I recently had the great honor to represent the Department of Colorado at National American Legion College at the National Headquarters in Indianapolis, Indiana. Over this week I had the opportunity to not only learn more about The American Legion but see the organization in a new light. In all the moments throughout the week walking into the National Executive Committee (NEC) Room, where history such as the G.I. Bill of rights, the creation of the legacy scholarship fund or support for burn pit victims was passed. I had the opportunity to read a resolution of my own, one out of twenty-seven that will now be considered by the NEC. Below is the resolution.



NATIONAL AMERICAN LEGION COLLEGE OF THE AMERICAN LEGION November 13-19, 2021 Indianapolis, Indiana

Resolution No. D1-001-2020 Creation of the Afghanistan War Remembrance Day Origin: National American Legion College Class of 2020 Submitted by: District 1, National American Legion College Class of 2020

WHEREAS, The American Legion preamble states, "To preserve the memories and incidents of our associations in all wars"; and

WHEREAS, On October 7, 2001, the United States began operations in Afghanistan responding to the al-Qaida orchestrated September 11 terrorist attacks; and

WHEREAS, Operation Enduring Freedom continued from October 7, 2001, to December 31, 2014; and

WHEREAS, Operation Freedom's Sentinel followed Operation Enduring Freedom and continued from January 1, 2015, to August 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, Throughout the course of Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Freedom's Sentinel, 2,022 U.S. servicemembers were killed in action, 534 died from non-hostile actions, and 20,761 were wounded in action; and

WHEREAS, Throughout the course of Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Freedom's Sentinel four U.S. DoD civilians were killed in action, and two died from non-hostile actions; and

WHEREAS, 1,822 civilian contractors were killed in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Freedom's Sentinel; and

WHEREAS, Those numbers include all servicemembers, DoD civilians, and civilian contractors serving in theaters in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Freedom's Sentinel; and

WHEREAS, The last U.S. servicemember departed the Afghanistan theater on August 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, National Vietnam War Veterans Day is a national observance commemorated every year on March 29 as a day to honor the servicemembers who served in the Vietnam War; and

WHEREAS, Each year, the President of the United States issues a proclamation designating July 27 as a day of national observance in honor of National Korean War Armistice Day; now therefore; be it

RESOLVED, By District 1, National American Legion College Class of 2020 of The American Legion in regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, November 13-19, 2021, That The American Legion strongly urges Congress to recognize August 30 of each year as the official end of the war in Afghanistan, by proclaiming this date as "Afghanistan War Remembrance Day" as an official national observance of The United States.

This resolution is a small thank you and dedication to all my sisters and brothers who have sacrificed so much, up to their lives.

Lastly This month, as you gather with family and friends, Charyse and I want to wish all of you a very Merry Christmas and happy holidays. For many of our nation's military families, the holidays are a merry time, a time to reunite, but for families who are apart, this time of year is especially hard, and it's a reminder that our troops aren't the only ones who serve and sacrifice. Their families do too. We as an American Legion Family are here, for everyone, the active duty servicemember, veterans, and their families. We all look forward in seeing you in the next year!

If you do not remember/know how to march or fold the flag, we will teach you. The only two items that a new Honor Guard member needs to get on their own is a Legion cap (or SAL/ALA as applicable) and shoes (multiple options available). All other uniforms items that you need are provided by the Honor Guard. You do not have 3-5 hours a month? That is okay, you can still help the Honor Guard by telling others in the Legion, Sons, or Auxiliary (Post 209 or other Posts in the area) about

Buy A Brick Fundraiser!

We are re-introducing an exciting fundraiser for our Post. We are partnering with Polar Engraving to offer our members, family, friends, and our corporate Veteran-friendly supporters an opportunity to purchase an engraved brick to adorn our landscaping project we are working. The engraving uses the same technology as used on tombstones so it's extremely durable. Here are some FAQs:

- What Are We Having? A Brick Fundraising Event
- Why? To Further Funding of our American Legion Programs
- What Size Are the Bricks? 4"x 8" or 8"x 8" bricks for individuals, and 8"x 8" or 12"x 12" bricks for our corporate supporters.
- What are the Costs for the Individual Bricks? Prices vary depending on size, style and lettering desired, but typically range from \$90 to \$200. For the 8x8 or 12x12 bricks, you can add a second emblem. Contact the Adjutant for ordering details. There is **NO** additional cost for the second emblem on the larger bricks.
- What are the Costs for the Corporate/Veteran Supporter Bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$250 to \$500.
- What is the Difference between Individual and Corporate Bricks? Individual bricks are identified for Veterans, and family members of Veterans wishing to purchase a brick to honor their Veteran. The corporate bricks are for our Veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who wish to show their continued support to our Nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the Brick Purchase Restricted to Members of the Post 209 Family? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves as a lasting memory of their association with Post 209. We also welcome anyone to purchase a brick for their Veteran loved one, or to show their support to our Veterans.
- Can I Buy a 12"x 12" Brick for Myself/Loved One? Absolutely!
- Where Do I Go to Buy a Brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209 to buy your brick. The site is very user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. You will be able to see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- How Do I Pay For the Brick? We have the site setup to accept payment via PayPal or by check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where Will the Brick Be Shipped? All bricks will be shipped to the Post. We will notify you when it arrives and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What Will Become of My Brick? It will be placed near the Flagpole at the Post and will be part of the landscaping design we are working. If you are a landscaper or know a good one (preferably a Veteran), have them contact our Adjutant.
- How Long Will this Fundraiser Effort Last? We plan to only sell as many bricks as needed for the first phase of the landscaping project. Currently, that is anticipated to be 600 bricks, but that number may change depending on brick sizes purchased and the final design approved by the Post.
- Will I Have an Opportunity to Buy a Brick Later? Quite possibly. It depends on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.

Order your brick(s) now to ensure you get one in Phase One of our project. If you buy multiple bricks, let our Adjutant know and we will make certain they are all placed together.



BRINGING A LITTLE SOUTH TO THE WEST



I believe every generation experienced a national or world event so impactful, they knew where they were and what they were doing when it occurred. For example, if I could ask my grandfather, he would likely tell me it was the sinking of the ocean liner RMS Lusitania by a German U-Boat, which catapulted us into the "War to End All Wars!" and

he would probably also tell me it was the bombing of Pearl Harbor. I have to believe for my Dad, there may have been a few. The first probably was 7 December, 1941, "...a date which will live in infamy..." an event that resulted in both he and his father joining the US Army and serving during WWII, the second war to end all wars, and maybe when man first stepped foot on the moon. Then there was the assassination of President, Kennedy, and his last life-changing event had to have been 9/11.

Interestingly for me, those life-changing events I just mentioned for my Dad I can also claim, with the exception of the Pearl Harbor attack. Now don't misunderstand. I'm not ignoring my wedding day, nor the birth of our two sons or our grandkids. Those were obviously very special and life-changing, but this is not what I'm talking about. The one event that was probably most profound to me was the Kennedy assassination. I still have vivid memories of that day. I was attending a Memphis City School and my teacher was a proud Texan. When the news came over the intercom, she broke down and cried like a baby. I don't know which upset me more, a teacher crying in front of her students, something I'd not seen before nor since, or the assassination of a sitting US President.

Looking back at those previous generations, I am in awe of how Americans responded to those events. History has shown that Americans did not shy away or run and hide and "hunker down" (Southern term) and wait for the badness to go away. Instead, they joined together to respond head-on to each one.

There are many of us who can remember the events I recounted, and you may have some others I didn't mention that were life-changing for you. Those events could be either/both good and bad. Which you can recall and how it affected you and those around you are very personal to each of us.

I'm guessing many of you would add the COVID-19 pandemic to the list. I guess it was first discovered in December, 2019 in Wuhan, China. I don't know the exact date it made its way to the US, theories abound. And there are some out there who don't believe it even exists. They believe it is a government hoax. Regardless which camp you fall into regarding COVID, most of us agree it changed how we go about our daily lives.

We've read and seen how history recorded our reaction to the events I mentioned and the others from previous generations. So, what will history write about us and how we reacted/responded to the latest life-changing event? Will it read that we locked ourselves in our house/prison to wait out the pandemic, or will it say we pulled together, adapted and overcame?

I submit to you that it needs to say we stepped up. We didn't let this disease or anything else keep us from living. Sure, we've had to change how we do some things. We were and are still required to "mask up" in some places. We get vaccinations, or we don't. But whatever we are doing, we are doing it differently than we did 3 or 4 years ago.

No matter your personal decision or belief, our lives are different as a result of the pandemic. Our daily routine is not the same as it was a few short years ago. Good, Bad, or Indifferent, we have all had to change. Are we changing for the better? Are we helping others and ensuring we are doing all we can? Let history record that we, as the family of The American Legion were there for our Veterans and their family yesterday, today, and tomorrow. We were there then, we are there now, and we will be there...Always!
