FROM THE DESK & MIND OF THE COMMANDER

Why do all my friends kill themselves? A question I was asked a couple of weeks ago by a grieving Fort Carson Soldier, who was mourning the loss of his friend who he had just lost to suicide. This question continues to haunt me, because like him I am all too familiar with the pain this Sergeant is feeling. I sat and listened to groups of soldiers from his platoon talk and say things like, "I just talked to him," "he said he was good," "he was always the one to help others." I couldn't help but think how many more times will I have to hear these words? How many more times will we wonder what else could we have done?

The American Legion like many organizations understand that Military & Veteran suicide is a pandemic within our community. Between 2005 and 2017, 78,875 Veterans took their own lives. The reasons are not fully understood, but the numbers reflect a burden with heavy wartime demands after almost two decades of post-9/11 wars. In a 2018 white paper published by The American Legion, two of the many root causes for Military & Veteran Suicide contributed to losing a sense of purpose & losing a sense of belonging.

During the First World War, psychiatrists noted that "shell-shocked" soldiers treated closer to the frontlines with the support of their comrades showed a higher level of recovery and mental health improvements vs those who were evacuated from their units. The Veterans ranging from Vietnam to the current Global War on Terrorism, rejoined a civilian populous that was either against the conflict (think Vietnam) or become disconnected from the war as a whole (think our current 19-year conflict).

In a 2011 Pew Research Center study, 84 percent of Post-9/11 veterans said the public does not understand the problems faced by those in the military or their families. Stereotypes portrayed in the media haven't helped much either; PTSD, unemployed, injured, or unstable are a few of those stereotypes.

There is some good news though. Veterans, although some maybe troubled by their past, still have a willingness to continue to serve even after leaving the military. The skills learned in the military make Veterans a top choice for leaders in private and non-profit positions. Groups like The American Legion, VFW, Team Rubicon, and many others continue to provide the outlet and support for active duty service members and Veterans.

The American Legion is committed to ending Military & Veteran Suicide by establishing a Suicide Prevention Program. This committee reviews methods, programs and strategies that can be used to reduce Veteran suicide. Since 1981, The American Legion passed national resolutions to combat suicide, 20 years before it was identified as a public health crisis by the VA.

Here at Post 209 we can rally together to help all persons struggling with thoughts of suicide. Together, we can give them a place of belonging, a sense of purpose. Together we can call our comrades, be they Legionnaires or not, just to see how they are doing. This isn't something that can be assigned to a committee or individual to help end Military & Veteran suicide.

In closing I'd like to quote resolution No. 28 passed in 1981, "Many Veterans return home and miss the sense of purpose and belonging that they felt from military service." As a Legion family we can return that sense of purpose, regardless of when they returned from theater, Korea to the Global War on Terror, we have an obligation to our sisters and brothers in arms to look out from them as they did us. A simple phone call can save a life. Let's fight to end this so no one ever needs to ask "why" again.

The Veterans Crisis Line is a free, confidential resource that's available to anyone, even if you're not registered with VA or enrolled in VA health care. The caring, qualified responders at the Veterans Crisis Line are



specially trained and experienced in helping Veterans of all ages and circumstances.



Buy A Brick Fundraiser!

We are re-introducing an exciting fundraiser for our Post. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our landscaping project we are working. The engraving uses the same technology as used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are some FAQs:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs
- What Size Are the Bricks? 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.



- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$125 to \$500.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209 to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.

And Now, Something You Should All Know and Be Aware!

Out-of-Network Surprise Billing Disclosure

Surprise Billing—Know Your Rights Beginning January 1, 2020, Colorado state law protects you* from "surprise billing," also known as "balance billing."

What is surprise/balance billing, and when does it happen?

You are responsible for the cost-sharing amounts required by your health plan, including copayments, deductibles, and/or coinsurance. If you are seen by a provider or use services in a facility or agency that are not in your health plan's network, you may have to pay additional costs associated with that care. These providers or services at facilities or agencies are sometimes referred to as "tout of network."

Out-of-network facilities or agencies often bill you the difference between what your insurer decides is the eligible charge and what the out-of-network provider bills as the total charge. This is called "surprise" or "balance" billing.

When you CANNOT be balance-billed:

- Emergency Services. Not every service provided in an emergency department is an emergency service. If you are receiving emergency services, in most circumstances, the most you can be billed for is your plan's in-network cost-sharing amounts. You cannot be balanced-billed for any other amount. This includes both the emergency facility and any providers that see you for emergency care.
- Non-emergency Services at an In-Network or Out-of-Network Facility. The facility or agency
 must tell you if you are at an out of network location or at an in-network location that is using
 out of network providers. They must also tell you what types of services may be provided by
 any out-of-network provider.

You have the right to request that in-network providers perform all covered medical services. However, you may have to receive medical services from an out-of-network provider if an in-network provider is not available. In this case, the most you can be billed for covered services is your in-network cost-sharing amount (copayments, deductibles, and/or coinsurance). These providers cannot balance bill you.

Additional Protections:

- Your insurer will pay out-of-network providers and facilities directly. Again, you are only responsible for paying your in-network cost sharing for covered services.
- Your insurer must count any amount you pay for emergency services or certain out-of-network services (described above) toward your in-network deductible and out-of-pocket limit.
- Your provider or facility or agency must refund any amount you overpay within 60 days of being notified.
- A provider, hospital, or outpatient surgical facility cannot ask you to limit or give up these rights.

If you receive services from an out-of-network provider or facility or agency in any OTHER situation, you may still be balance billed, or you may be responsible for the entire bill. If you intentionally receive non-emergency services from an out of network provider or facility, you may also be balance billed.

BRINGING A LITTLE SOUTH TO THE WEST

Kids today are obsessed with electronic gaming. Whether on their tablet, laptop, or Smart Phone, they will spend hours at a time lost in their own little cyber world.

For a kid growing up in the 50's and 60's, we didn't have electronic gadgets to keep us occupied. Our escape was music. Those two decades arguably produced the best music of the 20th Century. And for those who would disagree, it's really not worth arguing about because you are

either tone deaf or have no appreciation for music.

Baby Boomers were just as obsessed with their music as kids today are with Minecraft and Grand Theft Auto. I firmly believe it was the music that defined our generation. It didn't matter where you lived; metro, rural, or suburbia, the music revolved around all kids of that generation.

There was music for all/any tastes. Whether it was country, folk, rock, or Motown, music was the center of most conversations, parties, or any after school activity. Our biggest challenge was scraping together the \$0.50 or \$0.65 to buy the 45rpm record featuring the latest hit.

45's, as they were called back then was the most popular format for music. Today, if you mention a 45, people look around for a semi-automatic weapon. 45's of the 50's and 60's was a different type of weapon. The songs played on those small records defined our political leanings, made us fall in love, consoled us when our heart was broken, and helped us just make it through the day. For the most part on a 45, there was one song per side, an A and B side. The A side was the hit and the reason you bought the record. The B side was typically something to fill the space. A record producer didn't want to put two hits on the same 45. That was a waste of money. They wanted us kids to buy two records, not just one. But occasionally, a B side song turned out to be a hit and sometimes the B side ended up being the bigger hit. But that was rare.

Now if you were wealthy, or saved up your money, you could splurge the \$2.00 for an LP (Long Playing) record, or commonly referred to as an album. That medium played at 33 1/3 rpm with a various number of songs, but typically it offered 7 songs per side. Unlike the 45, we didn't refer to the album as a 33 1/3. That would have been silly. The great thing about the LP was there was always at least 3 or 4 hits on the album, and about once a year, the record producer would release "The Best of..." or "The Greatest Hits of..." Those LPs normally cost a little more, but practically every song was a hit.

While we didn't have iPods that can store hours of music, the spindles on our record player was capable of stacking records. For 45's, you had a choice of a small yellow adapter that snapped onto the 45 to make the center hole small enough to fit on the spindle, but if you had the money, you could buy an adapter that fit onto the spindle that would accommodate the larger hole in the 45. The record player was automatic and when the record reached its end, the tone arm would raise and return to its home position to allow the spindle to release the next record.

Stacking records gave us the capability to listen to hours of music automatically. And until the 8-track tape came along in the mid-60's, this was how we listened to our music. With the invention and mass production of the 8-track, we were able to take our music on the road and had an option over the AM radio in our cars.

Just thinking about that music brings back fond memories. Most of us from that era can still recall where we were and what we were doing when our favorite song first hit the airwaves.

Now, go "put your glad rags on, join me hon'. We'll have some fun until the clock strikes one!" Let's kick off our shoes and head out to the gym or auditorium!
