **Where will the brick be shipped?** All bricks will be sent to the post. We will notify you when it arrives, and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- **What will become of my brick?** It will be placed near the flagpole at the post. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- **How long will this fundraiser effort last?** We plan only to sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project.
- **Will I have an opportunity to buy a brick later?** Quite possibly, depending on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.



Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know, and we will make sure they are all placed together.

Legacy Scholarship Pony Express Run

Support the Children of our Disabled and Fallen by contributing to The American Legion Legacy Scholarship. Eligible recipients include the children of U.S. military members who died while on active duty on or after 11 September 2001 and children of post -9/11 veterans having been assigned a combined disability rating of 50 percent or greater by the Department of Veterans Affairs qualify. The American Legion Legacy Scholarship helps ensure higher education is a possibility for children who lost a parent to death on active duty or suffered a service-connected disability rated 50 percent or greater by V.A. since the terrorist attacks of 11 September 2001.



Colorado American Legion Post families across the state engage in fundraising efforts or contribute to the 2022 fundraising effort in conjunction with their program during the year. The donations received are consolidated at various relay stations across the state.

On 6 August 2022, Colorado American Legion Riders will conduct the statewide Pony Express run, riding one of the designated routes to collect donations from the relay stations. All routes will reach a central collection point in the afternoon for a campaign celebration and some good old-fashioned fun.

But we also had several other jobs in and throughout the Memphis area and suburbs where we grew up.

Like many other kids my age, I was a paperboy at one point. Nowadays, most newspaper carriers drive to deliver the morning edition, but my delivery system was done on my 20" red, big tire bicycle. I did this for a couple of months one summer because I realized getting up before daylight to receive, fold, and deliver newspapers was not for me.

One of the more interesting jobs I did put the "odd" in odd jobs. I worked for a carnival. I helped put together and run the "Tilt-a-Whirl." But it was the people who traveled with the carnival that made it odd, not the rides. These guys reminded me of the characters portrayed in *Easy Rider* with Peter Fonda. While they looked like loners, they were very much a family. One evening a customer felt he had been shorted in his ride. He had been "celebrating" probably affected his disposition and inability to gauge time accurately. He loudly expressed his displeasure and wanted a "pound of flesh" from the ride operator, a 250-pound bearded, long-hair member of this carnival family. The operator shouted a "code word" in less than a minute; the customer was surrounded by other carnival guys with chains, pipe wrenches, and lead pipes. It was a very sobering sight, and fortunately, he decided his ride had ended in a sufficient amount of time. After that incident, I decided it was time to change careers.

Another odd job was helping a friend re-stock her bar at a Honky-Tonk in Mississippi. For those unfamiliar with the term, a Honky-Tonk is a country bar that plays live country music. Back in the day, this was a popular venue for local musicians like Elvis Presley, Jerry Lee Lewis, and Johnny Cash, to name just a few. This job ended the day a six-pack exploded and drenched me in beer. My parents' friend took me home and explained that I had not been drinking even though I smelled like a brewery. My parents said they believed the story, but they also decided I should seek employment elsewhere after that incident.

I worked in grocery stores and retail stores part-time. I also worked briefly for a landscaper mowing and weed-eating residential homes. I HATE doing that type of work now. We drove through farm areas selling watermelons from my Dad's pickup bed. We also drove up to a cousin's sawmill in northwest Arkansas to get a load of hickory hand tool handles that we sold at various local hardware stores.

Well, gotta go. Jackie has a few odd jobs for me. Those never seem to end, and they are not very interesting anyway. It is unlikely you'll hear about them from me in a future article.
