The first annual Junior Shooting Sports Conference was held in Indianapolis on September 18, 19 and 20. I was privileged to attend in place of Mr. John Centa, the Department of Colorado Junior Shooting Sports Chairman. Discussions covered several related topics including starting and sustaining a JSSP club, coaching credentials, background checks, insurance coverage and the 2015 National Championship. It was announced that the 2015 Postal will start on 11/01/2015 and the next National Championship will be held at the Olympic Training Center on July 19 to 23rd 2016. National would like to replace the JSSP postal contest with a Department shoulder to shoulder contest sometime in the future.

The following recommendations were decided upon at the conference: Each Department should name a JSSP Chairman and JSSP club lists should be checked for accuracy. Colorado has 34 clubs listed and it isn't known how many are active. JSSP Clubs should be required to renew every year as this will automatically keep the club lists up to date.

Next year's conference will cover the 2016 Postal, grant writing, and the Orion scoring system. Representatives will be present from Crossman and Daisy to discuss the use and care of their air rifles. A representative will be there from the CMP to discuss what they do and the benefits of affiliation.

This was a very good conference and well worth the time to attend. John Centa attended our Junior Shooting class on Wednesday September 30th and had high praise for our program here at Post 209. We thank him for his attendance and plan to work together to start JSSP programs at other Posts here in Colorado.

Our current Jr. Shooting class ends November 4th. The NRA marksmanship continues November 11th & 18th. There are no classes scheduled November 25th. Practice for the Legion Postal Competition will be December 4th and the Postal Contest will be December 9th. No Young Guns classes after December 9th through the end of the calendar year. We will start again with the next class on February 10th 2016. This class still has openings but will fill up fast. Last of the clauses of the Preamble:

TO CONSECRATE AND SANCTIFY OUR COMRADESHIP BY OUR DEVOTION TO MUTUAL HELPFULNESS...The last or 10th clause of our Preamble is the most important ideal expressed in our Preamble. It marked a new concept in America—a concept that made The American Legion the greatest force for social betterment in all the history of the United States. Let us be factual and examine this.

At the close of World War I, America was just emerging from its lusty era of rugged individualism. It was an era when the individual hammered out his own destiny and progress with little or no help from the government. An honest facing of the facts brings out that American society was then a cold society insofar as any organized public hands of helpfulness were concerned.

When the Veterans of World War I came marching home, they found the nation utterly unprepared to care for the combat casualties of the war. The wounded, the shell-shocked and the sick were lodged in poor houses, jails, and asylums or what-have-you.

The American Legion wrote such laws, had them introduced in the Congress, went out over the land to arouse the conscience of the people of America and mobilize support for its legislative aims. It did both with a sacrificial fervor that overcame all obstacles. The Congress enacted the laws, it provided the administrative machinery, it appropriated the funds, it built hospitals. Then to bring about a single responsibility for the carrying out of all Veteran laws and to achieve a unification of these government services, The American Legion put through Congress the legislation to create the Veterans Bureau which has become the Veterans Administration of today.

This is how we can hail The American Legion today as an unparalleled force in these United States for social betterment. American Legion concepts and its ideal of devotion to mutual helpfulness warmed up the whole social climate of America. Today, America is extending its helpful hands all over the world through our assistance programs of foreign aid. It all came about because the veterans of World War I came home enriched with wonderful ties of friendship and gave those ties a meaning by consecrating them to the ideal of mutual helpfulness.

The American Legion Preamble has been the beacon light of The American Legion for more than 90 years. It has been amended only once in all that time. That amendment consisted of adding the letter "S" to the word "war." It makes the Preamble read today "Great Wars," so as to embrace all wars.

My last three words to all of you are: **GO TO CHURCH!!!!!!**

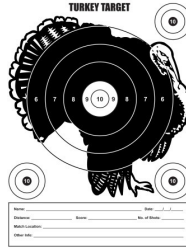

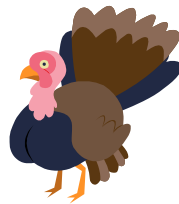
THIRD ANNUAL TURKEY SHOOT

From the Historian; Remembrance of Tom Eric Testorff

Some at Post 209 know that I lost my brother, Sp4 Thomas E. Testorff, US Army, Killed in Action, Quang Tri Province, Vietnam. Tom might be the principal reason I joined the American Legion. It was to honor his memory, and maybe get to know others like him that I first considered Post 209. As a “Gold Star,” I was asked to write a little about Tom - who he was, and my remembrances of him.

Tommy has always been a hero to me. There was his training, his letters home, and Vietnam. But there was also a Tom that existed before the Army. Much like our brother Lee, Tom was musical, played in a band, and had a sense of humor. He was an older brother that you could look up to, and know that he was earnest and meant what he said.

My big brothers knew about things like science, and football, and how to tie a tie, and life, and fishing, and the world beyond our neighborhood. Both had been Scouts. Both cared about the planet and the people on it. They both cared about Vietnam, and each in his own way wanted greatly for our country to be a force for good in the world.

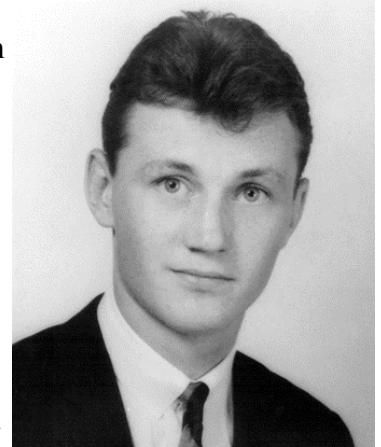
One year they put together a bicycle for my birthday out of parts they had cobbled together. They painted it blue - my favorite color - and it was the greatest bike in the world.

Tom had an old car that was much the same way. He put it together from parts of other cars, and it was loud, rusty and smelly. It had been hit, so it was a little lop-sided when it drove down the street. To a kid like me, it was the greatest car in the world. Likewise, Tom had rescued Moose, who had been a mangy, kind of smelly dog. Moose was crippled and was a bit lop-sided when he walked, and for some reason, when Tom drove off in that car, Moose always had to follow as far as he could: car and dog, both leaning the same way. Moose would usually keep watch until Tommy got home.

When I was small, one of my fondest memories of Tom was a game he used to play with me where I would stand on top of a brick wall. The wall was about 3 feet high, but seemed a lot higher to me then. Tom would be standing on the ground below the wall, and I would turn with my back to him and just let myself fall...He always caught me. I never doubted it.

Tommy was big-hearted, he would rescue a sickly little dog one minute, then throw himself into the middle of a fight the next, just to lend a hand to a friend. His headstone reads, “Greater love hath no man...” The rest of the verse is: “...than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends.” He did just that in faraway Vietnam.

I have been without him now most of my life, but I know he’s saying to me, “Don’t sweat it, little bro. Things will be ok.” Tom was that kind of person.

BRINGING A LITTLE SOUTH TO THE WEST

In a previous article, I mentioned Mr. Burma Hobbs and promised a follow up on this very unique character from my southern memories. Constable Burma, as he was called in polite company covered DeSoto County, Mississippi just across the state line from Memphis, Tennessee. Now when I say he covered DeSoto County, I mean he COVERED the entire county as if it were his private residence. Many would argue it was. He was the law in that county and his decisions were rarely disputed. Underage drinkers, especially those who dared to cross into DeSoto County from Memphis, were in for a night to remember if they were caught by “Mr. Burma.” He was a short man with an even shorter temper. I will always believe the Jackie Gleason character in *Smokey and the Bandit* was modeled after Burma. That was Burma incarnate and I think most people who had any encounter with him would agree. His reputation was cemented the night he stopped Miss Tennessee Universe and her date for a minor traffic offense and then ended up chasing them around their car, waving his 2-foot-long flashlight. A local cartoonist, Draper Hill once called DeSoto County “the independent state of Hobbs.”

Many of the Memphis Police Officers, especially those patrolling the state-line were not Burma fans. It seems Constable Hobbs would sometimes confuse where his jurisdiction ended and he would follow (read that as chase) suspected speeders and other offenders across the state line into Tennessee and into Memphis city limits. This happened more times that you would imagine. And when it did, the Memphis cops would pull Burma over and remind him he was out of bounds. I think Burma would do that believing he might be able to sneak into town and get back without being spotted. Wrong!

As a teenager growing up in that part of the country, I would often venture into the Hobbs empire. As with everyone else, I was completely aware of Burma’s constant presence and seemingly omniscient eye. But as with everyone else, that didn’t deter me from being a typical teen. There didn’t appear to me there was any rhyme or reason to how he levied justice. I guess it all depended on how his day had gone previous to our meeting.

Constable Burma Hobbs served the good people of DeSoto County, Mississippi for many years. He was revered by some and reviled by others. Regardless of what anyone thought of Burma, he kept the peace in the county and was not afraid to confront any one person or group (gang). While short in stature, he was tall in commanding respect for his position. Bless his heart. May he rest in peace.
