And the Drive is On!

Beginning 1 July, we start our 2025 membership drive for The American Legion, the American Legion Auxiliary, and the Sons of The American Legion. Please remember your membership due date of 31 December is NOT when you should consider renewing. You should do it when you get that first renewal notice! This will ensure there is no lapse in your membership status, keep the Legion magazine coming to your doorstep without a hitch, and save our organizations from spending hundreds of thousands of dollars sending renewal reminder notices. This is money that could and should be used to further our great programs. And don't forget, effective 1 July, dues for our Legionnaires will go up to \$55/year, and up to \$45/year for the Auxiliary. The Auxiliary juniors will stay at \$12/year. 2025 dues for our SAL Squadron will be \$30/year for adults and \$20/year for juniors under 18. These new rates are the result of the increase announced by our respective national organizations. We're still the best deal in town, and this is the first increase we've seen in nine years. Don't you wish inflation would have done the same thing? And oh by the way, if you get your renewal in early, you will be eligible to receive a "free meal" in October when we have our "Early Bird" dinner event.


Happy Independence Day! It's great to be an American! But there's a freedom even greater!

From our Post Historian

1 July 1898 – Colonel Theodore Roosevelt's 1st U.S. Volunteer Cavalry, popularly known as the "Rough Riders," were among the forces that captured the San Juan Heights above Santiago, Cuba in the brief but consequential Spanish-American War. The American victory, in which the U.S. Navy destroyed most of Spain's warships, brought an end to the Spanish Empire and ceded Cuba, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Philippines to the United States.







2 July 1863 – Colonel Joshua Chamberlain's courageous leadership of his 20th Maine Infantry in defense of the Union left flank at Little Round Top in the Battle of Gettysburg earned him the Medal of Honor. The costly Union victory at the three-day Battle of Gettysburg was a turning point in the American Civil War. Two years later, Major General Chamberlain was designated to accept the formal surrender of Confederate forces at Appomattox Courthouse.

4 July 1776 — "Appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions... With a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence," the Continental Congress formally declared American independence from the British Empire. Seven additional years of military operations were required before the British government was forced to acknowledge the United States of America as an independent nation. Happy Independence Day!

16 July 1945 – America's first prototype atomic bomb was detonated at the Los Alamos, NM "Trinity Site" as President Harry Truman was meeting with Soviet leader Stalin and British Prime Minister Churchill in Potsdam, Germany. Upon receiving the news of the successful test, Truman issued the Potsdam Declaration demanding the unconditional surrender of the Japanese government, warning that failure to heed the declaration would end in Japan's "prompt and utter destruction." When the Japanese government ignored the demand, Truman never hesitated to employ the newest weapon in America's arsenal; from Truman instructed the U.S. Germany, Secretary of War to "release when ready...."



26 July 1947 – President Truman signed the National Security Act, which in addition to creating the CIA and the National Security Council, reorganized the military branches into a National Military Establishment (renamed Department of Defense) under the control of a single Secretary of Defense, disbanded the War Department into a Department of the Army and the newly independent U.S. Air Force, and created the Joint Chiefs of Staff to advise the executive branch on military matters.



26 July 1948 – President Truman signed Executive Order 9981, which abolished segregation in the U.S. armed forces and ordered full integration of all branches, providing for equality of treatment and opportunity for all persons in the armed services without regard to race, color, religion or national origin. "I am asking for equality of opportunity for all human beings, and as



long as I stay here, I am going to continue that fight." Initially there was considerable resistance to the executive order from many military leaders, however the Korean War accelerated the policy, and by war's end, most of the military was fully integrated.

27 July 1953 – Combat operations in the Korean War ended in a signed armistice, creating a demilitarized zone (DMZ) between North and South Korea along the 38th parallel. To this day, as no formal peace treaty has ever been concluded, "Cold War" tensions still exist on the Korean peninsula. American military intervention in Korea (1950-53) cost our nation over 36,000 lives and has resulted in a continuous U.S. military presence in South Korea since 1950.

From our Color/Honor Guard Captain

Every once in a while, a veteran's family will touch you in a way you can never forget. I am sure every member of the team has the one or two particular Final Honors they supported that stand out for them, myself included. Back in early April, Valerie, our Honor Guard Coordinator, was contacted by the family of a veteran requesting our support for his Final Honors. This request was a little different than the usual requests that we receive. SGT Bernard Diaz served in the





Army during WWII, was 100 years and four months old when he passed, was eligible to be interred at Arlington National Cemetery, and his wishes were to be interred here at Pikes Peak National Cemetery. Since he did not retire, the Army would provide the required two personnel for the playing of TAPS and folding / presenting the American Flag, so we were needed for the rifle volleys. Valerie spoke with the family periodically to keep them updated on the status of our support, but with being two months out we did not expect to see the signups for support to be solid until later. As weeks went by, the signups for support on the Honor Guard Event Calendar were not looking good for that service. We were sitting at only two members signed up for the Final Honors (three is the minimum required to support). The thought of having to tell this family that their veteran was not going to receive the Final Honors he greatly deserved was starting to really bother Valerie. She dreads having to deny requests for support from a funeral director, but absolutely hates it when she has to tell a family directly that we cannot get the three members necessary to be there for their veteran's Final Honors. With this family, the thought of saying "we cannot be there" was hitting harder since the family she had built a rapport with was so kind and hopeful that the Honor Guard would be there for a veteran of the Greatest Generation. Finally, with little time to spare and some team member schedule changes, there were enough members available to support the event. The look on Valerie's face showed the sheer joy she felt being able to tell the family a couple of days prior to the event that our team would be there. We ended up with four members signed up to support the event, which is actually the number I prefer to have since it allows for the command / presenter of the expended rounds to be outside the rank of the firing party. Four members also helps ensure that we have enough available in case someone is unable to support at the last minute, which unfortunately was the case with this event. So, the team was very lucky to still have enough personnel available to provide the requested support. I was present at the event yesterday for this veteran, though due to a uniform mishap, I sadly was unable to provide support (again, luckily there was fourth member). I saw the family waiting after everyone else had started for their cars, looking towards the Honor Guard building. Valerie had told the family I would be present and they were looking for me. As I left the Honor Guard building to meet with the family, one of them (great-granddaughter?) had started walking towards me with a small bag. She thanked me for having our team out there to support, to which I responded with the customary "it is an honor and a privilege for us to be there for our veterans." While we sometimes are handed donations after the events, this time I was told that this was a small gift for Valerie to thank her for the support and compassion she provided their family during the time leading up to the service. I could see the other family member (daughter), holding the folded flag, still waiting and Bill waving me over. The look of sincere thanks and appreciation on her face when I took her hand and offered the team's condolences was all it took, no words were needed. While a part of me does get a little "emotional" at every Final Honors I attend, there are a few that hit quite a bit harder. The family and the impact of our support makes this Final Honors one I will never forget. When I returned home, I handed Valerie the bag and told her how it was a gift from the family to her. She was quite surprised, to say the least, since no one has ever done that before. I am quite sure that this will be a family that Valerie will not forget either. Oh, and the gift was what former (and greatly missed) Honor Guard team member Brad Henderson would describe as "a bottle of grape juice – aged in oak" along with a personal note written to her on a picture of a very young SGT Diaz in uniform.

I want to take a moment to thank Bill Thomas, Jeff Heischman, and Steve Hayes for their support the last couple of months. While there are several Honor Guard members that provide much



needed support to the team, these three team members were crucial to the team's success. Due to multiple work and personal commitments (some very unplanned), the team was able to continue providing our veterans Final Honors largely due to the efforts of these three team members and their dedication to our mission. Thank you very much for your extraordinary efforts during a difficult time, I am extremely grateful.

I am sure you are well aware by now, the Honor Guard continues to work very hard support our veterans and our community... but, we **NEED YOUR HELP!** A large portion of the team have full time jobs, or are otherwise not available, there are only a handful of team members supporting the majority of all events. Unfortunately, this has led to the team denying requests to support Final Honors at veterans' services due to not having the minimum three members available. This means veterans are not receiving the Final Honors they both earned and deserve; which is something each of us have earned and should expect when it is our turn. Please, read the next paragraph and ask yourself – "Do I have a few hours each month to support even just one event?"

And now for the standard ending of my newsletter article — Want to be part of a great team? The Honor Guard needs to gain more new team members in order to ensure we are able to continue supporting our veterans and our community. Understandably, not everyone has much time to participate in the Honor Guard. In reality, all someone needs are a few available hours: about an hour to participate a night for a training meeting (check the newsletter calendar or the calendar on the Honor Guard website - https://legion209.org/honorguard209/) and up to a couple of hours for an event. So around three hours a month for a meeting and just **ONE** event is all you need to make a difference in helping support our veterans and our community. Members of The American Legion, the Sons of The American Legion, and The American Legion Auxiliary are all eligible to be members of the Honor Guard with all uniform items provided except Legion family-specific cap and shoes. From our Junior Shooting Sports Program

The Young Guns Basic Course provides youth ages 10-18 years old (boys and girls) the opportunity to learn about firearms safety and basic shooting skills. During Young Guns, credentialed National Rifle Association (NRA) Basic Rifle Instructors teach the safe handling of firearms, shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing), how to zero a rifle, and how to score targets. At the end of the course, the youth have a competition shoot against the others in the course in order to show off the skills they have learned. The Marksmanship Course provides graduates of Young Guns the opportunity to further develop their shooting skills. If you have a



child, grandchild, niece, nephew, neighbor kid, etc. interesting in learning about firearm safety, contact the Post 209 JSSP at: jssp209@gmail.com.

The Fall 2024 Junior Shooting Class flyer has been posted on the Young Guns website. The Young Guns brochure, Basic Course Application (new shooters), and Marksmanship Course Application are also available on the website. The cost for students is \$30. It is never too early to sign up, so send in your youth's application today! The Fall 2024 classes start with Marksmanship on Wednesday September 11 and Young Guns on Thursday September 12.

The JSSP needs Instructors and Range Safety Officers (RSOs) to support the program, ensuring quality instruction and a safe range for the students. A tentative schedule has been set for holding NRA Basic Rifle and NRA Basic RSO Courses this summer. The scheduled courses are based on interest and number of student signups, a minimum of four students are needed for each course at least two weeks prior to the course date (to allow for ordering materials from the NRA). The cost for each course is \$60 and covers: all materials, range time, firearm use, ammunition, and lunch. The courses scheduled are:

- NRA Basic Range Safety Officer Course 07:00-17:00 at Post 209 Saturday August 3 (Sign up by July 19)
- NRA Basic Rifle Course 07:30-17:00 (07:30-15:00 at Post 209, 15:30-17:00 at a range TBD) Sunday August 18 (Sign up by August 2)

Every year since childhood, the 4th of July brings fond memories of Black Kat Firecrackers, Sparklers, and many other types of fireworks we set off in celebration of our Declaration of Independence from England. There were many brands of firecrackers, but nothing compared to Black Kat. They were loud and pretty powerful for a firecracker. But if you wanted something to really blow things up, you got M-80's or Cherry Bombs.

Cherry Bombs were aptly named. They looked like a cherry. They were red and round and the fuse resembled the stem. But there was nothing sweet about them. Just watching one go off earned enough respect to know you don't hold it in your hands when you light it. And if they weren't scary enough, we had M-80's. These monsters were about 1 ½ inches long and tube-shaped with the fuse coming out from the middle of the tube. They looked harmless, but they had been known to blow a couple of fingers off if you were dumb enough to hold them in your hand to light. I don't think you can even buy M-80's these days. Good! Both of these were for very special use, but they gave us a big thrill to watch them go off. Growing up I'd heard of some kids putting Cherry Bombs in the commode in the Boys Room, but I don't recall anything like happening in my school. We did some stupid things, but nothing that was destructive to school property.

While Sparklers were cool to light up at night and have sword fights, firecrackers were our primary source of pleasure and not just during the Independence Day holiday. We pretty much played with them yearround. I remember on one occasion we were visiting grandparents on their farm in Missouri. They lived on a gravel road and had a neighbor across the road who had a farm and also raised chickens for laying. The chickens were kept in a pen on the side of their house and the pen was large enough for the chickens to wander around outside the coop. Also near the pen was an apple tree. There was always a large supply of rotten apples laying on the ground. Me, Bubba, and the kid who lived at the house and was about our age got the idea to use the rotten apples as hand grenades. We, being the geniuses we were, thought it would be really funny to put a Black Kat firecracker in the top of the rotten apple, light them up and toss them into the pen. When the apple grenade exploded, it was hilarious watching the chickens screech and scamper. Yep, it was great fun until the kid's Mom saw us from the kitchen window. The three of us found it a little uneasy sitting down for a few days after that. My grandparents didn't often spank us, but they also didn't shy away from it when warranted. And looking back, this was one of those times. I also heard those chickens didn't lay eggs for several days.

But back to our Independence Day celebration. Other than firecrackers, Roman Candles, Bottle Rockets, and Sparklers, the other major attraction was always the fireworks over the Mississippi River. We would drive down Riverside Drive and park along the river. We'd get out of the station wagon, lay on the hood and/or on top of the car and wait for nightfall. Every year the city would put on a firework's show that was the highlight of the day. Hundreds of cars would be parked along the Drive watching the show. And they never let us down.

I don't know if I've outgrown the thrill of playing with firecrackers, but I can tell you the cost would keep me from buy them now. Wow! The thought of spending a couple hundred dollars for 15 minutes of fun isn't appealing. But I do still enjoy watching a good firework's display like the one over

Pikes Peak or at the Baseball Stadium. They always bring back great memories, and

it doesn't cost me a cent. That also makes me smile.




Walk of Honor
