# From our Post Historian



In the opening salvos of the Spanish-American War, Commodore George Dewey's seven-warship U.S. Asiatic Squadron destroyed the Spanish Pacific fleet on 1 May 1898 in the Philippines Battle of Manila Bay without suffering a single American combat fatality. Immediately hailed as the "Hero of Manila," Dewey became the only Naval officer in American history to attain the rank of Admiral of the Navy.

On 1 May 1960, former USAF pilot Francis Gary Powers was shot down by a surface-to-air missile over the Soviet Union while conducting a CIA-sponsored U-2 aerial reconnaissance mission. While the U.S. initially claimed the plane went off course on a meteorological mission, the Russians embarrassingly exhibited the captured pilot, plane, and processed camera rolls to the world, convicting Powers of espionage in a Moscow show trial.

Osama bin Laden, founder of Islamic terrorist group al Qaeda, was killed in Pakistan by a team of Navy SEALs on 2 May 2011. While his death was a welcomed accomplishment in the "War on Terror," no other person had a greater impact on early 21st century American security and defense policy, and contributed to global instability.

On 5 May 1961, Navy Commander Alan Shepard was launched aboard the Freedom 7 space capsule on a 15-minute suborbital flight, becoming the first American astronaut launched into space. Ten years later, Shepard became the fifth man to walk on the moon as part of the Apollo 14 lunar mission.

"The American Legion" was adopted as our organization's official name at the Saint Louis Caucus on 5 May 1919.

8 May 1945 – Americans celebrated the victorious end of WWII in Europe, dubbed "VE Day," with the unconditional surrender of Nazi Germany. Harry Truman had been President less than one month, following the untimely death of President Franklin D. Roosevelt on 12 April. Having served as an artillery officer in France during the First World War and a founding member of the first American Legion Post in his native Missouri state, Truman earned the distinction as the first Legionnaire to become U.S. President. Upon suddenly inheriting the role of American wartime commander in chief, Truman remarked, "I felt like the moon, the stars and all the planets had fallen on me."

On 9 May 1997, following the American restoration of diplomatic relations with Vietnam, former USAF Captain Douglas Peterson became the first U.S. Ambassador to Vietnam since the 1975 fall of Saigon. Shot down on 1966 bomber mission over Hanoi, Peterson had been held as a POW for six years during the Vietnam War.



The Berlin Airlift, considered an early "battle victory" of the Cold War, came to end on 12 May 1949. Eleven months earlier, in retaliation for the Allied nations' formation of Western Germany, the Soviet Union blockaded all road, rail, and water communication routes into West Berlin in an attempt to force the isolated city into Soviet control. In the first major test of the newly formed U.S. Air Force, America (and Britain) responded with the largest airlift in history, flying in over 2.3 million tons of food, fuel, and supplies to the beleaguered city around the clock for eleven months. Six years later, when Western Germany became a NATO member in May 1955, the Soviet Union responded by establishing a "Warsaw Pact" organization of seven Soviet-controlled Eastern European nations.



On 15 May 1942, the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps (WAACs) was established, granting women official military status. Though performing "non-combatant" roles, the WAACs served in every theater of war and paved the way for the eventual integration of women into every component of military service.

Traditionally, "Decoration Day" began in May 1868 to adorn the Arlington National cemetery graves of Civil War dead. Memorial Day, observed the last Monday of May, is set aside to remember those who have died in military service to our nation. Lest we forget.

# From our Color/Honor Guard Captain

The Honor Guard has continued to support Final Honors at various locations, supported the Post 209 Post Everlasting in March, and supported the Honor Bell ceremony in March to present the artifacts that are going to be part of Honor Bell 002. Over the last few months, the Honor Guard has also been making uniform changes to increase the impact the Honor Guard makes during events. The team now wears black berets, which allows the Honor Guard to have uniform headgear across all members. The transition to black cords and black ascots for Final Honors and other somber events ties in the team's uniform to the meaning of the event. This also makes a better incorporation of ALR Color Guard members to help support events where both teams are involved. The gold cords are now used only for Color Guard related events, along with the gold ascots. New jackets have been purchased due to Flag & Emblem no longer carrying the standard jackets the team has used for several years. The new jackets are black and much less prone to fading. We are in the process of putting Velcro on all patches to be used, allowing for easier transition to other members, especially across the Legion Family.

The ability to put together a Post 209 Color Guard to compete in the Color Guard Competition at the National Convention is still hopefully a possibility. Post 209 has over 1,000 members, is the largest Post in Colorado, and is recognized as one of the most active posts (or most active) in the Department. A member of Post 209, Jay Bowen, is on the path to becoming the National Commander in 2026. The Post just needs <u>four</u> Legionnaires with the desire and commitment to be the best. I do not know if there has ever been a Post win the competition and become the National Commander's Color Guard for a National Commander from their Post. I doubt it has ever happened and Post 209 has an opportunity to do something truly outstanding.

It appears March is the month when the Honor Guard has to deny the first Final Honors request of the year. This time the team was unable to ensure Navy veteran Edwin Bernard received the Final Honors he was entitled to and earned. We were unable to support the event because the team was **one member** short of the three required. The Honor Guard needs to gain more new team members in order to ensure we are able to continue supporting our veterans and our community. Understandably, not everyone has much time to participate in the Honor Guard. In reality, all someone needs are a few available hours: about an hour to participate a night for a training meeting (check the newsletter calendar or the calendar on the Honor Guard website - <a href="https://legion209.org/honorguard209/">https://legion209.org/honorguard209/</a>) and up to a couple of hours for an event. So around three hours a month for a meeting and just **ONE** event is all you need to make a difference in helping support our veterans and our community. Members of The American Legion, the Sons of The American Legion, and The American Legion Auxiliary are all eligible to be members of the Honor Guard with all uniform items provided except Legion family-specific cap and shoes. # From Our Junior Shooting Sports Program (JSSP)

The Spring 2025 session has ended. The Awards Night and Pizza Party was held on Wednesday April 16, 2025. Three new students completed the Young Guns program, all siblings. William was the session's Top Shot, with both William and Diana receiving the Eagle Eye Award for shooting a perfect bullseye. The Marksmanship course had the following NRA MQP Air Rifle awards earned:

- One student earned Pro-Marksman, Marksman, and Sharpshooter;
- One student earned Pro-Marksman and Marksman; and
- One student earned Sharpshooter.

The Fall 2025 session for Marksmanship and Young Guns will start in September. Applications can be submitted at any time. Youth ages 10-18 years old (boys and girls) have the opportunity to learn about firearms safety and basic shooting skills. During Young Guns, credentialed National Rifle Association (NRA) Basic Rifle Instructors teach the safe handling of firearms, shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing), how to zero a rifle, and how to score targets. At the end of the course, the youths have a competition shoot in order to show off the skills they have learned. The Marksmanship Course provides graduates of Young Guns the opportunity to further develop their shooting skills. Both courses have a credentialed NRA Range Safety Officer (RSO) overseeing the range and ensuring all activities are conducted safely and in accordance with the JSSP Range Standard Operating Procedures (SOP). If you have a child, grandchild, niece, nephew, neighbor kid, etc. interested in learning about firearm safety, contact the Post 209 JSSP at: jssp209@gmail.com

The JSSP still needs Instructors, RSOs, and Volunteers to support the program to ensure the continuation of quality instruction and a safe range for the students taking part in the program(s). Currently, the program has four primary dual Instructors/RSOs, with an additional RSO available. There must be an Instructor and a RSO present for each class. When two or more instructors are unavailable, the courses risk being canceled for those nights.

### Bringing A Little South to the West

Things have certainly changed since I was a child. I'm talking about how young people today render respect to adults. Growing up, if asked a "yes" or "no" question from any grownup, my answer ALWAYS included either "yes ma'am (or sir depending who asked), or no ma'am or sir.

Nowadays, most kids just answer "yeah," or "yes." If you do find a child answering respectfully with "yes ma'am," many people will comment, "I guess you're from a military family." So, should my takeaway from that comment be that the only kids with manners are children of military families? That may be the case today, but not when I was growing up.

Anyone who served on active duty in any branch of service learned on day 1 that addressing an officer of any rank included either "sir" or "ma'am" depending on who you were addressing. But if you said that to an NCO, you would typically hear, "Don't call me sir, I work for a living!" This was suggested to indicate officers direct and order, while NCOs carried out the orders and worked to execute the directive. Even now when talking with many Veterans, if I refer to them as "sir" or "ma'am," I'm likely hear the same response unless talking with a former officer. It just became a habit, or maybe it was what some would call "Common Courtesy." But don't get me started on anything related to "common." I don't think it exists any longer.

And I don't think it was restricted to southern families, although I tend to hear it more from that region of the country than most others today. Back in the day, it was just something taught to all kids across the country and at a very young age. It was a means of rendering proper respect to adults and this was the manner in which it was done.

Also, when did it become the norm to respond to a "thank you" with "of course?" What the heck does that mean anyway? Are they saying, "well of course you should thank me?" What happened to a simple "your welcome?" That's two words, just as "of course" is.

I guess I just don't get it. My fear is we've become too informal and insensitive when it comes to paying respect to others. It feels we've lost what many would call "Common Courtesy."

If it is a "military family" or "southern" thing, then maybe we need to infiltrate more southerners and military families into our society. Maybe we need to get them into a Veterans Service Organization such as The American Legion and have them write monthly periodicals for their local newsletters. Would that work? What if we could get a southerner who was retired military to actually write the articles? Would that help return us to the days of "Common Courtesy?" Sounds like a pipe dream. Where in the world would you find a southerner living out west that was also retired military and willing to write a monthly newsletter article for their American Legion Post?

# Walk of Honor

- What are the costs for the individual bricks? Prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering desired but typically range from \$75 to \$200, depending on size.
- What are the costs for the corporate/veteran supporter bricks? Again, prices vary depending on size, style, and lettering but typically range from \$125 to \$500.
- What is the difference between individual and corporate bricks? Individual bricks are for veterans and family members wishing to purchase a brick to honor their veterans. The corporate bricks are for our veteran-friendly supporters and businesses who want to show their continued support for our nation's heroes by purchasing a brick.
- Is the brick purchase restricted to members of the Post 209 families? No. We encourage members to buy a brick for themselves for their veteran loved ones or to show their support for our veterans.
- Where do I go to buy a brick? We have a link on our website. Just visit legion209.org and click on "Walk of Honor." Or, you can visit <a href="http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209">http://polarengraving.com/ALPost209</a> to buy your brick. The site is user-friendly and will walk you through the design and purchase. In addition, you will see a preview of your brick before finalizing the purchase.
- **How do I pay for the brick?** We have the site set up to accept payment via PayPal or check. PayPal is an extremely safe way to purchase a brick, and you don't need a PayPal account to use it.
- Where will the brick be shipped? All bricks will be sent to the post. We will notify you when it arrives, and you are welcome to stop by and see the brick you have purchased.
- What will become of my brick? It will be placed near the flagpole at the post in the area we call the Walk of Honor.
- How long will this fundraiser effort last? We plan to continue selling bricks until the Walk of Honor is covered with personalized bricks.
- Will I have an opportunity to buy a brick later? Quite possibly, depending on what is decided/approved for the next phase of our project.
