The Habit of Winning

Winning is not a sometime thing. You don't win once in a while. You don't do things right once in awhile. You do them right all the time.

Winning is a habit. Unfortunately, so is losing. There is no room for second place. There is only one place in my game and that is first place. I have finished second twice in my time at Green Bay and I don't ever want to finish second again. There is second place bowl game — but it is a game for losers played by losers. It is and always has been an American zeal to be first in anything we do, and to win.

Every time a football player goes out to play, he's got to play from the ground up. From the soles of his feet right up to his head.

Every inch of him has to play.

Some guys play with their heads.

That's okay – you've got to be smart to be number one in any business, but more important, you've got to play with your heart.

With every fiber of your body. If you are lucky enough to find a guy with a lot of head and a lot of heart, He's never going to come off the field second.

Running a football team is no different from running any other kind of organization — an army, a political party, a business. The problems are the same. The objective is to win, to beat the other guy. Maybe that sounds hard or cruel. I don't think it is.

Without members there would be no Legion Programs. Without members we would have no voice on Capitol Hill.


Without members there would be no accomplishments in assistance and support to veterans, their families, the community, state, and nation.

VA Expands Agent Orange Registry

On Thursday, 2 August 2001, there was an email posted that indicated the VA had expanded the registry for Agent Orange to include Veterans who came in contact with the herbicide at Fort Drum N.Y. Fort Drum was added to the list after the Department of the Army

acknowledged that testing of the herbicide was conducted at Fort Drum during 1959. Last year the VA added Veterans who were in Korea during 1968 and 1969 near the Demilitarized Zone

Portable Oxygen Systems

The VA has entered into an agreement with Bell Enterprise Corporation to provide a secure device to hold the potable oxygen tank while riding or driving in a vehicle.

Sometimes the tanks will freeze if not kept upright. Also the tank could become a projectile in a collision.

In order to get this device, all you should have to do is contact the VA Clinic in Colorado Springs and Pueblo or the VA in Denver for the proper procedures in obtaining the safety device.

TYPE II DIABETES

In January, the VA put out that veterans who served in Vietnam from 9 January 1962 to 7 May 1975 and have developed Diabetes after they were released/retired from the military should file a claim through the VA. The reason for this is that Diabetes has been added to the list of compensational diseases connected to Agent Orange.

A Veteran or a surviving member of a deceased Vietnam Veteran who died at least in part due to Type 2 diabetes, should file an informal claim stating that the claimant is seeking disability benefits (or, for survivors, death benefits) because the disability (or death) was due to Type 2 diabetes which resulted from Agent Orange exposure; and if due to Type 2 which results from Agent Orange; and if such a claim has been denied in the past.

An informal claim need merely be a letter. But be advised the more information that you can provide the better off you will be.

VA Proposes Raise in Non-Service Connected Medication Co-Payments

The VA has proposed that the \$ 2.00 co-pay per prescription per month be raised by 300% to \$ 7.00 per medicine per month.

As it stands now if you are taking ten prescriptions you pay \$ 20.00 per month and you are provided enough medication for three months at a cost of \$ 60.00. Under the proposal it would cost you \$ 70.00 per month. And for a three month supply the cost would be \$ 210.00. This will not affect service-connected medication.

You can let the VA know how you feel on this by writing the Department of Veteran Affairs, 810 Vermont Ave., NW, Washington, DC 20420.

We need to get letters into the VA by 10 September telling them we are not in favor of the increase in Co-Pay.

I realize that it isn't much time to react but because of the time frame that I discovered this email on the internet and when our newsletters go to print it makes it hard to get this information out in a timely manner.
