Required:

- 5. Drive thru dinners will be offered upon request. When you RSVP, indicate it is a takeout order and what time you will be coming to pick up your order.
- 6. MASKS will be required to enter the Post.
- 7. Your temperature will be taken at the door, if you register above 100.4, you will be asked to leave.
- 8. These questions will be asked at the door:
 - a. Have you been exposed in the last 14 days to someone that has tested positive for COVID-19?
 - b. Do you have any symptoms of COVID-19?
 - c. Have you traveled to one of the pandemic hotspots in the last 14 days?

Please know these temporary changes are to keep everyone safe. We are looking forward to seeing everyone and hope everyone is well.



Buy A Brick Fundraiser!

We are re-introducing an exciting fundraiser for our Post. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our landscaping project we are working. The engraving uses the same technology as used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are some FAQs:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs
- What Size Are the Bricks? 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.



- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$125 to \$500.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209 to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.

Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know and we will make certain they are all placed together.



FROM OUR POST SERVICE OFFICER

Pikes Peak National Cemetery (PPNC)

PPNC is a 374-acre Department of Veterans Affairs national cemetery located in southeast Colorado Springs. The cemetery will reportedly serve burial needs for more than 95,000 Veterans, their spouses, and eligible family members for the next 100 years.

COLORADO SPRINGS – The National Cemetery Scheduling Office has begun accepting burial applications for eligible deceased veterans and their spouses for the Pikes Peak National Cemetery in Colorado Springs. For more information on burial eligibility or any additional questions, please call (719) 216-1025. The staff in Colorado Springs cannot accept burial applications in-person or by phone.

Next of kin or a funeral home acting on the eligible family's behalf can request burial at the Pikes Peak National Cemetery by contracting the St. Louis office at 1-866-900-6417 or by email at: NCA.scheduling@va.gov. You will be asked to call the toll-free number 1-800-535-1117 to complete the process. Those applying are asked to send a copy of the military discharge document/DD214 and Death Certificate (if applicable) to the National Cemetery Service Office.

What are the requirements for burial in National Cemetery?

The in-ground requirements are very stringent and some of the hardest to meet out of all national cemeteries. To be eligible for in-ground burial service, members must be one of the following: Retired from the military, a recipient of a high status medal or killed in action.

Get Veterans burial benefits. Eligibility. Find out if you qualify for burial in a VA national cemetery and for other burial honors.

Apply for a pre-need eligibility decision letter. This can help you pre-plan for burial. Learn how to apply for a Burial Allowance, to help pay for a Veteran's Funeral Services, Burial, and Transportation Costs.

Memorial items. Find out how to apply for Grave Markers, Headstones, Presidential Memorial Certificates, and other memorial items.

Burial in a VA national cemetery is open to all members of the armed forces and Veterans who have met minimum active duty service requirements, as applicable, and were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable. Members of the reserve components of the armed forces who die while on active duty or who die while on training duty under certain circumstances are also eligible for burial, as are service members and former service members who were eligible for retired pay at the time of their death.

A Veteran's spouse, widow or widower, minor children, and, under certain conditions, unmarried adult children with disabilities, may also be eligible for burial. Eligible spouses and children may be buried even if they predecease the Veteran.

VA provides the gravesite, grave liner, opening and closing of the grave, government headstone or marker, U.S. burial flag, Presidential Memorial Certificate and perpetual care of the gravesite at no cost to the family.

VA operates 150 national cemeteries and 34 soldiers' lots and monument sites in 42 states and Puerto Rico. More than 4 million Americans, including Veterans of every war and conflict, are

buried in national cemeteries. VA provides funding to establish, expand, improve and maintain 117 Veterans cemeteries in 48 states and territories including tribal trust lands, Guam, and Saipan. For Veterans not buried in a VA national cemetery, VA provides headstones, markers or medallions to commemorate their service. In 2017, VA honored more than 361,892 Veterans and their loved ones with memorial benefits in national, state, tribal and private cemeteries.

Information on VA burial benefits is available from local VA national cemetery offices, from the Internet at www.cem.va.gov, or by calling VA regional offices toll-free at 800-827-1000. To make burial arrangements at any open VA national cemetery at the time of need, call the National Cemetery Scheduling Office at 800-535-1117.

FUNDING HEALTHCARE FOR OUR VETERANS: Today, the President signed legislation providing our veterans with the funding they have earned through their sacrifices for our country.

- President Trump signed S. 2372, the John S. McCain III, Daniel K. Akaka, and Samuel R. Johnson VA Maintaining Internal Systems and Strengthening Integrated Outside Networks Act of 2018, or the VA MISSION Act of 2018.
- America's veterans deserve timely access to the highest quality of care possible and funding for the programs that keep them healthy and well.
 - That is why President Trump and the Department of Veterans Affairs worked closely with Congress and Veterans Service Organizations to create draft legislation to support our veterans.
- The VA MISSION Act provides \$5.2 billion in mandatory funding for the Veterans Choice program until a new consolidated program is implemented, which provides veterans with flexibility to receive care at both Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and private health facilities.
- Since its creation in 2014, more than two million veterans have used the Veterans Choice program and have scheduled more than 41 million appointments in their communities.

STREAMLINING VETERANS CHOICE: The VA MISSION Act consolidates the VA's community care programs, creating a new, single program for veterans care.

- The VA MISSION Act takes the long-overdue step of consolidating the complex, bureaucratic
 web created by seven different veterans community care programs into one unified program,
 simplifying and strengthening healthcare opportunities for America's veterans.
 - The new program is projected to take effect one year from enactment.
 - The new consolidated program will increase transparency and accountability, and ensure that veterans receive the right care at the right time with the right provider.
 - The bill also accelerates the processing of claims by community providers so that they are addressed in a prompt and timely manner.
 - The bill authorizes access to walk-in community clinics, so that veterans have immediate, local access to non-emergency convenience care.
 - The new program strengthens the process between the VA and the community healthcare providers who prescribe opioids to veterans.

IMPROVING AND EXPANDING CARE: The VA MISSION Act provides new resources and creates new programs to build on and improve the care our veterans receive.

- The VA MISSION Act expands eligibility for the Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers program, allowing caregivers for all veterans to access.
- The bill removes barriers for telemedicine, provides additional resources for hiring and retaining healthcare professionals, and establishes mobile deployment teams to support underserved facilities, among other important steps to improve veterans' care.
- The bill further allows the VA to modernize its assets and infrastructure to serve our veterans in the best possible way.

On Wednesday, June 6, 2018, the President signed into law:

S. 2372, the "John S. McCain III, Daniel K. Akaka, and Samuel R. Johnson VA Maintaining Internal Systems and Strengthening Integrated Outside Networks Act of 2018" or the "VA MISSION Act of 2018," which contains provisions to: (1) create a new, permanent Veterans Community Care Program to consolidate all of VA's authorities related to providing care through non-VA providers; (2) amend certain VA health care authorities; (3) expand the Family Caregivers Program to veterans of all service eras; (4) establish an independent commission to oversee VA's asset and infrastructure review process; (5) establish a Center for Innovation for Care and Payment; and (6) address miscellaneous issues.

BRINGING A LITTLE SOUTH TO THE WEST

Last month I wrote about the different types of records available to us when I was growing up. I think this month I'd like to share with you some of my favorite artists of the day. I suspect many of you will easily associate with some of my favorites,

even if you don't agree with my picks.

Being a boy from Memphis, I am honor bound to start my pick with Memphis' favorite son, Elvis Presley. Even though he was born in Tupelo, MS. about an hour and a half away, he claimed Memphis as his home and that's really where he got his start. He showed up one day at Sun Records in the mid 50's in downtown Memphis with his guitar to record a song for his mother. Sam Phillips, the owner of the record studio found his style and voice to be very unique and what he was looking for in a new Memphis sound. Elvis had a more than 20 year run as an artist and earned the title of "King of Rock and Roll." It would be impossible for me to say what my absolute favorite is by him, but some of my favorite songs include *I Can't Help Falling In Love With You, Wooden Heart, My Way,* and *The American Trilogy*. He pretty much ruled the Juke Boxes and radio until around 1964.

In 1956, a young bespectacled man wearing what we used to call Birth Control Glasses (thick black rimmed glasses) opened for Elvis. This helped launch the career of a Lubbock Texas boy who went on to record standards such as *Peggy Sue, True Love Ways*, and *That'll Be The Day*, among many other great songs. Sadly, a mere three years later, Buddy Holly died in a plane crash in Clear Lake Iowa in February 1959 along with Richie Valens (*La Bamba, Oh Donna*), and JP 'The Big Bopper' Richardson (*Chantilly Lace*). We lost some great singers/songwriters that day. So much so that 11 years later, Don McClain released his huge hit *American Pie*, declaring that was "the day the music died." An interesting bit of trivia, Buddy's Bass Guitar Player, Waylon

Jennings was supposed to be on the plane with Buddy, but he gave up his seat at the last minute to 'The Big Bopper.' It is said by many this decision haunted Waylon for the rest of his life.

While the music didn't die with that plane crash, it makes me wonder what other great songs could have been written and released by these rising stars. And to prove the music didn't die in 1959, a phenomenon occurred in 1964 that changed the face and tone of Rock and Roll, the British Invasion. This was the term given to the British bands who crossed the pond and began singing in the US. The indisputable champion of British groups was The Beatles. I really liked their older songs, but they got weird and I guess the fame and fortune took its toll as suggested by their later songs. I much preferred *Hard Days Night* and *She Loves You* over *Hey Jude*.

There were many other very good music artists that popped up during this same time. Who could forget Diana Ross and The Supremes? I don't anyone who didn't have a crush on Diana Ross, especially when she sang *Baby Love!* Other Motown greats included Otis Redding's (*Sittin' On*) *The Dock Of The Bay,* and Aretha's *R-E-S-P-E-C-T!* And as controversial as it was back in the day with their anti-war leaning, we all sang along with Peter, Paul, and Mary's *If I Had A Hammer,* and *Leaving On A Jet Plane.*

There were so many great songs, songwriters, and musicians during the 50's and 60's, I could devote pages just naming some of my favorites, and would still miss a few. People today still love to listen to the Rock, Folk, and Motown hits from those wonder years, but for us who lived it when they were first released, it is very spe cial. As Jay and the Americans so aptly put it, just living back then provided us with *This Magic Moment!*

So Take Me Home, Country Roads down memory lane and around Dead Man's Curve to Memphis, TN.

I guess I should say I'm Sorry for all the cliches and metaphors, but That's Alright Mama.
